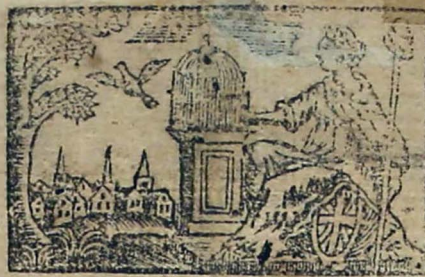

CASCA.

It does not remain a doubt that the people of England no longer look upon the flourishing state of their Colonies, with the same degree of pleasure and complacency as formerly. They regard our growth with an evil-eye, and jealous of our encreasing numbers and wealth, think they discern their own destruction in our prosperity. This is the presage of a People remarkable throughout the world for a melancholy cast of mind, whose enjoyment of the present is ever distributed by a distant view of the future. A true Englishman, who reads Potholewait's Dictionary of Commerce, with the same spirit, with which it was wrote, will sadden at every page at accounts of a woollen manufactory at Abbeville, the great importation of French barbers and valets, or the declension of the Turkey state, and will find the ruin of his country in the smuggling of a hoghead of claret. Enveloped in a foggy atmosphere, and breathing nothing but the grossness of a sea coal air, every Citizen of London is a rueful Politician predicting the most direful calamities, from every untoward occurrence in public affairs.

But, if this is not sufficient to disturb their repose, there is another ingredient, in the national character, of a still more malignant influence: For, being a commercial People, and accustomed to view all objects through the medium of self-interest, every public undertaking is the result of dry calculations, wherein all liberal ideas are thrown out of the question. — So far from embracing all mankind with expanded hearts, the human race, in every quarter of the globe, is sacrificed with ease to prospects of national advantage: — Hence the cruel despotism exercised over the East-Indians, and the late expedition to St. Vincent. — This too is their notion of Patriotism.

With this prevailing character it is in vain to hope, that our liberties and properties will not be sacrificed to the ease and greatness of Britain, equally with those of other People, less closely allied. — The relation, which she stands in to us, as the parent state, is a bond of amity too feeble to suspend for a moment the operation of such selfish and powerful passions, as avarice and the lust of empire. — Let Ireland, a sister kingdom, witness the weight of her oppressive hand.

Nor let us conceive, that the free form of his own constitution will inspire an Englishman with a tenderer regard for the rights of others. — He values them not, provided their destruction contributes to his own benefit. — A trader of London not at all qualified, by nature or education, to controul the fortunes of men — protected in his own person and property by a thousand legal forms, shall issue orders, from his counting-house, to tear 1000 unhappy Africans from their country and families, and every thing held dear by them, and lead them into a dismal captivity.

I am drawn into these reflections, and justified in them, by a late publication, in England, of political Essays, on which the greatest encomiums have been bestowed. — It seems to be the principal purpose of the Author to encrease the jealousy against the Northern Colonies, by representing them as dangerous Rivals in Commerce, and very benevolently proposes to despoil them of their Manufactures and Trade, that they may be obliged to confine themselves solely to tilling the earth. The means to effect the former, he lays, should be, "to sell the manufactures of Britain so cheap throughout the colonies as to ruin all their own manufactures and this to be done by means of Factors to be established by Government, in the chief towns of America, with goods purchased by Government, and to be sold at such prices, as would immediately ruin all the colony manufactures, and consequently multitudes of other Factors, who have established houses for the sale of British goods, which they must have purchased there, at the common market-Price."

I leave this to be commented upon by the Americans, observing only, that it seems not an extravagant conjecture to suppose the present project of the India Company, in concert with the Ministry, of sending Tea to the Colonies, may have been suggested by this publication, and embraced by them, not only as the best expedient to enforce a revenue act, but as an experiment to be made of Government Factors, for the righteous purpose of ruining our private traders.

But I trust to my Countrymen, that to open violence they will oppose courage, and to artifice wisdom: and I hope the same virtues, which have been hitherto tried with effect, will be always on the watch to defeat such baseful and pernicious designs; and that this accursed Tea will be rejected with the same firmness, as in the time of the general non-importation agreement, when a love of the publick good so nobly triumphed over avarice, and every base and selfish passion.

LORD BISHOP of ST. ASAPH.

I BEG leave, in the name of my country, to call upon your Lordship to mingle your "indignation" with ours, against the "artifices" of the Ministry, for their late attempt to "separate the interest of the colonies from that of Great-Britain," through the medium of the East India Company, and at the same time to thank your Lordship, in this public manner, for your excellent Sermon, preached before the Society for propagating the gospel in foreign parts.

It was reserved for you to pluck a quill from some Angel's wing, to mark the common interests and duties of Britain and her colonies. It was reserved for you to rescue the Bench and the Lawn Sleeve from the reproach under which they have fallen, during our late struggles for liberty. You have removed the just and unjust prejudices entertained against prelacy by people of every denomination in America. You have made us forget the Bishop, in the Man, and the Baron of the realm, in the British American Patriot.

You are too happy in the possession of that virtue, and in the contemplation of those abilities, which gave birth to your Sermon, to receive the least addition to your happiness from the approbation or gratitude of the Americans. But allow us, my Lord, for our own sakes to assure you, that we pore over it as the most finished piece of composition in our language. — We view it as a monument of the strength and extent of human genius in discovering and enforcing the most complex truths: — we prize it as a common MAGNA CHARTA of Britain, and her empire in America.

Accept, my Lord, of the incense of gratitude from millions of American breaths. It rises from the altar of Justice, perfumed with the love of liberty. Laurels — not such as are raised in the hot beds of Court favor, but the spontaneous, unloading laurels of America, shall cluster thick around your brow, and when you "sleep in dull cold marble," your name shall live in this western world (so borrow an Indian phrase) while the sun shines and the rivers flow. —
