

A.E.T.'s Professor Muller Retires

Edward J. Muller, Professor of Architectural Engineering Technology, will retire this quarter after 32 years of dedicated service to Southern Tech, and indeed, to all of the Engineering Technology programs around the nation.

Professor Muller came to Georgia in 1948 as one of the founding fathers of Southern Tech. While an instructor of Industrial Arts at the University of Wisconsin-Stout, he was contacted by the Georgia Institute of Technology to help initiate a two-year program of Engineering Drawing at the Technical Institute (Southern Tech's original name) in Chamblee, Georgia. Realizing that this was his best opportunity to leave the cold winters of his northern homeland, he accepted the position and for twenty-five years was Head of the Department of Engineering Drawing at Southern Tech.

Among his many accomplishments while at Southern Tech are his two texts on architecture. Architectural Drawing & Light Construction was pub-

lished in 1967 and has since become a standard in virtually all schools of engineering technology across the nation. In fact, it is currently used in over 400 schools around the world, including those as far away as Singapore, Japan, and Australia. His second text, Reading Architectural Working Drawings is no less of an achievement with copies being used in schools all over the North American continent.

Now, after 32 years of "pleasure-able" teaching here, Professor
Muller can sit back, relax, and recall
many of his life's most memorable
experiences that occurred as a result
of Southern Tech's growth. One of
his most proud moments for the school
was in 1970, when it was granted fouryear status. In 1973, he received
his Master of Fine Arts degree from
the University of Georgia, and
brought Southern Tech its first
course in painting; one of his personal fortes.

Dr. Wynn Leaves S.T.I.

Professor Lewis N. Wynn will be resigning at the end of this quarter after teaching at STI for 10 years. He, along with Dr. Phil Secrist, were the first historians at Southern Tech. Professor Wynn's reason for leaving is "to teach History majors and possible business opportunities."

Sting: What do you think the best aspects of STI are?

Wynn: "The students and faculty. The students are great and the faculty is well-qualified and many are good friends. I'll just say teaching here has been a fantastic experience." Sting: What is your least liked aspect of STI?

Wynn: An unresponsive administration. It has not developed Southern Tech's full potential and has generally demonstrated a lack of full college operations, including development of student life, professional de-

velopment, and a general lack of understanding of STI's role in the community. The prevailing attitude has been: "If it causes any administrator to make an effort or be innovative, then its not worth it. In general, my major criticism of STI is a feeling one gets of administrative malaise."

Sting: What activities were you associated with at Southern Tech?

Wynn: Goat Day and I helped SGA get started. I organized the mattress stacking champions of the world in 197?. We stacked ??? mattresses in

Wynn: We need more technical fields such as medical electronics. And since our students are getting into the international job market we need a course in international

Professor Harry M. Shenck has been teaching at Southern Tech for 16 years. for Before coming to Southern Tech, Professor Shenck taught for five years at Western Reserve University and one year at Penn State. He did his undergraduate work in Mechanical times at Case Institute of Technology and his graduate work in he Physics at Western Reserve University. Professor Shenck is a member of several professional organizations, at American Association of Physics
Teachers and American Physical Society.

Professor Shenck said his reasons for coming to teach at Southern Tech are many. One, he was tired of industry and the rat race and wanted to teach again. Since teaching jobs were very available at this point in time, he and his wife decided that they wanted to live in Georgia which he considers "the only place to live in this country." So he looked for a job in this area and found one here at Southern Tech.

Youngblood Retires by Mike Payme

Among the professors retiring in recent quarters is Mr. Ralph P. Youngblood. Mr. Youngblood officially retired last winter quarter but is still on campus on a part-time basis, teaching Calculus at night this quarter.

Originally from Augusta, Georgia, Mr. Youngblood attended Georgia Tech where he completed his degree in Electrical Engineering. After he graduated he worked at the Georgia Tech Engineering Experiment Station for about two years and then became a partner in a electrical engineering service company in Atlanta. Mr. Youngblood joined Southern Tech in winter quarter of 1954, when the campus was made up of somewhat rickety old military buildings at the Peachtree-DeKalb Airport. 



S.T.I. Needs Volunteers for Orientation

I.D. Scholarships

The Industrial Distribution Option Program of the IET Department expects to be able to offer a number of scholarships again for the 1980-81 school year. Funds for these scholarships are provided by private companies and by a trade association, and are granted on the basis of merit rather than need. Amounts range from \$167 to \$250 per quarter.

You must be enrolled in the ID program to be eligible. Further, you must have at least a 2.5 GPA, overall and for the most recent quarter, and must have completed at least 14 hours during the most recent quarter. Preference will be given Florida residents for one of the scholarships; all others are open to Georgia residents.

Application forms are available from the Financial Aid Office and must be submitted by July 31. ALL CURRENT HOLDERS MUST RESUBMIT if they wish to be considered for the upcoming academic year. Awards will be announced to the recipients by September 2.



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
