The KING of PRUSSIA.

**From the LONDON GAZETTE.**

At the Court at St. James's, the 19th of July, 1778. Present the KING's Most Excellent Majesty, in Council.

**WHEREAS** many injuries and acts of hostility have been committed, and many unjust seizures made, by the French King and his subjects, unto and upon the ships and goods of his Majesty's subjects, contrary to the faith of treaties; and whereas his Majesty has lately received advice that such acts of hostility are now publicly encouraged and authorized by the French King's orders; His Majesty has taken into consideration these injurious proceedings of the French Court; and his Majesty being determined to take such measures as are necessary for vindicating the honor of his crown, and for procuring reparation and satisfaction for his injured subjects, is pleased, by and with the advice of his privy council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that general reprisals be granted against the ships, goods and subjects of the French King, so that as well his Majesty's fleet and ships, as also all other ships and vessels that shall be commissioned by letter of marque or general reprisals, or otherwise by his Majesty's commissioners for executing the office of lord high admiral of Great-Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all ships, vessels and goods belonging to the French King or his subjects, or other inhabiting within any territories of the French King, and bring the same to judgment in any of the courts of admiralty within his Majesty's dominions; and to that end his Majesty's advocate general with the advice of the admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the draught of a commission, and present the same to his Majesty at this board, authorizing the commissioners for executing the office of lord high admiral, or any person or persons by them empowered and appointed, to issue forth and grant letters of marque and reprisals to any of his Majesty's subjects, or others, whom the said commissioners shall deem fully qualified in that behalf, for the apprehending, seizing, and taking the ships, vessels and goods belonging to the French King, and the vessels and subjects of the French King, or any inhabiting within his countries, territories or dominions; and that such powers and clauses be inserted in the said commission as have been usual, and are according to former precedents: And his Majesty's said advocate general, with the advocate of the admiralty are also forthwith to prepare the draught of a commission, and present the same to his Majesty at this board, authorizing the said commissioners for executing the office of lord high admiral, to will and require the high court of admiralty of Great-Britain, and the lieutenant and judge of the said court, his surrogate or surrogates, as also the several courts of admiralty within his Majesty's dominions, to take cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon, all and all manner of captures, seizures, prizes and reprisals of all ships and goods that are or shall be taken, and to hear and determine the same; and according to the course of admiralty, and the laws of nations, to adjudge and condemn all such ships, vessels and goods as shall belong to the French King, or the vessels and subjects of the French King, or to any other inhabiting within any of his countries, territories and dominions; and that such powers and clause be inserted in the said commission as have been usual, and according to former precedents: And they are likewise to prepare and lay before his Majesty at this board, a draft of such instructions as may be proper to be sent to the courts of admiralty in his Majesty's foreign governments and plantations for their guidance herein; as also another draught of instructions for such ships as shall be commissioned for the purposes aforesaid.

**Extract of a Letter from Berlin, July 30.**

On the 18th in the morning the King, accompanied by the Prince of Brunswick, reconnoitred the Emperor's camp, and soon after orders were given for the erecting of batteries; the artillery was drawn up, and all possible preparations were made for an immediate attack, which his Majesty had resolved should take place the next morning; but to the very great astonishment of our Monarch and his whole army, he received on the same evening a flag of truce from the Emperor, with the following message, 'That his Imperial Majesty having maturely considered the object of the present contest between him and his Prussian Majesty, was from a sense of humanity led to spare the lives and blood of his innocent subjects, and was ready to settle the Bavarian affairs upon the principles proposed by his Prussian Majesty, in the course of the

late negotiation. And that if his Prussian Majesty would appoint a proper person for a fresh negotiation, his Imperial Majesty would also call near him his Minister, and that all contentions and differences should be finally settled and determined.

"In consequence of this message, the King has sent orders to Count Finckenstein and Baron de Heisterberg, his two privy cabinet Ministers, to come to him, and these two Ministers accordingly set out this afternoon to join his Majesty at his camp near Jarrowitz in Bohemia. Thus, Thanks to gracious Heaven! Peace is restored. May Divine Providence grant us the enjoyment thereof for many years to come."

**Curious paragraphs taken from the Halifax Gazette.**

**HALIFAX, September 29.**  
Saturday the 26th inst. arrived his Majesty's ship H. M. S. Capt. Joseph Browne, commander, who is the lat. 40. 32 North, long. 66, 36 W. fell in with the Marble, rough, a rebel ship from B. A. N., with two tier of guns, with which ship a close action ensued and continued near two hours. The confusion of the rebel ship and the advantage the Hope felt from a light air of wind, tho' she suffered considerably in her sails, masts, yards and rigging, she was enabled to effect her escape; the loss the Hope sustained was of little moment, considering the situation she was engaged in, and the superiority of the enemy, having lost only one man in the action and two wounded, in the latter is the commander, who received a shot through his body, but it is thought to be doing well.

Since which arrived the ship Constant from St. Domingo bound to Nantz, said to be a seizure of the Hammond schooner letter of marque, but being found under French colours, and no legal authority being produced to put the Hammond's people in possession of her, she was brought into this port as a prize to his Majesty's ship Hope.

Last Sunday arrived a cartel with about 190 prisoners, (who were taken by rebel privateers) in 8 days from Boston. By 5 gentlemen who came to her, we are informed, That Commodore Elsing, the French Admiral arrived there with his fleet in a very distressed condition. That the Admiral's ship had lost all her masts and rudder. That six sail of French ships of the line were lying in Nantasket road, when they left that port, and three in King-Road: That the Admiral had taken out of his ship 18 pieces of cannon, for the defence of some batteries on George's Island that harbour, and that there were three French frigates laying in the harbour near the town. That the people of B. A. were in the greatest consternation imaginable, from the apprehensions they had of receiving a visit from Lord Howe; in consequence of which they were moving into the country with great precipitancy. That the Bostonians and French are at variance continually. That three lieutenants of the French ships, have left their lives there of late, by some of the Boston people, one of which was the first lieutenant of the Admiral's ship. And it is further said, that Gen. Burgoyne's troops are removed further back into the country, to prevent any ill fate that might happen, in consequence of their being so nigh, in case an attack should be made upon Boston. It is said, that the Continental money is held in so low account, that 40s. of hard money will purchase 40 dollars of it. That rum is 8 dollars per gallon, and all kinds of provisions, are sold at very exorbitant prices.

**Extract of a letter from a gentleman of consideration at New York.**

"Generals Lee and Mifflin have raised such a dissension in the rebel army, that Gen. Washington's authority is much curtailed, and the rebel leaders say publicly, that he and the Congress aim at absolute power, and mean to fill their country to the French; and further say, if America is to be subject to monarchy, a British King shall rule them. This is the prevailing topic of conversation amongst them. And the members of the Congress are greatly divided amongst themselves. The parties may be nominated English and French.

From deserters and refugees who daily come in from Philadelphia, Jersey, and the upper part of the Province (the latter have refused the last oath), all agree, that there is a general clamour raised against the Congress—very illiberal language, which passes with impunity; and it is supposed that before next spring they will be routed off their seats and power.

"C. I. Butler with the Indians is making sad ravages upon the back settlements. So many join him, that was out army at this time in Pennsylvania, it is here

supported, by those who know the country best, that this season would finish the rebellion, and give us peace upon the terms we wish—Perhaps a British army may soon appear again in that quarter—'Tis too long expected."

A Large Quantity of Counterfeit Bills of the following Emission of Continental Bills has lately been sent out of New-York; several Villains have been detected, and are now under Guard, at Danbury, for uttering them: They are very easily known, being struck on Copper Plates, they look & feel smooth; the Complexion of the Bills differ very much from the true Bills, and are very badly executed.

The Counterfeits are of the following Emissions, viz.

- 40 Dollar Bill, 11 April, 1778.
- 5 ditto ditto.
- 30 ditto 26 February, 1778.
- 8 ditto 20 May, 1778.
- 6 ditto ditto.

**40 Dollar Bill Counterfeit**—The Eye is not so long by 15 Part of an Inch, as in the true Bill, and is much plainer, the smaller Part of the Eye is broken off plain, in the true Bill it runs into the Cloud, the Sight Part of the Eye in the Counterfeit is too strong and bold.

**5 Dollar Bill Counterfeit**—The four first Letters in the Word Spanish, are larger than the three ending Letters, in the true Bills they are much alike.

**30 Dollar Bill Counterfeit**—The Name of one of the Printers on the Back of the Bill is SELLORS, in the true Bill it is SELLERS.

**8 Dollar Bill Counterfeit**—In the Face of the Bill the T in the word THIS is not so long nor large as in the true Bill, and the Letters in general are much smaller; the lower Part of the Harp in the true Bill is nearer to the inner Circle than the Counterfeit is.

**6 Dollar Bill Counterfeit**—In the Word Value, the V is too high up, in the true Bill it is on a Line with the other Letters in that Word.

One other 30 Dollar Bill, of some Emission with the other is, REOTE instead of RECTE.
