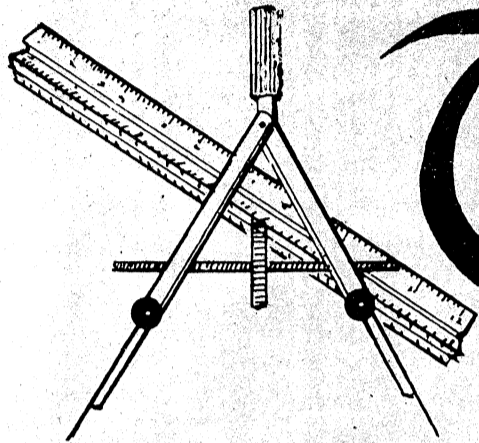

Nancy Schmidt: Counselor

Nancy Schmidt recently joined Barbara Anderson on the counseling staff at Southern Tech. Her comments about her new position are contained in the following interview with *Sting* staff member Allen Bearden.

Bearden: Could you tell us a little about yourself?

Schmidt: I grew up in Arkansas, a small town. I went to college there and got a degree in English. Then after working for the State of Arkansas for a year, I moved to Athens, Georgia, and got a Masters Degree of Education with the specialty in student personnel and higher education. I worked a year in Indiana at Ball State University as the resident hall director. I was ready to get out of the dorms so I moved to Boston and worked at a small liberal arts college, Corry College. I was the counselor, similar to my position here. I then moved to Atlanta.

Bearden: There was a rumor that the administration wanted a man for the job of counselor, but that your qualifications won out.

Schmidt: I'm very glad about that!

Bearden: Hooray for women's lib?

Schmidt: Well I think it makes

sense in some ways on a campus that is predominantly male to have a male and female counselor, maybe some guys need a male to talk with. But I really think that once a student is working with a counselor it's not going to matter that much. I don't think it will be detrimental.

Bearden: What kind of specific problems will you handle here?

Schmidt: The whole range of problems. Non-academic probably more than academic. But we will probably do quite a bit of academic counseling - study skills, decisions about changing majors and about future careers. But some of the most prevalent things that students are concerned with are relationship problems - girlfriend, boyfriend, family or just friends and roommates. One of the most important functions that I perform is that of holding up a mirror so people can see what they are saying. Sometimes it's hard to look at your own feelings objectively.

Bearden: What about your career guidance programs?

Schmidt: Part of that will be done in the counseling office. If students are undecided about their goals or want

to see what skills they have, we can talk to them about career planning. I think about career planning as career-life planning. If you choose a life in engineering, you will have a certain kind of lifestyle. You should look at it as a whole and decide if you would be comfortable with this lifestyle.

Bearden: Have you set office hours?

Schmidt: Not yet. Our regular office hours are from 8 to 5, but we will be doing some evening programs. People can come by now and set up appointments. Students should feel free to drop in any time. It will be beneficial, especially in fall quarter, to have an appointment. Students shouldn't necessarily feel that they have to have a problem to drop in. It's a place that you can learn more about yourself or just express some ideas. In the past there has been a stigma against going to the counselor's office. But I think it's healthy to talk to someone who can be trusted, confidentiality will be maintained strictly. I think that people have felt free to come in during the last two years since Barbara has been here.

Bearden: What kind of special interest programs do you intend to set up?



Schmidt: I hope to do more of those. I want to see what the students' interests and needs are. There are a lot of different workshops - we can do career planning workshops, human sexuality, assertiveness, alcohol - not so much about alcoholism, but what is alcohol? What role does it play in the lives of people? I hope we can start a growth group, a group that wouldn't have a single focus.

Bearden: What were your first impressions of Southern Tech?

Schmidt: My first impression was that it's really growing and making a reputation on its own since separating from Georgia Tech. Students are very nice here and it's great to be back in the South.

Castellucis On Leave From STI, Begins Fulltime Campaign.

The pace of the campaign will accelerate to sixteen-hour days, which will begin at 6:00 A.M. when Richard puts on the headphones for his daily briefing on the actions of the U.S. Congress while he takes his morning

walk, and end around 11:00 P.M. while he writes "thank you" notes on his way home from his last scheduled event of the day.

Castellucis, who is popular with students and faculty alike, will be missed at the school, but many of his friends at Southern Tech will see him frequently because they have volunteered to work in the campaign.

C-5? 0-141!!!!

The C-5 situation is one that many STI students and faculty are watching nervously and rightly so. The new five year contract would mean 8000 new jobs. And considering Lockheed president Owensby's high regard for STI, you could assume that our student, professors and alumni would pick up a decent share of these.

But now it looks like the company may not get the contract. By a 60 to 39 vote, the U.S. Senate approved an alternative measure to buy 48 second hand Boeing 747's from America's troubled airlines instead.

Powerful Senator Henry Jackson led the fight against Lockheed, arguing that six billion could be saved the taxpayer while helping bail out Braniff and others.

Senators Nunn and Mattingly led the charge for Georgia, contending that the C-5 is a superior craft with greater capabilities for hauling "out-size" cargo. They also question buying used aircrafts, that will obviously have to be replaced sooner.

I don't know much about either plane, but I am sure that when debate begins in the House, the decision won't be made on merit anyway. Defense contractors have always fought like step-nephews scoffling for the biggest piece of Uncle Sam's cornbread. This decision will be made in backrooms and bar rooms by senators concerned more

with politics than the defense of this country.

So if Georgia and the seventh district want this 4½ billion to come into Marietta, it must out politic Boeing. The best way to do that is with strong leadership from this district. Our congressman must put on his dancing shoes and dance!

Unfortunately, the congressman from the seventh does not exactly have a pile of leadership accomplishments to his credit. Larry McDonald has sponsored 141 bills in his seven and one-half years in congress, most of which insulted the intelligence of Congress. Only one, **just one**, ever made it out of committee. This bill tried to impeach Andrew Young and was trounced on the house floor. He did co-sponsor somebody else's bill to change the name of a post office once, that one passed, but aside from a few **amendments** that he has successfully sponsored, McDonald is zilch! We should not be too optimistic about the chances of the C-5 when our best chance has never passed a single bill.

Even worse, the feeling around Washington is that the mere presence of McDonald in this district is the best reason to vote against Lockheed. McDonald is not well liked by his peers in Congress, one of them said that "everybody hates McDonald."

'Southern Tech Gets New Computer Degree Programs'

(Note: The following article is an explanation of the newly developed computer degree programs, adapted from a news release distributed by the Southern Tech Public Relations Office to media throughout the state. Any currently enrolled Southern Tech student interested in obtaining information regarding Fall Quarter enrollment in the Computer Hardware Option should immediately contact David Summers, ECET Department Head, ext. 247. Southern Tech students interested in obtaining information regarding enrollment in the Computer Software Program should contact the Registrar's Office, ext. 267.)

Four new computer degree programs will be offered at Southern Tech beginning fall quarter as a result of action taken by the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia at their June meeting in Atlanta. The Board also approved \$500,000 for academic computing facilities to support the programs. Both four-year bachelor and two-year associate degrees will be offered in Computer Engineering Technology (hardware) and Computer Information Systems Technology (software), giving Southern Tech one of the most comprehensive technically-oriented computer offerings in the state.

Although both programs will be offered beginning fall quarter, initial enrollments in computer courses will be limited. As additional resources are obtained, the programs will be expanded to better meet demand, according to Dr. Harris Travis, vice-president and dean of the faculty.

"The half million dollars approved for the computing facilities by the Regents was made possible through the efforts of the Cobb Legislative Delegation," commented Southern Tech President Stephen Cheshier. They recognized our need and also the tremendous benefit to the community that the computer programs will provide," he added.

Background

The programs were proposed to the Regents after extensive research by college faculty and administrators. The program concepts, curricula and career paths were planned with input from an Industrial Advisory Committee, as well as research into similar programs throughout the nation. The Computer Information Systems Technology (CST) offering will be a new degree-granting department at the college, while the Computer Engineering Technology (CpET) program has been combined with the college's Electrical Engineering Technology department, to be renamed as the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering Technologies (ECET). The upgraded computer facilities will strengthen the present computer emphasis in all degree-granting departments at Southern Tech, including Apparel, Architectural, Civil, Industrial,

Mechanical and Textile Engineering Technology.

Research has shown that demand for the new programs could significantly increase enrollment at Southern Tech, already the fastest-growing senior college in the University System of Georgia. The college has an enrollment of 3,000 students, and has an annual growth rate of 15 per cent. Reports from the admissions office indicate that 40 per cent of all students requesting information on Southern Tech have expressed an interest in computer programs.

"These four new programs will provide outstanding career opportunities in a field where the sky is the limit," commented Dr. Cheshier. "A report in the **Wall Street Journal** last August summarized the employment picture for technically-trained graduates. Labor Department statistics showed that colleges throughout the nation are only producing 11,000 people to fill 54,000 available jobs in the computer field. Our new programs are in direct response to needs expressed by industry; so, the jobs are there."

Dr. Cheshier cautioned that the programs can only grow as resources are available.

"Since students only pay about 20 per cent of the cost of their college education, funding must come from other sources. As we receive equipment and money from industry and state appropriations, we will expand our computer programs to better meet demand. Because of the popularity of the field, we predict that student demand will be far exceed the number of participants we will be able to accept initially."

The Software Program

The Computer Information Systems Technology program will provide students with a strong background in management systems and computer applications. As in all engineering technology programs at the college, a strong background in mathematics and science will be emphasized.

Graduates will be especially prepared for employment as analysts or programmer-analysts in technical, engineering support or managerial areas. The program differs from traditional computer science programs in that a technical track will be offered that will train graduates for industrial and technical computer applications. In addition, a track will be offered in the CST program to train graduates for positions in business and commerce, including computer application in personnel and finance.

The Hardware Program

The hardware program, or Computer Engineering Technology, is designed to produce graduates competent in the application of minia and micro computers in the area of control, instrumentation, manufacturing and data management. As is the software program, CpET will build upon a strong math and science

background.

"The Electrical and Computer Engineering Technologies Department will continue to offer its present Bachelor of Electrical Engineering Technology degree, computer systems option," stated David Summers, department head. "The BEET would be for students who want a more broadly-based coverage of electronics and computers. For example, the new CpET program will include 57 quarter hours in computers, as compared to

28 quarter hours in the BEET computer option," he said.

Cooperative Education, a program allowing students to alternate work and college quarters, will be offered in both of the computer bachelor degree programs. The college will seek Accrediting Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET) accreditation for the new programs. All present bachelor degree programs at Southern Tech have that accreditation.

(1) Presently, a vehicle registration fee of \$6.00 is charged a year if purchased Fall Quarter, \$4.00 Winter Quarter, \$2.00 Spring Quarter, \$2.00 Summer Quarter.

(2) The late fee presently charged is \$5.00 per day for a maximum of three days on required fees or charges. The schedule of changes is as follows: \$5.00 per day for three days, \$7.50 per day for the fourth through the tenth day and \$10.00 per day for the eleventh through the fifteenth day for a cumulative maximum of \$117.50.

(3) Returned check charges are now applied to the following schedule: paid within 30 days, a \$10.00 charge; paid between thirty days and within sixty days a \$20.00 charge; and paid over sixty days a \$30.00 charge. The new check return charges are as follows: paid within thirty days, the same as now, \$10.00 charge; paid between thirty and sixty days a \$25.00 charge, paid after sixty days a \$50.00 charge.

(4) The fee for Academic Credit by Examination is \$50.00. A receipt must be secured from the Business Office reflecting payment of this fee before taking the examination.

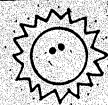
