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An ORDINANCE afcertaining what captures on water shall be lawful.

In purmance of the powers delegated by the confedera-tion in cales of capture on water 1

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Be it ordained by the United States in Congress as sembled, that from and after the first day of February next, all resolutions and ordinances of Congress relating to captures or recaptures on water, and coming within the purview of this ordinance, except as is herein after excepted, shall be null and void But questions of this nature arising before, or which shall be undetermined at that day shall be determined at any time during the war with Great. Britain according to them, in the same manner, as if this ordinance had never been made.

It shall be lawful to capture and to obtain condemnation of the property herein after enumerated, if found below high-water mark; that is to lay.

All ships and other vessels of whattoever size or denomination belonging to an enemy of the United States, with their rigging, tackle, apparel and fermiure.

All goods, wates, and merchandizes belonging to an enemy, and found on board of a ship of other vessels of the control of th

with their rigging, tackle, apparel and furniture.

All goods, wates, and merchandizes belonging to an enemy, and found on board of a fitip of other veffel of fuely enemy.

All contraband goods, wates and merchandizes; to whatever nation belong ag, although found in a neutral bottom, it destined for the use of an enemy; but the goods, wares and merchandizes belonging to a tenemy-contraband goods, and goods destined to a blockaded, invested or besieged porty being always excepted, sound in a ressent provided nevertheless, that from and after the first day of March, in the jear one thousand seven hundred and eighty two, all goods, wares and merchandizes of the growth, produce or manufacture of Great Britain, or of any territory depending thereon, if sound within three-leagues of the coasts and designed to any port or place of the United States; in any ship or vessel hologang to the ciracens of the said states, or the subjects of any neutral power, shall be liable to capture and condemnation. unless the same stall have been previously captured from the enemy and condemnate, or in consequence of capture, may be proceeding to some port or place not in the power of the said enemy, for trial and condemnation.

All ships or other vessels, goods, wares and merchandizes belonging to any power, or the subjects of any power against which letters of marque or reprisa shall have issued.

All ships or other vessels, with their rigging, tackle, apparel and furniture, and with their cargoes, whatesover nation belonging, destined to any port or place invested, besieged or blockaded, by a sofficient force belonging to, in the service of, or co operating with the United States, so effectivally as that one cannot attempt to euter into such port or place without evident danger.

All ships or other vessels, swith their rigging, tackle, apparel and furniture, and with their cargoes, tound in the possession, are the following, that is to fixy.

Cannon, mortars, fire-arms, piltols, bombs, granadoes, bullets, balls, susses, storods, belt

It is fhall manifefly appear, that of any entire thing of which division cannot be made without injury to its value, a subject of the enemy, and a citizen or a subject of a foreign power, not being an enemy, are joint holders, the whole shall be condemned and sold for gold or sliver, the proper proportion of the net proceeds of subject hall be deposited in the treasury of the state in which thall be deposited in the treasury of the state in which the sale shall he, to be paid to the order of such eitzen, or the subject of such toreign power. It such division can be accomplished, but neither the citizen, nor the subject of a foreign power, nor his agent, shall require specific restirution of his property, there shall be a sale in the same manner, as if the property were indivisible. But if in such case a requisition be made to this effect, the due proportion shall be specifically restored.

Where property shall have been originally captured on land from a state, or a citizen of the United States, and shall be recaptured below high water mark by another citizen thereot, restitution shall be made to the former owner upon the payment of a reasonable salvage not exceeding one fourth part of the value, no regard being had to the time of possession by the enemy.

On the recapture by a citizen of any Negso, Mulatto, Indian or other person, from whom labour or fervice is lawfully claimed by a state or a citizen of a state, forcise cestivation stall be adjudged to the claimant, whether theoriginal capture shall have been made on land or water, and without regard to the time of possession of the lawfully the cleamant to the recaptor, not exceeding one south of the value of such labour or fervice, to be estimated according to the laws of the state under which the claim shall be added.

But if the service of such Negro, Mulatto, Indian or other person captured below high water mark, shall not be legally claimed within a year and a day from the sentence of the court, he shall be set at liberty.

In all other cases of recapture, restitution shall be made to the owner upon payment of one third part of the true value for salvage, if the property shall have been setaken in less than twenty-four hours after the capture. But if it shall not have been retaken until the expiration of twenty-four hours ofter the capture, restitution shall not be made of any part.

Besides those who are daily authorised to make captures by a special commission, captures of the property of an enemy shall be salvaged lawful when made:

11. By a private vellel not having such commission, satisfactory proof being produced that they were made in pursuing the course of her voyage, and repelling a previous attack from an enemy.

2d. By any body or detacliment of regular soldiers.

3d. By inhabitants of the country, if made within cannon that of the shore.

4th. By an armed vessel sailing under a commission of his most Christian Majeste.

5th. By the crews of Britiss vessels, while captures of this fort are licensed by the Britiss.

Recaptures shall be made by no other persons than those authorised to make captures, except the crews of residence and those authorised to make captures, except the crews of residue to the country in the country in

The destruction of papers, or the possession of double papers by any captured wessel, said be considered as evidence for condemnation, unless good cause be stewn to the contrary.

To the commander in chief of the navy of the United States, shall be allotted one twentieth part of all prizes taken by an armed vessel or vessels under his orders and command; when there shall be no such commander in clues, the one twentieth part allotted to him shall be paid into the treasury of the United States.

To the captains of any single armed vessel two twentieth parts, but if more ships or vessels two twentieth parts of all prizes taken when they are in company, to he divided equally among all the captains.

To the captains of massines, lieutenants and massers, three twentieth parts of all prizes taken when they are in company, to he divided equally among all the captains.

To the lieutenants of masses, lieutenants and massers, three twentieth parts of all prizes taken when they are in company, to he divided equally armong them.

To the lieutenants of masses, carpenters, massers maters, and the sestetary of the sleet, two twentieth pacts, and

To the following perly warrant officers, viz. midshipy men, (allowing for each ship fix, for each brig four, and for each sloop two) captains clerks, surgeons mates, stewards, sail makers, coopers, armotrers, (allowing for each vessel to each only) boatswains mates, gunners mates, carpenters mates, (allowing for each vessel two of each) cooks, cockswains, (allowing for each vessel two of each) ferjeants of marines, (allowing two for each slip and one for each brig and sloop) three twentieth parts to be divided equally among them; and when a prize is taken by any vessel, on board or in company of which the commander in chief is, then the commander in thief's cook or cockswain shall be added to the said petty warrant officers, and share equally with

The remaining eight twentieth parts, and half of the one twentieth part shall be divided among the rest of the vessels company or companies as it may happen, share end share alike.

No officer nor man shall have any share but such as are actually on board their several vessels when any prize or prizes shall he taken, excepting only such as may have been ordered on board any other prizes, before taken, or sent away by his or their commanding officers.

Upon the capture of any other vessel, if stade by a vessel of war, belonging to the United States, one half of the property condemned shall be decreed to the United States, and the other stall to the captors, to be divided as aforestaid: If by a private vessel not having a commission, the whole shall be decreed to the captors if by any body or detachment of regular or other troops in the service of the United States, the whole shall be adjudged to the captors, to be divided in proportion to the pay in the line of the armity: If by inhabitants of the country, being in arms, the whole shall be entitled to the eaptors, to be divided equally among them; provided, that if any such inhabitant shall be entitled to the shares, and if killed, his legal representative shall be entitled to four shares. If by the crews of British vessels, the whole shall be adjudged to the capture, he shall be entitled to two shares, and if killed, his legal representative shall be entitled to surface in the court.

On recapture by an armed vessel sleen in equipped in a warshe manner, the proportion to be withdrawn from the original owner, shall be slowed as in the case of a capture of an enemy's vessel commission of an hostile vessel not commissioned as a man of war or privateer.

The rules of decision in the several courts strail but the resolutions and ordinances of the United States in Congress assembled, public treaties, when declared to be so by an act of Congress, and the law of nations, according to the general usages of Europe. Public treaties shall have the pre-eminence in all trials. This ordinance shall commence in force on the first day of February, which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-two.

Done by the United States in Congress assembled, the fourth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven bundred and englishmen, and in the fixth year of our independence.
