





From this meeting, Mike Waters and Jennifer Bige were named Editor and Assistant Editor and officially began work on the fifth of February.

Mike was editor of his high school yearbook and has great ideas for our yearbook. Jennifer has experience in newspaper layout. Both face the formidable task of getting a staff organized, meeting with yearbook publishing companies and planning the book. Other problems include covering Summer and Fall Quarters as well as January in the new book. Due to the starting time and the fact that is becoming standard practice in more and more

colleges, *The Log* will begin having a Fall delivery date.

Both editors and any interested students will be meeting with representatives from Jostens and Herf-Jones publishing companies on this Thursday, February 8. Both companies can meet the Fall deadline if all the student work is completed by July. Yearbook pictures are scheduled to be taken during Advanced Registration (February 26 - March 1). All Faculty are warned if they do not get new pictures taken, the oldest picture of them that can be found will be printed.

The 1988-89 Log should be on its way to the printer when this issue hits the stand, and hopefully will be returned before Spring Quarter 1990 is over.

Student Center Funding Process

The funds for the \$6.5 million addition to the Student Center will go to a vote in the state legislature around the first of March. This vote will be the final process in obtaining the new addition for the Student Center.

Currently the state legislature is working on the Fiscal Year 1990 supplemental budget, and the funding for the addition to the Student Center will be in next year's budget. Preparation for the Fiscal Year 1991 budget will begin

approximately around mid-February by the state legislature. Southern Tech is at the top of the Capital Construction list presented to the Governor by the Chancellor of the University System of Georgia. The Governor has submitted his budget to the State Senate and House of Representatives. Appropriations committees in both house will then approve the budget and send it to the floor of both houses for a vote.


After this, the budget will be sent to the Joint Appropriations Committee for final approval. Should the funding for the new Student Center survive this process,

Southern Tech could break ground for the new construction project in July.

According to Beverly Rethmel, Director of Development and College Relations, Southern Tech does not foresee any problems with obtaining the funding. But historically, this has not been a trouble free process.

During the planning for Fiscal Year 1989, Southern Tech's construction request for the Student Center was number three on the Board of Regents' list for Capital Construction. Traditionally, the state legislature had accepted the list as is and funded every project it could from the top of the list down. But that year the state legislature decided to change that decision and consequently Southern Tech was bumped from the list. Last year, Southern Tech was at the very top of the list, and again passed over by the state legislature. One explanation for this stated that Southern Tech was being punished because legislators from Cobb County opposed the sales tax increase.

According to Dr. H. Dean Propst, Chancellor of the University System of Georgia, the Southern Tech Student Center was built 10 years ago at a time when Southern Tech only had a student body of

2,380. The current size of the student body at Southern Tech is 4,026, and the Student Center only provides half the space needed for student services. In a speech given to the Joint Appropriations Committee, Dr. Propst said, "This facility is critically needed at Southern Tech."

If funding comes through for the Student Center, an addition will

be first built and then the current structure will be renovated. The "new" Student Center will include a 500 seat theater, a full cafeteria area and separate snack bar, new meeting spaces and offices, and a new recreation area. In addition, the campus bookstore and post office will be relocated inside the Student Center.

Head of Plant Ops Awarded

On July 4,1990, Southern Tech's head of the Plant Operations department, Jim Brown, will journey to Canada to accept the Award for Excellence in Facilities Management,

Mr. Brown submitted a booklet

to the Association of Physical Plant Administrators (APPA) several months ago describing Southern Tech in detail. After reviewing the booklet and taking an unofficial trip to the Southern Tech campus, the members of APPA named the campus the winner of the Southeastern Region.

Six regions of the world which


include the APPA members of the U.S.A., Canada, Mexico, and eleven foreign countries end up with twelve eligible colleges, including both large (5,000 or more students) and small (less than 5,000 students) campuses. Members compete for the International Award presented to both categories. Up against some tough competitors such as West Point, Southern Tech has a 20% chance of winning the prestigious award offered by the Professional Affairs Committee.

Divided into two categories, the regional award that Mr. Brown won was in the competition of eleven other states in the Southeast region. This was the first time Southern Tech's Plant Operations ever competed in this contest.

The booklet Mr. Brown submitted was a "self-evaluation" report which served as a basis for the regional award. In detailed structure, the self-evaluation included the purpose and goals of the department, organization, resources, policies, planned management of the school, and a description of the campus.

Serving as the largest department of Southern Tech with a staff composed of seventy staff members, the college depends on the Plant Operations Department to



Mr. Carter said the United States was a generous and giving nation, but it has its faults. For example, toxic waste from the United States is now being dumped along the African coast and Africa is accepting the

poison for money which the continent desperately needs. President Carter said he believes there should be a law to convict and punish companies who use Third World Nations as a garbage dump.

MET Building to be Renovated

The Southern College of Technology has been recently found to be full of expansion and progress. Some new buildings are being constructed while the old ones are being fixed up. This is a great achievement by the faculty and staff of this school in making this institution bigger and better than it was.


The most recently proposed project that is expected to take off in

the next month or two is the renovation of Mechanical Engineering Technology (MET) building. According to Dr. Logue, the head of the MET Department, the renovation of the MET building will enable both the departmental students and the students of engineering graphics to lay their hands on computerized equipment after completion.

The building will be renovated so as to have two new drawing laboratories, eight faculty offices, and a metrology laboratory, to mention but a few. The project, which will start very soon, will not interrupt any MET students while taking their classes.

All other MET faculty offices and laboratory classrooms will be completed before the graphics lab, which will be the last of the rooms to be renovated. This will enable the students to take their graphics classes in the completed building while the graphic's lab is being renovated.

This project is expected to be completed within the next nine to twelve months.



Drug War Aimed at College Students

In trumpeting aggressive new anti-drug campaigns, the governors of Georgia and Nebraska made punishing college students a central part of their state-of-the-state addresses in mid-January.

In Georgia, Governor Joe Frank Harris introduced a bill to let state colleges suspend students convicted of drug-related offenses during the term of their arrest. Violators would receive no credit for work completed during the term, and no refunds would be made available.

Similarly in Nebraska, Governor Kay Orr asked her legislature to force students at the University of Nebraska, and Chadron, Kearney and Peru State colleges to sign statements that they are "drug-free" before they can enroll.

Also under Orr's proposal, students convicted of a drug offense would have to go into rehabilitation.
On their second offense, students


would be kicked out of school.

Students would be re-admitted, Orr said, "after the second offense if they proved they've been rehabilitated."

"It's absurd," complained NU student government member Deb Fiddelke, "to single out students. Education shouldn't be used as a political weapon."

Earlier in the school year, Illinois Republican state Representative Jerry Weller said he would introduce a bill to give preference in awarding state aid to students who provide a clean urine sample. Under the plan, students who submit to a drug test and come up clean would get preference over an equally qualified applicant who refuses to take the test.

Already, students who get federal grants have to sign a statement promising they don't and won't use illegal drugs. Additionally, college officials are required to have some kind of anti-drug program in place.

Colleges May Have to Admit Crime-

Congress this month will start seriously considering a bill that would force colleges to tell their students, employees, applicants and their parents how many crimes occurred on their campuses.

While many public-relations minded administrators oppose the bill because it could make their schools look bad, a group of college security experts resolved January 12 to oppose it because they believe it would be unenforceable.

"We're not in favor of the bill because it's not policeable," said Jan Sherrill of the Center for the Study and Prevention of Campus Violence (CSPCV).

Major support for the bill comes from students, parents and faculty members who say they need to know about local crimes in order to protect themselves from them.

Currently, only 11% of the two and four-year colleges in the country bother to report crimes to the FBI, which tracks criminal activities.

The quality of the statistics, moreover, is uneven. While one school may report a crime commisted on what is legally a city-owned curb, another school may decide not to report it as a "campus" crime. Consequently the former college, appearing to be a dangerous sinihole, may have a harder time recruiting students and faculty members than the latter one, which comes off looking like a relatively pacific oasis of learning.

The result, students and experts seem to agree, is a highly unrealistic image of leafy, safe campuses in which students feel so secure that they don't take basic security precautions.

"It's easy to get a false sense of security on campus," said University of Wyoming student Amy Bell. "Students, especially freshmen, think nothing bad will happen to them."

"Students often have a false sense of security on college and university campuses," said Representative Bill Goodling (R-Pa.), who in September introduced the federal bill that would require schools to tell the public about the crimes committed in their communities.

"It's interesting that students do things on campus that they would never do at home," said Sherrill of the CSPCV, which is based at Towson State University in Maryland.

"You would never prop your front door open for the pizza man or leave the window open for your boyfriend to crawl through at home, yet it happens routinely in the dorms," Sherrill said.

Just such an incident sparked the current move to force colleges to confess that crimes happen on came puses.

In 1985 Lehigh University freshman Jeanne Cleary was brually beaten, raped and murdered in her Pennsylvania dorm room. Her attacker got into the dorm because a pizza dox was propping the main door open, and Clery's room remained unlocked while she slept.

Jeanne's parents such Lehigr for negligence, claiming that, given the dearth of crime statistics, no one suspected such an attack was likely or even possible at the school. They were awarded \$2 million in an out-of-court settlement.

The couple used the money to start a non-profit organization, Security on Campus, dedicated to helpoing other universities improve their safety measures.

Thanks to the Cleary's lobbying, Pennsylvania was the first

state to require schools to report crime statistics. The bill became law in May, 1988.

Since then, Florida, Louisiana, and Tennessee have passed crime stat. laws. New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Missouri, California and Delaware are considering similar laws. The penalty for noncompliance would be \$10,000, except for Tennessee and New York, where the fine would be \$1,000.

Goodling's bill, the Crime Awarenss and Campus Security Act would make all campuses provide "timely notification" of crimes and publicize their security policies.

"If details of crimes are not publicized, a student may unknowingly walk alone into a parking lot where several rapes occurred, or may prop a door open unaware that burglars robbed students in other dorms where doors were left open. If these students were properly informed, they might have made different choices," Goodling said.

Wyoming's Bell believes that Goodling's bill would make a difference.

"Crime (on campus) happens more often than students know. If they knew more, they would be a lot more careful," she said.

"It's our responsibility to get crime statistics out to students so that they can be aware," added Traci Bauer, editor of the Southwest Statesman at Southwest Missouri State University (SMSU) in Springfield. "People are so sure this campus is safe because they don't hear about crime," Bauer added.

Bauer's paper, in fact, is trying to pry crime stats from unwilling SMSU administrators.

SMSU's police force says it will release information only through university relations director Paul Kincaid who, in turn, won't give crime data to *The Statesman* on the grounds it would violate the Privacy Act of 1974. The Privacy Act keeps student's private records from becoming public information.

Kincaid added he has asked Missouri's attorney general's office to issue an opinion whether he is correct or not.

If Kincaid ultimately refuses to reveal the information, Bauer said he may try to sue to get it.

University Offers Refunds for Food

In what may turn out to be a first
in dorm food, officials at Clark
University have started offering
students money back if they don't
like their residence hall meals.

The new program, says Jack Foley, the business manager of the Worchester. Mass. university, is designed to dispel the long-held notion that all college food is bad and to better accommodate the

individual tastes of its student customers.

"It seems to be a common denominator for students at all colleges to write home about the quality of the food," Foley said.

Under the new plan, students unhappy with their dinner can complain to the food services manager, who, if unablé to concoct an adequate substitute, will credit the student's university account for the price of the meal.

Breakfasts cost \$1.66, lunch or brunch costs \$3.32 while dinner costs \$4.99.

Clark will share the costs of the program with Daka, a Massachusetts food services company that manages Clark's dorm cafeterias.

The food service company, which serves approximetly 150 East Coast campuses, intends "to make it available at all of our schools," said Daka official Ron Cohen.

Greeks Ban Pledging

A national fraternity, Zeta Beta Tau, reported its experimental ban on pledging seems to have eliminated hazing in its chapters around the country.

Most nationals have adopted anti-hazing policies during the past three years. In August, moreover, two nationals — Zeta Beta Tau and Tau Kappa Epsilon — went further,

completely banning pledging which, they said, sometimes leads to hazing. Students would become full members upon invitation instead of having to endure a prolonged "initiation period."

In December, ZBT announced the experiment seems to be working. Nationwide, ZBT fall rush attracted 20 percent more prospective members than the fall rushes of previous years.

Southern Tech was recently awarded the "Living the Dream" award by the Martin Luther King, Jr. Support Group of Cobb County Georgia.

Dr. Harris Travis, vice president for academic affairs also received "The Martin Luther King Freedom Award" from the Omicron Mu Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity.

Sting Record Review: Everything But The Girl

Everything But The Girl started out over five years ago in England with the release of their debut album

Eden. Tommy LiPuma, an American contemporary jazz producer who has worked with George Benson, Miles Davis, and David Sanborn, offered to produce Everything But The Girl's next

album. However, Tracey Thorne, lead vocalist, and Ben Watt on guitars and vocals, decided that it was too early in their career to try to break into the American music scene. Also, Ben and Tracey were quite involved with solo albums at the time.

The decision not to go to America led to three more albums over the next four years, all of which were recorded in England. Ben and Tracey experimented with the craft of songwriting, vocal techniques, and broad ranges of musical styles. *Eden* attracted the critic's attention with its single, "Each And Every One."

Everything But The Girl became more and more popular throughout Europe, while in America a compilation of songs from Eden and a selection of other tracks was released under the plain title Everything But The Girl. In 1985, the album Love and Money was released. Like Eden, it was produced by Robin Millar.


Baby, The Stars Shine Bright was recorded in 1986 at Abbey Road in the old Beatles studio. In the year of hip hop, Ben orchestrated the

songs to the hilt, borrowing from Burt Bacharach, Phil Spector, and Dusty Springfield. *Baby, The Stars Shine Bright* spawned a very unlikely radio hit with "Come On Home."

In 1988, Ben Watt tested his skills as a producer. The result was the album *Idlewild*. Strikingly autobiographical and simply performed, the songs were musical short stories. *Idlewild* included Everything But The Girl's biggest hit single - their rendition of Danny Witton's "I Don't Want To Talk About It." The single reached #3 on the U.K. chart in the summer of that year.

In March of 1989, Everything But The Girl met with Tommy LiPuma in New York to work on their current album *The Language* Of Life. Guests include Omar Hakim (drums), John Patitucci (bass), Larry Williams (keyboards), and Jerry Hey (horn arrangements). There are saxophone solos from Michael Brecker and Kirk Whalum, and a rare appearance by the legendary stan Getz.

The first single released on *The Language Of Life* is a song called "Driving." "Driving" has a good strong beat yet is not too overpowering as some songs tend to be. "Driving" is comparable to the Swing Out Sister hit "Break Out." "Driving" along with the other singles off of *Language Of Life* are available on Atlantic Records. 



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

We Goofed, We're Sorry

Newspapers serve many functions. We here at *The Sting* try to concentrate on keeping you informed and entertained, but newspapers have another major function: political tools.



In my term as editor we have tried to avoid the political. Oh sure, we try to point out the occasional problem around campus, but we mostly try to keep you informed about what is going on, without bias.

But when the last issue came out, we had our noses rubbed in the political. This was a result of a mistake made in a very prominent place: the front page. And even worse, it was in the title of the lead article.

The title was "Masters in Electrical Engineering Coming." This is not true. It won't be a master's in electrical engineering, but a masters in electrical engineering technology.

And while this may seem like a minor point to you and me, it is very important to the Board of Regents. I know, you and I habitually drop the "technology" whenever you refer to a major on this campus, but the school has been faulted a couple of times before for not making it clear enough that the degrees offered here are in engineering technology. The last thing the school needs is for something as public as the school newspaper to refer to a program as an engineering degree, not an engineering technology degree.

And to make matters worse, the title makes it sound like the program has already been approved, which it hasn't. And if Georgia Tech has anything to do with it, it won't be approved. Ever. And that mistake in the title could be used as a political weapon by them

to help prevent the Regents from approving it.

If you are wondering why Georgia Tech is so keen on preventing us from getting this masters program, I'll tell you: competition for student money. Right now they are on top and intend to stay that way. We dealt them a major blow last spring when the five-year Bachelor's of Architecture was approved over their strenuous objections, and they are trying their best to prevent us from gaining any more ground. And a simple thing as a poor title could give them more ammunition to use.

In my defense, I can only say that the mistake in the title was the only one associated with the article. The article itself made it clear that it was a masters in electrical engineering technology and that it wasn't approved yet.

Writing titles is one of the most difficult things we do. They must be of certain lengths to fit into the spaces reserved for them. If the title had been "Masters in Electrical Engineering Technology May Be Coming Soon," it would have been six inches wider than the page it had to fit on. So I removed a couple of words.

After the explosion that went off after last issue was released, I can guarantee that a great deal of thought will go into all titles in the future to prevent a repetition of this kind of mistake.

I apologize for any problems that this mistake might cause. Hundreds of hours of work by many people all over campus have gone into this proposal to the Board of Regents, and I certainly hope that a moment's thoughtlessness on my part won't do anything to jeopardize it.

The Board of Regents was created to depoliticize education in Georgia. Unfortunately, politics creeps into every facet of our society. It is inescapable. But I think it would take some pretty small minds to use something as petty as the title of a college newspaper article against something so obviously necessary as masters degrees in engineering technology.







Baseball Team Young but Coach Is Hopeful

Southern Tech begins the 1990 spring baseball season with what Coach Charlie Lumsden calls "the first true rebuilding season in six or seven years." The Hornets have lost seven starting players from last year's roster to the evil god "Graduation", and start this season with an incredible 13 freshmen on the roster. Even so, Coach Lumsden hopes to field a very competetive team. One of the freshmen, Kevin Cannon, played for Evans High School, a team which is ranked #2 in the nation, and is on a nationally recorded winning streak of 71 games without a loss.

In losing seven players from last year, the Hornets lost a great deal of offensive power. "Out of the seven players we lost, at least five hit .340," says Lumsden, "so we lost a lot of offense and experience." Coach Lumsden chose to go with freshmen rather than junior college transfer students because of the stringent transfer rules for JuCo students.

Going with freshmen has its advantages, though. With 13 freshmen on the roster, Coach Lumsden will have thirteen experienced players for three years. This promises to be crucial next year, as Shorter College has 16 seniors on the roster, while Brewton Parker College has 14. "We're thin in the pitching staff, and we'll probably start three freshmen in the outfield, and one at third base,"

explains Lumsden. "It will be a very young team," he continues, "but it will be a competetive team because we have a lot of good athletes."

Lumsden is counting on two of his returning players to have good years. Chuck Cianciolo returns to first base and Billy Sanders returns to shortstop to lead the Hornet's infield. "Chuck and Billy are both back after a good year, and we feel they'll both put in a strong performance."

Southern Tech opens its season on February 17th against Erskin College of South Carolinia, but it won't be until the following Wednesday that the Hornets find out how good a team they really are. "That Wednesday we play Jacksonville State, a Division II powerhouse from Florida. That game will give us a good indication of how good this team will be." Their first conference game will be the 24th of this month against Brewton Parker, the team Lumsden picks to win the conference championship.

If the Hornet's survive this season, the future looks very good for Coach Lumsden's team. With two of the division powers graduating a total of 30 seniors, and a total of 24 underclassmen on his roster, Lumsden likes the way the future looks. "We feel like if all these guys stay with us, we have a nucleus to build a very good baseball team." Having been to the NAIA World Series with one team already, one can only wonder if Coach Lumsden plans on going there again.

After a tough road trip, the Southern Tech Runnin' Hornets raised their overall record to 18-5 with a victory over Berry College last Wednesday night. Upcoming home games include Georgia College, Brewton Parker College (#5 in the conference), Knoxville College, and conference arch-rival Kennesaw (#4).


Kennesaw State College is hot on the heels of Southern Tech, and a slip by the Hornets now could mean not playing any playoff games at home.


The Hornets next home game is Saturday, February 10th. Game time is 7:30 P.M.
