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Constantinople, October 13. N. S.

THE Grand Signior having resolved to remove to this Place from *Andrinople*, the Aga with the *Janizaries* under his Command marched from thence on the 26 of *August*, and the Grand Signior with his whole Court set out on the 28th, and arrived here the 7th of the last Month. My Lord *Paget*, Ambassador from the King of *Great-Britain*, came hither on the 16th of *September*, and made a very noble Entry, all the *English* Gentlemen and Merchants here went as far as *Ponte-Grande*, to wait on his Excellency, and to accompany him into Town. The same day came into our Port an Envoy Extraordinary from the Czar of *Muscovy*, on board a Frigate of 36 Guns, in 6 days from *Azof* which very much surprized the *Turks*, to see a Ship of War come from those Parts. The Business this Envoy is sent about, is said to be to confirm the Truce concluded at *Carlowitz* between the Czar and the Sultan, and to negotiate the Continuation of it for a longer term of Years, or to conclude a Peace. The Envoy Extraordinary of *Poland* having finished his Negotiation at this Court, which related chiefly to the Evacuation of *Gaminiec*, had Audience of Leave of the Grand Signior this day, and will set out from hence in a day or two on his return home. We have received an account, that the Grand Signior's Forces sent out against the *Arabs* that were in Arms near *Babylon*, have engaged and totally routed them, so that this Rebellion is entirely suppressed.

Venice, Octob. 30. The Dutchess-Dowager of *Hanouer* arrived here the 27th Instant from *Modena*, and yesterday she left this Place in order to continue her Journey to *Vienna*, whither she is going to be present at the lying in of the Queen of the *Romans* her Daughter. A considerable Sum of Money was sent last week to General *Mocenigo*, to pay the *Venetian* Forces under his Command in *Dalmatia*. Our Letters from thence give an Account, that the Commissioners for regulating the Limits continue their Conferences, and have already made so great a Progress therein, that it's not doubted but they will have fully executed their Commission before Winter. The Duke of *Mantua* is returned hither from *Rovigo*. Signior *Pisani*, who was *Proveditore* of the *Venetian* Army in the *Morea*, is arrived here from that Country.

Warsaw, Octob. 24. Most of the Senators appointed to confer with Baron *Overbeck* and Monsieur *Werner*, Deputies from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, in order to put the last Hand to the Treaty for accommodating the Affair of *Elbing*, are returned hither from the Country; and the Cardinal Primate is daily expected here from *Radzieowsky* on the same occasion. Prince *Alexander Sobiesky*, one of the Sons of the late King of *Poland*, is dangerously ill. It's reported here, that the Grand Signior being dissatisfied with the Conduct of the Bassa of *Gaminiec*, has caused him to be strangled.

Copenhagen, Nov. 7. The Body of the late King of *Denmark*, which lies at present in a *Mausoleum* in the King's Chapel, will be carried on the 12th Instant to *Roschild*, to be there Interred with the Kings his Predecessors; and the Ministers and Great Officers of State, the Knights of the Seve-

ral *Danish* Orders, and other Persons of Quality, have Orders to be then ready to assist at this Solemnity; It's said, that the King will soon after begin his Journey to *Holstein*. The Troops quartered in *Jutland* are ordered to repair thither, and they began their March on Sunday last; This morning a Battalion of the Prince Royal's Regiment left this Place in order to join them, and will be followed on the 5th Instant by the 3 Battalions of the Foot-Guards; All these Forces have their Rendezvous near *Rensbourg*, where it's said the *Danes* will have an Army of about 15000 Men, under the Command of the Duke of *Wirtemberg*, who intends to be going thither in 2 or 3 days. The *Danish* Squadron, according to the last Accounts we have from them, lay off the Island of *Bornholme*.

Vienna, Octob. 31. Our Letters from *Buda* of the 27th Instant give an Account, That Count *Osting* was come to that Place in his Journey to *Turkey*, having been treated with all the Respect due to his Character by the Governors of *Presburgh*, *Raab*, *Gran*, and the other Places through which he passed. They write from *Peter-Waradin*, that the *German* Forces employed in building the new Fortifications near *Arat*, use their utmost Diligence to put them into a condition of Defence. The Bishop of *Passau* arrived here yesterday from *Passau*, and will be going in few days to *Ratisbonne*, to reside as the Emperor's First Commissioner at the Diet. The Count of *Lemberg* will likewise shortly part from hence on his Embassy to *Rome*.

Francfort, November 7. The Elector Palatine is still at *Newstadt*, but is expected from thence in a few days at *Wejnheim*, and after a short stay in that Place, will return to *Dusseldorp*, whither he has already sent part of his Equipage. Baron *Muller*, Envoy from the King of *Sweden*, is on his Departure from hence to *Nancy*, having received Orders from the King his Master, to Compliment the Duke and Dutchess of *Lorraine* in his Name, on the Birth of their Son.

Hamburg, Novemb. 10. We have Letters from *Stralsund* of the 7th Instant, which give an Account, That the Squadron of *Swedish* Men of War was arrived at the Isle of *Rugen*, on the Coast of *Pomeran*, and having put ashore 4 Regiments of Foot, making together about 5000 Men, they returned to *Sueden*. Our Letters from *Saxony* say, the King and Queen of *Poland* continued at *Torgaw*; And that Monsieur *Opdam*, Envoy Extraordinary from *Holland*, was come thither from *Berlin* to Compliment them on the part of the States General. They write from *Berlin*, that Mr. *Stepny*, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain*, left that Place on the 2d of this Month on his return to *England*; And that the Elector of *Brandenburgh* is gone from *Oranienburgh* to *Potsdam*.

Brussels, November 13. The Treaty for settling the Limits in the Netherlands, is finally concluded between the Commissioners who met for that purpose at *Lisle*, and they have sent the same to their respective Masters to be Ratified; In the mean time the *Spanish* Commissioners are come hither, and intend, as soon as they have received the Ratifications from *Spain*, to return to *Lisle* to exchange them with those of *France*. Don *Quiros* the *Spanish* Ambassador is shortly expected here from the *Hague*. Some new Works are making at *Ostend* for the Improvement of that Port, which is done at the Charge of the County of *Flanders*, the States having granted a Fund for that purpose.

Hague, November 13. Monsieur de *Cranenburgh* is appointed by the States-General to go with the Character of their Envoy Extraordinary and make their Compliment to the King of *Denmark* on his Accession to the Crown, and he is on his departure for *Denmark*. The Deputies whom the States of *Groninghen*, sent hither some time ago to confer with the States-General upon several matters relating to that Province, are returned home, having performed their Commission. Monsieur *Dyckvoelt* is gone to *Utrecht*, to be present at the Assembly of the States of that Province, who are shortly to meet there. The Heer *Corstenhoep* Treasurer-General of the United Provinces, died here this week.

Paris, Nov. 14. N. S. The Court returns this evening from *Marly* to *Versailles*, and the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans* are gone to meet the King at his Arrival there, but will come back on the 19th Instant to their Palace in this City to receive the Duke and Dutchess of *Lorraine*, who are expected the 20th. The Earl of *Manchester*, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great-Britain*, is to make his Publick Entry to morrow; The *Mareschal de Villary* is appointed to receive and conduct his Excellency on this occasion, and the *Chevalier de Lorraine*, a Prince of the Family of *Lorraine*, is to introduce him at his Audience. The King has lately given the Bishoprick of *Luxon* to the Abbot of *Leclerc*. It's said, an Edict will shortly be published, for laying a Tax on Chimneys throughout this Kingdom. Our last Letters from *Strasburgh* give an Account, that the Commissioners appointed by the Most Christian King to treat at *Francfort* with the Commissioners from the Emperor and the Elector Palatine, had given a Paper containing the Demands of the Dutchess of *Orleans* on the Palatinate, to which they expected an Answer from the Palatine Commissioner. The building of the Town of *New Brisac*, is continued by the *French* with great Application. They have not yet evacuated the City of *Brisac* on the other side the *Rhine*, by reason the demolishing of the Bridge of that Place is not finished, tho' at the Emperor's Desire one of his own Engineers is present, to give Directions for hastening that Work.

Deale, Novemb. 7. The *Hop well*, Capt. *Deighton* Commander, arrived here this morning from the *Barbadoes*. There are now about 50 Sail of outward-bound Merchant Ships in the *Downes*, who will proceed with the first fair Wind.

Keasington, November 6. The General Assembly of *New-England* have made an humble Address to His Majesty, wherein they return most Dutiful Thanks to His Majesty for all his Royal Favours to that Colony, and in particular for having appointed the Earl of *Belmont* to be their Governor, and do assure His Majesty of their constant Loyalty and Affection to His Royal Person and Government; which was presented to His Majesty by *Si. Henry Ashurst* Baronet, being introduced by the Rt. Ho-

nourable my Lord Chancellor; And His Majesty received it very graciously.
