EDEN System Cancelled, Big Money Lost

The EDEN system was supposed to be a new administrative system of computer programs to handle all of Southern Tech's registration and record keeping. But many major problems developed in it from the beginning, and several weeks ago all attempts to implement it were officially abandoned.

According to Dr. Ranakumar Nadella, Assistant to the President for Planning and Control, five years ago the President's Office decided that the computer filing and registration programs the college was presently using were woefully inadequate. "We felt that the administrative software

would not be able to serve Southern Tech too long because of some limitations." Many of those limitations were in the area of how large the computer files could be.

So it was decided that a new system would be needed. All the systems reviewed that would do what was needed were far beyond the college's range. Many were in the range from half a million to a million dollars.

Control Data came to Southern Tech and proposed that they sell Southern Tech a beta system for a substantial discount. A beta system is one that has been written but all the mistakes in it haven't been corrected yet. Control Data assured the President's Office that a single Southern Tech programmer could correct

all the mistakes in the system in two years.

This seemed an excellent deal at the time, so Southern Tech paid a hundred thousand dollars for what was eventually to become the EDEN system.

Problems began emerging almost immediately. The section of the system that generated reports was not user-friendly. "The report generator they gave us initially was almost impossible to work with." A professional programmer could use it, but a clerk in the Admissions Office couldn't.

Even though the debugging process was only supposed to take two years, after two years had past the debugging process

Enrollment Reaches New High

Enrollment has reached an all time high this quarter, 4026 students. This is up a substantial 6.6% from last year's fall quarter enrollment of 3778 students and up 5.1% from the previous high of 3795 three years ago.

Approximately 75% of the enrollees this fall are students returning to Southern Tech. The other 25% are new students. The majority of the 1000 new students can be divided into two groups. 523 are incoming freshmen, up 9.4% from last year, and 390 are transfer students, down 3.2% from last year. The rest are graduate students (63), and an indecipherable 24 who are listed simply as "other."

There are several interesting breakdowns of the information collected about the new students and about the students in general.

The graduate program had an increase of 5% more new students. This puts the total number of graduate students at 183, up 4.5% from last year.

A majority of the student population will be interested to know that there are now 674 women on campus, up 4.7% from last year. This puts the male-female ratio here at about 5 to 1

New Students

Black students will be proud to know that the total black student population is up an enormous 17.9%. Southern Tech was previously ranked third in the nation in actual numbers of black students enrolled in engineering and engineering technology, and we may soon be ranked even higher.

It is obvious that more potential students are choosing to come here, especially freshmen. Although there is no accurate way to know exactly why new students chose SCT, part of the reason may have to do with SCT's publicity campaign last spring. According to Jim Thompson, Director of Public Relations, during this campaign, "Calls to the Admissions Office increased 30-50%." Also during this time coupons were run for more information about the college, which also got a large response.



Campus Cop Gets Job Back

For six weeks Kenneth Warren was out of a job and out of the police academy school because he was "insubordinate to his superior."

Several weeks ago Warren was fired after he called J.R. Robertson, Vice-President for Business and Finance, and

told him of his fiancee's suspicions towards Billy Howard. Michelle Julian, Warren's fiancee who works in the Campus Safety Office, had already pressed sexual harassment charges against Billy Howard, the Director of Campus Safety.

Warren was given back his job as a Campus Safety of-

ficer

Apparently, the college did not give Warren a reason why they rehired him. On September 18 Warren went back to his job, but with new hours from 10:30 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.

Samuel J. Baker, Executive Assistant to the President, called Warren after a conference with Miss Julian. Baker said he would put the Campus Safety officer through the academy and would pay his salary as long as he quit when he finished school. Warren disagreed, so the two men finally came to an agreement. The college started paying Warren when he began his classes at the police academy on October 9. Warren has to seek employment elsewhere because he has agreed to resign a month after he finishes his six-week training course at the academy.

"It did, but it didn't" have anything to do with Michelle being his fiancee when he talked to Robertson about Chief Howard being around Miss Julian after she had already accused Howard. Warren said he protects the students and the faculty, so he was just doing his job.

Smoking Survey In

During the Spring quarter the Faculty Senate Committee did an informal survey of smoking at Southern Tech. Professor Sally Sage of the Applied Computer Science Department was the appointed Chairperson of the subcommittee which was formed to study the possible need to update our smoking policy on campus.

A total of 481 people participated in the survey. This consisted of 197 students, 114 faculty members, 160 staff members, and 10 undistinguishable others. This population was 15% smokers and 85% non-smokers.

Of the 409 non-smokers questioned, an overwhelming majority (90%) felt that smoking should only be permitted outdoors or in designated areas. These are both stricter policies than the existing policy of no smoking permitted in classrooms and labs.

As to be expected the policy of smoking being permitted everywhere on campus presented a strong division among the smoking and non-smoking participants. A mere 1.7% of the non-smokers agreed with this policy, whereas 18.1% of the smokers agreed.

The majority of the smokers were in agreement on two policies: Smoking in designated areas and outdoors and no smoking in classrooms and labs. The latter is the existing Southern Tech smoking policy.

Before any actions are taken Prof. Sage will be conducting a meeting with another committee to discuss these findings. This committee will consist of the six people already on the Faculty Senate subcommittee and six students appointed by Dawn Kyle, our SGA President. A recommendation will be created by this joint committee which

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One Day of Drop/Add Proves Unpopular

The one day of drop/add during registration caught many students by surprise. It was an attempt to help smooth the disbursement of more than \$400,000 of Financial Aid to the 15% of the student population receiving the funds. Unfortunately, it also caused long lines for students.

The decision to hold one day of drop/add was recommended by Dr. Harris Travis, Vice-President of Academic Affairs,

approved by the "Registration" Committee. The decision was based on two main concerns.

The first concern came from auditors from the Board of Regents. Southern Tech's previous registration process took nine days. The auditors recommended that a new plan be adopted that would complete registration in the first week of school.

The second concern was money, specifically State Funding and Financial Aid. With the

auditors reprimanded Southern Tech for the late agreements, which they interpreted to be the granting of credit by a state agency which is against state law. Adding people to the rolls after the end of drop/add also gave the appearance of artificially inflating the student population for funding purposes. Most of the people who were added after drop/add were financial aid recipients who failed to pick up their checks and had their

schedules dropped. Part of the regulations concerning Financial Aid Funds require for the recipient to have a certain class load. Therefore, funds could not be released until the end of drop/add, when the schedules were finalized. This prevented many students from buying books and supplies until the third day of class or later.

Dr. Travis said the new procedure for drop/add is not set in concrete. The committee is still looking into the problem with the procedure and wishes for student input to help solve the problem. Dr. Emerelle McNair, Director of Financial Aid, is holding a special meeting of the Financial Aid Advisory Board at

11 a.m. on Wednesday, October 11, 1989, to address the problem this quarter. The board is looking for students, especially those on

financial aid, who experienced problems with the registration and fee payments this quarter and can offer help and suggestions.

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BITNET Coming to SC7

The Cyber supercomputers will soon be connected with BITNET, one of the world's largest computer mail/conference networks. The gateway to the network is projected to come on line sometime before Thanksgiving.

BITNET allows a user to send electronic mail to hundreds of thousands of individual computers and users in the U.S., Japan, Britain, Germany, and even behind the Iron and Bamboo Curtains. One node of the network in China was even used by protesting students to receive outside news on how their protests were developing.

BITNET is essentially a free service because it is mainly run by volunteers and funded by each respective country or university. Some organizations provide services such as bibiographic searches (an invaluable service around research paper time), mathematical computing, and even renting memory space. These services are extremely cheap due to the volunteers and funding.

Along with these services, conferences are also provided. These


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New System Creates Chaos ·



A scene from a new sci-fi novel or from a low budget space flick? Who pilots this squat, saucer-shaped vessel? Maybe Buck Rogers or Luke Skywalker? If any of the above was the impression that you got when you read this quote, then it is my sad duty to inform you that you are sadly: lacking in the area of newspaper comic knowledge. Any connoisseur of the Sunday funnies, or of The STING's comic page for that matter, would know right off that the ship carries none other than our hero, the intrepid Spaceman Spiff!


Spaceman Spiff is the creation of six year old Calvin, who, in turn, is the comic page creation of Rueben Award winning cartoonist Bill Watterson. As the star of Calvin & Hobbes, Calvin is the kind of kid you always wished you were, the kid of unlimited imagination, and Hobbes is his stuffed tiger/best friend who comes alive only in Calvin's imagination. Calvin

& Hobbes is topping the charts as the favorite comic in many newspapers around the country (it is, in fact, The STING's most read comic). Now, Watterson has released a new Calvin & Hobbes collection entitled The Calvin & Hobbes Lazy Sunday Book, and it's in color! It's hard to resist laughing at the genius of Watterson in capturing the true essence of childhood. After reading several strips you begin to believe that there is actually a Calvin somewhere, and Watterson is merely a photographer catching him in all his exploits.

The Calvin & Hobbes Lazy Sunday Book is a wondrous book, containing more than one hundred Sunday comics spanning all four seasons of the year, and Calvin making every one of them a hilarious adventure into the world of tigers, spacemen, giant bedbugs, superheroes, and more. Hobbes acts as Calvin's cohort and companion, and at times even his nemesis. Whether they're walking through the woods on a crisp fall evening, or riding a mean wagon down a hill of impossible steepness, Calvin and Hobbes are practically inseparable. Calvin, however, is not completely absorbed in his imagination as he has found a

friend in a neighbor and classmete, Susie Derkins. Susie adds the element of a smart, suave six-year old girl who has the amazing ability to foil every one of Calvin's plans. Then there are Calvin's parents, two people whose existence on this planet are ruled by their child. Pity these poor people, for they have suffered. This is merely touching on what Calvin & Hobbes is all about.

Watterson has already put out four Calvin & Hobbes compilations, but these have been limited to black and white reprints. Now, with The Calvin & Hobbes Lazy Sunday Book we can enjoy Calvin in full glorious Sunday color. While this book contains many comics already released in his previous books, it also contains several ones that haven't been released in a book vet. Watterson is a man who is not completely content with the seven or eight frames allowed for a Sunday comic. He has given us a marvelous full-color, ten page story at the beginning of the book. Watterson hopes to one day return to full page Sunday comics. As Watterson points out in the afterword to the book: How much comic artists get depends on how much we, the

Season Attacks S. Africa

If you're looking for a lighthearted movie to ease the tension caused by that last test you bombed, this is not the movie to see. Although in my humble opinion this is a movie you should see.

Euzhan Palcy's anti-apartheid film A Dry White Season is about standing up for our human rights.


This movie centers around the character Ben du Toit portrayed by Donald Sutherland. As an Afrikaner who teaches history at a private academy for well-off white South Africans he is guilty of ignorance, believing all his life that his country was taking its only possible recourse against the uprising of the black South Africans.

The movie hits hard from the beginning as a vocal. protest march (mostly of black schoolchildren) is turned into a bloody massacre by the police. The academy's gardener, Gordon, pleads for Ben's help as he is told of his son's arrest and suicide as a result of the protest. This initiates the hero's political awakening which also brings him isolation even from his own family.

A string of events following the death of Gordon opens Ben's eyes to the true workings of his governmental system. In his quest for justice he seeks the help of a wry old barrister (attorney) magnificently played by Marlon Brando. He agrees to take a case against the state only after protesting that "Law and justice aren't on speaking terms at all in South Africa."

A Dry White Season gets its point across in a straightforward yet gentle, entertaining way. With the aid of a superb cast this is sure to be one of the most important films of 1989. On a scale of 1 to 10 I rate this an 8.

Faculty Spotlight -Dr. Wess

Dr. Robert Wess, an Associate Professor of English here at Southern Tech since 1981, recently returned from a year's leave of absence. Dr. Wess, a transplant to Georgia from Ohio, had the honor of teaching two semesters at Charles University in Prague Czechoslovakia, as a Fulbright Professor in American Literature and Language.

Charles University, the oldest university in central Europe, was opened by mandate of Charles IV, king of Bohemia and the Roman Empire. Consisting of many faculties located throughout the city of Prague, it remains today the major university in Czechoslovakia.

The Fulbright Fellowship program, founded by Senator Fulbright, is sponsored by the United States government to promote good will among nations, to increase international understanding, and to promote faculty development. Competition for this fellowship is on the national level. For this position, Dr. Wess' application was reviewed by regional and national screening boards. It was only after months of waiting that he was informed that he had been chosen for the position at the Philosophical Faculty at Charles University.

STING: What did you enjoy most about Czechoslovakia?

Dr. Wess: I enjoyed "the cultural, architectural, and musical beauty of Prague." Prague is one of the beautiful old cities of Europe and the architecture is outstanding. The musical level is very high and the cultural level is very international.

STING: What did you like the least about Czechoslovakia?

Dr. Wess: Sometimes the "red tape" was annoying. For instance, there was a lot of "red tape" in terms of moving in and out of the country or in getting something special. One has to have a lot of patience and persistance.

STING: Was the language difference a barrier for you?

Dr. Wess: Absolutely! To live in a country, one ideally knows the language well and at the very least one tries to know the language as well as possible. That's what I did and that's what my wife did as well.

STING: Do you plan to write some type of paper about your experience?

Dr. Wess: I hope to do an article or two about several different topics: churches, for example, and some of the current changes taking place.

STING: How did the people of Czechoslovakia treat you as an American?

Dr. Wess: It depended. I'd say in official circles there was a politeness, but there was also a bit of aloofness. Westerners are still treated with some standoffishness in eastern countries, and Czechoslovakia is no exception. Unofficially, however, we met people in the city, and we became friends with several different families.

At the university, colleagues were polite, even friendly. The chairman of the English department treated me very well. He even invited my family to dinner on several occasions. It was at his request, in fact, that my Fulbright Fellowship was extended throughout the Summer until September 15, 1989.

Writers of the Future Appear Now

Remember science fiction? It seems that in today's reading market, true science fiction has almost disappeared. I know what you're saying. Sci-Fi is bigger than ever at bookstores. Writers of the Future is "an international search for new or amateur writers of new short stories or novelettes of science fiction." Writers submitting articles cannot have had novels or novelettes published before or have had more than three short stories published. So essentially,

what we get is a collection of new and fresh ideas. And the judges include such famous authors as Larry Niven, Andre Norton, Jerry Pournelle, Anne McCaffrey, Rober Silverberg, and Roger Zelazny. Also, the anthology is interspersed with articles of advice from accomplished authors, aimed at amateurs. Wow. Look at all those a's. I think that may be a world's record.

But anyway, the book. It contains a multitude of good stories, but I'll give you some of the highlights. "The Nomalers" is an interesting mix of selective breeding and division of labor that IET's will find interesting. ACS majors will enjoy "The Disambiguation of Captain Shroud," a story written from an interesting viewpoint. "Just Don't" is probably the shortest short story I've read in a while. and "A Ghost in the Matrix" is an interesting mix of future technology with the society of the 1850's.

What more can I say. It's a good book. It's short stories, so it's perfect for the "don't have a lot of time for reading" lifestyle of college students. So buy it, because I want them to send me the next volume to review next year.





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
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Mother Earth Throws a Tantrum

During the latter part of the second week of October a low pressure system developed in the Atlantic Ocean off the coast of Brazil. In the days that followed, as the system was scrutinized by a vast array of sensors from the air as well as space, one of the deadliest and most destructive phenomenon known to man developed, a hurricane. By early in the third week,

Hurricane Hugo as it was now called, had laid to waste an assortment of tiny but densely populated islands in the eastern Carribean and was taking its aim at the eastern coast of the United States. Initially, no one knew where or even if the great storm would make landfall.

Early in the afternoon of October 21 it became apparent that Charleston, South Carolina would be the victim and the order was given for a total, mandatory evacuation

of the coastal islands. Interstate 26 out of the city was made into a one way as 100,000 people tried desperately to leave the city in the ten hours before the class 4 hurricane came ashore. As the afternoon grew into evening conditions became steadily worse.

For over two hours that night and into the following morning sustained winds of over 135 m.p.h. raged, ravaging the once pristine jewel of the Old South. Entire city blocks were destroyed, leaving only piles of twisted and broken debris. Not only were buildings and structures decimated by the storm, the entire life works and savings of thousands of people were totallly and completely annihilated. In addition, hundreds of thousands of trees. once the pride and joy of Charleston, were broken off or ripped up by the wind and used as battering rams to impale anything in their path.

In the days that followed this great tragedy, the call for help went out from Charleston. Thousands of volunteers from all over the nation dropped what they were doing and rushed to the

"We're going strong," is the new motto for Charleston, S.C. in the aftermath of Hurricane Hugo's devastation last month. Soon after the hurricane swept down on this historic city, Tom Crowell (staff photographer) and I visited the city to help with the relief efforts.

Expecting to find total chaos and confusion, I was surprised by how much the city had returned to a "relative" sense of normality in such a short time...but so much more work is still needed to be done.

The Charlestonians are a proud group of people and they are determined to see their city restored back to the grand old city it was before the devastation. But with the strong sense of optomism and "can-do" among the citizens and volunteers I believe the city is going to be better than it was before Hugo.

Few people in Charleston were unaffected by Hugo's wrath. On the Sunday morning of our visit an elderly black gendeman, are seed to less dunday suct, was clinical on the sector men of the

home that had not be obliterated by Hugo--the porch. We wanted to stop and say something to him, but there was simply nothing appropriate to say that could express our sympathy for him and his family

We worked with the Department of Parks in Charleston and met many citizens who were grateful that people outside the

area and the state were volunteering their time and skills to help rebuild their city.

It was an eye-opening experience to visit this city, not only to see the destruction but to hear the stories which will be passed down for generations to come in Charleston. Each Charlestonian


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

wasn't even half completed. So two more programmers were added to the project.

When the programmers complained to Control Data, the Control Data people made several attempts to fix it, then just gave up and told the Southern Tech programmers it was their problem.

Control Data became increasingly uncooperative. They would promise to send programmers to deal with specific problems, then not do it.

Then, inside of a year, all three programmers working on the project left for higher paying jobs. So no one was left working on the project who knew anything about it.

When the last programmer left in August, the entire project was reevaluated. "First of all we didn't like the product. It's not a permanent solution for us." Control Data is no longer selling EDEN; they sold the rights to it to someone else, which was taken as a bad sign. And there is no one on campus experienced in the EDEN system, so if they hired someone new there would be a six to nine month delay while he learned the system before it could possibly be implemented.

So the President's Office decided to cut their losses and

cease all attempts to bring EDEN on-line.

If \$100 thousand was spent initially on the system and one programmer with a salary of twenty-five thousand a year was employed for four years and two others for two years, then at leaat \$300 thousand was spent on the EDEN system with no results.

The President's Office was reluctant to release the exact figure spent on the purchase and debugging of the EDEN system. Therefore, \$300 thousand is probably a conservative estimate.

Now Dr. Nadella's office is looking for other possibilities within the University System of Georgia. If they choose one of the systems that has been written by the programmers of a Georgia college, they wouldn't have to pay anything for it.

Another advantage is these systems are already up and running at other colleges, so the President's Office already knows what to expect from them, and that they do work.

The money that they don't have to spend on the software could possibly go toward buying a larger computer, probably a Texas Instrument 1500, a substantial upgrade from the existing mainframe computer.

If necessary the full Committee will reword the policy recommendation and then the entire issue will be presented to all the faculty and staff members of Southern Tech for a vote. The results of this vote will determine whether or not there will be any changes here at Southern Tech.

If nothing else, the survey did uncover a surprising statistic: At least 2% (the 10 undistinguishable others) of the Southern Tech community do not know what they are!

HPV in World's Top Ten

The Southern Tech Human Powered Vehicle (HPV) took 7th place at the International Human Powered Vehicle Association world championships, held September 13-17 at the Michigan International Raceway in Adrian, Michigan. HPV project directer and MET faculty member Orren Williams called the ASMECAB sponsored trip "...very successful, an outstanding learning experience."

The HPV project began three years ago when three students approached Professor Williams about building an HPV. A special topics class was started with the ultimate goal of building a vehicle that could seriously challenge the world record in the 200-meter time trial, then set at 59 m.p.h. It was decided last year that the world championships were to be one stepping stone towards that goal. Since then the world record has been broken (65 m.p.h.) but the world championships were still judged to be an important event, one that could be used to test the vehicle against others. After final modifications that included the molding of two Lexan windscreens the trip to Michigan was launched.

Accompanying Prof. Williams were his wife Sandra, daughter Sally, and five HPV project students: Yousef Khalousi, Keith Pervis, Doug

Tidwell, Paul Volle, and myself. After a fourteen hour drive we learned two important things about Michigan: It's cold and it rains a lot. 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
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
