

Off-Campus Bookstore Opens

There will soon be an alternate place to buy textbooks besides the on-campus Southern Tech Bookstore. Engineer's Bookstore, which has been on North Avenue, just off the Georgia Tech campus, since 1954 will open a branch store at 1111 Clay St., which is just across the street from the main entrance.

According to Pat Cunningham, Manager of the Engineer's on North Avenue, they decided to locate here because "it seemed a natural place to expand. We want to serve the students and the community with technical and professional reference books."

When asked about prices, she said, "You probably are not going to see any cheaper prices on books. What you hopefully will see are many more used books. The [markup] margins on textbooks don't leave much room to play with the retail price. You are looking at 20 to 25 percent on a new book. On used books the students save money and the bookstores make a little more money. Even though books are real



expensive, there's not much margin."

In regards to the Southern Tech Bookstore she said, "I don't think that your campus bookstore is ripping you off. They operate by the standard industry practices that everyone else does. Textbooks are just incredibly expensive."

She also said, "We'll have a full line of the college textbooks for you. We'll have a complete line of technical reference books, building codes, and supplies."

They will be opening Wednesday, September 7, and will have a used book buy-

back period the week of finals. "We generally pay half price, and we need all the books," said Ms. Cunningham.

When asked about service she said, "I hope that we do a good job for the students. If we don't we won't be there very long."

Student Connectors Disconnected

Seven student volunteers working as Connectors for the Gearing Up summer orientation program were dismissed from the program following a recent overnight incident involving alcohol, the STING has learned. According to Barbara Anderson, Director of Advising and Retention, "The incident involved a group of student volunteers who were supposed to stay overnight in the dormitories with the incoming freshmen. Sometime during the night, this group of student leaders

left the dormitory for a time leaving the visiting students unsupervised. When some of the visiting students became rowdy, Campus Safety found seven of the student volunteers behind the baseball field where some of them were consuming alcohol."

When asked about the volunteer selection process, Anderson explained that students who volunteer for Gearing Up are screened by the Connectors Committee. "Those students accepted for Gearing Up are allowed to participate as long as they con-

sent to an agreement. That agreement states that the student refrain from consuming alcohol while on duty and, during the evening, must stay in the dormitories at all times with the visiting students," she said.

Each Gearing Up session handles 165 students who spend a Thursday night on campus and go through a full day of orientation the following day. A group of some 25 Connectors stay with the students overnight in the dormitories. During the day, some 30 or more students

work as Connectors showing new students around the campus, briefing them on the registration process, and answering questions to help prepare them for life at Southern Tech.

At press time, it was unclear what disciplinary action beyond dismissal from the Gearing Up program would be taken against the students involved. According to Anderson, the matter has been referred to Dean Smith with each student's involvement in the incident to be considered individually.

Dr. Pfeiffer Steps Up As Acting English Department Head



This year has already seen the Electrical and Mechanical Department Heads step down. In what may seem a trend, Dr. Robert Fischer of the Humanities and Social Sciences Department has also resigned as that department's head.

Dr. Fischer held the position for the past 15 years. As full professor of History, he now will return to the classroom to teach U.S. History and Western Civilization courses beginning this fall.

Dr. Sandy Pfeiffer has been appointed the Acting Department Head; a search for a permanent head will be conducted during the coming year. The pace for the Humanities side of the department will quicken with the start of fall quarter. The Master's in Technical Communication will begin, and a new English Honors program for verbally superior students will be initiated.

Besides eight years at Southern Tech as an associate and then full professor, Dr. Pfeiffer also managed the



Human Resources Department of McClelland Engineers, a geotechnical firm in Houston, during 1984 - 1985 while on leave from Southern Tech. As Director of Technical Communications for the past four years, he led development of the Minor and Master's in Technical Communication.

Because of the two changes in the department, Dr. Pfeiffer stated, "I want to continue the success in leadership which Dr. Fischer brought to the department. My primary con-

cern as the Acting Department Head is to oversee the management of both the graduate program and the composition sequences. Also, we will be revising the humanities and social sciences part of the core requirements this year."

With the move of Dr. Pfeiffer to Acting Head of the department, Dr. Carol Barnum will serve as Acting Director of Technical Communication. Also, Dr. Susan Morrow is currently the Director of Composition.

World Record Bound

The American Society of Mechanical Engineers is looking for a few good students to meet the challenge presented by the University of Alabama at Huntsville. Last spring, Tom McCoy, Keith Pervis, Tim Wright, and Frank Fincher pioneered the Human Powered Vehicle (HPV) program at Southern Tech. These students designed and built a vehicle to represent Southern Tech at Huntsville's Rocket City Challenge.

The design began on paper and quickly progressed to scale model form. The model was taken to the University of Tennessee Space Institute where it was evaluated in low flow velocity water tunnel tests. Based on test results, the model was modified and retested in Southern Tech's wind tunnel. The modifications resulted in a model with nearly perfect aerodynamic properties. From the model, a shell was constructed using state-of-the-art composites donated by Burlington Fabrics. The

frame was the product of a Machine Design I project by Bruce Boone, a Southern Tech student and ASME member.

The efforts of the original HPV team placed Southern Tech in the top three at the Rocket City Challenge. Led by Professor Orren Williams, the HPV has grown into a credited special topics class.

The current team is now in the process of modifying the frame and shell for increased performance. Their goal-to shatter the world record of 65.7 miles per hour. Beyond the prototype, plans include the design and construction of a totally new HPV for competition at the international level.

On Thursday, August 18, ASME will have their next meeting. A slide presentation on the HPV will be given. Don't miss this opportunity to have a great time while applying and learning practical engineering skills. 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




3) "Yes, it's good to have something going on."



3) "Yes, definitely a good idea. Colleges are supposed to have a radio station."



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




Hear What You've Been Missing

Many of you are probably unaware that we have a Music-Listening Room on campus. Since our student activity fees help pay for the operation of this room, (pardon the pun) it really pays to know about this facility.

The purpose of the room is to provide a place on campus for students to (you guessed it!) listen to music and socialize.

The room, which is located on the lower level of the Student Center next to the double-glassed doors, is open to all Southern Tech students. The hours of operation are 9 AM to 11 PM Monday through Friday. These hours are subject to minor changes because they are determined each quarter by the student assistants who monitor the room.

The equipment in the room includes three turntables (two of which were purchased within the last three years), five tables with headphones and jacks for private listening, one single cassette deck, a house speaker system, a color television, and a LARGE selection of albums and many cassettes.

The equipment is well-maintained and most of the albums are in excellent condition. A student assistant is always in the room during operating hours to help insure that the equipment and albums are treated properly.

I was very impressed with the wide range of music and number of albums available. You can hear classical (Bach to Tchaikovsky), pop (ABBA to Stevie Wonder), rock (Aerosmith to ZZ Top), heavy metal (AC/DC to Scorpions), new wave (B-52's to Talk Talk), jazz and new age (Herb Alpert to Synergy), and finally country (Alabama to Hank Williams, Jr). And there were MANY artists listed on the printout that I, an avid music listener, have never heard of.

Have any of you ever heard of Bootsy's Rubber Band or Urubamba? I guess I'll have to check into these to satisfy my own curiosity. There are approximately 650 artists available! Talk about impressive. Even more impressive is the number of album titles available -- about 1,300! Surely there is something for everyone in the Music-Listening Room. The cassette collection consists of

30 - 40 pre-recorded albums.

Barry Birkhead, Director of Student Activities, is in charge of the music room. Kevin McCray is the Music-Listening Room Director. Kevin has a \$100 - 150 yearly budget with which to purchase new albums. There are five student assistants that monitor the room. Students can request the purchase of a certain album or cassette via the student assistant on duty or through the Student Center office.

There are several policies to follow when using the room. Firstly, bring your current Southern Tech identification card. The student assistants cannot lend out equipment without proof that you are a current Southern Tech student. Secondly, eating, drinking, and smoking are prohibited for obvious reasons. Records don't seem to play as well when soda has been spilled on them. Thirdly, a Discwasher kit is available to clean the records of dust and fingerprints prior to playing them. This helps to increase the longevity of the albums, thus saving student activity funds. Lastly, although there is a house speaker system, it must be turned down if others are listening to music through the headphones. Headphones alone do not keep out all the sound and noise from the outside.

Mr. Birkhead sympathized that the present music room appears uninviting from the outside. Structural changes will begin when the new Student Center funding is approved. The new Student Center has been designed with a music room three times the size of the current facility. Also, the new area will probably not be a closed-off room, but an open gathering area of the recreational area.

Both Mr. Birkhead and Kevin McCray expressed disappointment that the Music-Listening Room is not being utilized to its fullest capacity. Kevin felt this might be due to the summer lull in enrollment. Kevin also stated, "I would like to see more funding for more albums."

The Music-Listening Room is one of the many services provided for us through our student activity fees. It seems a shame that more students don't take advantage of this facility because it is there for all of us to enjoy.




