



Masters in Electrical Engineering Coming

Southern Tech will soon be adding another Masters Degree to it's existing graduate programs in Technology Management and Technical Communication. Hopefully by Spring quarter of 1991, a Masters Degree in Electrical Engineering Technology will be available.

The remaining problems facing the MS in EET are getting final resolution by the Board of Regents, and then getting the consent of SCT's Graduate Program Committee for specific hours and courses to be offered.

An interesting sidelight is that the Board of Regents is not just approving the electrical masters degree. Instead, they are approving a Masters in Engineering Technology. In other words, the other engineering technology departments potentially could offer masters degrees as well.

As far as prerequisites for the program, Professor Julian A. Wilson, the ECET department

head, said, "If [students] graduated before 1986, they probably wouldn't have had differetial equations, and they would have to pick that up. If they graduated in a later catalog, there would be no undergraduate prerequisites, they could go right into...the course."

The program itself would be between fifty to sixty credit hours, "leaning towards fifty" according to Professor Wilson. The rough breakdown of these hours will be thirty-five hours of electrical clases, ten hours would be math, science and computer science, and the remaining five hours would be free electives. These free electives however would have to be classes at the graduate level.

Among the 35 hours of electrical classes will be ten hours dedicated to a project. These ten hours will be distributed among the last three quarters. "It's not really a thesis. In keeping with Southern Tech's policy, it will be more of an applied type problem," according to Professor Wilson. In the first quarter of the project, the

student will produce an abstract telling his or her ideas for the project. The second quarter would be involved with library and data book searches. The final quarter would be committed to designing, building, and gaining approval for the student's project.

Prof. Wilson went on to say that the program initially offered will be the general option, or, "a schmattering of specialties." However, the Electrical Department hopes that in about three years to have the same level of diversity in the masters program as in the bachelors program.

When the electrical masters courses are offered, the Electrical Department now plans to follow the lead of the current masters programs as far as scheduling goes. That is to say, the classes will be held at night, in order to accomodate the current Southern Tech graduates, who are currently working.

Professor Wilson also said that at least one more professor

New AET Degree Starts Fall

After almost five long years of preparation, the five-year architecture degree was approved by the University System of Georgia Board of Regents in the Spring of 1989

Approached by the Georgia Registration Board, the Architecture degree plan of study was derived by the AET faculty.


Although Georgia Tech offers a masters degree in Architecture, the college only offers a bachelor of science in architecture, which is not recognized as a professional degree. Southern Tech and the Savannah School of Art are the only colleges in Georgia that offer a five-year Bachelor of Architecture.

Beginning in the fall of 1990,

the new Southern Tech degree will offer the student the opportunity to reach limitless boundaries in comparison to the AET program.

The AET program is a practical program. It is not intended to produce design professionals. For one thing, there is little design in the curriculum. Compared with the new program's fifteen design courses, the AET program requires only four courses at the most, which certainly lacks the required amount of design courses according to the National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB). The main difference between the AET program and the new program lies in the architectural electives and the emphasis on design. The new five-year plan will be very theoretical, and the design courses will be more practical and realistic.

In the past, Southern Tech graduates had difficulty passing the "design" part of the professional examination because it was not the AET degree's goal to train students to become Registered engineers or architects. With this

new program, after five years, a student is an apprentice for three years under the Intern Architect Department Program (IDP). After such time, the student can take his licensing exam. Graduates from both programs start out at the same step of the career ladder such

as working on a draft board or a computer station. But the difference lies in the boundaries. As the acting AET department head, Harry Kaufman, said, "They [the students] start in the same place,

BITNET Coming Really Soon

The Southern College of **Technology Computer Operations** Department has connected the campus' Cyber mainframe computers to BITNET, a network of computers that connects many colleges, universities and research

institutions. The BITNET connection will be made available to students and faculty of Southern


Southern Tech is connected to BITNET via a dedicated line to Georgia Tech. Installed during Spring quarter of 1989, the dedicated line provides Southern Tech with other connections such as the University System Computer Network (USCN) as well as BIT-

BITNET allows Southern Tech to communicate with many other institutions already on the network. As of October 1989, BITNET connects over 3400 different computers at 1300 individual locations in 33 separate countries. In addition to the resources available directly on BITNET, this network also gateways into other computer networks of the world. Such networks are INTERNET (formerly ARPANET), JANET (Joint Academics of the United Kingdom), CSNET, NSFNET (National Science Foundation), UUCP, EARN (Europian Academic Research Network), and NetNorth (Canada).

Resources accessible through BITNET vary from location to location, but BITNET is mainly used for electronic mail and conferencing and file transfers.

BITNET is not available to the entire Southern Tech student body at present because it is still in a testing stage, but Computer Operations plans to make it automatically available to all students who have accounts on the Cyber mainframe. Currently, all enrolled

CS Professor Visits China




Professor Barbara Thomas was recently sent by the United Nations to China to present a paper on CAD systems - Photo by Jack Silver

A proposal submitted by Barbara Thomas, assistant professor of Applied Computer Science, opened the path for her to explore the adventures of China. The United Nations granted her a full paid trip to Beijing to speak during the CAD Symposium of North China University of Technology. The title of her proposal was "Human Factors Regarding the Interaction Between the Users of a CAD System."

While at the symposium, she was able to meet a variety of people. Among them were: The president of the University, Pre Qiu; graduate students Yulmei Dang, Li Xiaobo, and Liu Shuxin; and many other symposium par-

In comparing China to the



United States, Prof. Thomas noticed three major differences: salary, sources of transportation, and standard of living.

Prices are very low in Beijing, and so are the salaries. In fact, from conversations that Prof. Thomas conducted with various professors in China, she found that their salaries are unbelievably low: approximatly \$250 to \$450 dollars per year. Moreover, the driver of a car makes more money than a professor, and a pack of cigarettes is equal to a month's salary of a worker in Beijing.

Although the population of China is well over a billion people,


the main source of transportation in Beijing China is the bicycle and public transportation. Moreover, driving an automobile in Beijing is not very popular at all, since not too many people even own automobiles.

Largely because the number of manual laborers in China is so much higher than that of the U.S., the standard of living in Beijing is lower, which reflects on the prices and salaries. Besides that, the living arrangements in China on the average are extremely small, and the conservation of energy is traditionally abided by and is a way of life there. Prof. Thomas noted that "Even though it was about 30 or 40 degrees in Beijing the policy is that the heat is only turned on for two hours per day, from 8:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., ...this goes for the hot water as

Although the conference lasted five days, she did get to go sightseeing where she was able to view The Great Wall of China and Ming Tomb.

Prof. Barbara Thomas is not the first Southern Tech professor to attend such a venture, for Dr. Pfeiffer, head of the Humanities and Social Science Department, and Dr. Carol Barnum, also with the Humanties and Social Science Department, both visited China as

The trip that Prof. Thomas made to China proved to be educational, informative, and entertaining. Thus, events such as these keep the flow of communication open, while also helping to maintain the good ties that Southern Tech has established with North China University.

Over the last several years, The Sting has been steadily increasing in quality and popularity. We convinced Dean Smith that to improve any more, we would have to have some better equipment.



With the new equipment, we can do "on screen" layout. This means we can actually see what we're doing when we're doing it.

We can also take articles that have been typed on other Macs and place them in the paper without having to retypeset them. We will also be able to use a spell checker, which should eliminate a great many mistakes.

With these advantages, we should be able to concentrate more on the appearance and contents of the paper, and less on the mechanics of getting the paper down on the page. This will lead to a visually more appealing and readable paper.



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
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News Bits

BITNET Is Bitchin'

"Mickey Mouse wears a Dan Quayle watch," and, "If bankers can count, how come they have 8 windows and only 4 tellers?" are two quotes that found their way to my BITNET mailbox in a list of quotes from a Consultant's forum. Not that all BITNET messages are just a list of quotes, but subjects discussed over BITNET are not just ones that would concern computer science enthusiasts. This computer network has a lot to offer anybody who desires to express his ideas and opinions.

Normally, there are three basic procedures that a user would conduct over BITNET: electronic mail, file transfers, and electronic conferencing. There are other applications for BITNET, but for the most part, many people won't get beyond doing these tasks.

Electronic mail (e-mail) is exactly what it sounds like mail sent electronically. Let's say that you are collaborating on a project with a pal, Alfred E. Neuman, at MIT, to build a hand-held particle accelerator. You produce some findings that would be beneficial to his current experiments and you don't have a stamp. Well, to solve this dilemma, you could walk down to the 300 building, sign on to BITNET in the computer lab, and send Alfred the important information. The next time Alfred uses BITNET, probably only two hours after you sent it, he'll receive your message and be able to conduct his experiments correctly. And this would make you both millionaires because you were able to submit your patent long before the team from Kennesaw College and Cornell because they used the U.S. Postal Service.

Traditionally, one might think that the only people using file transfers are those computer junkies with taped-up spectacles who stay up until all hours of the morning trying to get a copy of a file with the latest digitized picture of the centerfold from the current issue of "Playboy". However, file transfers from BITNET file servers range a spectrum of topics. Many times, public domain software can be easily obtained from BITNET for computers from CP/ M to OS/2 to MVS, meaning that the owner of an old Cromemco computer might be able to find a free version of Tetris for his computer. The files available from BITNET can also be text files on varied subjects such as fractal geometry and articles from "Fly Fishing Digest".


Perhaps the most interesting and readily usable feature of BITNET would be the different conferences or discussions (known as "lists") available. Because conferences can be very interactive, they can easily become a user's sole endeavor when using BITNET. Basically, discussions are started on subjects ranging from agriculture to gerentology to world politics. And for those poeple who do not wish to follow any structured topic of converstation, there are conferences specifically with that idea in mind as well.

In case the entire meaning of this article has not pierced your mind, then "diverse beyond your



Unlike the failed EDEN project, which ended up costing Southern Tech an estimated half a million dollars, Southern Tech's connection to BITNET is a "minor cost" according to Dr. Cheryl Purvis, Acting Director of Computer Operations.



It seems that the Textile Department cancelled TET 334 (Composites) after actual classes had begun. The reason given was that seven people did not justify a class. Classes must have at least 10 students.

There are two lines of thought that come to mind in this instance. First, didn't the administration realize the implications of what happens when a higher level class was cancelled after drop/add? The second is why cancel the class at all? But more on that later.

More than the inconvenience of having to find another class is involved. For some of us, making a new schedule meant delaying graduation. For others, it was limited by the hours we told our employers we could work, which was based on the schedule we were told we had in the first place. About the only benefit to be gleaned from this entire situation was we didn't have much debate as to what the lead editorial in this issue of *The Sting* would be.

A little forethought would have gone a long way in this situation. If there were only seven people in the class at pre-registration, notices could have been sent out stating this. Then students would at least be

encouraged to find additional students to join the class, or be on the lookout for other classes.

I suppose the administration could have been hoping that more people might join the class if they left it open during the one day of drop/add (see the Consensus Editorial). Hopefully, this is not a normal school policy. Although, some other "normal" school policies are just as nebulous, if not even more

Now back to that second line of thought. The big question in our minds is, "Why does ten students justify a class, and not seven?" Does the school pay professors by the class? Are SCT students only capable of learning in large groups? Do professors get assigned other classes once their old ones are dropped? Are they paid by the hour? Are the empty rooms rented out for children's birthday parties, or the storage of toxic waste?

One of the reasons many of us chose Southern Tech is because it is a more student-oriented school, with a better student to teacher ratio. Is the administration trying to say that that ratio can't get too good, or the class is cancelled?

One suggested reason for this was based on the Georgia Tech model. Professors use the time to do research. However, Georgia Tech generates money by being a research institute, we don't.

In the end, this all comes down to point of view. The administration undoubtedly feels justified about what it did, and what it will do in the future. We just hope the administration tries to see things from our view before making some of these decisions.

Since our last issue, the Southern Tech Runnin' Hornets, with the help of two new recruits, have raced to a 15-3 record. With the nation's top ranked NAIA defense, the Hornets have suffered only one loss this quarter, to #11 ranked Georgia Southwestern. Southern Tech has allowed an average of only 58.2 points per game, the lowest in the nation. This past Wednesday, the Hornets brought down their average even further with a 83-54 victory over the LaGrange Panthers.

The Hornets have also added two new players. Rudy Myers and John Lancaster bring much needed relief to the guard position. Until January 4th, the Hornets had only two players listed at that position. Rudy Myers brings speed and strong defensive skills to the team. John Lancaster adds experience at point guard with

skills gained at Fort Sumter Community College in Florida. The two will give Chuck Johnson and Bradd Durr, who have both been averaging over 30 minutes a game, some much needed rest during the thick of conference play.

Assistant Coach Tyrone Dean expects significant contributions from both players, commenting that Myer is "very quick. He'll help add a lot of defensive pressure." He continues that "Lancaster is a coach's type player. He knows the game of basketball very well." These recruits come at a critical time. Rufus Kay suffered a broken wrist in a game earlier this month and won't be returning until the final two weeks of the

Another occurance this year has been BIG HOME CROWDS. Perhaps the fact that Southern Tech has one of the few winning records of any sports team in Atlanta has something to do with it. Whatever the reason, the crowds

have the coaches pleased.

The suprising story may be that the biggist ST crowd was not at home, but at the game against Kennesaw College. Everyone came. Students, faculty, fraternities, sororities, and other campus groups showed up in force to watch the Hornets defeat their conference rivals. "We really appreciated the support we had at the Kennesaw game," says Tyrone Dean, "we usually don't get crowds that big. It was a good game." The team would also like to thank all the people who have come to the games so far this sea-

The Hornets have had contributions from all their players this season. Chuck Johnson is the leading scorer with at 13.6 point average. Brad Durr has had a good season at point guard (72 assists, 26 steals), and Lamar Smith and Cordell Benton lead the team in rebounds (6.2 & 6.0 per game respectively). Benton also has the season high point total in one game with 28 points against Earl Paulk on January 2nd and leads the team in field goal percentage with an incredible 74.7%.

Chuck Johnson leads the free throw percentage category with an 82% mark from the line.

The Hornets are 8-1 over the last nine games, and need your support at the home games. The next home game is on Saturday, January 27 at 7:30 pm. Show up. Admission is free because you've

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
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
