PHILADELPHIA, Jehr 1. Translation of a letter from St. Pierre, Martinico, dated May 27th, 1780.

Shall only engage your attention with an account of the movements of the naval forces in these seas since the date of my last letter. The 9th instant the French fleetappeared in the channel of St. Lucia, when the enemy immediately got under way from Gras Het, and the next day after doubled the Point Saline.

"The Count de Guichen then tacked about and Reered eastward, which was a skilful manæsvre in order to draw the enemy at a distance from any retreat, in case he should find them inclined to haz-The 11th, as foon ard an engagement. as the two fleets had nearly joined, the Count offered battle to the enemy, who chose to decline it that day, as well as every other, successively until the 14th when there was a fkirmish of about an hour with our Vanguard, the English manœuvering in order to go to windward; our Admiral having immed:ately tacked about to bring the rest of his ships to engage, the enemy fled with all sails out.

" The 15th, 16th, 17th, and 18th, palfed away in different manœuvres, without being ever able to bring them to action; But the 19th when our Beet was bearing down on them, in the form of a Half-Moon, they imagined they might attack the Van and Rear guard with advantage, and that the Centre could not possibly bring itself to bear; the engagement then commenced, and lasted from one o'clock till five in the evening; the enemy gave way on all sides, and when our fleet bore down on them, they fled with the greatest precipitation, and were pursued until-night closed the scene. The next day nothing appearing in view, the Count de Guichen Reered his course for this Island, being in great want of provisions and wood.

"The fleet will be repaired as soon as possible, which I imagine will take about fifteen days; our thips of 64 have fuffered the most, the fire of the enemy being mostly levelled at them, and they were opposed to those of much superior force; fix of the English fleet have got into St. Lucia so disabled as to be incapable of putting to sea this campaign, Rodney with the remainder, it is thought, has taken refuge at Barbadoes; Admiral Rowley had his thigh carried away in the last engagement and the eldest son of the Count de Guichen, had his leg shattered to pieces, our loss in the two combats does not exceed 150 men killed and wourded; that of the enemy, from mamy corroborating circumflances, must have greatly surpassedit.

" The English worked their ships to great advantage, but they did not fight as well as they manœuvered, fee eral of their officers are under an arrest for cowardice Not one of our corps has been stigmatifed by so base an imputation,

The formidable preparations which were making at Brest, and which we expected were to have reinforced us here, we are now certain; are distined for America, Mons de Terney, to whom is com-mitted the command of this expedition, was to fail from Brest the 15th of April, with 10 ships of the line and 10,000 troops, commarded by Monf. de Rochambeau, who on their arrival are to act in concert with the Americans.

" June 3. A Spanish frigate that sailed from Cadiz the 1st of May, arrived here to day ... orders were given for 20 thips of the line to hold themselves in readiness for sea, and the General who had embarked on board the Iphegene, in order to visit the Islands of St. Vincents and Grenada, and reinforce those important garrisons, has deserted his voyage, and has given orders to differ out the troops that were diffired for that purpole.

" A Sparish fleet coi sitting of 12 ships of the line, four fifties, and frigates with opward 100 transports are announced, and the stigate that arrived with the difpatel es, left them but 200 leagues to windward.

" I am of opinion that with this formidable confederated force, an attack will immediately be made at St. Lucia, and that our operations will be continued until the season of the hurricane months when the conjoined forces will fall down on Jamaica, the reduction of which is eapital object with the Spaniards.

"This powerful diversion in the II lands, with the confiderable, succour that Monf. de Ternay will carry to reinforce the American army must greatly derang the projects and arlarm the fears of ou enemics. After finishing the intender operations in these seas, the whole of ou force may unite together, form a junct hn with yours, and drive the English from every possession they hold in the Thirteen United States-"

Extract of a letter from a gentleman of the first character at St. Pierre, Mai tinique, to his friend in this city, date

June 4, 1780.

"Yesterday a Spaninsh frigate arrive here, and informs us of the near approaof a Spanish fleet, which is expected w be in our bay in ten or twelve day This fleet cor fifts of 12 ships of the lin 6 frigates, and 14 large nercha tmen, a med by the King, from 50 to 56 gu each, with 12,000 land torces, 900 gu

ners and minors, a large quantity of heavyartillery, ammunition, &c. Itisthought A Quantity of Continental Mothis expedition will fall on Jamaica. I have this from the Commander of the Spanish frigate, not by hearfay, therefore you may depend on it.

at A lugger is also arrived here in 33 days from Cadiz, and informs us, that Count D'Estaing who commands the Combined fleets, being on board the Ferrible, of 110 guns, with fix ships of the line, going from Toulon to Breft, took the Cumberland of 74, two 50 gun ships, and 12 transports, which had lately failed from Minorca."

Intellgence from the Southward.

" Sir Henry Clintons Proclamation, dated Charle Rown, June 3, 1780, has rendered us affential fervice, for it obliges the inhabitants of the interior paris of the country to take a decifive part, not withflanding the paroles that many of them had figned, whilst it enables us to diferiminate between our friends and foes, and puts arms into the hands of hundreds who were loft to t'e common cause. The florm which has burft over our heads, and which feemed big with impending rain, begins already to give way to fairer profpe ts, and already we are recovering from the shock which the lofs of Charleftown gave us. The enemy, who threatened nothing less than the eonqueft and defolation of North as well as of South-Carolina, bave retreated from Camden, and recroffed Santce river, on their return towards Charlestown; they were no doubt inf rmed, that Governor Rutledge had halted at Charlottee, where he was joined by a respectable body of militia, and the State troops from Virginia, that General Cafwell, with the North Carolina militia, and the horse under Colonels White, Washington and Henry, who were in part remounted, joined by Colonel Armand's corps, were advancing; that the first division of the Maryland and Delaware lineswere near Salisbury; and that the Baron de Kalb had long left Peters. burgh with the remainder. Their accounts of Tariton's fuccess, though published by authority, are yet shamefully exaggerated; that Col. Beaufort was defeated, and that he loft two pieces of cannon, is undoubted; but it is no less fo. that he twice repulled the enemy's cavaly; that his men did not give way till the avalry, no longer venturing to attack him were manceuvering to furround his fmall party, whilft a far Superior body of infanry advanced to attack him in front; and har his whole loss, in killed and woundd did not amount to more than 80."
