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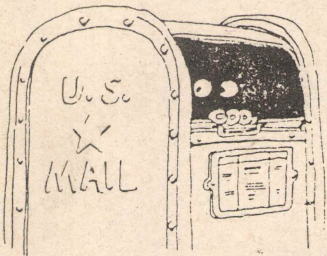
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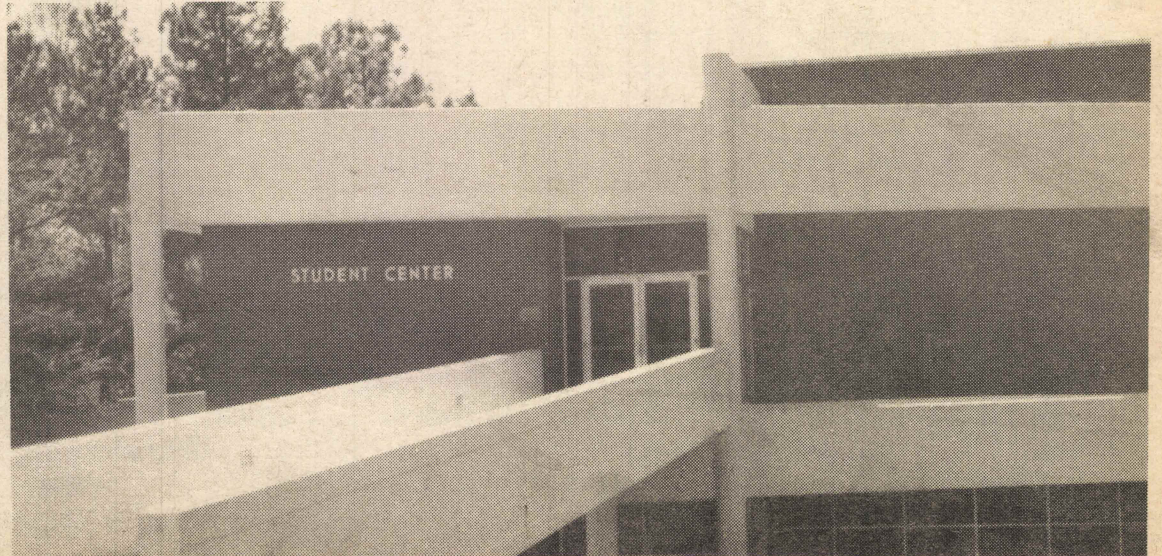
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Student Center Addition Lost

Southern Tech students were extremely disappointed to learn, after much political infighting, that funding for the Student Center Addition was deleted from the State Supplementary Budget. The addition, designed during the 1987/88 school year, would have been bid soon and construction started as soon as the bids were processed. The project, third on the Regents' priority list, was included in the Governor's Budget Recommendation.

In an unexpected move, a few key members of the House Appropriations Committee deleted Southern Tech's \$6 million project and inserted a Library addition at Albany State (also \$6 million). This action stunned the members of

Cobb's legislative delegation, the Regents, and the Governor's Office because the Legislatures had never before changed the Regents' priority list. The Board of Regents is, under the State Constitution, an autonomous department and sets its own priorities for

funding.

With support from the Governor's Office through Lt. Governor Zell Miller, Cobb Senator Roy Barnes, and other strong supporters, the project was added back to the Senate version of the budget. As

always, the budget, after being approved by the Senate, went to a joint conference committee composed of House and Senate leaders. The Southern Tech supporters were unable

Students and the Election Process

In July 1971, after a long struggle, the 26th Amendment allowed young collage students to vote. This amendment gave responsibility to the student to become knowledgeable about political parties, candidates, and issues in order to make an intelligent decision when voting. When Mr. Reagan became president, he cut educational assistance programs, making it difficult for many destitute students to obtain financial assistance. The candidate who wins the election this year could equally effect the student as Reagan has. Student involvement in the election process is for our own good.

The Democratic Party is generally a liberal party that believes government must be

willing to make changes to improve life for its people. Democrats believe the federal government should take a strong role in trying to solve the nation's problems. In foreign policy, they stress and back efforts to control nuclear arms. They support spending government money on social programs instead of the military and have lead efforts to end discrimination against minorities and women. Currently, the main contenders for the democratic nomination are Jesse Jackson and Michael Dukakis.

Jesse Jackson plans to cut nuclear weapons by 50 percent and freeze nuclear testing. He would finance new roads, mass transit, and low cost housing. He would also eliminate military waste and make corporations and the

wealthy pay their fair share of taxes in order to provide funds for education.

Michael Dukakis believes in a reduction of military spending, providing better pay for teachers, and an overall educational improvement.

By the late 1970's, many voters began to rethink their support for liberal policies. Critics blamed liberals for costly social programs, inflation, and higher taxes. The loss of U.S. influence as a world leader and military power was also blamed on the Democrats. The conservatives began to take prominence.

The conservatives, who usually belong to the Republican Party, gave an alternative solution to the problems since their basic doctrine is to have a hands-off philosophy of government

while backing traditional values. The Republicans generally push to lower taxes and end government regulations of businesses. They also believe the federal government's chief role should be to ensure a strong national defense. The main contenders for the Republican ticket are George Bush and Robert Dole. George Bush was the first candidate to endorse the INF treaty which will eliminate Soviet and U.S. medium range missiles. He is for merit pay for good teachers and opposes further cuts in in federal spending for education.

Robert Dole favors limiting growth in Defence spending and would cut some domestic programs that don't effect the poor. He has also worked to cut the deficit.

VA Update

Military veterans and active duty personnel are a substantial group of people here at Southern Tech. The educational benefits we have earned while in service have given many of us the opportunity to attend college while working only part-time or not at all. Because these benefits give us the "freedom" to pursue a degree and receive a monthly check for doing so, it is important that you know the facts about your particular benefit category or "chapter".

There are five chapters for educational assistance:

1. Chapter 34 is the "old" GI Bill. This covers Vietnam era veterans inclusive of people who enlisted on or before 31 Jan 76.

2. Chapter 32, known as the Veterans Education Assistance Program (VEAP), covers those individuals who enlisted 1 Jan 77 through 1 Jul 85, and who contributed to the program.

3. Chapter 35 covers dependents of personnel who either died on active duty, or have 100 percent disability. Forty-five months of benefits are available up to the age of 26.

4. Chapter 106 applies to six-year active reservists. Education funds are payable up to a Bachelor of Science degree in a chosen major.

5. Chapter 30 is the "new" GI Bill. The effective dates for eligibility is 1 Jul 85 for those who decided on the education plan and had the deductions taken out of the first years pay. There are two specific groups affected by Chapter 30: Individuals who enlisted on or after 1 Jul 85, and the Chapter 34 recipients who are still on active duty.

The rules to receive Chapter 30 benefits, for those who entered active duty on or after 1 Jul 85, state that the individual must have either, 1) served three years minimum active duty and no selective reserve time, or 2) served more than the minimum of three years, or 3) completed two years of active duty and four years of selective reserve.

The Chapter 34 beneficiaries affected by Chapter 30 must have either, 1) completed three years continuous active duty after 30 Jun 85, or 2) completed 2 years active duty and four years of selective reserve after 30 Jun 85. In short, for a Chapter 34 eligible to receive

Chapter 30 education benefits they must still be on active duty through 30 Jun 88. The benefits under this program would become available 1 Jan 90.

In my interview with the VA office on campus, Greg Holec stated, "The biggest problem we have is people not informing us of changes in their major." The VA has specific guidelines on changing majors.

Remember, a change of address form, VA Form 572, keeps the checks and VA information coming to you uninterrupted. If you do have pay problems, the first place to contact is the Regional VA office in Atlanta at 881-1776. Also, submitting a veterans pay request during pre-registration will keep your checks coming monthly without a break.

In closing, if you earned these benefits, you should know the facts as they pertain to you. Pay schedules vary from one person to the next. Sharon Chesser, Greg Holec, David Snyder, and Mark Kelso are the VA office staff. Take the time to get to know them. They can provide you with the complete story.

to hold onto the project because of the political composition of the committee.

Much has been written in the various newspapers during the past week about the reasons. A major issue was the fact that three individual legislators were able to change the Regents' priority list. The priority list has been used for over 14 years to determine where the System will use construction bond money. To get to the top of the list, a college must submit strong justification for the project, demonstrate its needs, and have the project approved by the Regents' staff and Board. It is a lengthy process and not taken lightly. To disregard the list could put state colleges in the position of having to individually lobby their legislators.

Many of those familiar with the particular legislators felt that it was old time power politics which often pits rural

elected officials against urban legislators. The House Budget Committee was split along these lines. In addition, two of the major players, Cobb's Representative Joe Mack Wilson and Commerce Representative "Bubba" McDonald had been fighting during most of the session over the proposed dome stadium. The fact that both Cobb colleges, Kennesaw and Southern Tech, had projects on the list annoyed McDonald. While it was true that all 4 projects recommended were Metro or North Georgia projects, the same situations existed last year except they were mostly rural projects.

Southern Tech officials feel certain that funding for the Student Center addition will be approved in the 1989/90 budget. Nevertheless, patience is difficult when you have come so close to getting the badly needed construction underway.

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SGA Election Results

The SGA held elections for a new president and vice-president on Thursday and Friday, April 7 and 8. Dawn Kyle and Gary Reuss were running for president; Traci Cowart and Priscilla Blount were the vice-presidential candidates.

The votes were counted Friday afternoon, with approximately 14 percent of the student body casting ballots which totaled 438.

Winning by a wide margin, Dawn Kyle defeated Gary Reuss. Of the 438 votes cast for both candidates, 265 went to Dawn, with Gary receiving 173. Of the 405 votes cast for vice-president, Traci

Cowart took 208 while Priscilla Blount came in a close second with 197.

Ms. Kyle won on a platform of improving:

Dorm Conditions: renovation, parking, and unloading

Food service Preparation: lowering pricing and improving the quality of food service preparation

Campus Safety Patrols: upgrading procedures on campus

Recognition of Outstanding Faculty

Though not widely known among students, for several years "Outstanding" faculty members have been recognized for their efforts. The committee for Outstanding Faculty Awards (OFA) is seeking nominations for this year's winner(s).

Eligible faculty members include full-time, tenure track members of the faculty or library staff. Professors must have taught at least three catalog-listed courses during the 1987-88 academic year to be eligible. Last year's winner's who form the OFA this year, are not eligible to win until next year. Last year's winners include Richard Castellucis (ECET), Julian Lee (Met), Hans Troemel (CET), Jose Vinelli (Math), Preston A. White III (ECET), and Charles Weeks (Humanities).

"We would like to see a lot of student participation in this year's nominations," said Dr. Charles Weeks, Chairman of the OFA committee. Faculty members are nominated via a form. Any combination of three students and faculty members are needed to sign the form. The principal nominator, or all the nominators, basically express why they think their nominee deserves the award. The nomination forms will be distributed to all faculty, staff, and student organizations. Nomination forms can also be obtained in room 215 from Nancy Fairbanks.

Qualified nominees will have excelled in teaching, offered out of class help, sponsored a student organization, bettered themselves by consulting, attended conferences to stay "sharp" and the like, according to Professor Weeks.

Weeks also adds, "The only way we can select winners is by using the information on the nomination form. We will pay attention to who signed the form and the significance of the arguments made in the nominees favor. Emphasis will be placed on teaching, then all other things will be considered."

All nomination forms must be submitted to Dr. Weeks by May 1, 1988. The OFA committee will probably use some type of rating system to determine a maximum of six winners. The winners will be announced at the last general faculty meeting of the Spring quarter. The winners will receive recognition, a plaque, and a stipend (last year's was \$500).

In closing, Dr. Weeks stated, "Many times professors are judged by what they have published. They often do consulting work because it's financially rewarding. All that's fine, but sometimes professors cut corners in teaching. The outstanding Faculty Award recognizes professors mainly for teaching, and that's what we are really here for."

Placement Office Provides Career Services

You have struggle through four or more years at Southern Tech, and, although you are not sure you believe it, you are in your final quarter before graduation. Before tests, homework, lab reports, and term papers, a nagging thought has hit you: 'PERHAPS IT IS TIME TO START LOOKING FOR A JOB. Where do you go? The placement Office, located on the bottom floor of Howell Dormitory near the street.

Actually, Director of Placement Paul Smith recommends that you begin your job search four quarters before graduation. While it is difficult for the busy engineering tech student to find time for anything besides coursework, early preparation for that entry-level career position will pay off. If you start looking before you have to, you will have plenty of time to research potential employers and find a job that is right for you. Otherwise, if you wait until the last minute, you might find yourself forced to take the first job that comes along, even though it is not what you want. Worse yet, you might find yourself with no job and a mounting stack of bills.

Career counseling is available from Paul Smith, Vivian Howard, and Katie Burr. Student Assistant Bruce Mattys is on duty in the evenings to answer questions.

Probably the most-used of Placement's services are the on-campus interviews. Fall quarter 1987, thirty companies conducted a total of 266 inter-

views. In addition, 112 other companies recruited through the Placement Office, but did not conduct on-campus interviews.

A word of advice to first-time job seekers--be flexible. Many good entry-level opportunities exist for those willing to relocate or travel. Competition for jobs is tough, and not everyone is going to start out with a plum spot at a fortune 500 company.

Registering with Placement so you can participate in the on-campus interviews is simple: You fill out cards with your name, address, class schedule, and other information, and you leave a copy of your resume. The only requirement is that you be within four quarters of graduation. For you trouble, you receive a free copy of the CPC Annual, which gives a national listing of companies and the degrees they are looking for. Such a deal, who could resist?

You say that you're a freshman or a sophomore and are not yet ready to start your career. Stop by the Placement Office anyway. There are magazines, career guidebooks, guidelines for writing resumes and cover letters, information on the job market, videotapes on companies and interviewing skills, and company literature. There is also a bulletin board of part-time jobs, should you find yourself in need of extra income.

No matter how far you are from graduation, the Placement Office has something to offer you. Those students who take the time to research employers and begin interviewing early will have an edge in today's competitive job market.

Meese Advisor Accused of

Bilking Small Catholic College

Press Release

A small Catholic college in California may have been bilked by an investment advisor who, in turn, conceivably funnelled profits due to it to U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese instead.

Federal investigators last week said they are probing what happened to investments made for Marymount College of Palos Verdes, California, by investment advisor W. Franklyn Chinn.

Chinn—who used to work with scandal-plagued Wedtech Corp. and who currently is under indictment on racketeering charges—was helping direct Meese's investments at the same time he was advising Marymount how to invest.

And, at the same time Chinn helped Meese turn a \$50,000 investment into \$90,000, he may have defrauded Marymount of \$281,000 by faking losses in nonexistent gold transactions and transferring the money to his personal accounts in Hong Kong, an Internal Revenue Service investigator alleged in a January, 1988, affidavit.

The affidavit became public last week, when the Democratic staff of the Senate Subcommittee on Government Management Oversight released papers relating to special prosecutor James McKay's investigation of Meese's financial dealings.

McKay is probing charges Meese helped get Wedtech, a now-defunct New York firm, a lucrative federal contract in return for Chinn's help in making investment profits for Meese.

Marymount officials are seeking "any information which might provide substantiation" of the allegations, school officials said in a written statement released March 4.

College officials say they are cooperating with federal investigators.

"Marymount has experienced reasonable overall returns on its investments, as compared to the general investment market performance, during the period of Mr. Chinn's relationship with the college," the statement said. "While the various published allegations will be carefully evaluated by the college, it wishes to state that its funds remain intact."

One scenario has it that Chinn pooled investment money he got from Meese and from Marymount, and then assigned the profits to the person who could do him the most good—Meese—while assigning the losses to Marymount.

Chinn's attorneys repeatedly have asserted Chinn did not give preferential treatment to Meese at Marymount's expense, and that the college was not defrauded.

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DOE Honors SCT Freshman

The United States Department of Energy recently honored Southern Tech's Brenda Handley, A freshman in Architectural Engineering Technology, along with 38 other students from around the nation during two days in Washington, D.C. On March 29 and 30, Handley and the other students were guests of the DOE as a result of their two week internship last summer at Fermi Lab located near Chicago.

While in the nation's capitol, the students met with Secretary of Energy, John Herrington, and toured the DOE research facilities. The students also met with several Nobel Laureates who had done super collider research for the DOE. The trip culminated with a Rose Garden ceremony at the White House,

where President Reagan met briefly with the group. Afterwards, the DOE hosted the honorees on Capitol Hill at a lunch with the Nobel Laureates, members of Congress including Representative Ed Jenkins, and the Under-Secretary of DOE, Joseph F. Salgado.

In a group comprised of students from many prominent universities around the country, such as Harvard and Stanford, Handley represented Southern Tech as well as being the only student from Georgia.

Handley's experience began while still a student at Gordon Central High in Calhoun, Georgia. Last spring, she earned top honors as one of the three state finalists for her science fair project dealing with "the photo-electric effect" during its exhibit at the University of Georgia.

Annual SIGGRAPH Conference

It's time to start gearing up again for SIGGRAPH '88, the 15th Annual Conference on Computer Graphics and Interactive Techniques, which meets August 1-5 in Atlanta, Georgia. This conference, which is the largest computer-related conference in existence, examines the latest computer graphics research developments, applications advancements, technological breakthroughs and industry issues. Included in the technical program will be the presentation of papers and panels on such topics as animation, CAD/CIM, image synthesis, and graphics hardware. In-depth courses, which last approximately seven hours each, on a wide variety of topics associated with computer graphics and interactive techniques will be offered on Monday and Tuesday, thus limiting the participant to only two topics out

of the approximate thirty that will be offered. Exhibits will be set up inside the World Congress Center and will feature new graphics equipment. The main attraction in the conference is the film and video presentation of the best efforts in computer animation, like Peter Gabriel's "Sledgehammer" and Dire Straits "Money for Nothing" videos, based on innovation, creativity, production quality, and pure viewability. Tickets for entry into this exhibit will be needed and it is suggested they be purchased early. The art show on real-time and interactive computer environments. And as always, the technical slide sets, a collection of 35mm slides, will reflect the technological advances of the past year in hardware and software. 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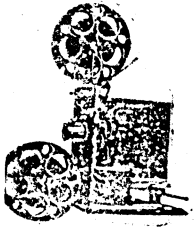

Never Tried It

Dear Never,

My first question is, do you have time?

Recopying notes is a lengthy process. I know many students swear by this method, and for those whom it helps, great.

However, you might want to consider an alternative.

Many bookstores sell note pads and notebooks with a very large left margin. You take notes on the right, then use the left side of the page to build a running sum-

mary outline of your notes. This margin is a good place to mark the organization of topics, to rephrase definitions and to write in you own questions.

Although it takes less time than copying your notes word for word, this method can actually prove more beneficial.

By focusing on organization, rewording, and concise summary, you are subjecting the notes to a much more complex mental process than note copying. That processing will make the material yours to keep.

(If your bookstore does not have this paper in stock, you might request an order. They're called summary pads or notebooks. Or a simple ruler will help you create your own.)


"Done!" he cried as he grabbed for the bottle.

reworking, rethinking is needed to make the chapter or lecture stick.

Second, learning is not passive; you are not a Xerox machine. Learning a chapter is a matter of making it yours--building your own sense of the parts and the whole and what you need to learn and why it matters.

Time management needs to be equally aggressive. Productive study time doesn't just happen. You have to create it. You have to mold and shape your day to make it more than something that just happens to you.

The time that you carve out for writing a paper is a product of your thoughtful creative mind just as is the paper itself.

So don't fret your mind about every specific study technique. Justaskyourself, "Am I giving the information enough reworking to make it stick?" and "Am I placing my own imprint on the material--and on my own time--in such a way that I'm making it my own?"

Page 17 is a comparison of the present with the past. Many things change in 40 years. Technology, what we are all studying here, has

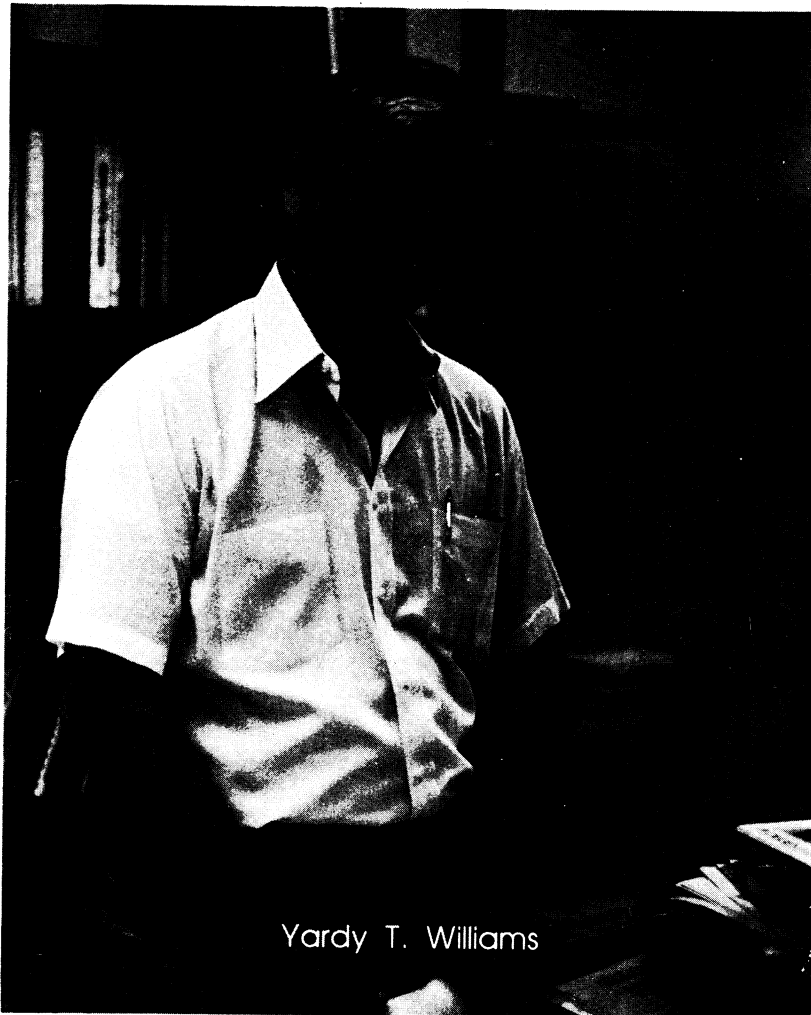
definitely advanced. Page 18 is a sample of what was important to our predecessors. Page 19 details the growth of Southern Tech.

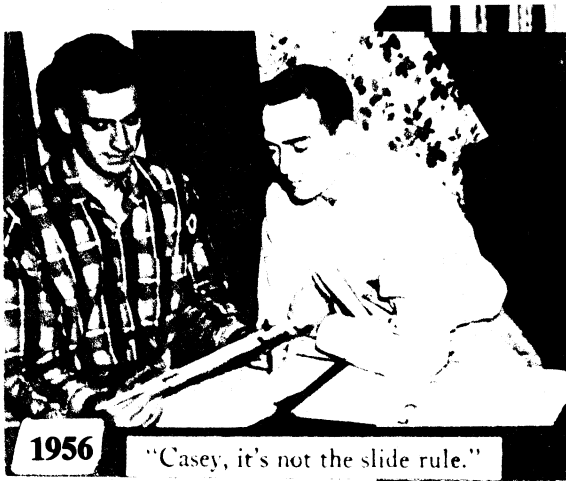

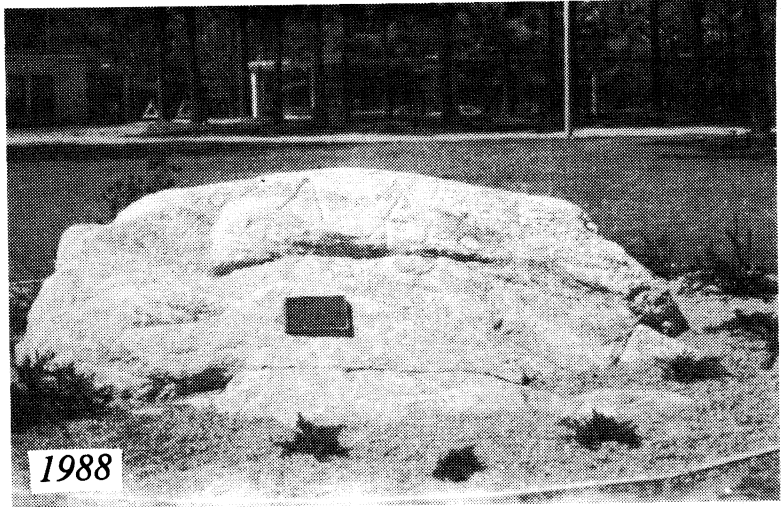

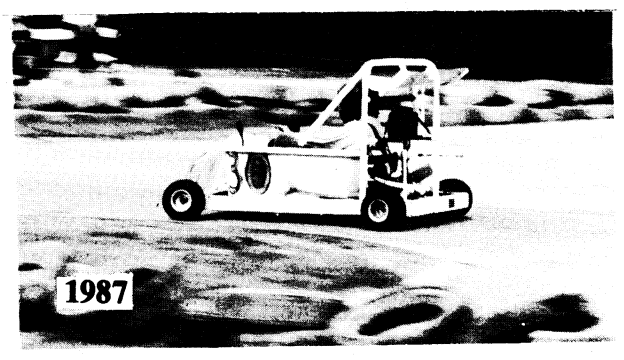

The Marietta college informally known as "Southern Tech" has undergone considerable change in the last four decades. This includes several changes in its more formal name, with each new identity clearly marking growth. And, in the course of that growth, the college itself has created changes in the scope of engineering technology education in the state.

Known as the "Technical Institute" when it opened its doors in 1948, the school was founded to bridge the gap between skilled craftsmen and the engineer. The Georgia Business and Industry Association asked the Board of Regents to set up a school to train technicians, and Southern Tech began with 116 students at the Naval Air Station in Chamblee. It operated as a two-year engineering technology division of the Georgia Institute of Technology. The initial curriculum selection and development was done in close liaison with industry. A task force was appointed through the GBIA and curriculum was modified to meet the needs of industry.

In 1949, Southern Tech moved on quickly to become

the Southern Technical Institute" and was recognized as a college-level school by the U.S. Department of Education.

In 1958, Georgia Governor Marvin Griffin appropriated \$2 million for buildings, and the school received a contribution of over \$500,000 in land, facilities and services from Cobb County and the City of Marietta. This enabled Southern Tech to design a real home in Marietta to replace its rented facilities in Chamblee. In 1961, Southern Tech moved into that home.

In the late 1960's, there was a national trend toward four-year engineering technology curriculum leading to the bachelor of engineering technology degree. In part, this was due to a move toward more scientific and less application-oriented curriculum by engineering schools. In 1970, Southern Tech became one of the first colleges in the nation to offer the Bachelor of Engineering Technology degree.

In 1979, the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia voted to make Southern Tech a senior college in the System, severing its organizational ties with parent school Georgia Tech. In July 1980, Southern Tech officially became the 14th senior college and 33rd independent unit of the Univer-

sity System, and Acting Chancellor Vernon Crawford named Dr. Stephen Cheshier of Purdue University as the college's first president.

By the fall of 1980, Southern Tech was the fastest-growing senior college in the University System, offering both two and four-year degree programs. In 1986, Southern Tech's official name was changed to "Southern College of Technology" to clearly define the school as a senior institution which offers work through the master's level. Since that year, Southern Tech has introduced two master's programs - Master of Science in Technical Management and Master of Science in Technical Communication.

In 1988, Southern Tech is in the midst of a capital fundraising program to fund construction of a multi-purpose health and recreation center to accommodate intramural sports, a fitness center, weight room and swimming pool with locker facilities. Over 40 years, the face of the Southern Tech campus - and the name which identifies it - has changed to meet modern demands in education achievement. But for most students, alumni, faculty, staff and the surrounding community, the college remains "Southern Tech" - a familiar old friend.

Dear Mr. Buckholts,

I say this because I know that the Vietnamese, for whom we are fighting, are not contributing their part to their war. If a Vietnamese is drafted, he can easily become what we call a draft dodger and know that if apprehended he will be

sent into the army with no disciplinary action against him. He is free to roam about the countryside until he is finally captured. He has all the freedom in the world and when he is captured, the war may be over. He is allowing us to fight his war and I think this is unfair to us.

- Projects: Cake sale, rummage sale, banquet.

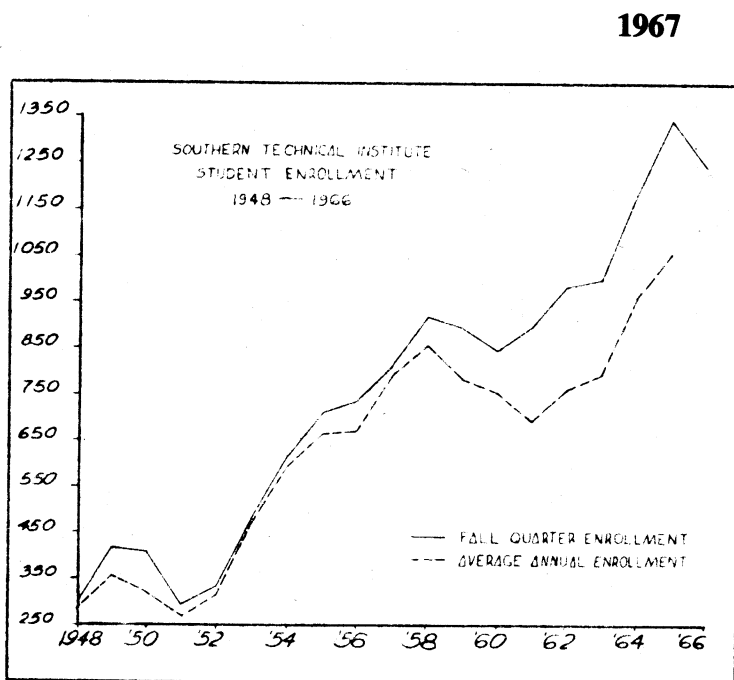

GRAPH REVEALS STEADY CLIMB IN STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Using data supplied by the registrar's office, the staff of THE ENGINEERING TECHNICIAN compiled the above graph to illustrate the growth of the Southern Tech student body since the school's beginning.

The first quarter, fall of 1948, had an enrollment of 293; 1948's average enrollment was 288. Since that first year, the enrollment has grown to a peak of 1340 students in the fall of 1965. 1965 also had the highest average annual enrollment with an average of 1029 students for the year. Enrollment for the fall of 1966 dropped from the 1965 peak of 1340 to 1244, a decrease of 7.2%.

From the 1948 enrollment of 293 to 1966's Fall enrollment of 1244 there has been a quadrupling of students enrolled.

New sign located front lawn Southern Technical Institute.



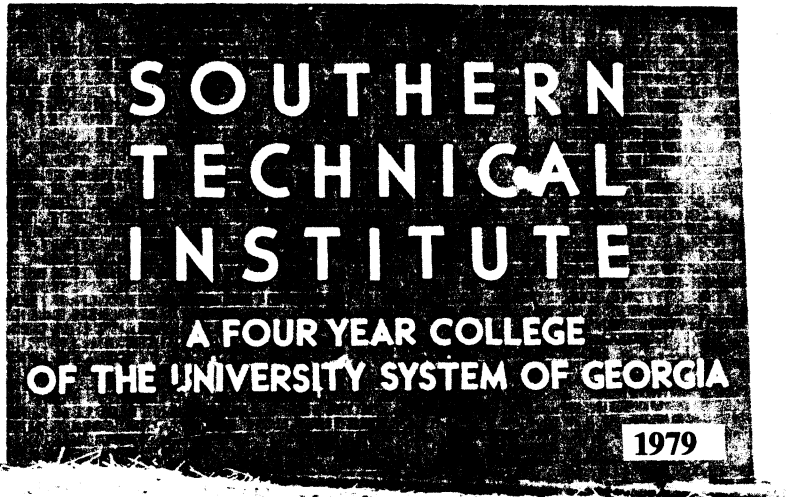
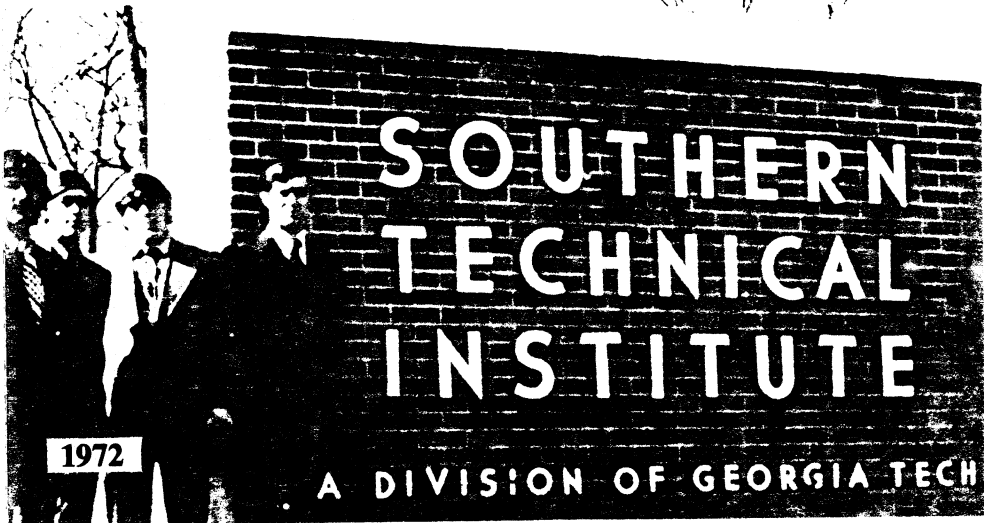
Plaque Unveiled

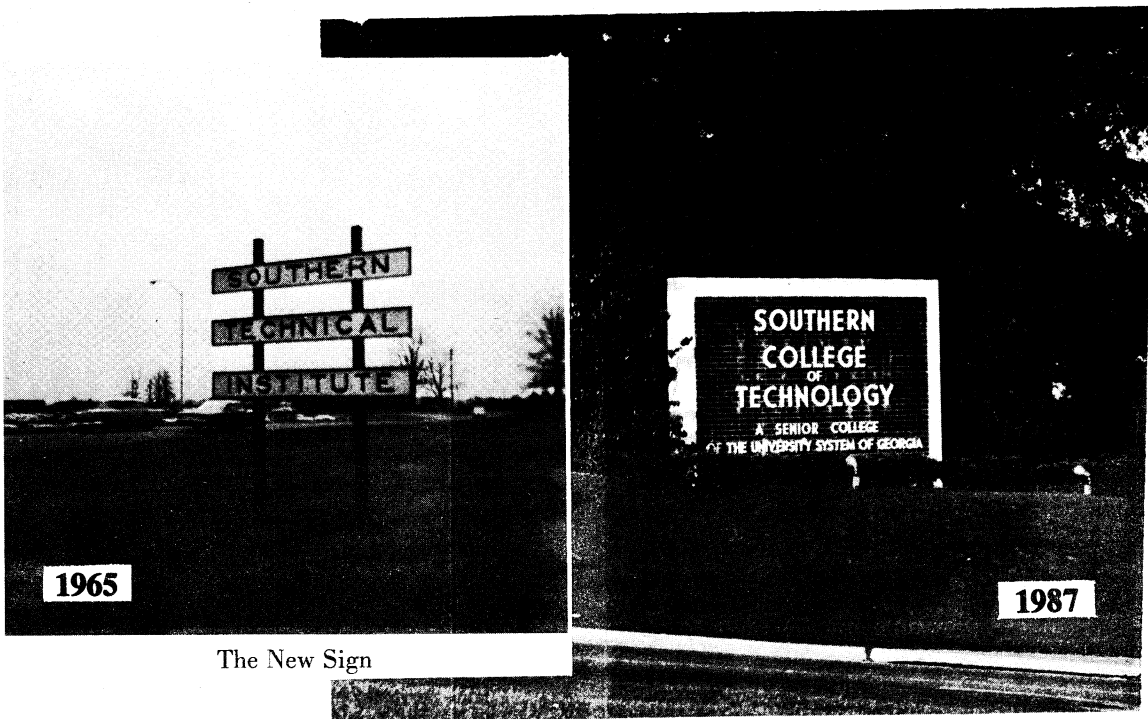
Club, who spearheaded the Marietta-Cobb County drive in 1957 to obtain the land for our present campus.


