Southern Tech's Placement Office has been responsible for bringing in some large and prestigious companies this quarter; this is a fact that those graduating appreciate very much...I know I do. The placement service, under the direction of Paul Smith, is a service that all students of Southern Tech should be taking advantage.

Recently, Paul Smith expressed some of his concerns for those who decide to use the Placement Office services. Sixty to seventy percent of the graduates use the Placement service, according to Smith, but that means there is another thirty or forty percent who fail to ever register with the Placement office. Paul Smith also stated that students should begin to become familiar with the

Placement services during the last TWO years at Southern Tech. Even though a junior may not be ready to start the job search, he (or she) should become aware of job and company possibilities. Taking the time to read through company brochures and information will allow a person to start forming his or her ideas about what they want to do as a career. You need to be aware of what you want, and what the companies want. Hopefully there will be a happy medium somewhere. Spending this time in the Placement office meeting the staff and reviewing the information will give you better direction in pursuing a career.

Some of the things that Mr. Smith said were in the works for the Placement Office are seminars, workshops and even

the possibility of a course in career planning. Also, the Placement Office hopes to hire a full time employee with experience in professional career development and counseling.

Smith also said that most of the companies that interview on the Southern Tech campus are already impressed by the quality of the employees they have already hired out of Southern Tech. These companies distinguish very little between engineering technology graduates and engineering, according to Smith, when it comes to salary, positions and advancement; however, a few companies do discriminate against Southern Tech graduates when it comes to these three areas. Companies want entry level employees with the applied engineering or practical ex-

perience degree. Many positions that are filled with engineering school graduates could easily or be performed as well or better by Southern Tech graduates.

Though Southern Tech does have many companies interviewing on campus, some companies have not found it to be "worth their while" to come Southern Tech. It's not that the companies don't want Southern Tech graduates, because they do. The problem is influencing the Southern Tech graduates. Southern Tech graduates typically want to remain in the metro-Atlanta area and are not willing or prefer not to relocate. Paul Smith said that the reasoning for this is varied but mainly because those attending Southern Tech simply like the Atlanta area. Also, many of the

students are married or have already settled in Atlanta (Marietta) and have more or less committed themselves to staying in the area. Therefore, a key to finding the right job may be in the willingness to relocate. If, however, you simply must remain in the Atlanta area, Atlanta is a big enough territory to find what you want-if you are persistent.

Paul Smith and staff deserve your support and appreciation. They are doing a great job of making our lives better after Southern Tech. As Southern Tech continues to grow, and it is, the Placement Service will also grow and continue to match our graduates with the "real" world.

Bathtub Racing

BATHTUB RACING is familiar to the students of Southern Tech, however the rewards of this curious endeavor are not as well known. Resume made Easy

I finally have my resume completed! I got it finished just in time to start interviewing next quarter. I'm sure somebody else is struggling with their resume, so I'm going to list the (6) easy steps to take. The funny thing is that it was easy putting together my resume and I thought it was going to be difficult.

AUGUSTA—Graduate Student Research Day will be held November 16 at the Medical College of Georgia for students throughout the Southeast interested in pursuing advanced degrees in the biological sciences.

This event is held to expose students to MCG's programs in graduate studies. MCG offers master's and doctor of philosophy degrees in the fields of anatomy, biochemistry, endocrinology, microbiology, pharmacology, and physiology. Also offered are master's degrees in nursing, oral biology, medical illustration and Master of Health Education in dental hygiene, medical technology, occupational therapy and physical therapy. In addition, some combined degree programs are offered.

Visitors to MCG on Nov. 16 will view and discuss research being conducted by students currently enrolled at ACG. Tours of various departments will be given and faculty will be available to answer questions. Lunch and free parking will be provided.

Travel awards are available to students from other cities.

The Board of Regents needs a new chancellor. A board search is in the process of looking at candidates for the position. They are interviewing two main candidates for the job, but some others are being considered. University of Georgia President, Fred Davison, and University System Vice Chancellor, Dean Propst, are the leading contenders. The committee will also speak with University of Alabama President, Joab Thomas. Thomas has said he doesn't want the job; he's only interested in a consulting role on the Regents Board.

The Regents said they are also trying to get other people to join the chancellor race. They said that they would interview other candidates on a later date.

Some of these others to be considered are George Bidell, Executive Vice Chancellor of Florida's State University system; Barbara Uchling, Chancellor of the University of Missouri; and John Raff, Chancellor of the Massachusetts State University system.

In November or December, they new chancellor will be selected by the full Board of Regents. This chancellor will replace Vernon Crawford, who plans to step down after five years as the top administrator of Georgia's 33-institution public university system.

These top candidates were chosen from hundreds of candidates who were prescreened by a search committee between April and August.

Twice each year, Fall and Spring semesters, a group of 500 students from colleges and universities across the United States set out on a journey of learning and discovery. They are the participants on Semester at Sea, a study abroad program based on the floating campus, S.S. UNIVERSE. Academic credit is earned from the University of Pittsburgh and transferred to home campuses. There are over sixty voyage-related courses to choose from.

Semester at Sea visits Japan, Korea, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Sri Lanka, India, Egypt, Turkey, Greece and Spain on each 100-day voyage. The S.S. UNIVERSE is an 18,000-ton ocean liner complete with classrooms, a 12,000 volume library, bookstore, student union, theatre, dining room, hospital and sports facilities.

"Shipboard Education" offers a broadly based program, focusing on the comparative aspects of societies and world problems, bringing an important international dimension to a student's education. More than 15,000 students from over 500 colleges and universities have participated in Semester at Sea.

According to the program's executive director, Dr. John Tymitz, applications are still being accepted for the Spring '85 semester. Engineer Shortage

In Dallas, Texas, executives in high tech companies have been warning of a pending shortage of qualified engineers. Well just recently they have declared the shortage is already here.

They said that every major industry is clamoring for highly technical people. In Dallas and Fort Worth, there is a demand for engineers, especially in electronics.

Richard Holtry Executive Staffing Manager for Mostech Corp. gave some steps to follow to solve the engineering shortage problem. He said first, companies should retain the engineering talent they already have. He said to do this by giving engineers well-funded, challenging, and interesting work to do. He also said to have a technical promotion ladder which allows senior engineers to remain as scientists but receive the pay, benefits, and staff help equivalent to that of a vice-president.

Another way to help solve this problem is to allow employees to move from production jobs to become technicians and even engineers.

Some firms even send employees to college or pay them for courses they have already taken. Firms are also having college students in cooperative education programs on the grounds that the student will work for them after completing college. Firms are even going so far as to start their own technical schools to help meet their needs.

VA Benefits

Nearly two million Veterans Administration pensioners will receive the agency's annual income questionnaire around November 1, to determine their future eligibility for the VA needs-based program.

According to VA Atlanta Regional Office Director Charles W. Wickes, the questionnaire, required by law must be completed and returned to VA by January 1, 1985. Pensioners who do not return the questionnaire may have their monthly checks stopped.

The questionnaire will go to all persons receiving VA pension payments or Parents' Dependency and Indemnity Compensation benefits, the VA Director explained.

"Pensioners will receive a worksheet to assist in completing the form, and which may also be used as a record of information they report," Wickes said. "Help in completing the annual income questionnaire is available from this office or from the major veterans organizations."

Pension is paid to wartime veterans with limited income who are permanently and totally disabled from reasons not traceable to service. At present more than 47,300 Georgia veterans receive pension benefits from the VA.

Director Wickes said veteran pensioner recipients can call his office toll-free from anywhere in the state using these phone numbers.

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Regents Exam

IMPORTANT THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE REGENTS' EXAM

1. You should take the Regents' Exam as soon as you complete English 101 and 102.
2. The test is FREE.
3. You are required to take the test until both parts (reading and essay) are passed, however you are only required to re-take the part failed. You may take the test as many times as needed.
4. Everyone with 75 or more credit hours who has not passed both parts of the Regents' Exam is automatically scheduled for remediation in Developmental Studies DS 025 Reading and English, a five hour course.
5. You will save yourself time and money if you take the Regents' Exam as soon as you are eligible.

6. Co-op students or any Southern Tech student who is eligible to take the Regents' Exam, may take the exam at any State College. You do not have to be enrolled in school in order to take the exam. You must request a letter from our Regents' Coordinator here at Southern Tech, stating your eligibility and school code, to be sent to the college where you wish to be tested.
7. Again, you do not have to be in school the quarter you take the Exam. Call 424-7367 if further information is needed.
8. The next Regents' Exam will be given February 4 and 5, 1985. Sign up for the exam in Developmental Studies, January 14 through January 25, 1985.

To Your Health ...

It is getting that time again when the common cold virus will attack you. Just about everybody catches a cold at some time or another. Colds are costly and can lead to serious complications.

Symptoms--

- 1- Symptoms usually develop 1 to 3 days after the virus gets into the body. If the symptoms get worse instead of better after a few days--get medical help.
- 2- Watch for complications. A cold's infection can spread to the ears and sinuses and may lead to other diseases.
- 3- Colds are spread by close contact - such as sneezing or coughing, kissing or using contaminated dishes or towels.

WAYS TO AVOID CATCHING A COLD.

- 1- The most important way to avoid colds is to stay healthy--good diet, plenty of sleep and exercise to keep the body defenses up.
- 2- Keep humidity up - too dry air indoors during the winter keeps your nose from fighting colds effectively. Overheating dries out the air. Keep the thermostat down and use a humidifier.
- 3- Keep away from colds--Avoid crowds when possible during cold and flu out-breaks.
- 4- Don't smoke. Smoking lowers resistance to all respiratory diseases. Smoking irritates the mucous membranes in the nose and throat.

IF YOU HAPPEN TO GET A COLD--

- 1- Get plenty of rest. Helps you fight the cold and lowers the

chance that bacterial infections and complications will occur.

2- Eat and Drink sensibly. Eat normal - no need to "starve a cold". Drink plenty of fluids, fruit juices and hot liquids.

3- Use only mild medications. Aspirin or Tylenol helps relieve a cold's aches and fever. Gargle with warm salt water if you have a sore throat. Throat lozenges may be helpful. Antibiotics are not effective in treating *Viral* illnesses. Your doctor may choose to give you medication if there is the possibility of having both a bacterial infection and a virus at the same time.

4- Observe Good Hygiene. If you are generally healthy *most* colds will disappear in a week or so.

Call or see your doctor if these symptoms appear--

1. fever over 101 degrees for more than 24 hours.
2. Bloody discharge from nose or mouth.
3. Chest pains that reoccur or persist.
4. Persistent cough.
5. Headache
6. Sore throat that is long-lasting.

You may see different brochures or pamphlets I have been leaving on campus - (student Center, Business Office, Post Office, Library, etc.) This is free literature that is available and health related- interesting reading. I have other materials in the clinic that will be available to students.

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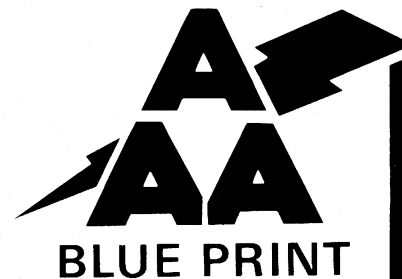

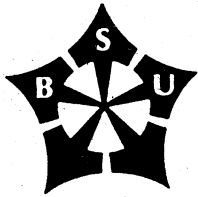
The ASCE is back this fall. We meet the second Tuesday of each month. Any changes are posted on the board in front of the CET building. Come and see what ASCE can do for you.

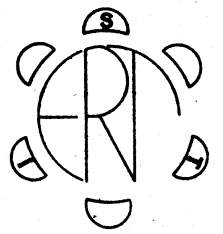

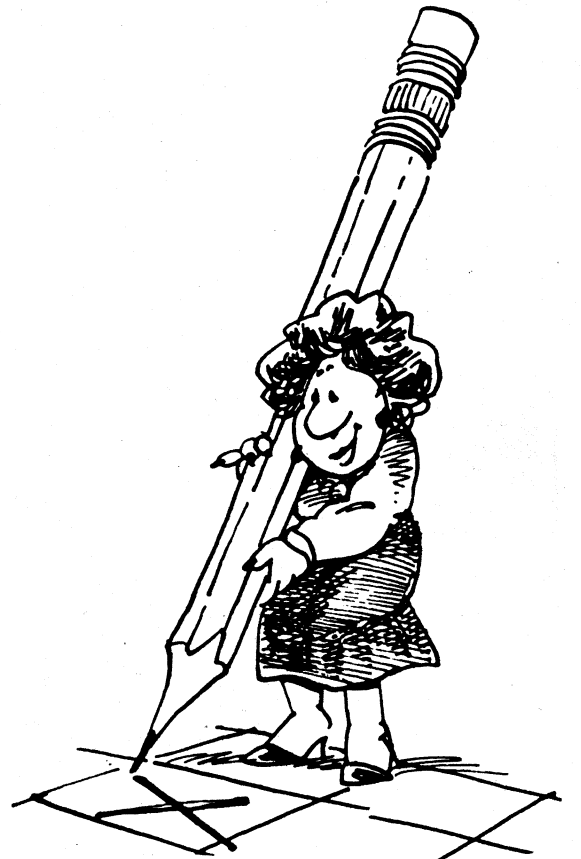

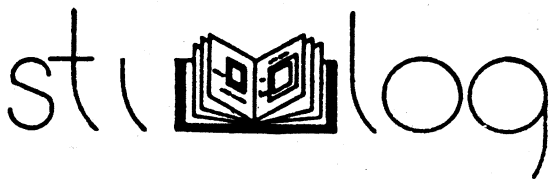

Can You Drink to That?

STUDENTS ARE OPENLY DEFYING NEW DRINKING RULES—Campus openings marred by mass arrests, drink-ins and a 'kidnapped' coach.

MADISON, WI (CPS)—Students at the University of Wisconsin-Madison—joined by disgruntled students from across the state — staged a mass "drink-in" on the steps of the state capitol last week to protest efforts to raise the drinking age there to 21.

"We, as students, understand that we and our peers will not stop drinking because the law dictates that we do," proclaimed Dan Katz, Legislative affairs director for the Wisconsin Student Association, which represents student governments from campuses around the state.

The defiance of new drinking policies expressed by Katz and other students at the Wisconsin drink-in — where the day's motto was "F**k 'em if we can't take a drink" — has been echoed by students around the nation over the last month.

While some experts predicted tough new campus drinking regulations nationwide would cause some students unease as they learned new ways to socialize, it appears that many

students are flaunting the regulations openly and at times even outwardly rebelling against them.

At North Carolina State University, for instance, state alcoholic control agents recently busted 36 students in one night for alcohol policy violations at a campus frat party.

The next night agents arrested 53 more NCSU students on similar charges.

Police arrested 56 students for liquor violations at Illinois State University during the first weekend in September, and arrested 47 more violators the following weekend.

Indiana makes random checks in a desperate attempt to enforce the new alcohol policy on that campus, where freshmen supposedly believe "that you come to IU to get drunk," says Dean of Students Michael Gordon.

"Some very important people, including some students, staff, and faculty, are willing to say, 'Ha, (the campus alcohol policy) is all a very funny joke,'" Gordon complains.

That's evidently the feeling of some Notre Dame students,

who last summer "kidnapped" a bust of famed football coach Knute Rockne to protest the school's drinking policy.

Along with a color picture of the bust comfortably tanning at a nearby beach, the Notre Dame student paper has received a ransom note warning that the Rockne sculpture won't be returned "till the students have their beer."

Problems and complications with alcohol policies also are plaguing such schools as Fort Hays State University, Arizona State, St. Bonaventure, and New Mexico, to name just a few.

"Alcohol-related problems are obviously taking up more time of campus law enforcement agencies these days, and alcohol abuse is a greater problem, or at least recognized more," says Dan Keller, director of Campus Crime Prevention Programs and chief of public safety at the University of Louisville.

"We have two or three major things happening at the same time that are making the alcohol problem greater, or at least more visible on a lot of campuses," he explains.

For one thing, "students who

may have been drinking legally off campus are now transferring their drinking habits to campus where new policies make drinking illegal."

In addition, "many states are now raising their drinking ages to 21, creating displaced drinkers who have no place to drink except on campus," he says.

Finally, Keller notes, "alcohol abuse has replaced drug abuse as the number one student behavior problem. And all these problems combined are really making alcohol an issue at many colleges and universities."

The whole "get tough" attitude toward student drinking, some believe, is only making the matter worse at many schools.

"Any time you trim back people's rights and opportunity, there will be some reactions," says Jonathan Burton, executive director of the National Interfraternity Conference.

Just as many students and fraternities were endorsing new drinking policies and campus alcohol awareness programs, he says, administrators and politicians started cramming

new rules down students' throats.

Instead officials should be working to "change attitudes as opposed to legislation," Burton says.

"The whole movement might have been much more effective if the campus alcohol education programs had been given more time to pick up speed," he theorizes. "First comes education, then minds are changed, and then legislation can be enacted with everyone's full support."

And while the new campus alcohol crackdown is preoccupying police, frustrating administrators, and angering students, it may not be having any effect on what it was designed to prevent: alcohol-related accidents.

A recent Boston University study found that raising the drinking age from 18 to 20 five years ago has had no effect on traffic deaths or the drinking habits of underage students in Massachusetts.

The only thing the law has done, says study author Robert Smith, is foster among students "a cynicism toward the legislative process and disregard for law enforcement."

Planning College Events

Planning and organizing a successful college event, whether it is a softball tournament, a Karate demonstration or a square dance is a lot like planning a party. How well it succeeds depends entirely on how much work you put into it prior to the event.

Follow these guidelines and you will increase your chances for success.

1. Pinpoint what you want to do If your event involves using the Student Center or a campus building, you probably want the advice and cooperation of the Department of Student Activities. Be prepared to explain what you and your organization want to accomplish. Do you want to raise money, entertain, inform, or interest new members?

2. Get advice from the department of Student Activities or the appropriate campus depart-

ment. your novel idea might have been used by another student group ten years back. Administrators know what will "fly" on the campus or what "track record" a certain event has had.

3. Draw up a budget If you are considering asking a business or co-sponsor to help you (i.e., joint venture) put on the event, the "partner" will want to know what you plan to spend and what you hope to receive. Some basic expenses to plan for: publicity, advertising, equipment rental, decorations, security guards, electricians, program and ticket printing, insurance, transportation, and talent. Remember to list income generating resources such as ticket sales, ads in the program, donations from local business, souvenir and concession sales. The Department of Student Activities can

suggest ways to cut costs.

4. Promote the event. Convince the campus that your event "will fly". It is a worthwhile event and you will need to sell it to your peers. It's like getting a bank loan - you have to prove your credibility and accountability. No one wants to take part in an event that is ill-conceived. Is your event going to attract students? Is your event going to benefit students?

Is your event consistent with the goals of your organization? Are you following college policy? If your idea has been tried before and done poorly, you need to make people aware of how you will overcome the mistakes and improve the event.

5. Set the date Make sure your event does not conflict with one already scheduled and that the facilities and talent you want to use are available.

Remember to allow for "lead-time" - time to prepare and publicize the event. Six weeks is necessary for major events. If this is a first time effort, you might even want to give yourself more time so you will be able to go step by step and can enjoy the experience.

Remember, schedule your event near a major pay-day (when all the college student assistants get paid) if you are charging admission. Especially, remember to do this if you are fund-raising for an event.

6. Develop a strategy Figure out the individual tasks that it will take to schedule your event. Find out how long each task takes and develop a time-frame for the accomplishment of each task. For example, figure how long it will take to print the tickets. Then make up a time schedule of when the

tickets should be delivered to ticket outlets and then sold.

Frankly, the person planning the event and completing the preliminary work should have the ultimate responsibility for any monies involved.

7. Relax and enjoy Similar to a well coordinated party, your event should almost run itself. As chairman of the event, you should check periodically with your subchairmen to correct last minute snags.

Remember, pay your bill promptly after the event. Also send thank you letters to everyone that donated time, money, and services to help you.

Also, most important - evaluate your event. How can you do it better? No one is perfect - do not be defensive. Take people's advice on improving your event. Remember, you were a novice once!

Flushing the Cooling System

If you're a shade-tree mechanic like me and love to work on your car, flushing the cooling system is an easy job.

Although some people like a "back-flush" method, I have found a method that is easy and gives me satisfactory results.

Step one is to drain the coolant from the engine while it is cool. Open the radiator cap to facilitate faster draining. Then place a container underneath the drain cocks on the radiator and engine. You should consult a manual to

locate the draincocks on your particular car. (On my Toyota there is one on the bottom of the radiator and the bottom of the engine block.) Open them only far enough to allow the coolant to drain. **Remember!** the engine is off and cool during this process!

Step two is to close the drain cocks and place a garden hose in the radiator. Turn on the water slowly and start the engine. **Keep hands, tools, and hose away from fan and moving parts.** Adjust the water so that

it's not running over. When the coolant system is almost full shut off the water. Add a container of radiator flush. There are many brands (i.e. Dupont, Prestone). Read the label for cautions and instructions. Most newer autos have aluminum radiator parts, so get a flush that is compatible with aluminum. Once you have added the flush replace the radiator cap and drive the car until it reaches operating temperature.

Step three, allow the engine to cool. Place the containers underneath the auto and carefully open the radiator and drain cocks. As quickly as possible place the hose in the radiator again and turn on a medium stream of water. Start the engine. The trick here is to adjust the water so that it goes into the system as fast as it drains out. Avoid spillover since the fan will splatter it on the car's finish. If this happens, rinse immediately to protect the paint. Continue to run the engine and water until a clear stream flows from the draincocks.

Step four is to stop the engine and close the drain cocks. Turn off the hose and add the

required amount of coolant. (This is usually half of the total capacity of the cooling system.) My 8 quart system gets 4 quarts (1 gallon container) of coolant.

Step five is to fill up the remainder of the cooling system with water. Replace the radiator cap and check for leaks, while the engine is running.

If you have an "overflow" tank, I recommend removing and cleaning it out. Fill it with a 50/50 mix of coolant and water.

An important note: When running the engine and adding water to flush don't allow the system to drain dry on a hot engine and then try to fill it up with cool water. This can crack the engine block. Remember to adjust the water flow so that the system stays almost full.

Counseling Center

When you see the word "doctor", do you think of "sickness"? Most people do. Similarly, the word "counseling" generally inspires images of crazy or severely disturbed people.

Doctors and researchers, however, are constantly seeking ways to keep people healthy and to prevent serious illness.

Health Prevention. These are also primary concerns in counseling.

For this reason, the stigma traditionally attached to counseling is both disturbing and sad. It is healthy to talk to someone who can be trusted and who is skilled in helping others develop their own resources.

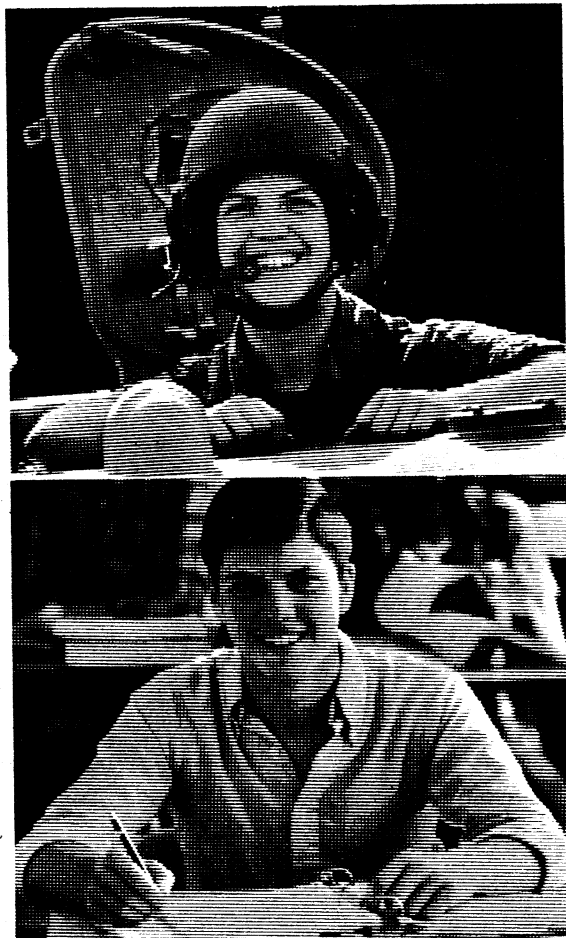
The Counseling Center here at Southern Tech offers students a place to discuss their concerns—study problems, stress, family issues, relationship difficulties, fears, worries, frustrations.

Complete confidentiality is guaranteed. In addition, the counseling staff regularly offer workshops on a variety of topics. The next workshop will be on *Time Management* at noon on Thursday, November 29. Keep your eyes posted for more details. Upcoming workshops will include interview skills, assertiveness training, test taking, anxiety, study skills, communication skill, and stress management.

Throughout the year the counseling center staff will also be writing articles in the *STING* about issues of concern to students. Should you have particular concerns that you think should be addressed, please stop by the Counseling Office in the student center.

Counselors don't have crystal balls or magic wands. They cannot predict the future, and they are not concerned with passing judgement. What they can do is help students to see their problems in a new light, teach a variety of academic and life skills, and help them discover and develop their inner potentials in order to overcome the difficulties that they are facing.

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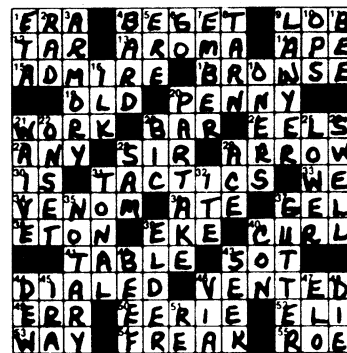

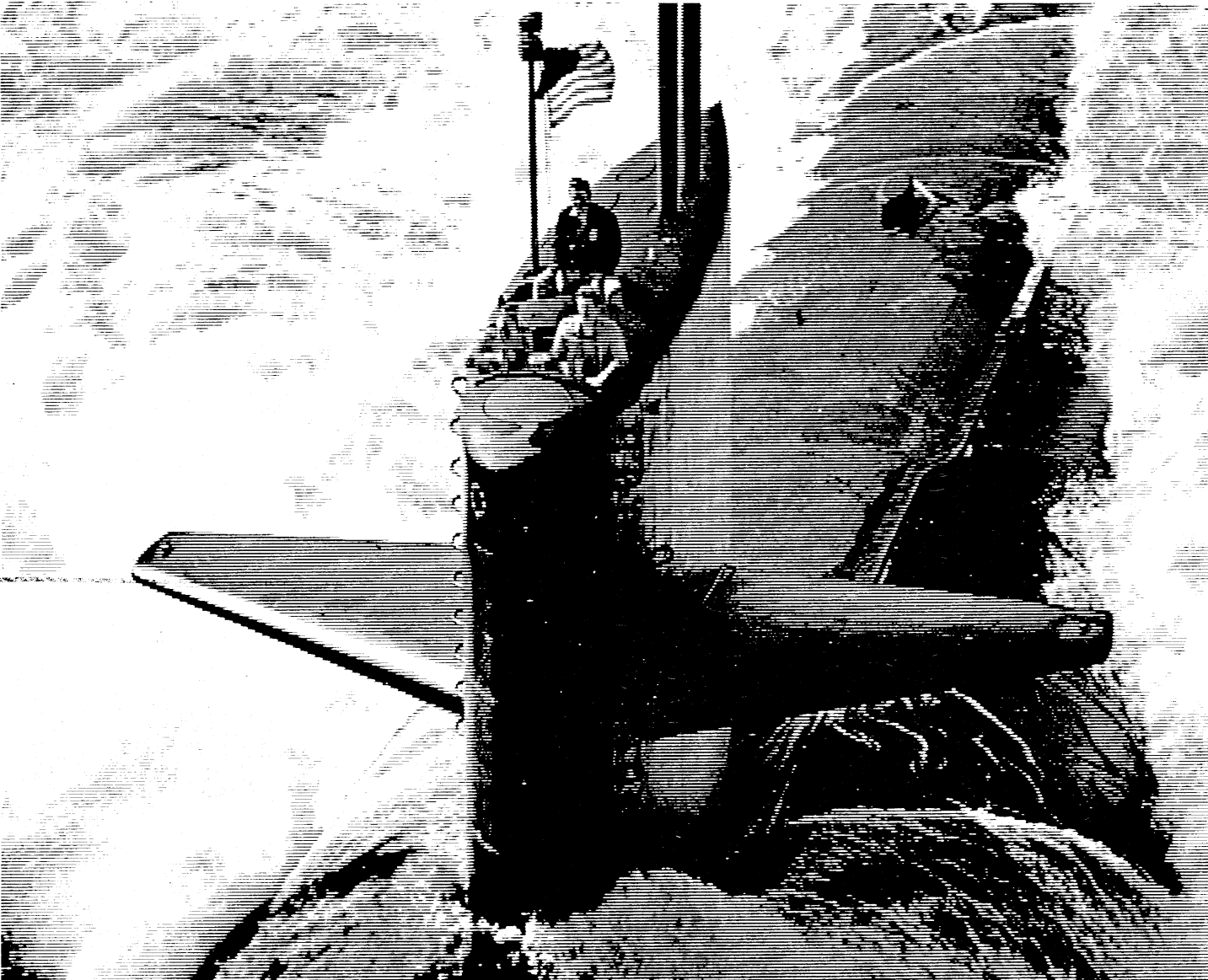

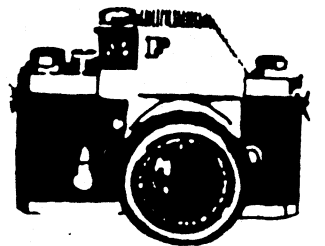
