



# INTERVIEW: Dr. Stephen R. Cheshier

Dr. Stephen Cheshire has been President of STI since it gained its independence from Georgia Tech in 1980. Allen Bearden was able to draw him away from his busy schedule for a few moments last month The result is the following interview.

Bearden - I understand that you've been pretty busy, that you went to Korea - could you tells us about what you've been doing over the last few months.

Cheshire - That was Taiwan in May. Southern Tech is a member of the American Association of State Colleges & Universities - as we are a state supported college. I am on several of their committes, I'm on their international committee. I went as a representative of that organization to Taiwain -With their government paying for it, to look at the educational system in Taiwain -Technical education especiallyand to develop good will. Over the summer, I headed a council of presidents from that same organization where we got into presidential leadership and how to more effectively manage a college - that was a one week seminar in Flagstaff, Arizona. The bulk of the summer though. has been here planning for the record enrollment that we're going to have. Were trying to redo policy and procedure to make the administration move a little smoother. Never have been an independent college for all those years, there were many things that we just never had to do. So we've spent a lot of time this summer working on those things.

Bearden - About your re-organization - there are shifts in responsibility within the administration. What is the outlook for this as far as helping the school?

Cheshire - It will help the school I think tremendously. It is not as many new positions as it looks like; it's just a functional reorganization of what we already had. For example, we had a housing director, but it was a half-time position. We have now been able to make it full time. The new position is the Dean of faculty. That's new to us, but to any independent college, you have a Dean. The only other unique position that none of the other colleges


have is the director of Industrial relations. We are funding that from an outside grant. That person will work very hard to strengthen our relationship with industry, help with equipment donations, with placement, fund raising with industry, developing short courses for industry - the whole industrial interface. In addition, that person will be the supervisor of the continuing education area, career services, placement and of co-operative education. We are hoping to expand co-operative education in the next few years.

Bearden - What will the trend be in the future - will we attempt to limit enrollment by increasing standards or try to increase facilities to handle new growth?

Chesire - Yes, the second. I very much resist capping enrollment at this point.

Bearden - So you feel that the need of the area would be better served by...

Cheshire - I feel very strongly that when you have 5 or 6 job offers per graduate and the



Bearden - What about evening school?

Cheshire - We will expand that too. We are growing so fast that we need to find ways to take the pressure off of our day school. Expanding co-op and the night school program would allow us better use of our facilities. We are trying to encourage the Academic departments to schedule as heavily as possible to take advantage of all time slots.

Bearden - Lets talk about enrollment projection. I have heard figures of 3,000 by Fall of 1982...

Cheshire - Our official projection was 3,000 by 83. But were going to come awfully close to 3,000 this fall, I looks like we're going over 2900. Within the last two years, we've gone from 2300 to almost 3,000.

most rapidly growing enrollment in the state that you're not beginning to meet the demands yet. It's artificial to cap enrollment and lace that lustration of students wanting in, and can't get in, and telling industry that we can't meet their demand. When we are a tax supported institution, you can't defend to the tax-payers capping under those circumstances. There are so many college graduates today having trouble getting jobs, and when we can get more jobs than we have graduates, our obligation to the state is to provide more graduates. So, the real burden is to find those resources that will allow us to grow.

But another side to this is that I don't think we should grow indefinitely. We are limited on this campus by the space we have. There is a finite number that we could ever hope to handle on this

campus, based on what I see today, it would be to our advantage to become the largest, most dynamic senior college in the state rather than the smallest, weakest University. Because of our special purpose mission, it would be very difficult to ever become a University. Our strength would be to become the major senior college - with an enrollment of around 6,000.

Bearden - How about your Vice president? This person hasn't been selected yet.

Cheshire - No, there are three positions - Vice-president. Dean of Faculty, Director of Industrial relations and coned. director. We have already done a national search on all three. We have committees from campus to screen candidates, to identify finalists. Over the monthe of October all of the

candidates each will spend a day on campus. As quickly as the last interview ends, we will make job offers; The latest that we will have them on board is January 1.

Bearden - Let me ask you about a few other things. For example, do you think that we will ever have Physical Education as required curriculum?

Cheshire - It's possible; it would require us asking for it. It would never be imposed on us. I havent felt any pressure to move in that direction. The problem is expense - you have to hire a faculty and it doesn't contribute toward degrees. That means you create a lot of overhead with salaries and equipment without any more degrees granted. It's hard money to spend.

Bearden - In the area of graduate programs, I know that some degrees here on campus make it rather easy to go into a business program at Georgia State, for example. Are there any plans for expanding the opportunities for students to enter graduate study?

Cheshire - There are two graduate programs that at some time will be appropriate for Southern Tech - we think about

these all of the time. One would be in technical management. The reason we havent pursued that further is that we havent had even an undergraduate program. Well, this fall there is a four year management option available in the IET department. That may well expand into our first Masters degree. Another one that some technology schools are getting into and one we will get into at some point certainly, is a technical Masters degree. There are only a couple in the country now and we're looking very closely at their success. When we're convinced that they are here to stay, we'll petition for one.

Bearden - How is the school operating now - in the red or black?

Cheshire - No, no - we are in the black - we have to be by

needed money, we would have to cut back on something.

Bearden - You mentioned a new management option in the IET department. Are any more new options or major new courses of study going to be offered?

Cheshire - We are asking this year for two new computer four year degrees - a hardware degree and a software degree. They have not been approved as of today - we are in the asking stage. These should go to the regents this fall for approval next fall.

Bearden - What's going on with the Drive-in Theatre parking lot?

## Official Parking Regulations

- 1) All temporary parking has been removed from Administration Circle with the exception of the Two (2) spaces identified and reserved for handicapped persons.
- 2) One (1) space identified and reserved only for commercial loading and unloading.
- 3) No other parking will be allowed on circular drive at any time. Also, anyone illegally parking in the reserved space in front of the Administration Building will be ticketed and fined accordingly. No excuses will be acceptable to relieve this ticket and fine.

All cars, trucks, motorcycles, motor bikes, and mini bikes operating on the campus other

than those of visitors and colle -owned vehicles must be registe and must have a Southern Tech Parking Decal on the lower right front windshield, on the inside.

The fee for registering a motor vehicles for Fall Quarter is \$6.00; Winter Quarter is \$4.00; Spring Quarter is \$2.00 and Summer Quarter is \$2.00. The decal is Valid from Sept. to Sept. of the following year.

PARKING TICKETS WILL BE GIVEN AND FINES IMPOSED FOR:

Unregistered vehicle Giving false information and/or falsely registering a car Reckless driving Failure to obey law enforcement officer Failure to reort or leaving the scene of an accident Speeding on campus Failure to obey a stop sign Reproducing or defacing a decal Parking in a reserved space/ restricted area/ driveway / loading zone/10 ft. of fire hydrant/ crosswalk Parking to obstruct traffic/ blocking other vehicle

Parking in unauthorized area Parking yellow curb/sidewalk/ lawn Parking overtime / reversed direction/ improperly/ undesignated area Failure to display permit properly

Impounding vehicle

Cars will be impounded for parking in driveways leading from the street or service roads' to boiler rooms, and for parking in undesignated areas on the streets, service roads, and driveways so as to impede the regular flow of traffic.

The fines are for first offenses, for second and third violations, the fines may be increased. For continued violatio disciplinary action will be taken and cars will be subjected to being impounded and/or permanently removed from campus.

If for some reason it is necessary for you to drive an unregistered vehicle on campus you must get a temporary permit from the Police Department. This permit is valid for a maximum of two weeks. The temporary permit will be displayed on the front winshield of the car.

Parking Tickets must be taken care of within Ten (10) working days from the day of violation. Failure to do this will result in your grades being frozen and a possible increase in fine, and will prevent you from registering the next quarter you attend school. There will be no more replacement decals, unless you bring the pieces of your old decal in. Without the pieces of your old decal, you will be required to pay the full amount.

Parking regulations apply of the night college student the same as for the day students with the following exceptions:

- 1) Night college students cannot park in a space with a wide yellow line across the base of the space. There are several lots containing these lines.
- 2) Night students cannot park in Dorm Supervisors' spaces. (Along Campus Drive from the Fire Academy entrance to Police Dept. Entrance of Norton Hall.)
- 3) No parking on Campus Drive in medical reserved spaces, or in front of the fire hydrants.

All other spaces are permissible for parking until the evening classes or 11:00 pm (whichever is earlier).

#### APPEAL PROCEDURE

If a student feels that he or she was unjustly ticketed they may appeal by letter or in person before the Judiciary Cabinet of the Student Government. Should the appeal be denied, he may appeal to the Dean of Students.

A grant of nearly a million ollars has been awarded to othern Technical Institute to evelop its cooperative education rogram for students. College resident Stephen R. Cheshier eceived written confirmation ctober 5 of the award, which is Title VIII HEW Comprhensive emonstration grant from the Offi f Cooperative Education Branch f the Department of Education, eadquartered in Washington, D.C. he total award was \$900,000 for three year period. STI is ne of 12 colleges in the nation o receive a comprehensive emonstration grant from the ffice of Cooperative Education his year. The award is etroactive. to September 1, nd is in effect through August 31, 1984.

The co-op porgram allows tudents to alternate work and college quarters, providing an opportunity for professional work experience and allowing students to earn money while nrolled in college. Southern was ech has offered a cooperative education program since the ollege's beginning in 1948. More than 200 STI students ow participate in co-op; and, college officials plan to use resources provided though the ederal grant to greatly xpand student participation.

" We are particularly pleased with this grant in the ight of the cutbacks in raditional forms of financial aid available ot students," commented STI President Dr. Cheshier. "Resources provided through the grant will allow us to reach out to ore Georgia residents who want to earn a degree in engineering technology--both the traditional 18-year-olds entering college for the first time, and the non-traditional students who want to co-op as a means of earining money and gaining professional work evperience in a new field when returning to college."

With the grant, college officials will work to develop a comprehensive denonstrative cooperative education program; thatis, a program that is available to students in all disciplines at the college and offered to a majority of the eligible students and that will demonstrate methods of program development to other colleges in the nation.

three-year program to inform

Federal and institutional support will be combined in a

Georgia citizens about opportunities available through cooperative education, to implement a joint industrycollege effort to recruit students into the program, with an emphasis on women and ninority recruitment, and to provide career exploration, employment mobility and retraining opportunities for the non-traditional student returining to the classroom. The college will channel grant resources into faculty support, industrial relations, public infromation and research. Funding will also support industrial relations, public information and research. Funding will also support additional staff for the cooperative education office forjob development, recruitment of students and recordingseeping in an expanded program

of student participation.



Ormsby will discuss the future of aviation. His talk is part of a day-long visit that he and other Lockheed officials will be making on campus. Before joining Lockheed, Ormsby worked for the Glenn L. Martin Company and the Navy Bureau of Aeronautics.
