

Some 1.4 million veterans across 2. Academic Calendar Petition was the nation are receiving rather dubious New Year greetings from the Veterans Administrations's Centralized Accounts Receivable System (CARS) in St. Paul, Minn.

The computer center which keeps track of all VA accounts is sending out 55,000 letters a day notifying veterans that they owe VA money and that VA intends to collect. The total bill is \$900 million.

The mass mailing is part of a twoyear-old Congressionally-mandated effort to seek out federal debtors, notify them of their debt and, finally, collect the debt through voluntary or, if necessary, legal means.

Most of the VA debts were caused by educational benefit overpayments to veterans attending school under the GI Bill, but VA compensation and pension and home loan programs are also included. Some debts go back to the 1960's.

Recent legislation allowed VA and other federal agencies to compare debtor lists against Internal Revenue Service records to verify current addresses. That is why many veterans for whom VA had no address are now receiving debt notification letters. For many-it's a

'Our toll-free counseling phone lines are literally ringing off their hooks this week," said Atlanta VA Regional Office veterans services officer Bob Snider. "We've averaged 1,500 calls a day so far this year and a large percentage have concerned VA debt notification."

This is a centrally managed program and there's not a lot the regional office can do for the veteran except to advise him or her on the alternatives listed in the letters," Snider said. "The letter tells them to deal directly with CARS in St. Paul and that's what we tell the veterans."

He noted that the letter is "advisory." It advised the veteran that he is indebted for a specific amount according to VA accounts receivable records. It states that CARS will provide the veteran an audit documenting that debt upon

I Knew I Was Back

I knew I was back when on Tuesday, January 4, 1983, I attempted to drop and add classes, traditionally known as the process of registration. My advisor warned me. He said it was best to decide on classes and times during preregistration. But me who am I to listen to excellent advice? Here was my opportunity to drop and 8:00 history class and add many of the classes necessary for me to petition for my associated degree after this quarter. My advisor reluctantly signed my form and I was off, willing to patiently endure whatever I had to, to obtain my goal.

After standing in a relatively short line at the computer terminal, I was informed by the nice lady there that I had been frozen by the library. I knew jof only one book the library could have caused this dilemna over. The book was not in my possession, and I was thoroughly upset because Southern Tech policy is such that I could not register or

request. It also advises the veteran of the steps he can take to repay the debt and the steps VA will take if the debt goes unpaid.

The latter includes deductions from current VA benefits, possible court action and the possibility of action by private collection agencies that could adversely affect the veteran's credit rating. If the debt is not cleared or in process of being paid by April, VA plans to start charging interest up to 13 percent.

The VA debt letters were mailed in late December and began arriving in Georgia just before the end of last year. Snider advised veterans who receive the letters to read them carefully, check their memories and personal records if they don't recall the debt and then contact CARS by Dan Owenby letter if they have questions about William "Guy" Barret the debt or repayment procedures.





Southern Tech Basketball Games 11 and 12

Game #11

Southern Tech's Wed., January 5th hosting of NCAA Division II member Indiana Central would develop into a game of numbers, large ones at that, and end with the Hornets on top 83 to 68 in an overall impressive game that opened Tech's 1983 portion of the schedule. In a game that took close to two hours to complete the two teams recorded 54 fouls, 58 free throw attempts, and a total of 26 players would see action. Southern Tech's side of the box score would show a total of 47 rebounds, .483 percent floor shooting, and a .750% mark from the line on 27 of 36 free tosses. The Greyhounds from ICU posted a total of 26 rebounds, a cold .413 percent from the field, and a .727 percentage at the line. Indiana Central, an eleven point loser at West Georgia the night before, headed back to Hoosier land witha 3 and 6 overall record against a very tough schedule.

Southern Tech would never trail in a game that would be tied twice in the very early stages. Paced by some fine outside shooting from 6p8 senior forward Allen Payne the Hornets broke from a 4-all tie to run off eight unanswered points and take a 12-4 lead with 15:50 left in the half. When the break came the advantage had been built to 11 points with Tech on top by a 42 to 31 score. Over the first twenty the Hornets had burned the nets for a .567% mark on 17 of 30 field goals and Allen Payne had recorded a 7 for 10 slice of that total and 14 first half points. It would be a four-filled second section and the Hornets would be in the bonussituation by the 15:56 mark. With 9:03 left to play Southern Tech held a 61 to 41 lead, but the Greyhounds scored seven straight to cut it to 61-48 at the 7:45 mark. The Hornets returned their margin to 19 points two minutes later and the 'Hounds would rally again to cut it back to ten-points in the closing minutes before the final of 83 to 68 would go into the record books.

Individually speaking it would be Allen Payne with 16, senior forward Jesse Walton with 15, and starting center Jerome Powell with 11 points and 13 rebounds. Senior center Joe Burgess missed the game due to an injury to his non-shooting hand. Senior guard Kenny Peterson added 9 and the newest Hornet Terry Dawson, a 6-61/2 junior forward from Warren, Ohio, scored 8 points in 12 minutes of action. Junior guard Angelo Anthony passed out 5 assists and recorded 3 steals. Tech's pressure defense all but shutdown ICU's leading scorers and the top Grevhound scorer would be 6-2 junior guard Larry Koch with 13 points and 6 rebounds in a reserve role. The turnover totals showed Southern Tech with 19 and Indiana Central recorded 9 floor errors.

Game #12

The impressive play of this "rebuilding" edition known as the 1982-83 Southern Tech Runnin' Hornets continued on Saturday night with a 62 to 50 win over arch-rival North Georgia before an estimated 1340 fans at the Hornets' Nest. On the defensive side the Hornets' pressure would limit the Saints to just 9 of 24 (.375 percent) in the first half whild on the offensive end the Hornets were hitting 12 of their 21 two-point tries for a .571% mark in the first half. Individually the North Georgia guards were 5 of 14 in the half while Tech's senior guard Kenny Peterson had hit all six of his shots for 12 with most coming from the 15-20 foot range. Overall Peterson, who also saw some time at forward, would not miss a shot until the 11:08 mark of the game and would finish with 7 of 8 shooting, 5 rebounds, 14 points. Junior guard Angelo Anthony scored 13 points in the second half and would establish a Hornets' career high for himself with a total of 17 points coming on 5 of 8 field goals and a perfect 7 for 7 at the line. Senior forward Allen Payne would miss on his first six shots but came on to hit his final four from the floor and ended with 10 points, all coming in the second half, on 4 for 10 field goals and 2 of 2 free tosses. Junior Jerome Powell again started at center and scored 4 points with 10 rebounds in 27 minutes. Junior forward Rodney Carter hit for 6 and was very impressive on defense vs.

6-8 two-time All-District forward Willie Thomas. In the reserve role it would be Jacobey Simmons and Charlie Williams scoring 4 apiece and senior center Joe Burgess adding 7 big rebounds in 13 minutes of action. Burgess was very impressive on the boards despite a badly injured finger on his nonshooting hand. For North Georgia, playing their 12th game on the road in the season's first 13 contests, it was 6-8 junior forward Willie Thomas with 18 (10 in the second half) and junior 5-10 guard David Lockhart with 14 second half points on some long range shooting. Lockhart entered the game with 2:45 left in the first half and never left as he missed his first three shots but hit seven of the last nine from the 20-foot neighborhood. The Saints' starting guards (John Dean and Norris Ratliff) scored 6 and 8 points but also posted 6 of 22 shooting from the field. The Saints' starting center Marcus Johnson, 6-6 junior, was limited to 2 points and 20 minutes due to foul trouble and starting forward Tom Beatty, a 6-4 senior, had to leave the game with an injury at the 13:34 mark in the first half. Overall North Georgia used eight players while Tech would use ten of their 14-man squad.

North Georgia's lone lead came on the game's first basket by Norris Ratliff at the 17:47 mark. Southern Tech scored six straight and a tip-in from Jerome Powell made it 6-2 with

16:26 in the half. The Saints answered back and the game was tied at 6 and 8 before and Angelo Anthony steal an assist to Kenny Peterson put Tech up 12-8 at the 11:07 mark. Peterson would close the scoring on the half with a 13-foot field goal at 1:21 which posted the intermission score of 25 to 18. With 17:25 left in the game Anthony banged home a 20-foot jumper and the Hornets were up 30 to 20. A bit later the Tech break was near perfect as Anthony, Peterson, and Payne teamed up for six straight points within a minute to make it 38-24 at the 12:22 mark. North Georgia would not die, however, and some good play from Thomas and Lockhart's 25-footer had the margin down to six with a 42-36 score showing and 6:54 on the clock. Lockhart would score 10 of the Saints final 16 points, but Tech would remain on top with some perfect shooting at the line from Anthony (all seven free throws in the last 2:17) and Payne. Two baskets from sub Jacobey Simmons and a Rodney Carter free throw were the big keys as STI would return the margin to 11 point at 49-38 with 4:24 to play. Overall the second section

saw Southern Tech hit 565% from the field and 11 of 13 free throws for a hot .846 percentage. North Georgia warmed up to .455% from the field in the second half.


