STI to add a Bachelor of Science

In response to an initial request from Georgia's construction industry, the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia has authorized Southern Tech to offer a Bachelor of Science Degree with a major in Construction Administration effective Fall Quarter, 1985. The four-year program will emphasize basic applied engineering and management principles as they relate to construction.

Several months ago, members of the Associated General Contractors of America, Inc. (AGC) approached Southern Tech to express a need for a comprehensive construction administration major to be offered in the Southeast (only one program within a 200-mile radius of Atlanta is professionally accredited). The AGC pledged both financial and advisory support toward the establishment of such a program. The Associated Builders and Contractors (ABC) also endorsed the program. As a result of industry's counsel, the construction degree's course

curriculum is clearly defined to better meet the needs of one of the state's largest industries. Southern Tech will continue to seek the input of industry Advisory Committee, which will help in the planning and implementation of the program.

Based on the size of its other degree-granting departments, Southern Tech anticipates the construction degree program will become the largest of its kind in the country. The construction degree will be housed under a separate academic department, for which a department head has not yet been chosen. The college plans to form a steering committee to conduct a national search to fill the position.

Southern Tech will seek professional accreditation for the program by the Technology Accreditation Commission, Accrediting Board for Engineering and Technology (TAC-BET), and/or by the American Council for Construction Education as soon as the program is eligible.

Tubs ahoy!

Thousands of spectators are expected on Southern Tech's campus Sunday, May 12 for the Annual Spring Bathtub Race. The 19th annual race, scheduled to begin at 3 p.m., will feature cast iron bathtub racers, powered by 175cc motorcycle engines, in an exciting 82.5-mile competition.

Drivers will make 75 laps around the 1.1 mile asphalt track encircling the campus. Most of the drivers are Southern Tech students and alumni.

First, second and third place trophies will be awarded, as well as awards for the best engineered tub, best rookie driver and sportsmanship. Members of the Atlanta Region Sports Car Club of America will provide assistance with race operations. Southern Tech student and faculty volunteers serve as track marshals and timekeepers, and oversee inspections and other safety aspects of the race. Admission is free to the public.

Two new math minors offered

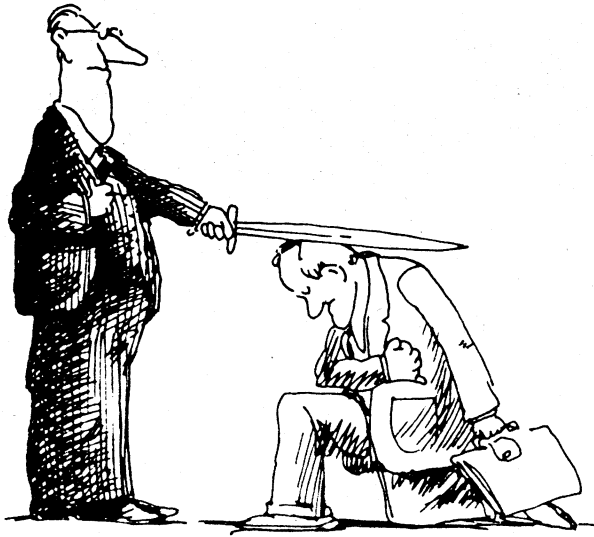
In its last meeting of Winter Quarter, the Southern Tech faculty approved two new minors in mathematics for STI students who will be graduated in June 1985 or later. According to Dr. Simon A. Stricklen, head of the Mathematics Department, these minors provide a "significant opportunity for those students who may be working in direct competition with Engineering graduates or who contemplate further study." "Mathematics," he goes on to say, "could be the most difficult subject to pick up on your own after graduation, so these minors can be an important foundation for work in technology."

The first of the minors is in Engineering Mathematics. It is intended to provide about the same mathematical background as is given to the four-year engineering school graduate. At Southern Tech, this should be of particular interest to students who expect to compete directly with engineering graduates on the job, students who plan to take the Engineer-in-Training Examination, or students who plan to continue their studies.

The second of the minors is a general minor concentration in mathematics, intended for students with particular interests. With the present scope of offerings, this may be of particular interest to majors in the computer field. The minor can provide a mathematical background equivalent to or exceeding that of the four-year graduate in computer science or industrial engineering. Also, it should provide a satisfactory mathematical background for further study.

Both minors require 21 hours of mathematics at the 300 level or above, including certain specific courses. Courses used for the minors may also serve as general electives, and depending on the major department, might also serve as technical electives. Those who successfully complete the minor will have it noted on their official transcript and will receive a certificate from the Mathematics Department. Awards will be given for outstanding performance.

Students who want more information about a minor in mathematics should see Dr. Stricklen in the Mathematics Department.

Our Buddy

During the Winter Quarter of 1985, one of my students in Economics 220 gave an oral presentation which dealt essentially with waste in government military spending.

As a class, we wrote Congressman George "Buddy" Darden and expressed our "sentiments" in respect to the costly problem.

Congressman Darden answered our letter, but the quarter had already ended. Therefore, I hope that this brief summary of his letter will be read by those students involved. Congressman Darden expresses his appreciation for the letter and concern of the students and stated the following:

As a member of the Armed Services Committee, I have had the opportunity to personally question Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger on the defense budget and the need to im-

plement more programs to improve our national security. I am extremely concerned about the need for a strong national defense. I do believe, however, that the defense budget should undergo the same scrutiny as any other Agency's budget. The defense

budget should neither be singled out nor be held exempt from cuts. I will continue my efforts to eliminate fraud, waste and abuse in defense spending, as exemplified by outrageous prices paid for spare parts and to insure that the United States gets the best defense programs possible.

Congressman Darden also asked that we continue to contact him on matters of interest and concern to us.

I personally believe that Congressman Darden will exert all efforts toward eliminating wastes in government spending.

Dear Editor,

I would like to address the issues brought up in the letter signed by BOTHERED in your March 12, 1985 issue of the Sting. First of all, BOTHERED may have known who the winner of the Homecoming dance was without having been there, but I happen to know two of the girls who were on the Homecoming Court and they didn't know who won. Obviously something went wrong. It may not have been because Ms. Slaughter was Black that they overlooked her, but a valid point was

brought up about the fact. The point was that Black achievements are dismissed everyday because of racial prejudice, and if someone doesn't keep reminding us, nothing will be done about it. Also, BOTHERED says that he is not prejudiced. I have yet to meet a person who isn't prejudiced against somebody whether they are Black, White, Blue or Green.

Bothered even goes so far as to name all of the different Black organizations which he feels are prejudiced against White people. I would like to

suggest that each organization has a valid reason for being formed.

Black History Month is necessary simply because where in any history book have you seen any lengthy information about the Black contributions and struggles in America? Black Music Awards are there because only a small percentage of Black music is recognized as being important. It would be equivalent to the Country Music Awards. The United Negro College Fund was set up because, remember way back

when, Blacks had to establish their own colleges. Blacks weren't allowed to go to college with White people. Blacks had to establish their own colleges. And now that White colleges have been desegregated, Black colleges find it harder to get funding to keep them going. Our Black Student Association helps to incorporate students into the surrounding community so that the community is aware of what Black students are achieving in college. And as far as the Black Miss America goes, up until 1984 Blacks

were not seriously considered as possible candidates for Miss America. However, Blacks are not the only group with their own pageant. There is the Mrs. America pageant and there are other minorities that have their own pageants.

BOTHERED is right that race should not be an issue in anything we do. I'm afraid, however, race will continue to be a big issue simply because people like BOTHERED haven't opened their eyes yet.

Dear Editor,

I am writing in response to a letter in your March 12, 1985 issue signed by a Mr. Bothered. The letter invoked many emotions from me. I was pleased to see a slightly opposing viewpoint expressed to my letter WHO IS OUR 1985 Homecoming Queen. I was also extremely concerned at the tone of Mr. Bothered's letter. Never in my wildest dreams did I think that my letter would be taken so out of context and have one sentence used to initiate such negative attack on the integrity and purpose of Black organizations.

Racism? If you had Bothered to look at the total context of the letter, you could see that it

was written to expose a "mild informality". The fact remains that the winner of the contest was not announced. The reasons behind it does not matter, the fact still remains. I have talked to Marsha McCrary and I am satisfied that it was not intended, and was probably something that happened in the heat of the moment. But that does not change the fact of what happened.

Racial organizations? Mr. Bothered, your letter shows an extreme ignorance of the purpose of Black organizations and customs. I do agree with you on a couple of points. I too, look forward to the day when Black History will be

placed in its rightful place in American and World History and not have to be highlighted by a special month. I look forward to the day when all students who wish to further their education are financially able to pay for their education without having to depend on assistance from such organizations as the United Negro College Fund. A group of people that has to wait for outside recognition and cannot recognize the achievements of its own individual members is truly lacking self-pride. Thus we have events such as the Black Music Awards, The Miss Black America Contest, and others.

Bothered, I am sure that

neither you, nor your distinguished colleagues are prejudiced, but I in no way claim or even consider myself an expert on what does or does not offend any particular group of people. I claim ignorance in this areas of expertise. Different people or groups of people react differently to certain remarks or events. What may be a mild informality to you, could be a very upsetting situation to me. Like for example a remark made by Grant Turner, the skit night comedian. You may have thought it was unfortunate, funny or not noticed it at all. I was highly insulted because of my cultural background and experiences

and asked for an apology. Was I over-reacting? No! I hope you see my point. As we learn to communicate with each other, understand one another and become sensitive to each other's experience, these problems may decrease.

I don't believe that everyone is out to "screw" Black people, but neither am I so naive as to believe that everyone loves everyone else, all problems are over because we've reached the promise land and that racism has ceased to exist. These problems still exist, but they can be solved. I think Dr. King said it best when he said, "we can learn to live together or perish as fools". I choose to live and learn.

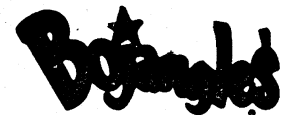

Hornets Play Hardball

Southern Tech has more than a high-powered NAIA basketball team in its athletic repertoire, there is also a strong division 25 baseball team. Charlie Lumsden, the 11 year manager of the Hornets, has given us a strong baseball team that is currently 27 & 6. With this strong start the team has high hopes for a very successful year.

The strong Hornet team shows much promise for this season and the future, as is shown in the catching corps. Jeff Whitmore, a junior with three years experience, has shown much catching ability during his years with Southern Tech. Backing Whitmore up is Bobby Moultrie who is a six foot, one inch freshman with a lot of homerun potential.

In the infield there is a great deal of playing experience starting with Danny Whitehead. Whitehead, in his fourth year, was all-conference as a freshman and has always played at his exceptional level. Keith Nichols is another infielder with experience, but he also has a strong competitive drive. The combination of Whitehead and Nichols gives the team some very good leadership and therefore are the team's co-captains. Rounding out the infield are Roger Armstrong, a four year starter and defensive wizard, Larry Marring plays third and has been with the Hornets for three years. Ron Crawley and Mike Muse also play infield, Crawley, a transfer back-up player, and Muse, also a transfer student, plays outfield as well and is a lead-off hitter.

As well as being a strong defensive group, the three starters also possess real hitting power. Out in center and rightfield are Sam Dart and

Mike Vandemark who both swing a mean bat as well as move the ball back to the infield in a hurry. In leftfield is Roger Hackett, he is an outstanding player and hopefully after his next and last year should be a strong pro prospect.

As it is well known a baseball team cannot compete without a strong pitching staff. Fortunately, Southern Tech has an excellent group of hurlers. Ivan Phillips is a right handed junior with a wicked curve ball. Maybe the best pitcher on the staff is Rodney Volrath, a strong six-foot

three inch rightie with a good chance at a pro career. Rodney's brother, Denny, is a freshman who is yet to show promise but does have three more years to prove himself.

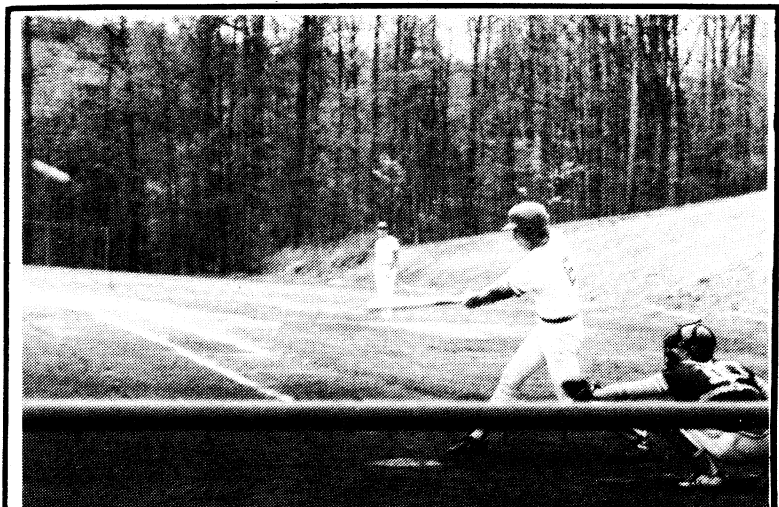

Lumsden's style of baseball is very well suited for his current talent. The hit and run style is very successful and works well for the lack of long ball ability. It has worked well for STI over the years, the Hornets have a two-season record of 74 and 32 while being three and four in district 25 playoffs.

Charlie Lumsden is more than a baseball coach, he stresses academics always come first. If a player has

Dirty Hoops

Now that the college basketball season has ended and the champion has been crowned, this may be the best time to review the occurrences of the season. Unfortunately, this is not a very pleasant thing to do because college basketball has become very tarnished. It is dirtied through the greed of the athletic departments whose want for a winning team has become more important than the players' performances in the classroom.

There is a classic example of this at North Carolina State. A star basketball player was allowed to play on the team after he had been put on academic probation. The fact that he was not doing well at N.C. State should come as no surprise; the above mentioned player received a 470 out of a possible 1600 on the SAT test. The average SAT score at North Carolina State is 1100. When Jim Valvano, the head coach at N.C. State, was asked about his school's actions, he responded by saying, "Those are the chances a school has to take, and we will continue to take those chances."

A blemish on college basketball a little closer to home is festering in Athens. Hugh Durham is in the middle

of an NCAA investigation while the results of a previous investigation were just made public. Although many charges were cleared, enough were upheld to show that Georgia basketball is not exactly sterile.

The NCAA is currently interested in the freshman, Cedric Henderson. Henderson, who seems to be the next Dominique Wilkins, was accepted at UGA with the help of Vince Dooley. He needed this help due to the fact he never graduated from high school. He was able to go to college because of a loop hole which states that a student can achieve a G.E.D. on the basis of how many school days he attended.

Examples such as these are giving college basketball a very bad image. Luckily, there is a brighter side to the story. Men like Bobby Knight of Indiana and Bobby Cremins of Georgia Tech, show how a basketball program can be successful and clean.

Even though Bobby Knight is under a great deal of pressure from the Indiana alumni, he is sticking to his values. He is running his team the same way he has done for the past decade. The only difference is that the Hoosiers are

not winning as often as in the past. The losing is partly due to the fact that Knight kicked his No. 2 player off the team for cutting classes. Bobby found out about the incident from the player himself, who understood and accepted the punishment. What about the highly publicized chair-throwing incident? Everybody knows that Bobby Knight is a volatile coach, and it would seem that his action was an understandable but unacceptable response to the pressures upon him.

There is a similar program at Georgia Tech. Bobby Cremins runs a highly powered, successful team. Best of all, Cremins won't accept any player who he knows would not do well academically at Tech.

All of this makes for good conversation, but rectification of the problem is a good bit harder. If there is a basketball program deserving a letter of protest, send it. Fans should go as far as to boycott a team whose practices are on the shady side. On the other hand, a good program should always be supported. Please continue to enjoy college basketball and remember a clean game is usually more fun.

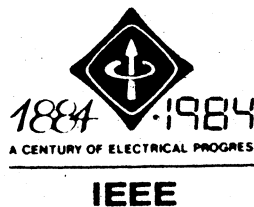

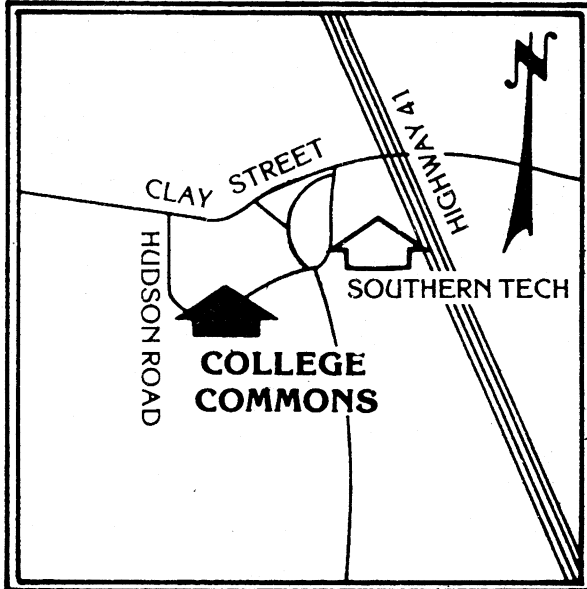

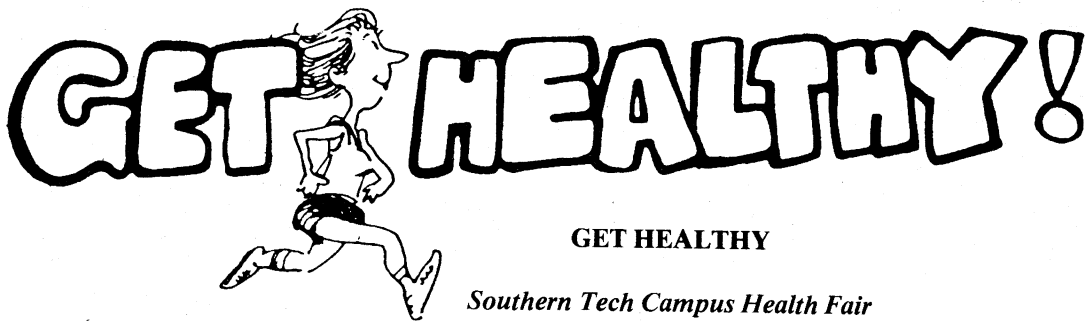

Engineering/Technology: The gap narrows!

ENGINEERING AND ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY are becoming more similar in both educational and employment practices, according to Richard J. Ungrodt, president of the American Society for Engineering Education (ASEE).

As the board of Regents continues to investigate the possibility of providing additional engineering education in the state of Georgia, the question of the difference between engineering and engineering technology as applied to curricula and jobs has arisen. Within the University System, engineering technology degrees are provided by Southern Technical Institute, and engineering degrees, both undergraduate and graduate, are offered by the Georgia In-

stitute of Technology.

In a presentation at the Board of Regents' February meeting, Ungrodt, who is vice president for academic resources and institutional development at the Milwaukee School of Engineering, said nationwide research shows that many engineering technology graduates are now serving in engineering positions in industry, and many engineering graduates work in engineering technology positions.

Ungrodt said that although the entry-level positions of engineering and engineering technology graduates are somewhat dependent upon academic background, "Once they disappear into the woodwork of industry they tend to rise to the level of their abilities, and their performance will determine, to a great extent, their eventual career patterns."

The major education difference between the two types of degrees lies in engineering's emphasis on theory and research and engineering technology's emphasis on practical problem-solving.

According to Ungrodt, engineering technology programs which have strong math and science bases could be converted to engineering programs which would meet the requirements of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET).

Ungrodt, whose institution has offered both engineering and engineering technology degrees since the late 1960's, said he sees no problem with Southern Tech offering both degrees if current engineering technology programs are upgraded to ABET standards.

Another question he raised is whether the University

System should put more money into institutions which are away from the center of industry. He suggested that system resources could be put into pre-engineering programs around the state, and that students from these programs could feed into current engineering schools. Such pre-engineering programs are currently offered at several institutions throughout Georgia.

The ASEE is currently developing a study on the differences between engineering and engineering technology, but Ungrodt said he doesn't expect a rapid conclusion from the study. It may be 20 years before the question is settled, he said, "because industry itself says, 'We will take graduates in technology and use them where we see fit and give them the engineering title.'"

Ungrodt acknowledged that that, however, is not the case throughout the country and that the differentiation in terminology can prevent engineering technology graduates from attaining some employment positions and from enrolling in graduate engineering studies. He added that industry has accepted the similarities of the two degrees much more readily than have educational institutions.

A survey of 10 major employers of engineering and engineering technology graduates in the Georgia area produced the following results:

IMPORTANT THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE REGENTS' EXAM

1. You should take the Regents' Exam as soon as you complete English 101 and 102.
2. The test is FREE.
3. You are required to take the test until both parts (reading and essay) are passed, however you are only required to re-take the part failed. You may take the test as many times as needed.
4. Everyone with 75 or more credit hours who has not passed both parts of the Regents' Exam is automatically scheduled for remediation in Developmental Studies DS 025 Reading and English, a five hour course.
5. You will save yourself time and money if you take the Regents' Exam as soon as you are eligible.
6. Co-op students or any Southern Tech student who is eligible to take the Regents' Exam, may take the exam at any State College. You do not have to be enrolled in school in order to take the exam. You must request a letter from our Regents' Coordinator here at Southern Tech, stating your eligibility and school code, to be sent to the college where you wish to be tested.
7. Again, you do not have to be in school the quarter you take the Exam. Call 424-7367 if further information is needed.
8. The next Regents' Exam will be given April 29 and May 1, 1985. Sign up for the exam in Developmental Studies, April 11 through April 19, 1985.
9. Help sessions will be held Tuesday, April 23, at 5:30 p.m. and Wednesday, April 24, at 12:00 p.m.
