Messieurs EDES & GILL,
IN yours of the 9th of August, we observed an extract of a letter from Bristol, eastward, setting forth, the cutting down and destroying a meeting house there. The following may be depended upon as an impartial account of the affair.

The inhabitants of the said town of Bristol, not agreeing since their being incorporated where to build a meeting house or houses, about two years past the said town chose a committee from the neighboring towns, to advise how many meeting houses were proper to accommodate the inhabitants, and where.—Who reported three, and the places.—

1772. March meeting, but few attending, the snow being deep, the party present, voted to build but one house, and that in a place in the woods, remote three miles from the settlements and ten miles from a great part of the inhabitants, and voted the money sufficient for the frame which they forthwith erected, and to make all sure tacks on some boards, to the value of nine pounds more than they had voted to be raised to prevent (as is supposed) its being taken down.

March 1773. At a full meeting, after debating the matter, it was voted by a great majority, that there should be three houses built agreeable to the vote of the said committee, and that the frame should be taken down, and a committee was accordingly chosen for that purpose, viz. Alexander Nickells, Esq; Deacon Jones, and Mr. Robert Sprout.

At May meeting a party had it inserted in the warrant to reconsider the above vote, it being a full meeting it was voted by a great majority, not to reconsider it.

On the 7th June. The said committee attended the business and employed therefor about 40 hands, and transported what rigging they could get, seven miles to the said frame, it being three miles in the woods remote from the body of the settlements, the said committee and company in general carried their provisions to encamp there one or two nights.

The committee then proceeded on their work and took down part of the roof, but finding that the rigging they had, was insufficient for the business; they sent to Mr. Henry Hunter (who had been of the committee for setting up the said frame) for the use of the rigging which he had in his hands, that he used in setting up the said frame, and offered to satisfy him therefor, but were refused. The said committee then considering as they were now on the spot and that the expense of procuring rigging from Boston, and again collecting the said hands, would be attended with more expense than the damage would be of cutting the side posts, and putting it down, the said frame being so large that it would not be such hurt for one of the small frames intended by the said committee.—Then the said committee thought proper to cut the side posts, and pulled down the frame as carefully as possible.

Alexander Nickells, Esq; being desirous that the frame should be removed according to vote, offered the dissected party, in public, to make good the damage of the said frame, and transport it too at his own expense, which the said party refused. On which the said party called a meeting for damages, and insisted on a vote, which passed in the negative.

As for said Nickells's being armed, he carried with him a pistol, purely for striking fire to the woods, and that was all the arms in the company that we know of.

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Messieurs EDES & GILL,
AS the public have several times of late been favored through the channel of the public news papers, with accounts of the muster and reviews of such, and such a regiment of militia in the province.—I have been led to the following observations, viz.

First, What is the end and design of forming a militia?—is it not this, namely, that by disciplining (and forming to some degree soldiers) a certain part of the community they may become both as to offence and defence, the guard of the state.—And in order to their answering this important design,

Secondly, It is of the last importance (if any real advantage is ever to be expected from them) that they be taught the use, end, and design of discipline, as it respects subordination, the manual exercise and the manoeuvres—as from the first arises that strict attention so absolutely essential in soldiers, from the second the dexterous and agile handling of their arms in the most useful and expeditious motion—from the third the changing their position with the utmost exactness and expedition; as circumstances may render it necessary in the field of battle, and the importance of each in action by the most lively representations should be impressed on their minds, and every thing superfluous or dangerous should be exploded— from hence then,

Thirdly, Since such vast improvements have been made in the art of war,—and so little time allotted to the militia (only four days annually) to acquire military knowledge and skill in the use of arms.—It is highly expedient that the best modes and methods of discipline should be practised—and such in special as are calculated for expedition and real service, and in order that the condition of the militia and the proficiency which the officers and soldiers have made in their duty, be from time to time fully known.

Fourthly, Reviews become necessary,—at which a few complimentary salutes and simple motions are by no means sufficient.—The regiment which is at any time reviewed, should rather exhibit their attainments in the manual exercise,—the freings, and of these a variety.—And also their exactness in performing their manoeuvres, which should also be displayed in variety—without this how shall the reviewing general determine whether the troops reviewed by him,—be properly disciplined and fit to take the field or not,—or by his own view see what cautions,—new orders or regulations are requisite which are some of the principle advantages that can result from a review, which for the most part is attended with no small expense.

If I am not mistaken in the foregoing observations, gentlemen and spectators who have attended at the late reviews, may determine what end has, or can be answered by them,—as they may have come up to,—or fallen short of the proper design of their institution.

A MILITARY COUNTRYMAN.

BALTIMORE, October 16.
Yesterday arrived the Ship Prince of Wales, Captain Morrison, from Londonderry, with about 200 Passengers, which make no less than 3000 that left that Port only within one Year, and come to seek in our back extensive and happy Territory, peaceable and comfortable Residence, which those loyal and industrious People could not enjoy in their native Land, from the ill-judged Oppression exercised over that sinking Country by Great-Britain.—Let the deplorable State of this once prosperous Land fill Americans with Apprehensions, and rouse them with animated Warmth to resist every Attempt of Parliamentary Tyranny under what specious or plausible Pretext or Guise soever it may be offered—for, the smallest Restriction of our Liberty admitted, ALL WILL BE LOST.

Extract of a Letter to a Gentleman in this Town, received by Captain Morrison, from Londonderry, dated August 17, 1773.

"As you cannot be Strangers on your Side the Water to the general Commotions which af-

fect this Kingdom, some Particulars thereof may not be unacceptable to you.—The Stagnation of Commerce occasioned by a Resolve of the Merchants to take no Gold Coin under full Weight, is very prejudicially and universally felt; no less than the Amount of £.20.000 of this Specie has been already cut to Pieces at the Bank; We hope, however, that the Result of an Address now framing for the Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council will give us Relief. The Distress of our Manufacturers in many Branches is truly afflictive; notwithstanding which, so great is the Propensity to Luxury, that foreign Manufactures are in great Request as ever. Several Thousand of Weavers, in Dublin, have assembled and paraded the Streets, threatening Destruction to the Venders and Wearers of any Commodity, but such as is manufactured in this Kingdom; and, to fill the Measure of our Woes, a Stamp-Act Scheme is, with some Certainty, talked of, nay, it is beyond a Doubt, that the Heads of it have been long formed, but kept back as a dernier Recourse. To this Species of Oppression we are determined to show warm Opposition; in which, we cannot be better governed, than by adopting a Conduct similar to that of the Colonies, when the nauseous Pill was offered to them for Digestion; for, weighing the whole of their Conduct, at that trying Crisis, it must be acknowledged laudable, and such, as has deservedly done them high Honour, and will, at some future Period, give Resplendency to a Page in the Annals of America."

By a Person just arrived from Red Stone, we hear, that the Shawanese and Delaware Indians have lately killed two White Men to the Westward of that Place.—The Particulars of this Affair we are not able to communicate.

NEW-LONDON, November 5.
The following Resolve passed the present General-Assembly.

RESOLVED, by this Assembly, That the Select Men, in the respective Towns, in this Colony, at, or before the General Election in May next shall take, and transmit to his Honor the Governor, a particular and exact Account of all the Persons in their respective Towns, as well Negroes and Indians as white Persons; distinguishing the Number of those, who are under the Age of Twenty Years, from those who are above that Age, their Sexes, and whether married or single.

And that the Colonel of each Regiment of Militia, shall also within the Time aforesaid, transmit to his Honor the Governor, the exact Number, of Officers and Soldiers in his said Regiment; thereby to enable his Honor, to prepare a complete Answer to a Letter lately received from the Earl of Dartmouth, his Majesty's Secretary of State, for the American Department.

And that this Act be forthwith Printed and distributed by the Representatives in the present Assembly.
