

New Architecture Degree Has Transition Problems

Is the Architecture program having problems? According to

some AET students it is.

During the 1988/1989 school year, students, faculty and staff lobbied the Board of Regents to obtain approval of a five-year Bache-

lor of Architecture degree. After defeating some opposition from Georgia Tech, the program was approved in the Spring of 1989.

Students will be allowed to participate in the 5 year program during Fall quarter of 1990 for the first time. While the program does offer a true bachelors degree, selection is very tough. To start with, students currently in the Architecture Engineering Technology program must attend a workshop and have at least a 2.25 GPA overall. Also, students must have a minimum of 2.5 GPA in all design and graphics classes. After meeting these requirements students will then be reviewed by the School of Architecture Admissions Committee who will determine if the student can be placed in a preliminary workshop to take place Summer quarter.

After completing the workshop, students can now enter the 5 year program right? Wrong! Even if students successfully complete the workshops, they will be admitted only if they show exceptional abilities in the field of Architecture. In addition, once students are in the program, they will be required to

maintain a minimum GPA of 2.00 and complete 251 quarter hours for graduation.

So, where is the problem? According to some students, the faculty in the AET department has "forgotten" the students currently in the Technology program. In other words, some AET students feel that the staff in the Architecture department does not care if the students gain jobs or become registered to practice Architecture. Another concern among students is that current AET students are not being given a chance to participate in the new bachelors degree program. Also AET students fear that current classes are being cancelled at such a rate that students will not be able to complete their graduation requirements.

While all students at one point or another experience some difficulties with their majors, it is obvious that some AET students are troubled beyond the norm. According to Professor Harry Kaufman, Head of the AET department, "The faculty and staff are currently working with American Board of Education Development to have the cur-

rent AET program accredited." This will help students in finding and keeping jobs. Also, Prof. Kaufman pointed out that students have literally been "tracked down" to be given a chance at jobs offered by various firms. Also, several professors in the AET department have personally helped students in finding temporary and permanent jobs.

In response to the cancelling of classes, Prof. Kaufman says that students were given ample time to take classes that would be cancelled. Also, he mentioned that students who needed to take a cancelled class could meet the criteria by setting up a substitute program with the AET department.

In the case of AET 316, Wood Structures, the class was not listed in the 1988/1989 catalog. Also notices were posted and announcements were made that the course would be cancelled. Therefore, according to Prof. Kaufman, students had plenty of time to complete AET 316. However, due to pleas from students, AET 316 will be taught for the last time during

·SGA '91 Budget Brings Controversy

The Finance Committee, which consists of Noel Page, Gary Reuss, and Mike Waters, has constructed the proposed organizational budgets for Fiscal Year 1991, which will be will be submitted to the SGA on May 15. With the proposed 1991 Organizational Budget, WGHR radio and the Bathtub Race will

suffer substantial reductions in their funding, and the Cultural Series will get an increase.


For 1991, WGHR requested \$12,020, but the proposed budget allocates \$6,000 to WGHR which is a \$2675 reduction from WGHR's 1990 budget. Noel Page indicated there are four factors which shaped the Finance Committee's decision to reduce WGHR's budget. These factors were the construction of the

new Student Center, WGHR's stipends for station management, Barry Birckhead's (Director of Student Activities) indication that WGHR could function on \$6,000, and WGHR's audience level.

Noel Page said that the construction of the new Student Center will result in the transmitter cable being disconnected and WGHR would probably be off the air for three months.

Addressing this point, David Miles (general manager for WGHR) said, "We anticipate being off the air for two weeks." David Miles added, "The Finance Committee's decision that WGHR would be off the air for longer than two weeks was an assumption, and they did not consult WGHR on this matter." David Miles said that WGHR was working on solutions to temporarily connect the transmitter cable to the transmission tower.

Regarding WGHR's stipends for station management, Noel Page said that WGHR's stipends for 1990 were \$4,000 and that WGHR submitted a budget for 1991 which called for \$7,100 in stipends. Noel Page

said, "The stipends for the two general managers would have increased to \$325 per quarter." Noel Page added, "The operations manager would have received \$300 per quarter, and three other positions would have received \$275." Noel Page

said, "They (WGHR) don't need that many people, and they don't need to be paid that much." Noel Page said, "A \$6,000 cut will tell them to rethink your administration



SGA Candidates Speak About Upcoming Election

Student Government Association elections are scheduled for May 25, 28, and 29. Under the new constitution, which received final approval on May 3, the President, Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer, and 10 councilpersons must be elected during this period.

At the time this issue went to press, only three people had signed up to run for councilperson.

Currently, Jeff Crocker is running unopposed for President. He is currently Vice President. He said, "Being unopposed at the present time, I'm not going to go to extreme expenses. I'm going to campaign more verbally, just talking around with my peers. I might make a few signs."

If he is elected, he would like to increase student interest in the SGA. He feels that many students are uninformed as to the importance of the SGA, and so are unwilling to

seek an office in it. He said, "I think a lot of people have a misunderstanding about the SGA and its purpose." He feels that only a small percentage of the student population realize how vital the SGA is, and so they are the only ones who show up and help make the decisions.

He also has a few projects he would like to see implemented. He would like to find positive ways to increase the visibility of Southern Tech. "I want to get better publicity, and that is going to have to come from students."


He also wants to try to dress the campus up a little. For instance, he would like to remove the old wooden signs from around campus, and replace them with modern ones.

The only problem he sees with the new constitution "is just getting settled down with it. Making the transition from our present one."

Currently, only one person has expressed an interest in running for Vice President, and he has some problems meeting the qualifications.

Gary Reuss is currently running for Secretary/Treasurer, a position he already holds.

If elected, his job will be to handle most of the day-to-day paperwork of the SGA. He says his responsibilities will include "minutes, agendas, making any phone calls necessary, any type of correspondence necessary, unless it would be handled through a committee." He will also be in charge of Treasury

reports, and make recommendations as to whether the SGA has the funds to cover proposed projects. He says he will also take on any additional tasks asked of him by the President or Vice President.

He is presently the head of the SGA Internal Affairs committee, but continuing in this role will be impossible as the new constitution forbids anyone holding more than one position.

He feels that the biggest change brought on by the new constitution is that most of the powers of the SGA officers have been removed. He said "The majority of the power lies within the council, as opposed to the old constitution where the majority of the power lay with the officers. Essentially, the officers are figureheads. I have seen in the past where to President has had so much power that what they say is law, and virtually overpowered the Student Government."

The major goal he would like to

work for during the next year is lowering the requirements for achieving Honor status at graduation. Currently, a graduate must have a 3.5 GPA to receive Honors, 3.7 to receive high honors, and 3.9 to receive highest honors. He said, "If you compare that with the rest of the University System of Georgia, the average is 3.0 for honors, 3.4 to 3.5 for high honors, and 3.7 to 4.0 for highest honors. My recommendation to the [Student Government] council will be to lower those standard to fall in line with the rest of the University system."

He would also like to require Academic Departments to publish in the class schedule exactly who is going to be teaching classes, not just say 'staff,' and institute Academic Fees graded on the basis of how many hours a student is taking.

Connie Baxter is also running for Secretary/Treasurer, but she could not be reached for an interview.

PR Head Defends Radio Ads

Recently, *The Sting* attacked in an editorial the radio campaign being used to promote the school in the weeks prior to Techfest. Jim Thompson, Director of Public Relations, opposed this view and wished that more facts be aired about it.

According to Mr. Thompson, surveys show that, "older high school students and younger college students, in particular, read very little newspaper. They do watch television, but...we can't afford television advertising. They do not read bill-boards, traditionally. But they do listen to radio." Mr. Thompson continued, saying, "when we do any kind of message to the community, we try to target those mediums that reach that age group [interested in attending Southern Tech]."

What's more, according to Mr.
Thompson's figures, calls increased in the admissions office by twenty five to fifty percent during the time

that the advertisements ran.

In response to the popular allegations that the ads make the school seem like a two year or technical college, Mr. Thompson responds that the new ads should have exactly the opposite effect, since many people already think that SCT is still a two year school, if they know that the school exists at all. The advertisements clearly state that Southern Tech is a college in the University System of Georgia offering both graduate and undergraduate degrees.

Mr. Thompson does admit, however, that Southern Tech's advertising campaign last year ran at roughly the same time as the advertising campaign from a prominent technical school, which may have led people to think that SCT's campaign was making the school look "cheap".

At the present time, the Public Relations Department says it only intends to run the advertisements once a year, in the weeks prior to Techfest, due to cost limitations.

Summer quarter.

While some complaints seem hard to justify, there is one complaint that is troubling. Why are AET students having a hard time passing AET 401, Building Design? Initial references stated that out of 14 students taking the class during Winter quarter, only 4 passed. However, inspection of the final grades reveled: 3 failures, 4 D's, and 1 drop. Seven of the 15 students passed with a "C" or better. After receiving a formal complaint, the Design Committee reviewed the grading procedures used by Prof. Sartor and found no problems or differences with the grading techniques used Winter quarter and those used previously. According to one AET senior student, "the 401 designs last quarter sucked."

After seeing the grades from last quarter, it is clear that students are having trouble with the AET 401 class. Another senior AET student

believes that the problem is a result of AET students being taught only the basics of design and not the particulars. Admittedly, the AET program's primary emphasis is on practical applications, not design.

This may be one reason why the AET 401 class is hard for students to pass. Students in the current AET 401 design class were asked for their opinions on the class. According to one student, the class is being taught using a different methodology called "Beaux-Arts." After seeing the current work and progress, it was felt that the designs were exceptional. The grades in the class also seem to be good.

While the architecture program is changing, it is up to students to talk to their advisors or Prof. Kaufman to find out how they will be affected. Also, any current AET student can participate in the five year program as long as the requirements are met.

structure." In response to these comments, David Miles said, "We split the general management into two positions with Barry Birckhead's approval because the amount of work of the general manager was quite a bit." David Miles said that WGHR currently has six paid positions: two general mangers, production manager, operations manager, program director, and music director.

In regard to WGHR's audience level, Noel Page said that WGHR's management was told last year they would have to prove to the Finance Committee that WGHR would be on the air more and that more people were listening before an increase in funds would be granted. In response to this, David Miles said that WGHR would get a petition of off- and oncampus listeners and submit the petition to the SGA meeting on May 15.

When David Miles was asked what would happen to WGHR if the proposed 1991 budget remains at \$6,000, he said, "If it goes through with \$6,000, \$4,000 will go to stipends because we must pay to get people to work for the station, and \$2,000 will be left over for operations." He added, "If any equipment failures occur, it will completely devastate the station, and the station will not be on the air." David Miles suggested that other activities the station supports such a CAB functions, BSA functions, and dormitory cookouts would have to be eliminated.

The Bathtub Race requested a 1991 budget of \$6,060, and the Finance Committee's proposed allocation is \$3,000 which is \$2,600 reduction from 1990. Noel Page said that the reduction in the Bath-

tub Race budget was because there was not enough outside sponsorship to hold two races; therefore, the Finance Committee decided to fund only one race.

For 1991, the Cultural Series requested \$10,000, and the proposed allocation is \$7,500 which is a \$2,500 increase from 1990. Noel Page said, "We (the Finance Committee) decided looking at what the Cultural Series had done this year brought more people to the campus." Noel Page said that the Cultural Series requested an increase in their budget to do more advertising such as using posters instead of fliers.

Also, the Finance Committee chose to allocate significantly less funds than requested by such organizations as the American Insti-

tute of Industrial Engineers, National Society of Black Engineers, Circle K, American Society of Civil Engineers, Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers, and American Society for Quality Control. For 1991, these organizations had requested well over \$1,000. Noel Page said that the Student Activities Fund is not meant to provide the total budget for special interest or departmentalized organizations, and these types of organizations must resort to fund raising mechanisms. He said, "Any amount over \$1,000 is too much money." Noel Page did comment that the International Students did get \$1,250 because they do help the campus with such functions as the International Festival and TechFest.

Nerds Rule! All Night Long! Geeks Rock My Face!

Each time Leonid Fridman walked by Harvard University's Mather House dormitory last fall, he saw a woman sitting at a desk in a ground-floor room, studying. He soon decided he had spotted a perfect member for his new club, the Society of Nerds and Geeks.

"He told me I was the best nerd and I had to join," says the woman, Angela Nahl. "I took it as a compliment. I like studying."

Ms. Nahl, who graduated from Harvard five years ago and is back taking pre-med courses, is now president of the Society of Nerds and Geeks. She says the society has a humorous name but a serious message: promoting the importance of learning for learning's sake.

The club, founded last Fall, is primarily a social organization for people who like to study. Some members call it a "support group for nerds." But the group also has a substantive agenda. It is pressing Harvard administrators to lengthen library hours and provide a late-

night shuttle service from libraries to dormitories. The society's members also want to persuade other students that studying can be fun.

The nerds and geeks say they understand why some find it curious that they have started their first chapter at Harvard, which is considered one of the most academically rigorous institutions in the country. A "Nerd Manifesto," which Mr. Fridman wrote, says: "We are often asked why we start our battle at a prestigious academic institution like Harvard where, it is claimed, we are preaching to the converted. We wish it were so! Sadly, we have to acknowledge that at Harvard antiintellectualism is rampant: Many students are ashamed to admit even to their friends how much they study. At Harvard nerds are ostracized while jocks are idolized.

Already the Society of Nerds and Geeks has spread beyond Harvard to include chapters at Dartmouth College and the University of Richmond. Students at Amherst College, Johns Hopkins University, and Mount Holyoke College are also considering whether to start chap-

ters

The Harvard nerds and geeks admit that their club's name conjures up images of awkward students wearing thick glasses and carrying calculators and slide rules. For the most part, though, that stereotype isn't fair.

The club's 20 members are self assured and wear jeans and T-shirts, just like other college students. The members are both undergraduates and graduate students, and they are majoring in a wide range of subjects, including mathematics, physics, chemistry, architecture, political science, and economics.

The students say they chose to call themselves nerds and geeks because if they had called themselves something else - say, "the Academic Intellectual Club" - other students probably would have referred to them as "those nerds and geeks," anyway.

Most of the members admit that they love to study during their free time, but they do spend time socializing. Some belong to singing groups, while others are on the staff of the student newspaper, *The Har-*

vard Crimson.

Some things do make the society members stand out. They dare to have conversations about political theories and scientific properties over meals in the dining hall. During one of the group's informal gatherings over dinner, Ms. Nahl and another member who is majoring in mathematics talked about computer-science equations so complicated they have not yet been solved.

"It was fascinating," Ms. Nahl says.

The group holds its weekly meetings on Saturday at 6 p.m. - a time when many other students are getting ready to party. For their meetings, the nerds and geeks gather in the Mather House dining hall to watch juggling demonstrations, lis-

ten to poetry readings, and discuss their goals. After the meetings, most of them head back to the library.

The nerds and geeks say their classmates, instead of partying, going to athletic events, and padding their resumes to get high-paying jobs, should pay more attention to learning, teaching, and research.

"We're never going to be able to keep up with the East Asian countries if our society keeps making the captain of the football team and the head cheerleader our heroes," says Mr. Fridman, a doctoral student in mathematics at Harvard. "In East Asian countries, hard work, studying, and intelligence are considered very admirable."

Harvard officials say they

Students, Parents Won't Stand For Large Tuition Increases

Students and their parents during the 1990s may be less willing to pay the double-digit increases many colleges imposed during the 1980s, a higher education consultant predicted in a study of what drove schools to raise their prices during the past decade.

"Consumers were relatively price-insensitive in the '80s," said Arthur Hauptman, who did the study for the American Council on Education and the College Board, "but it won't be necessarily so in the '90s."

Average college tuition and fees at four-year public schools rose from an average of \$636 per year in 1980 to \$1,694 this year.

Atprivate colleges, average tuition fees in 1980 was \$3,466. This year it was \$8,737.

In the study, called "The College Tuition Spiral," Hauptman found many schools drastically raised their tuition to physically improve their campuses, raise faculty salaries and bolster institutional aid to students.

They also felt pressure to increase tuition because enrollments had leveled off, making it harder for schools to "spread their fixed costs over growing numbers of students," the study found.

"I don't necessarily think it was a bad decision" to keep raising prices, Hauptman observed. "Schools were faced with these needs and demands, and they figured they could raise costs." Colleges, he added, didn't have to meet those demands by increasing tuition, however. "They chose to do it."

All the extra spending "didn't

necessarily improve the quality of teaching," he noted.

Hauptman said he didn't think colleges could maintain the practice of raising tuition faster than the general inflation rate without provoking some kind of political backlash. Yet, "it will take a grassroots expression of dissatisfaction for something to change."

A few hints of a developing backlash have arisen in recent weeks.

In Nevada, state legislators ordered University of Nevada officials, who have proposed raising tuition next year 15 percent, to keep their prices reasonable.

Similarly, Virginia's state legislature voted April 19 to withhold state money from any four-year colleges that increases undergraduate tuition by more than 6.5 percent or any two-year schools that approve more than 7.5 percent increase for the 1990-91 school year.

Additionally, students at Pacific Lutheran, Arizona State, Syracuse, and Rutgers universities, and the Universities of Miami, Michigan and Massachusetts have been active in opposing tuition hikes.

Nevertheless, announcements of tuition increases that exceed last year's continued on April 20, when students at Oregon's three public universities learned they will have to pay 9.5 percent more in 1990-91. Four-year state college students will have a 8.5 percent tuition hike.

On April 19, Albert Berry of the Tennessee Higher Education Commission announced Tennessee students' tuition would go up 8.5 percent next school year The commission had raised rates 7 percent for this school year.

There were cooking contests, door prizes, and loads of grocery store coupons. The Pet products exhibit kindly provided large plastic sacks to collect your share of the promotional products.



Plan B are a West Berlin quartet who know what Glastnost is all about. Unlike other new German bands such as Liabach, Plan B's sound has little to do with the Bulkan musical tradition and borrows heavily from the East.

Their U.S. debut on RCA Records entitled The Greenhouse Effect contains a variety of styles including Rythmic Pop, Rockabilly, and Post Punk. 






SGA Screws Up Yet AGAIN!

If life at Southern Tech is just a little inactive, then the SGA Finance Committee is doing all it can to absolutely stompout the last remaining twitches for survival. In their attempt to produce a recommendation for next year's



budget's for student organizations, they have managed to be completely irresponsible to the students of Southern Tech

Many organizations received budget cuts, but the two organizations that were notably delt a bad hand were the Bathtub Racing Association and WGHR, the campus radio station. Being cut by almost 1/2 and 1/3 respectively, both organizations were completely unaware of the SGA Finance Committee's intentions and were unjustly the recipients of a raw deal.

Basing the \$2,600 cut on rumor rather than fact, the Finance Committee came to a random decision that Southern Tech was going to start hosting only one Bathtub Race a year. I call this rumor, because as of this writing, no executive decision has been made on the subject. In fact, Lee Miller, President of the Bathtub Racing Association, was completely unaware of the rumor and the budget cut when I asked him what he thought of the entire affair.

The \$3,000 they alotted to the Bathtub Racing Association will only cover the insurance it takes to hold the event on campus, if that actually is enough money. What about other expenses? Is the Finance Committee also giving the Bathtub Racing Association a magic hat for everything else they'll need? Will the winner of the race be given a pat on the back and an, "Oh well, at least you'll have a few fond memories to remember this great occasion"?

And receiving the biggest budget cut of all of the organizations, WGHR is only getting \$6,000 in comparison to its budget of \$8,675 for 1989-1990. Again, the budget cut in this category was based more on rumor than on fact. But where the SGA Finance Committee got their information is completely unknown.

According to the Finance Committee, WGHR will be off the air for up to 18 months when construction begins on the new Student Center. This *surprised* the WGHR management, considering they are only planning on a maximum of two weeks of down-time, if there is to be any down-time, due to construction of the Student Center. According to the Finance Committee, WGHR spends too much money on management. This



also surprised WGHR management (as it should be to anybody with common sense), because how can WGHR spend too much money in the eyes of the Finance Committee when WGHR spends a total of \$1,200 per quarter on six positions compared to the *Log* which spends \$1,650 per quarter on just two positions.

And according to the Finance Committee, WGHR does not serve the students of Southern Tech. This really surprised the WGHR management, because within the course of the last two weeks, WGHR has given away nearly \$700 in free tickets to concerts at the Lakewood Ampitheatre, Center Stage, and the Masquerade. This does not include the albums given away, the lending of stereo equipment to other organizations, and other miscellaneous tasks carried on by the campus radio station. And considering that WGHR has over 30 people on staff (making it one of the largest Student Activities organizations), 6 staff positions is not "topheavy" in comparison to other organizations that have a total staff of 12 or less.

The SGA Finance Committee also seems to be completely unaware of a lot of other facts about WGHR. Over the past year, WGHR has had to deal with the broadcast console (essential for broadcast) blowing-out twice, renewing an extremely late FCC license (the fault of a previous management), and fixing a broken transmitter. In addition to that, in the past year, the WGHR staff went from around 10 people to its present and growing size of over 30, and the radio station adopted a more acceptable format for music (the play anything the D.J. darn well wants format) to be more receptive to Southern Tech students.

However, even if the Finance Committee knew all the facts and still wanted to cut the budgets of these two organizations, why weren't either one of these organizations even contacted? One would think that if the Bathtub Racing Association were being cut severely, the Finance Committee would at least have asked them, "Well, considering we are planning on cutting your operation by nearly 50 percent, how would this impact your organization?" Obviously the SGA Finance Committee views themselves as all-knowing, all-seeing, and maybe even all-powerful.

The final clincher in this bizarre tale is that while the Finance Committee was happily meandering around with a pair of scissors aimed at the bottom line, they decided to give themselves (the SGA as a whole) a total of a \$600 increase for next year. This would be a \$600 increase for an organization that has close to \$3,700 left over this year and really isn't sure how to spend it. This would also be a \$600 increase for the same organization that has had trouble most of the year finding enough people to come to their own meetings so they could get something done.


What happens when they hire



Finally, I'll go ahead and give


