Ten Years of Earth Day Spring Plane 1980

On April 22, many Georgians will join with citizens in other parts of the country in celebrating Earth Day '80. These celebrations should help us reflect on the truly revolutionary changes in American attitude towards the environment since the first Earth Day ten years ago, and they should help all of us recommit our spirit and energy to solving the difficult environmental problems of the 80's.

The first Earth Day of April 22, 1970 brought together millions of Americans in a shared concern about the earth's resources, educated them about a broad spectrum of issues from Air pollution to Zero population growth, and motivated them to take action. Congress, spurred by a motivated populace, took action. During 1970 alone, the National Environmental Policy Act was passed, and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the President's Council on Environmental Quality were established. Other legislative initiatives soon followed, including the Clean Water Act of 1972, the Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972, The Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974, the Toxic Substances Control Act of 1976 and the Clean Air Act of 1977.

The Georgia Legislature also responded to citizens' concerns with the passage of the Coastal Marshlands Protection Act of 1970, the Ground-water Use Act of 1972, the Erosion and Sedimentation Act of 1975, the Shore Assistance Act of 1979 and others.

The issues facing us are still tough, perhaps tougher. Improving air quality in Atlanta, Savannah and elsewhere will require our attention. So will the improvement of wastewater discharges from smaller cities and towns. With the changing economy we need to develop alternative methods of protecting land; we can no longer afford to buy everything we want to save. The state's rivers are being rapidly developed; in the

process we lose priceless natural and recreation areas. We need to grapple with the concept that parks and wildlife areas and other natural areas can't be all things to all people. They have their own carrying capacities which when translated into management policies may mean that unlimited human use cannot be tolerated.

Perhaps more challenging are the issues that surround growth. Some parts of Georgia, particularly Atlanta and the coast, are undergoing rapid growth. With it comes economic pulses and environmental negatives, especially if the negatives are not anticipated and dealt with effectively. Guiding growth will be the issue of the 80's.

On this date in 1970 millions of people participated in rallies, teach-ins, street fairs and festivals to demonstrate their support for a change in this nation's values that would ensure a clean, life-supporting environment.

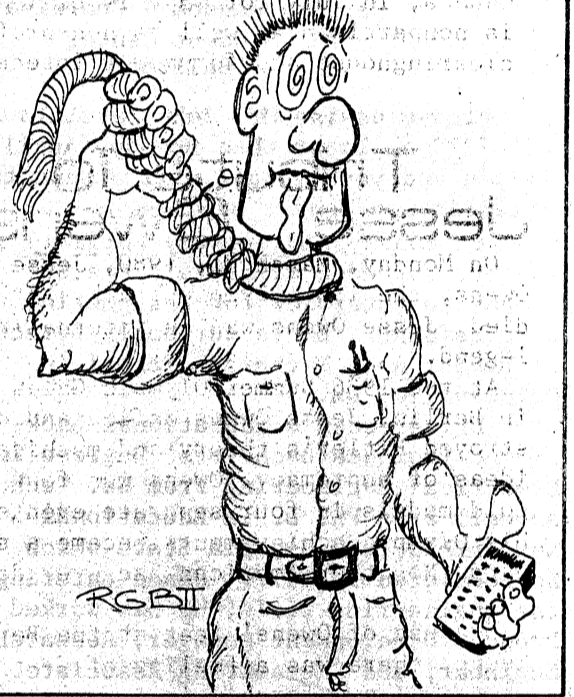
This year on April 22, environmentally aware citizens will celebrate the renewed health of our environment and look forward to ensuring that this health is not cast aside for short-term economic benefits.

The Agnes Scott College Observatory and Planetarium will present "Spring Planets, 1980" Thursday, April 17, at 8 p.m. The planets Venus, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn will be featured in a lecture, planetarium show and observation through the 30-inch telescope. 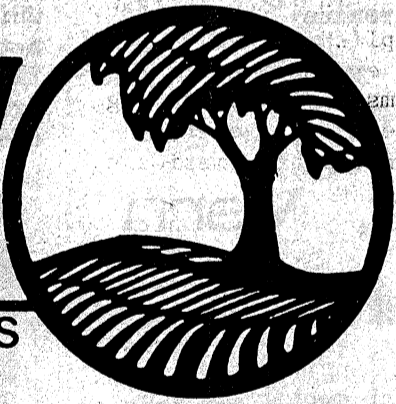

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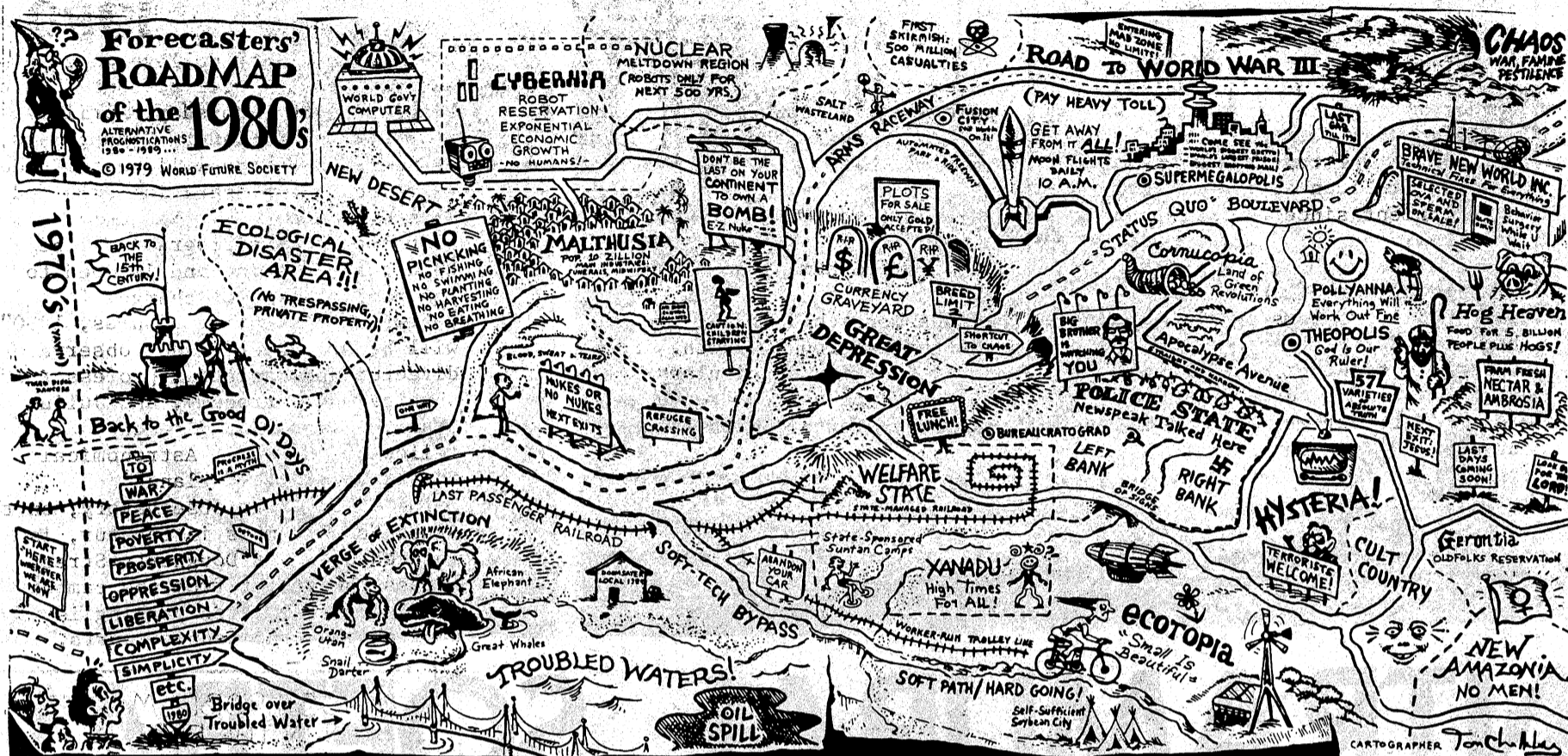

Tribute To Jesse Owens

On Monday, March 31, 1980, Jesse Owens, the 1936 Olympic track star, died. Jesse Owens was an international legend.

At the 1936 Summer Olympic Games held in Berlin, Jesse Owens defied and destroyed Hitler's theory and mythical ideas of supremacy. Owens won four gold medals in four separate events. His Olympic achievements became a standard. No other American had ever done this.

Because of Owens' feat at the Berlin Games, there was a feeling of deep respect and awe for him in the United States. Americans were united under a banner of strong nationalism in 1936. Jesse Owens' accomplishment helped advance this idea even further.

With the problems presently facing this country, especially those involving Russia, once again Americans are uniting in nationalism and support for this country. Support and unity is what this country really needs now.

With the Summer Olympics approaching, we could use another champion and hero like Jesse Owens. He was and still is an inspiration to many Americans. His story would be a great inspiration to many aspiring gold medalists.

However, American athletes have been asked to boycott the Summer Games. Jesse Owens opposed President Carter's boycott of the Summer Olympic Games to be held in Moscow saying politics have no place in the Games.

Jesse Owens was 66 years old when he died of lung cancer. He was considered the "greatest trackman ever". He had set 11 world records in track and field and he won four gold medals in one Olympics. There will be other heroes, but Mr. Owens, like our Olympic hockey team, gave us pride by defeating an "antagonistic idea".

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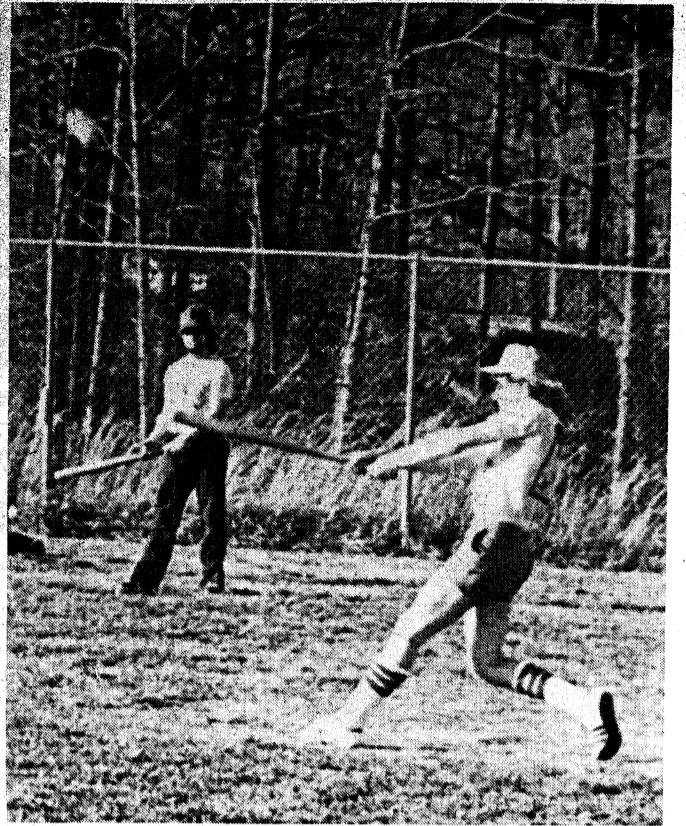
The Problem:

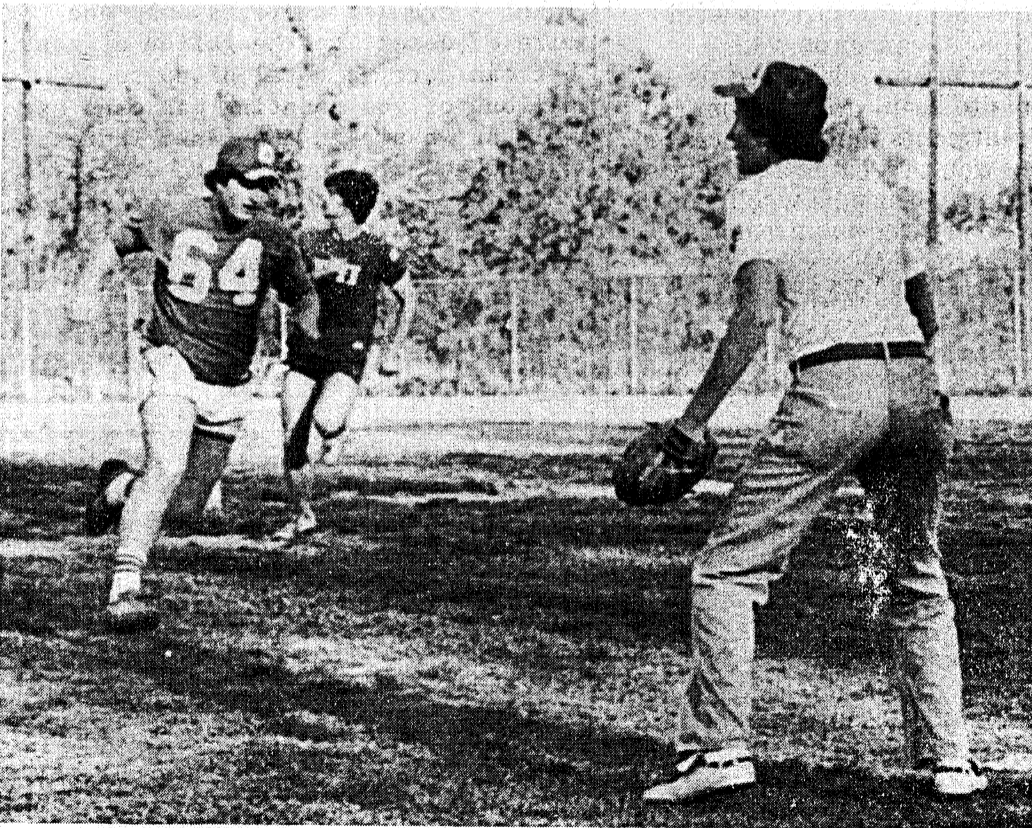

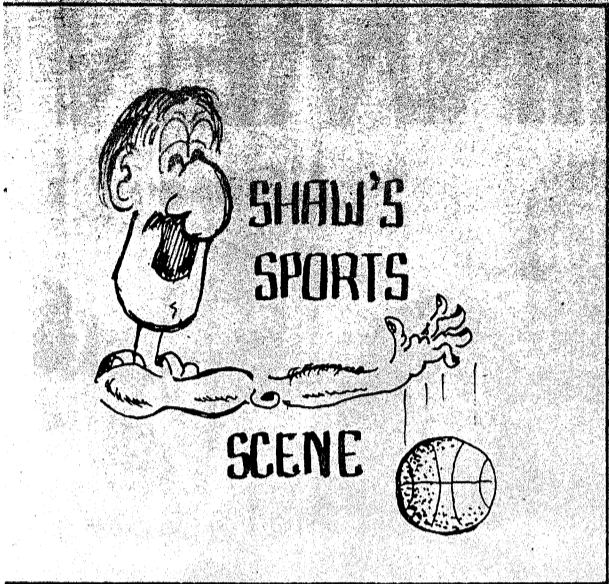

High Museum offers Black Art, Films



The Fifth Triennial Symposium on African Art will take place at the High Museum on April 16-19. This prestigious conference of international scholars, directed by Dr. Richard Long of Atlanta University, will include several events which are open to the public at no admission charge.

On Thursday, April 17, at 7:30 p.m. in the Walter Hill Auditorium, Gilbert Schneider of Ohio University will present an illustrated lecture entitled "Afro-A-Kom Again," describing the return of an important shrine figure which had been smuggled out of Africa to the U.S.

On Friday, April 18, at 7:30 p.m. in the Walter Hill Auditorium, Warren Robbins, director of the Museum of African Art in Washington, D. C. will present an illustrated lecture entitled "African Art and Modern Art."

On Wednesday afternoon, April 16, from 2:00p.m. to 5:00p.m. in the Walter Hill Auditorium, two important films will be shown: The Shape of Darkness (54 minutes) is an exploration of African art from 1000-1900 AD; A Great Tree Has Fallen (22 minutes) shows a funeral celebration in Ghana.

On April 17 at The High Museum of Art, African Artistry: Process and Aesthetics in Yoruba Art opens to the public. This exhibition of more than 150 pieces is drawn from the collection of William and Robert Arnett of Atlanta. There is no admission charge for this exhibition, which will be installed in the North Gallery, First floor.

This first major exhibition of Yoruba art in the southern U.S. will feature the highly sophisticated and inventive carvers of Nigeria. The Yoruba, the

most prolific art producers in Black Africa, are an important cultural influence not only in West Africa but also among the black diaspora in the New World. The exhibition will approach the art from the carver's view, emphasizing form, composition, and analysis of the process. Styles and schools of carving will be identified and analyzed. Recent paintings by Chief Z. K. Olarunjoba will be included.

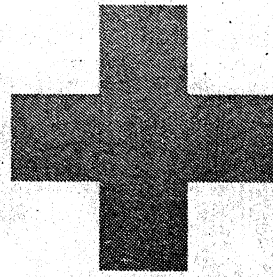

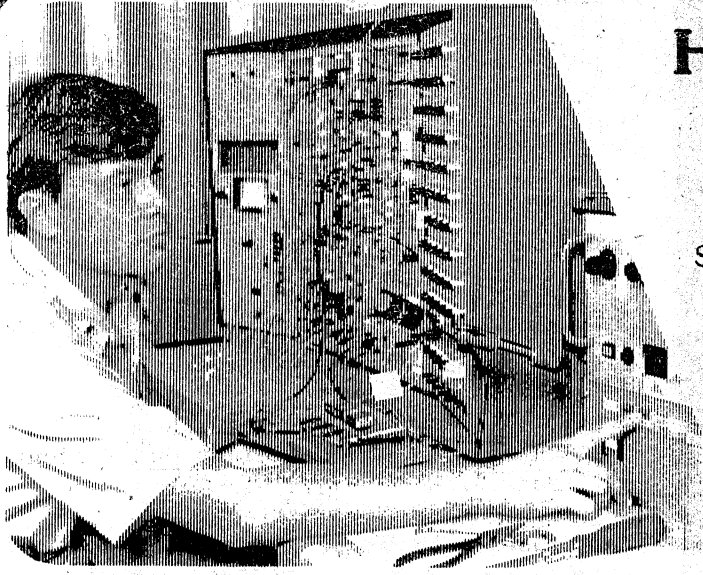

SIX FLAGS ANNOUNCES \$2.2 MILLION NEW SECTION FOR 1980

Six Flags Over Georgia will have a new flag flying over the park in 1980.

The Jolly Roger flag will wave over a new \$2.2 million pirate section called "Jolly Roger's Island."

The park's newest addition will be located on a Three acre-tract of land, surrounding the Mind Bender. Construction began in late November of 1979 with completion scheduled for late March.

The new area, dotted with lagoons and moats, will feature a giant new ride called the Flying Dutchman, a foot-stomping new live show, a lighthouse restaurant, plus numerous other games and attractions.

The Flying Dutchman is a huge pirate ship, suspended from above, that swings back and forth 180 deg. The half-million dollar ride was developed for Six Flags by Intamin, the same company that created the Mind Bender and the Great Gasp.

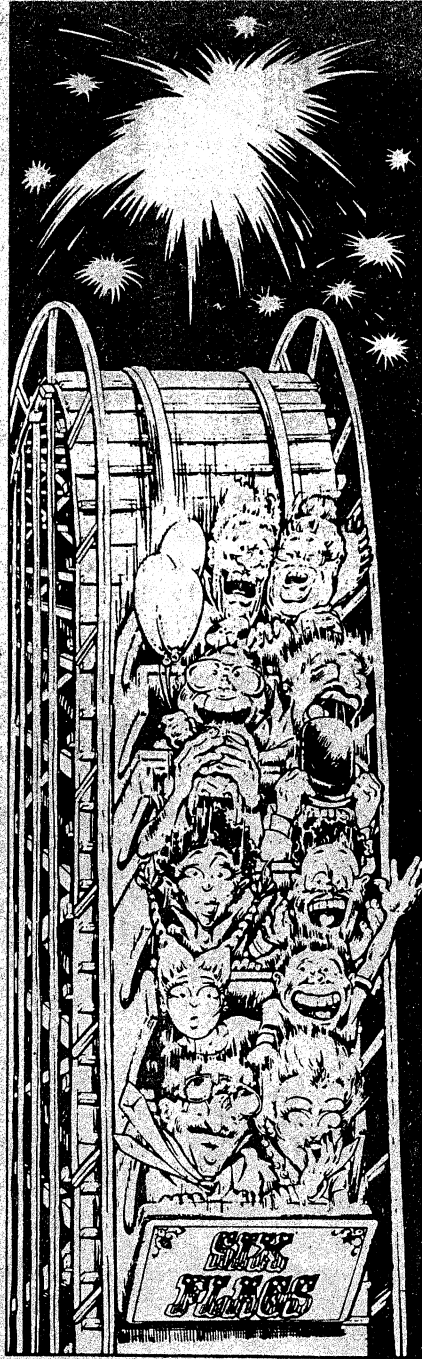
"Jamboree" will be performed in the new 700 seat Ship-Shape Theater. This show, like the popular Crystal Pistol Review, will feature the singing and dancing of some of the best young talent in the South.

Jolly Roger himself, will be on hand to greet visitors to his island as they have a bite at Pizzas of Eight, the new lighthouse restaurant.

Guests may try their hand at the remote controls of the Wavy Navy or Beach Buggy boats, and cars in the Remote Moat.

There will also be a new twist on the major attraction existing in the section. Riders of the Mind Bender will pass through Typhoon Lagoon, where water bombs and cannon fire will add more excitement to the most popular ride at Six Flags.

Introduced in 1978, at a cost of \$2.5 million, the world's only triple loop roller coaster has ridden over four million guests in the past two seasons.



Discount tickets to Six Flags are available in the Student Center Office.

Six Flags will open daily March 29-April 13 for Spring Easter Holidays, and then continue weekend operations April 19-May 18. The park opens at 10:00 am.

A 331-acre family entertainment center with themed areas containing over 100 rides, shows and attractions. A member of the Six Flags Family. The south's original family fun center.

Six Flags, located on I-20 West, just 10 minutes from downtown Atlanta, is not too far for a great adventure!

This year, there's a new flag at Six Flags. It's Jolly Roger's Island, a park within our park. A giant new pirate ship ride, The Flying Dutchman, will give you a sinking sensation. You can duck into The Ship-Shape Theater for a brand new live show, or dive into the Pizzas of Eight for a bite. There are remote control boats and cars in the Remote Moat and much more.

An array of 45 rides for family fun including:

- (1) THE MIND BENDER - The world's only triple-loop roller coaster. A one-of-a-kind thrill ride. A \$2.5 million spectacular that catapults passengers through three loops (two vertical) and travels up to 50 m.p.h.
- (2) THE GREAT AMERICAN SCREAM MACHINE - One of the world's largest, highest, fastest and up-and-downest roller coasters as featured in the 1975 Guinness Book of World Records.
- (3) THE GREAT GASP! - The South's first parachute drop. 20 stories high, 225 feet down, free fall for a time, parachute unfurls ending ride with a gentle landing and a happy sigh.
- (4) DODGE CITY - Largest and bumpiest car ride in the world. Over 50 cars patterned after Indy Race Cars of the early 1900's.

Six Flags maintains an hourly schedule of shows, including:

- (1) THE SHIP-SHAPE THEATER - The new theater on Jolly Roger's Island features a foot-stompin', hand-clappin' country themed show. "Jamboree" is a not-to-be-missed production.

The "Jolly Roger" was the name of the flag flown by pirates as they would take a ship. Sailing the high seas, pirates would innocently fly the flag of a nation as a disguise; when the pirate ship was upon its prey and about to board, the national flag came down and up went THE JOLLY ROGER. The Jolly Roger was a warning for victims to surrender, which many did to avoid a fight.

Pirates were no more anxious for a battle than anyone else; they frequently were victorious through the sheer psychology of fear, of which they were masters. The Jolly Roger was the pirates' key symbol. The term came to represent all that meant piracy.

Origins of the name "Jolly Roger" are obscure. The term was used as early as 1719. One of the most popular explanations states that it was the English corruption of "Joli Rouge," the term used by French buccaneers for their red flag used to frighten victims.

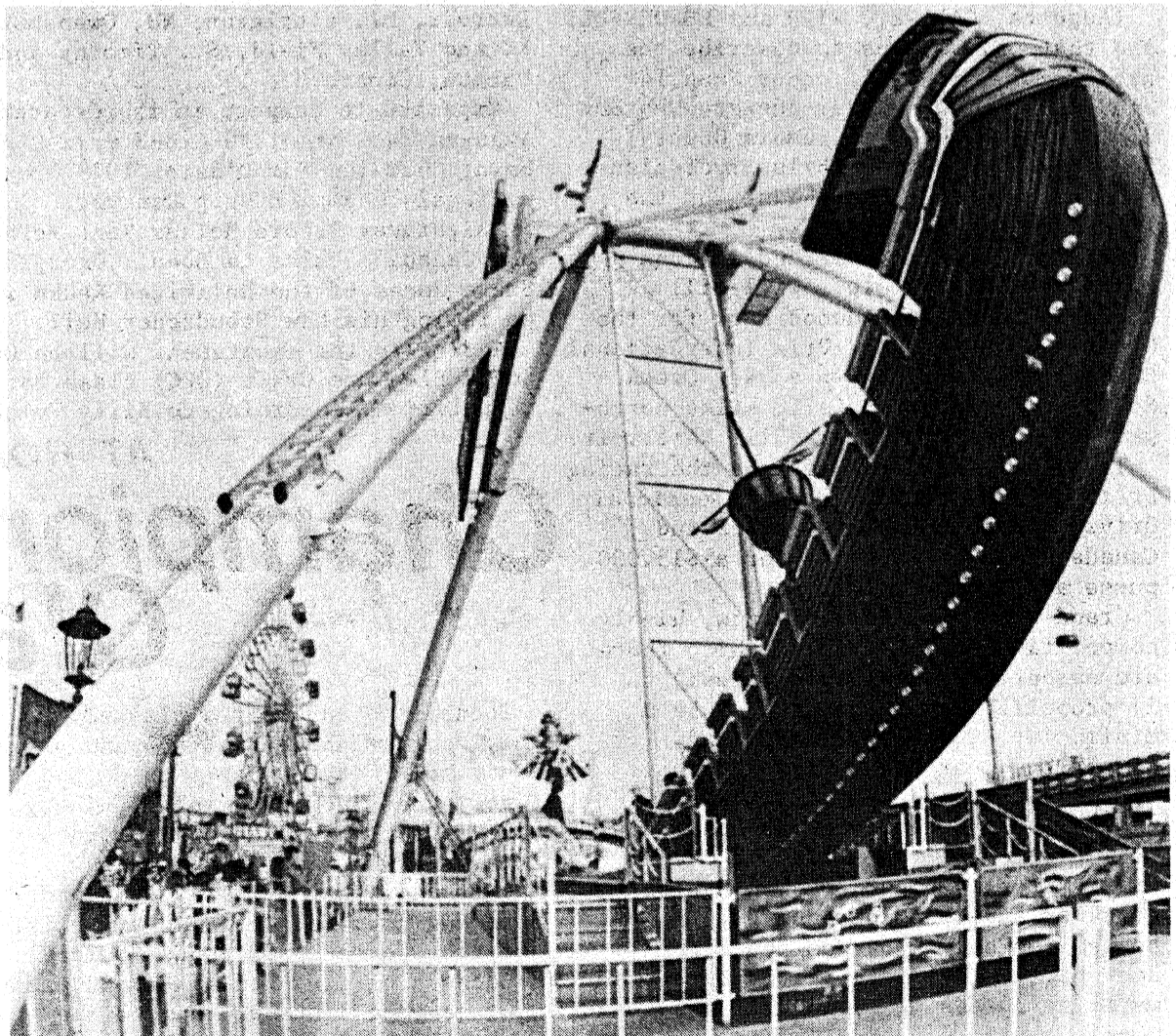

11 ANNUAL TROUT FESTIVAL

HELEN, GEORGIA---The Eleventh Annual Chattahoochee River Trout Festival has been set for May 2 to May 11 and several thousand fish raised in state and federal hatcheries will be released above the Alpine Village to supplement the supply of "native" brown, rainbow and speckled trout.

Chairman Dan Eagle said there will be \$2,500 in prizes with major awards each day. Participation in the ten day festival is free to all members of the public and anglers can register each or any day prior to wetting a line. The 1980 trout season in Georgia opens a 189-day run on March 29 and while many trophy fish are taken in the headwaters of "The Hooch" as they plunge through Helen, 175 smaller trout streams north of the village also lure many anglers.

In 1978 a 23-inch brown trout took the top prize in the Helen festival but in 1979 it took only a seventeen and a half inch rainbow to win the title for James Earl Hardigree of Bethlehem, Georgia. This year, in a new twist, visitors who have no desire to challenge the trout in the rapids can elect to enter the "pond division" at The Alpine

Valley in Robertstown, one mile up stream of Helen. Host Merle Long has two trout ponds and a catfish pond opening to the public.

The trout classic is sponsored by The Helen Area Chamber of Commerce with Zebco Company, of Tulsa, Oklahoma, and Daiwa Inc., of Gardena, California. Registration each day will be at Eagle Mountain Sports, The Village Inn, The Alpine Valley and The Chamber of Commerce at City Hall. Zebco, the world's most successful creator of rods and reels, will be giving away one of its new Model 4144 ultra light weight trout combinations each day of the contest.

For those who are not veteran trout fishermen there will be expert anglers, including J. W. Wade, on hand to give demonstrations and lessons free of charge. Helen will host its annual fish-fry in The Alpine Pavilion on Saturday, May 10, from 5 to 8 p.m. Dinner for four dollars will include fresh mountain trout "all-you-can-eat" style.

The trout festival is the oldest continuous community event in the Alpine village. Helen, once a gold mining center and a lumberboom town, was

nearly extinct in 1969 when local residents banded together and, with the guidance of artist John Kollock, converted the village into a Bavarian resort. The trout festival was the first project undertaken by the residents after the restoration.

While there is no charge for entering the festival, Helen officials insist that all anglers follow all state laws. For Georgia residents an annual fishing license is \$3.25 and a trout stamp is \$2.25. Out-of-state fishermen can buy a five day license for \$3.25 or a season's license for \$10.25. All persons under 16 years of age or over 65 years of age can fish without any license, permit or stamp; but no fisherman is permitted to keep more than eight trout in one day.

Paul Westmoreland Jr., co-founder of the trout festival, said the largest trout ever caught in the city limits during competition was thirty inches in length, "and I believe it will take one just about that size to win this year". Special events will include a spin casting accuracy contest Sunday afternoon, May 11.

GRAND PRIX HYDROPLANE RACING

(Augusta, GA) WET, WILD and WONDERFUL! And that only begins to describe the excitement which will occur June 14 and 15 when the Greater Augusta Chamber of Commerce and the Columbia County Recreation Department bring hydroplane boat racing to the southeast for the first time in history.

During the second weekend in June thousands of spectators will fill Columbia County's Wildwood Park for the Greater Augusta Grand Prix International Regatta. Formerly known as Keg Creek State Park, Wildwood is 18 miles northwest of Augusta on Clark Hill Reservoir.

The thrilling event will be the racing of inboard hydroplanes by professional drivers from the United States and Canada who are competing for a \$15,000 purse and trophies.

Grand Prix is relatively new, highly competitive boat racing in which there are essentially two basic rules:

- 1) propeller driven boats must be a minimum of 20 feet in length and
- 2) engines must not exceed 500 cubic inches of displacement.

Once these qualifications are met, it's off to the races for the Grand Prix hydroplanes equipped with either stock or supercharged engines. The boats, commonly known as "huffers" and "hummers," literally fly over the water at speeds up to 180 miles per hour.

Racing will take place on a 1 2/3-mile oval course on Keg Creek of Clark Hill Reservoir which has been surveyed for official record competition. The Greater Augusta regatta is one of eight races scheduled for the 1980 season. Other race sites are: Washington, D.C.,

Detroit, MI, Littleton, NH, Owensboro, KY and Valley Field, St. Timothy and Picton, Canada.

Expected to compete in the Greater Augusta race are 1979 Grand Prix High Point Champion Tom D'eath, 1979 Grand Nationals Champion Chip Hanaver, Straightaway Record Holder Kent McPhail and Canada's Jules Le Boeuf. Georgia's Steve Jones of the Unlimited Ranks will be racing his new Staudacher Hull.

Adding to the excitement will be Outboard Pleasure Craft (OPC) class racing competition. According to Billy Fulcher,
