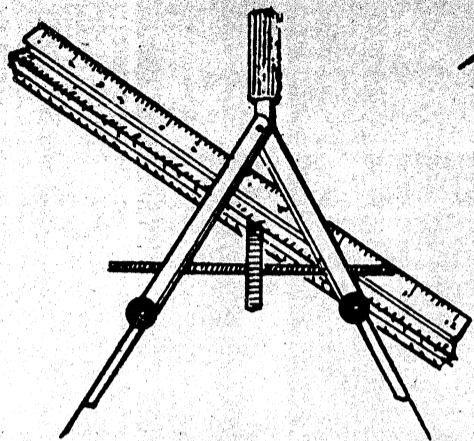

Another Of Southern Tech's Finest

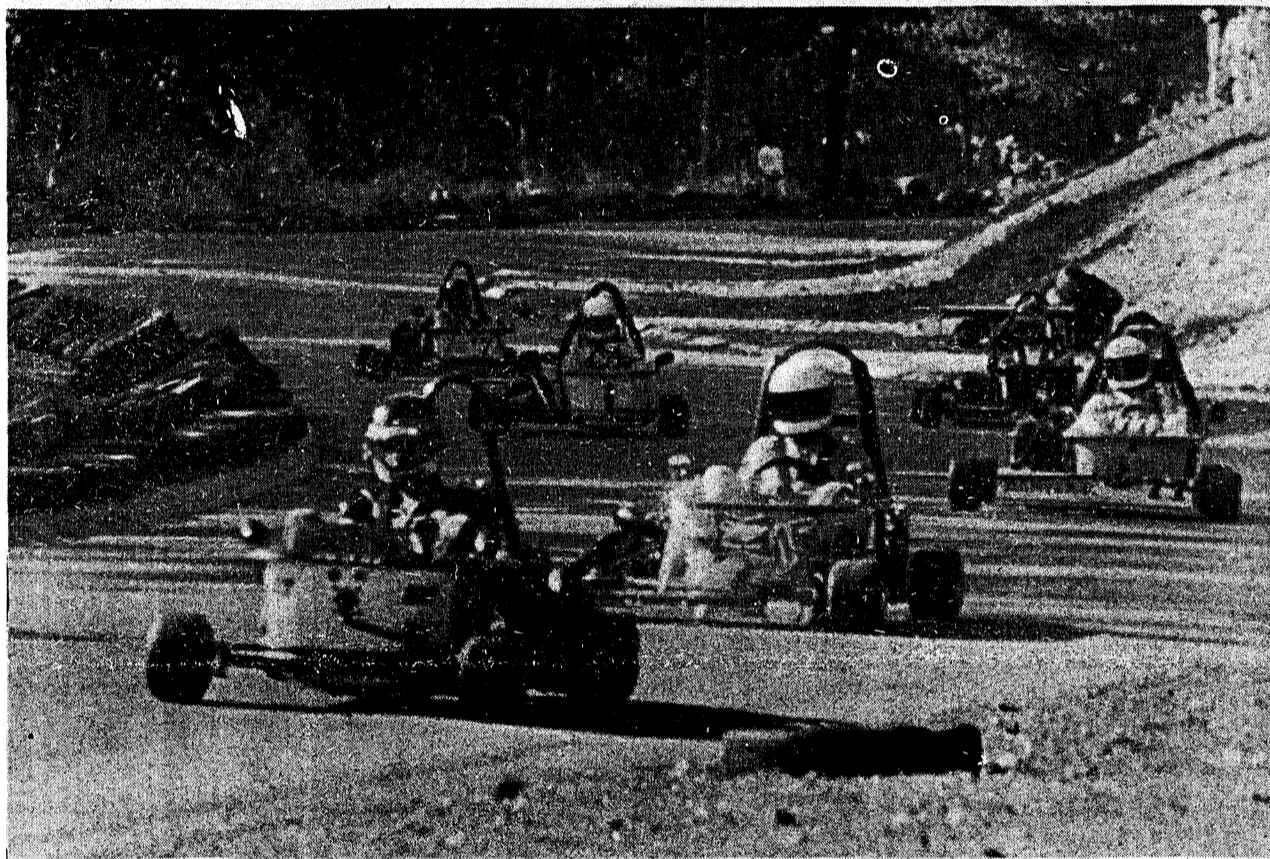

One of Southern Tech's finest traditional events happened last Sunday - the Bathtub Race. The forty lap race started at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon and ended with senior MET student Edward Jordan the winner.

The bathtub races originally started out with regular bathtubs being pulled by hand through the mud. Over the fifteen years that the races have been held many improvements to the tubs have been made. At one point the tubs were equipped with wheels and pulled by Freshmen. Today's bathtubs are powered by 175 cc engines and reach top speeds of 85 to 90 miles an hour. The average lap speeds are near 60 miles per hour. Two races are held each year - one in Spring and one in the Fall.

The race was interrupted after one lap due to a collision which eliminated two tubs from the competition. Rookie driver Mike Smoker's

throttle cable jammed on the straightaway leading to turn #4 causing him to collide with defending champion Charlie Mix. Both tubs suffered considerable damage and the drivers were taken to Kennestone Hospital where they were treated and released. Mike suffered a cut on his right thigh that took 15 stitches. Charlie suffered a compound fracture of his left arm. Both drivers are now back in school and doing fine. The race was restarted with six tubs completing. On the restart, top qualifier Rodney Bridges led the field for eleven laps before his pit stop gave up the lead to Edward Jordan. Jordan's pit stop on the sixteenth lap was quick enough for him to keep his lead over Don Davidson and Bridges. On the 31st lap Jordan's pit stop gave up his lead to Davidson but Jordan overtook Davidson on the next lap, when Don made his pit

stop. On the last lap, Davidson lost control while trying to close the four-second gap on Jordan. Don's tub bounced off the tires coming out of the turn between the physical plant and the gym. Don was unhurt although his tub was badly damaged. Edward Jordan took the checkered flag after 40 laps with a total elapsed time of 1 hour, 4 minutes and 43 seconds. Don Davidson took second place, having completed 39 laps. Rodney Bridges took third completing 38 laps. John Farmer took fourth. Donnie Gantt and Charlie Shatzen both went out on lap #7 due to mechanical failure. Roger Race could not start the race due to a seized engine.

The Bathtub Racing Association would like to thank everyone involved in the Fall race for making it a great success. Anyone interested in bathtub racing is welcome to come to the weekly Bathtub Racing Association's meeting. The meetings are held every Tuesday at 8 o'clock in room 213.

Minutes of every meeting are available at the Secretary-Treasurer's office or you may view a copy in the SGA bulletin case by the door to the post office.

Student Council meetings will be held at noon in room 212 every other Tuesday starting Nov. 17, 1981. Council meetings, with the exception of impeachment proceedings, are open to all students.

My SGA phone number is 424-7250. My office is located on the upper level of the Student Center and is open to students between the hours of 10:00am to 1:00pm and 5:00pm to 9:00pm on Monday. I am also available by appointment only between 2:00pm to 10:00pm on Tuesday and Wednesday.

This schedule is official only up to final exams Fall quarter 1981. During final exams and between quarters, I will be available by appointment only. A new schedule for Winter quarter will be posted at its beginning.

Serving in my capacity in the SGA gives me the authority to establish adhoc committees of the Student Council. These committees investigate problems, complaints, and ideas which could or do effect student life. Any student who wishes to discuss such a situation should

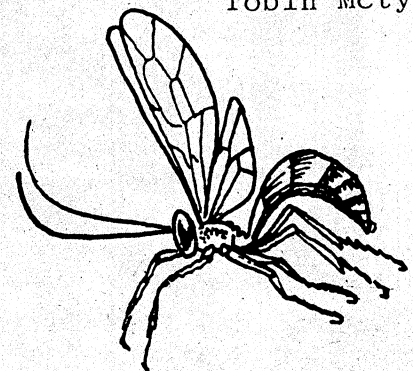
contact me. If it appears to be legitimate to me, I will establish a committee under the chairmanship of the respective student. After research and investigation, the committee may submit and discuss a written report. If appropriate, I will then refer the report to the Student Council who will then act on the report as it sees fit. For example, two students have already approached me individually: one to complain about the food service and another to suggest we establish a carpool referral service. I set up the Carpool Committee and the Campus Restaurant Facilities committee to investigate these possibilities.

In closing, there are two SGA positions yet to be filled. We need a Night School Representative and someone to serve on the Judiciary Cabinet. The requirements for these are 36 hours and two quarters at STI and a minimum overall GPA of 2.00. Anyone interested in these should procure a petition from the folder on my office door, complete it and return it to me.

The Student Government Association, as established by the students of Southern Tech, maintains full authority over all student organizations on campus. It has the power to recognize and review such organizations. And if it sees fit, it may withdraw recognition of such organizations.

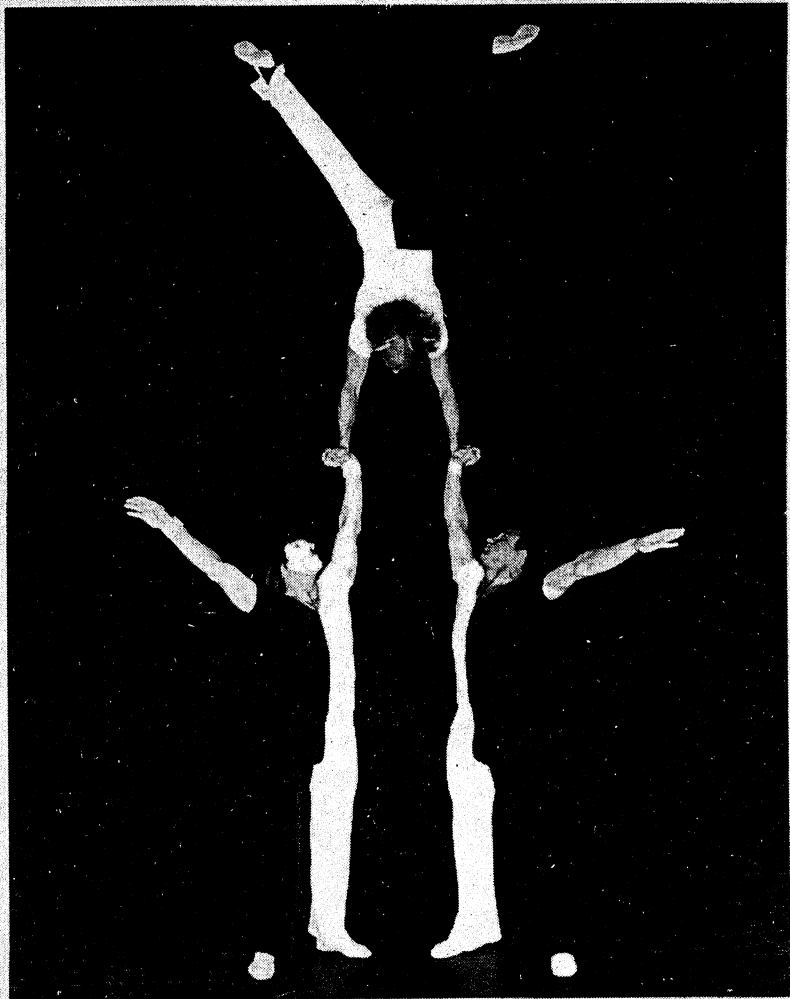

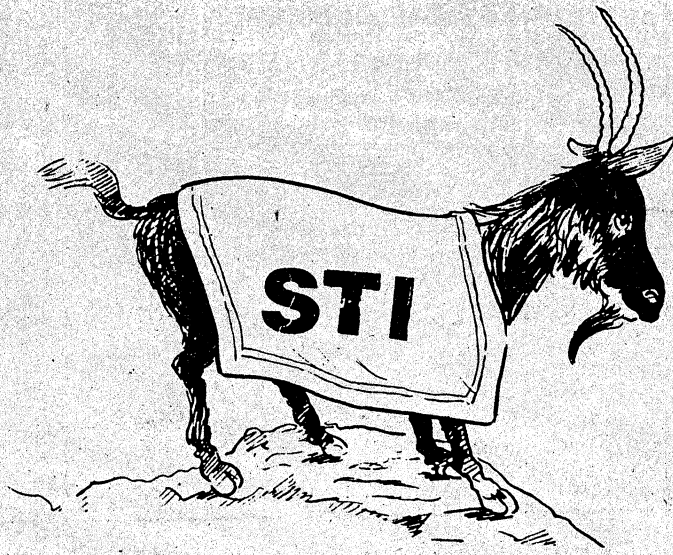

In each event a team's participant would try his or her best to earn points for the team's total. Using this strategy, the totals showed that the Geechees, the only

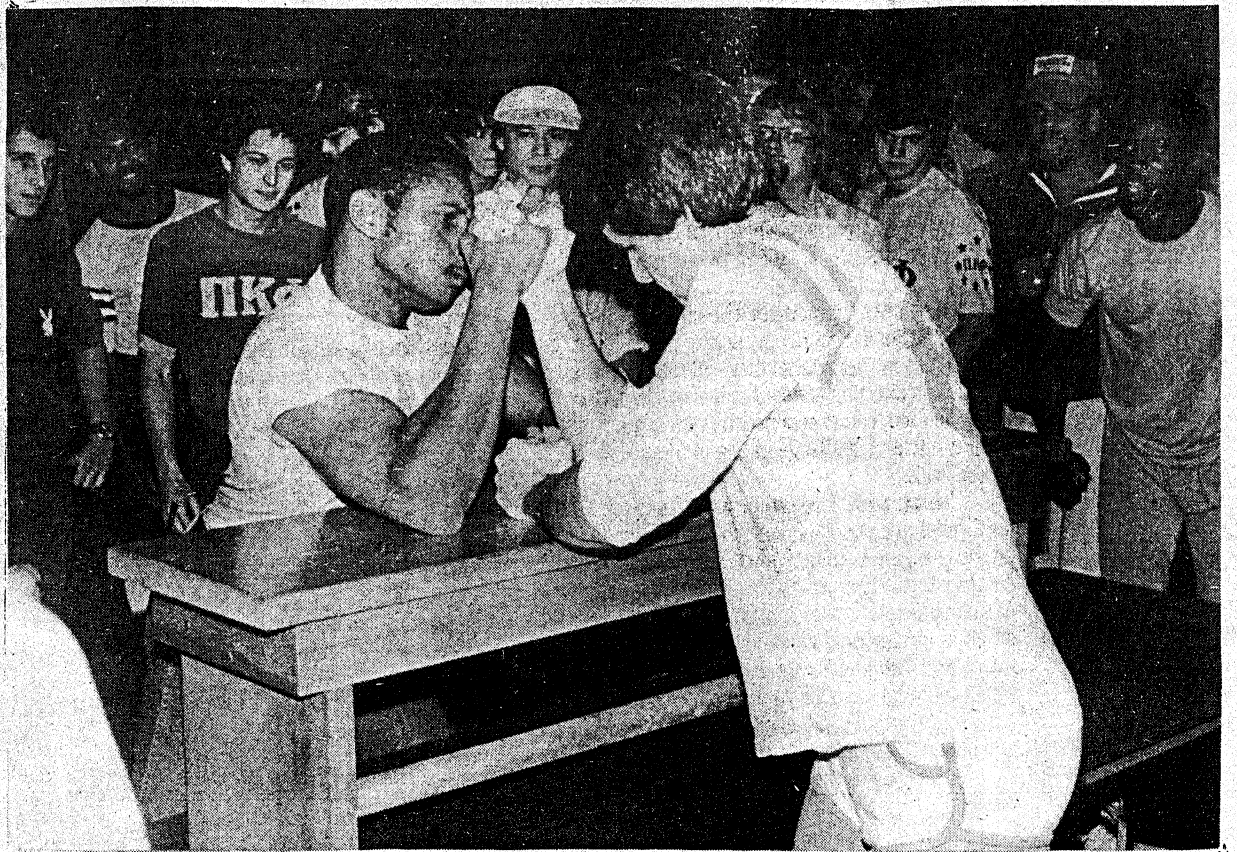

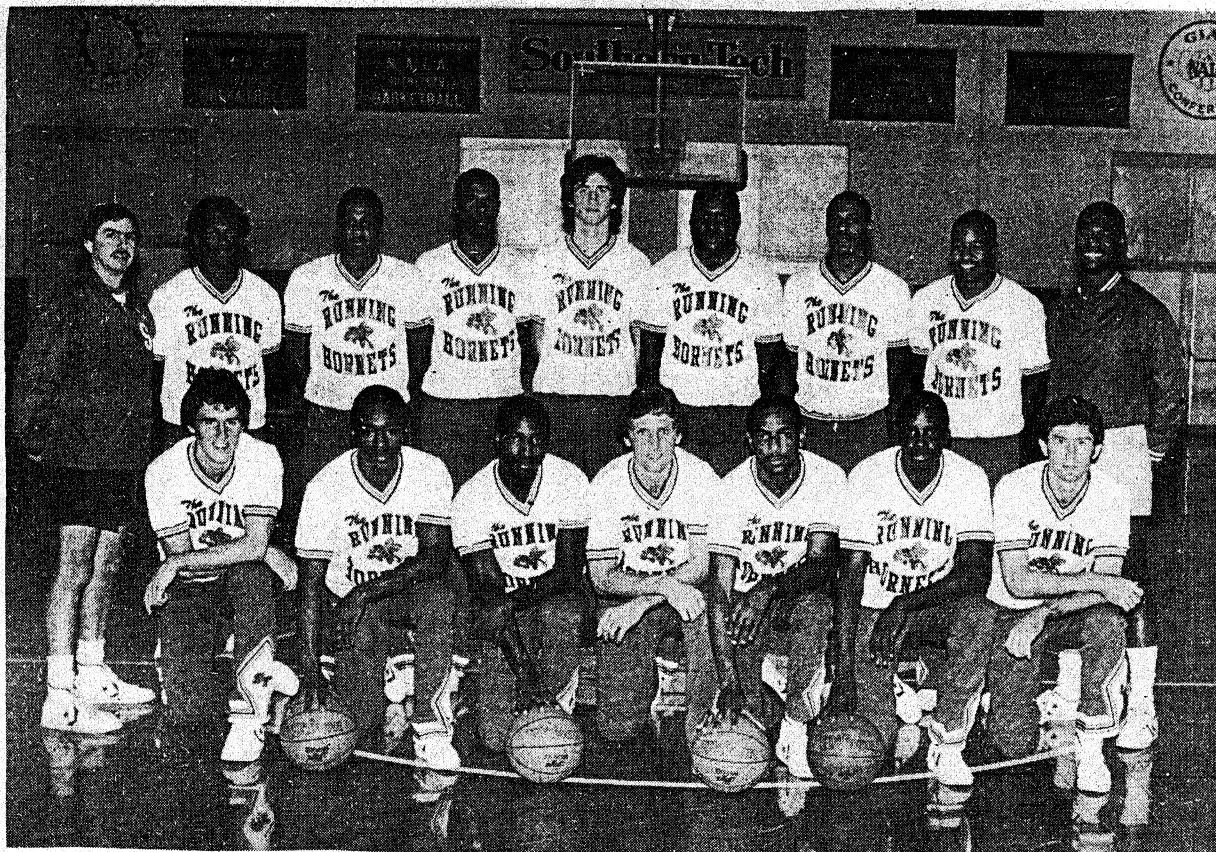

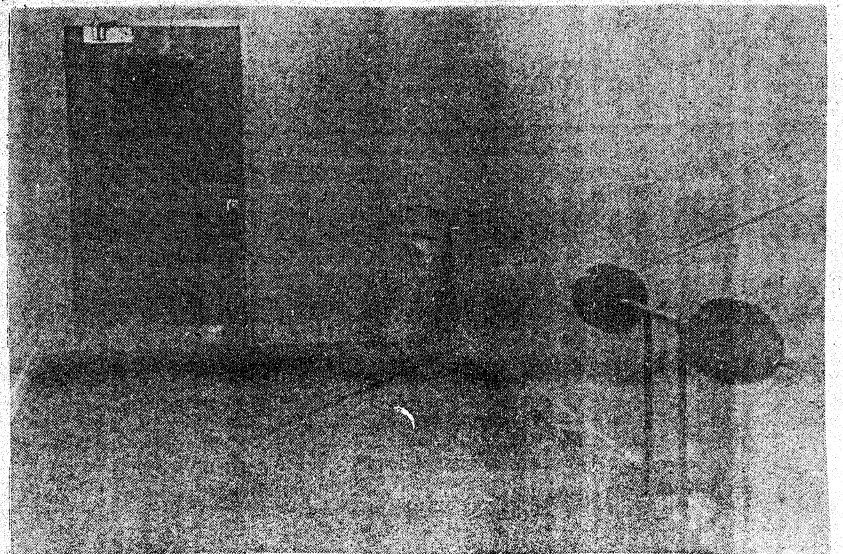

GUIDELINES FOR STUDENT ESSAY COMPETITION

Qualifications for Entry

- 1) Residence in metropolitan Atlanta either by school location or by home residence.
- 2) Full-time registration in an ABET accredited Engineering or Engineering Technology program. The institution does not have to be in metropolitan Atlanta.

Format of Papers

- 1) Ten pages maximum (one side), typewritten, double spaced
- 2) A title page shall be included with the following information:
 - a) Title of the paper
 - b) Author's name
 - c) Author's Atlanta mailing address and local telephone number
 - d) Author's school affiliation, curriculum and class status (Freshman, Sophomore, etc.)
- 3) The paper will identify and develop the author's concept of the 1982 E-Week theme "Engineers - Pioneering America's Revitalization." In addition, the paper will develop that concept with relation to the following general elements:
 - a) Historical evolution (past, present and future)
 - b) Specific engineering functions (i.e., design, research, construction education, etc.)
 - c) Specific areas of progress (i.e., communications, transportation, health, culture, etc.)

Finally, the paper shall contain a summary statement by the author presenting their definition of Engineering and also their assessment of what the preparation of the paper has meant to them, or in other words, what is the purpose of the paper.

All entries should be submitted to GSPE Headquarters by 5:00pm, February 1, 1982. The papers will be evaluated by a panel of educators and students from both Georgia Tech and Southern Tech. The papers will be judged as to technical accuracy, applicability to the theme, grammar and writing style - particular attention will be given to the author's successful, innovative development of their particular concept.

The winning entry will be announced in a press release some time during E-Week in February. The presentation of the \$100 prize will be made at the E-Week Banquet on February 26, 1982. Finally, the selected paper will be printed in the Georgia Professional Engineer (the GSPE magazine).
