


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

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State is Now 332 Million Dollars In The Hole

The long-awaited budget cuts have been announced, and Southern Tech is going to feel the blow.

The \$332 million shortfall in the '89-'90 State Budget forced state officials to call for cuts in the '90-'91 allocations. In order to help reduce the state's deficit, the Board of Regents approved Chancellor H. Dean Propst's plan to cut \$31.4 million out of their \$960 million '90-'91 allocation. This cut was divided among all of the schools in the University System of Georgia.

Until recently, it was not known exactly how Southern Tech would be affected. However, to minimize the effect on students and to avoid reductions in faculty and staff, President Cheshier has cut eight percent from each department's operating expenses for the upcoming year.

The eight percent cuts might include "travel, student assistants, and operating supplies and expenses," according to Dr. Ranakumar Nadella, assistant to the President. "For example, if they [were allocated] \$1,000, they lost \$80." It will be up to each department to decide how they will absorb the cuts.

Another concern here at Southem Tech was staff lay-offs. Because of the state's severe budget problems, personnel cuts might have been needed. However, according to Dr. Nadella, "to meet the cut that the Chancellor [of the Board of Regents] asked us to make, we had three vacant faculty positions for which we did not start the search process." These three vacant positions will not be filled this year; instead, the departments affected will be provided with funds to hire parttime teachers to fill these positions.

Looking at the big picture, Southern Tech receives about \$19 million annually from the state for operations. Because of the state's budget problems, Southern Tech is going to have to give back approximately three percent of its allocation for this year.

Included in the original allocation is \$875,000 in a quality improvement fund used to purchase new equipment, computers, books, etc. It was feared that all of these funds would be lost; however, President Cheshier managed to save half of the fund.

Therefore, three percent of the funds to be given back made up of a \$437,500 cut in quality improvements, and a \$150,000 cut in operating expenses from each of the departments on campus. In all, SCT is losing approximately \$600,000 from its '90-'91 allocation from the state.

At this point, these cuts will meet the requirements of the Board of Regents but it is not yet known if further cuts may be necessary. It is possible that when the new Governor and his administration takes office early next year, there could be another round of cuts.

To prepare for this possibility, President Cheshier has set aside \$200,000 of quality-improvement

Another potential problem might have resulted from the expected decline in new student enrollment for fall quarter. However, according to Dr. Nadella, "the number of returning students is likely to increase." Therefore, the decrease in new students should be offset by the increase in returning students.

The deficit in the state's budget has also delayed construction of the \$6.5 million addition to the Southern Tech Student Center. At this point, the project is still up in the air. Eventually, construction will take place, but when the funds will be available is not yet known.

Another victim of the cuts is the Library. Their share of the quality improvement fund, a mere \$75,000, has been eliminated completely, according to John W. Pattillo, director of the library. That means no new books and magazines, and they may even have to eliminate some current subscriptions. The library will also have to "cut ten hours from our weekend schedule," says Pattillo.

Despite all of the problems, "as far as the students are concerned, you should not see any changes around [campus]," stated Dr. Nadella. Although the state's budget problems are severe, most of the cuts involve doing without certain items just for this year.

To compensate for this year's cuts, Chancellor Propst is planning to ask for a thirty percent increase in state funding for the '91-'92 budget. Included in his plan is an eight percent pay increase for faculty mem-

The Baptist Student Center is in the process of being completed. The building will officially open this Thursday. It will provide an oncampus place for many kinds of activities and is located beyond the 300 building.


According to the Baptist Student Union's (BSU) campus minister for Southern Tech, Rev. John Pierce, the building cost approximately a half a million dollars. These funds were provided by the Georgia Baptist Convention, an association of over three thousand churches. These costs include the building itself, the land to put it on, and the furnishings for it.

The building is about 5,400 square feet, and was designed by Jim Fausett from the Architectural department.

The building is mostly one large multi-purpose room that can be divided up by partitions into 4 smaller ooms. This room contains a stage and a piano.

The next room is a full kitchen. According to Wade Leonard, the BSU's campus-minister intern, the kitchen "will be really useful when we have our Tuesday luncheon projects."

The building contains a medium-sized room set aside as a student lounge. It will soon contain couches, bookshelves and a TV.

The building also contains office space and a dorm-type room for Wade Leonard, the BSU's campusminister intern. He graduated from Mercer University in Macon and went on the Southern Seminary. He has completed one year there, and is working here as part of his educa-



Drug Testing Hits Southern Tech

During the 1990 session of the Georgia General Assembly, a large number of anti-drug bills were passed and subsequently signed into law by Gov. Joe Frank Harris. Among these new laws was a law requiring mandatory drug testing of all employees hired on or after July 1, 1990.

The mandatory drug testing affected all state employees including Southern Tech positions ranging anywhere from high administrative jobs to part-time student work. The cost to the school for the drug testing is \$50 a pop.

But the drug testing policy was brought to a halt by a restraining order issued July 20 by Judge Robert H. Hall of the United States District Court in Atlanta. The restraining order was to last until a hearing could be held. Although the hearing was scheduled for August 16, Judge Hall has still not rendered a decision on the law and the restraining order is still in place.

In accordance with the restraining order, Southern Tech is not requiring new employees to undergo drug testing.

The SGA Won't Go Away

For almost two straight quarters the Student Government Association has been a topic of much controversy on campus - so much controversy that an SGA story ran on the front page of *The Sting* for five straight issues.

During the summer, the big SGA debate existed over the muchtroubled SGA elections that took place at the end of Spring Quarter. Jeff Crocker and Connie Baxter ran unopposed for President and Secretary/Treasurer respectively and won. Gary Reuss ran unopposed for Vice President but lost to a 51% write-in vote for Mike Waters, a candidate that was running for a council position.

Surprising as the write-in vote seemed, the elections story would have ended there, but Scott Monahan submitted a protest letter to Vice President of Student Affairs Charles Smith. The letter of protest contested the elections on the grounds that the elections were posted for one date and then moved back. Vice President Smith decided that the problem was a matter for students to handle and forwarded the letter to the SGA Judiciary Cabinet.

On July 30, the SGA Judiciary Cabinet held a hearing and decided that the Spring Quarter SGA elections were flawed because of discrepancies as to whether or not all petitions were received by the deadline, questions as to why some petitioners were omitted from the voting ballot, and misconduct by the elections committee for changing the elections dates from May 25, 28, & 29 to May 28, 29, & 30. Consequently, the SGA Judiciary Cabinet appointed itself SGA elections committee and held new elections August 21 & 22.

The decision reached by the SGA Judiciary Cabinet came under fire. Many people on campus felt the elections set for August 21 & 22 were unfair because they were being held Summer Quarter when most students wouldn't be able to vote because they wouldn't be on campus. Dawn Kyle, president of last year's SGA and chairman of the Spring Quarter SGA Elections Committee, promised to protest the August elections accusing the SGA Judiciary Cabinet of improper investigation of the Spring elections. Other objections came from the leaders of Greek organizations such as Kim Ray, president of the Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity. In addition, the SGA Student Council sent a letter to Vice President Smith and Mike Sims, chairman of the SGA Judiciary Cabinet, asking that the Judiciary Cabinet rehold the hearing because of shoddy investigation procedures.

Despite these protests and a letter sent from Jeff Crocker, SGA President, clearly pointing out two violations of the SGA Constitution by the Judiciary Cabinet, the Judiciary Cabinet held the elections and brought in 108 votes (compared to the 150 votes captured by the Spring elections). The August elections brought no surprise write-ins and only two council position changes.

As of this writing, no protests have been heard concerning the August elections, but Noel Page, chairman of the SGA Internal Affairs Committee, reported to the SGA Student Council four constitutional violations by the SGA Judiciary Cabinet. In addition, the SGA Student Council is now considering a constitutional amendment that will allow the Student Council to impeach members of the Judiciary Cabinet.

Student Center Funds In Jeopardy

After finally securing \$6.5 million for the new addition and renovations of the Student Center from the Georgia legislature, the funds for the Student Center might be lost because the state came up \$332 million short of anticipated income.

Funds for the Student Center must be raised by the selling of bonds. The bonds were to be sold in July allowing for construction to begin in September. Currently, no one knows when the bonds will be sold

Acting on the information that the new Student Center would have construction started on it by the end of the Summer, WGHR ran a new transmitter line, several Greek and other organizations were moved out of their Student Center offices to make room for make-shift counseling center space, and *The Sting* completly destroyed the walls in their office.

Mall Area Renovated

Plant Operations began a two phase renovation of the Mall area at the beginning of Summer Quarter. Phase 1 was the installation of drainage and sidewalks, and Phase 2 consists of additional landscaping and the installation of a new lighting system. Both phases of the construction were planned to be finished by the beginning of Fall Quarter.

According to President Cheshier, the renovations will also include the addition of a permanent marquee and sculpture for the area.

IBM Donates Computers to SCT

Southern Tech received \$350,000 in computing equipment and software from IBM and \$150,000 from the Board of Regents to help in the start-up of a special Computer Integrated Manufacturing (CIM) laboratory. The CIM project will be carried out by an IBM AS/400 minicomputer and an IBM RISC workstation. The Mechanical Engineering Technology, Apparel Engineering Technology, and Industrial Engineering Technology departments will be tied into the AS/ 400 for database purposes. Also, the IET department received 20 to 25 personal computers to help with the CIM project. The computer facility will be housed in the 300 building.

Chesier Institutes No-Smoking Policy

After receiving recommenda-

tions from a Faculty-Senate subcommittee headed by Professor Sally Sage, President Cheshier instituted a campus-wide no-smoking policy that went into effect September 16. According to President Cheshier in a memo issued on August 17, "smoking, or the use of other tobacco products, will not be permitted inside any facility on the Southern Tech campus except in individual residence hall rooms where all parties occupying the room agree to permit smoking."

The recommendations made by the Faculty-Senate subcommittee followed a campus-wide survey that showed most people favored the nosmoking policy.

Plans are being made to offer on-campus seminars on how to quit smoking.

SCT's Financial Aid Not At Risk

Due to the announcement of the failure of the Higher Education Assistance Foundation (HEAF), many thought that loans and financial aid at Southern Tech would be in jeopardy. The failure of HEAF was due to too many defaulted student loans.

But most loans at Southern Tech are not guaranteed by HEAF, according to Ms. Verlene Brown of Southern Tech's Financial Aid office. Loans using HEAF might be switched over to other guarantee agencies. Fortunately, most of the loans made at Southern Tech go through the Georgia Higher Education Assistance Corporation.

Over the summer, Dr. Michael Slavit took over the Southern Tech Counseling Center, and has announced the intention to "raise the visibility of the center among students, to get [the Counseling Center]...recognized as a place where they can get some confidential help with some of their most difficult personal issues." Some of the plans to increase visibility are a series of free seminars for students, and an advice column to appear in this, and subsequent issues of, The Sting. Dr.

Slavit came here from the University of Georgia as a counselling psychologist.

For those students unaware, the Counseling Center is located downstairs in the Student Center, next to the cafeteria, and is available to discuss, free of charge, issues as diverse as academic motivation, test anxiety, substance abuse, eating disorders, stress, and depression.

Dr. Slavit would like to emphasize that there is no reason to be self conscious about visiting the counseling center. To quote, directly, from the brochure they give out, "The choice to enter counseling is a personal one. Some persons feel that to ask for the help of a counselor is an admission of weakness or incompetence. Nothing could be further from the truth. If you're not an automobile mechanic, you probably feel okay about getting help from professional mechanics, who know more about your car than you do. That's their profession. As trained counselors, we can help you gain insight into or control over your thoughts, feelings, or behavior. That's our profession."

The Counseling Center is open Monday through Friday, from 8:00 am to 5:00 am.


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



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Hackman Thrills by More Than a Narrow Margin

Narrow Margin. A suspense thriller starring Gene Hackman and Anne Archer. Written and Directed by Peter Hyams. Produced by Jonathan A. Zimbert. A Carolco Pic-

Narrow Margin is an action thriller of the old school. It gets most of its thrills from tension and barely suppressed violence. This makes it different from most modern action films that are full of flying bullets and exploding planes. Which isn't to say that the movie doesn't have its fair share of violence when appropriate.

When Carol Hunnicut (Anne Archer) is the accidental witness to a top-level mob slaying, she flees to a remote cabin in Canada to escape hit men hired to make sure she never testifies. When L.A. Deputy District Attorney Robert Caulfield

convince her to testify, a chase is begun that stretches from northern Canada to L.A.

Most of the movie takes place on a train. While the suspense thriller on a train is an old idea (Murder on the Orient Express leaps to mind), it is a good one. When the hit men follow Caulfield and Hunnicut onto the train, both groups are trapped on it. The hit men can't just shoot the two of them and leave because there is no way for them to get off the train. But they can kill them just before the train pulls into the station.

Also Caulfield can't arrest the hit men, because he can't prove they have done anything illegal. So he must watch them for an excuse to arrest them while protecting his witness from them. So the two groups chase each other around the train, each seeking a safe way to get rid of the other. The tension buildup is incredible.

Gene Hackman is currently one

Hollywood. The four-time Oscar nominee says he enjoyed playing Caulfield. "I like the idea that he is a lawyer and not necessarily a man of action. He's a guy not uncommonly strong or courageous who is thrust into a position of having to defend this woman and make things safe for her. He and Hunnicut are two characters put into a position of jeopardy who use their wits rather than force."

"I also enjoyed the amount of dialogue in this script. Something like an eight-page scene is fun for actors because you're doing what you've been taught to do. In acting class we're not taught to swing from trains or jump off cliffs."

"Carol Hunnicut could be anyone," Anne Archer says about her role. "She's a woman who has a normal lifestyle, and all of a sudden everything turns very strange and she's in real jeopardy."

James B. Sikking portrays the chief hit man. He is probably best

couldn't come up with anywhere better to have the last big confronta-

New Gene Wilder Flick Very Funny About Love

Funny About Love. A Paramount Pictures Release starring Gene Wilder, Christine Lahti, and Mary Stuart Masterson. Directed by Leonard Nimoy.

The best word to describe Gene Wilder's new movie *Funny About Love* is surprising. It's surprisingly light. It's surprisingly deep. It's surprisingly different from anything Gene Wilder has ever done before. In fact, it's surprisingly good.

I went to this movie expecting

another Young Frankenstein or Blazing Saddles. This movie is completely different. It is very much a "romantic comedy." There is both romance and humor. The unexpected talent of Gene Wilder is to have both in the same scene - even in the same sentence.

Gene Wilder plays Duffy Bergman, a political cartoonist who - in the first thirty seconds - meets his future wife Meg, played by Christine Lahti. They marry and decide to have a baby. Here the real plot starts. Meg REALLY wants to have a baby. Duffy is not so sure. They struggle to conceive and are unable to get Meg pregnant. Meg begins to feel extremely inadequate. The irony is that as Meg begins to concentrate on her career Duffy decides that HE really wants a baby. They eventually break up over the issue

Enter young, spontaneous Daphne Delillo (Mary Stuart Masterson). Duffy meets her at a Delta Gamma Sorority convention where he is the main speaker. In many ways she both simplifies and complicates his life.

This film has an extreme range of emotions. Mostly it is smilingly

humorous but there were many places where I laughed hysterically and one or two where I got a little misty. It shows the film's range that the funniest line is at Duffy's mother's funeral ("She died like she lived." - "Yeah, like Wile E. Coyote."), as is one of the most tearjerking scenes.

The thing that I liked best about the movie was the way that the point was made in each scene - then the action moved on. The embarrassing scenes were over quickly - always a plus.

This is sometimes a drawback, however. The way that the scenes

are fitted together makes it difficult to tell if the time passage has been two days or two years. There were too few clues in the dialogue.

All in all, this is a pretty good movie. One of the funniest moments was not even part of the script. When the opening credits were playing and the name of the director flashed on the screen, the entire theater chanted as one in a hushed voice of awe "LEONARDNIMOY". If you are a Rambo fan, you might not want to see it with your buddies, but it would be an excellent movie for a date. If you think *Roxanne* is a good movie, you'll like this one.





How can I tell if this is becoming a problem?

A: The gap between yours and your boyfriend's formal education may or may not cause problems with, or even cause the end of your relationship. First of all, attending college provides us with FORMAL education, but there are other ways to become educated, sophisticated, and aware. If you want the relationship to last, it will be important for you to share at least some of the same values, and perceptions of the world.

You have asked how you can tell if the formal education gap is becoming a problem. If indeed it becomes a problem, here are two ways you can detect it:

1) If you feel he is falling

behind you in sophistication, you could loose respect and admiration for him. Be aware of your own feelings and behavior. If you feel impatient with him, or find yourself telling him how you believe he should improve himself, then a problem exists.

2) It is possible he may feel good about your education plans, and may not feel at all threatened by them. If he does feel threatened and insecure, the most common way for him to display those feelings would be to treat you with less respect. If you find yourself being criticized, belittled, or "put down" by him, especially in the company of others, then a problem exists.

Remember that the existence of a problem does not necessarily mean a relationship is hopeless. If you can enlist your partner's cooperation in exploring your feelings and talking about the issues, especially with a trained counselor, then you may find that mutual pride and respect can be re-established and the relationship may continue. If not, perhaps you can at least end the relationship with some understanding and not with total bewilderment.

When he is finally arrested by narcotics agents, he finds that his only hope to stay alive is to testify against Paul Cicero and James Conway in order to be placed in the witness protection plan.

This is not a movie with a plot, it is simply a biography of one man's life in the mafia. Because of this, I expected a very serious and frankly, very boring movie. However, the movie seemed to move along quickly and contained quite a bit of comedy (as well as loads of violence). The

film was directed by Martin Scorsese, who directed such films as Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore, The Color of Money, and The Last Temptation of Christ. Scorsese had also directed Robert De Niro in the films Raging Bull and Taxi Driver. In Goodfellas, Scorsese does an excellent job of creating what could be termed as "a mafia atmosphere."

The characters in the film are all well developed and if there was anyone who was ever meant to play the role of a gangster, it's De Niro.

Although the film is a bit long (remember- it covers 30 years of a man's life), I found it to be enjoyable and worth seeing. As an account of mafia life, it is very in depth and realistic.

Akira Kurosawa's Dreams Is an Endless Nightmare.

Akira Kurosawa's Dreams, a Warner Brothers release, starring several people you've probably never heard of, whose names have an approximately even consonant to vowel ratio, and Martin Scorsese. The film was written and directed, surprisingly enough, by Akira Kurosawa.

So now you know what I knew as I went off to see *Dreams*. Akira Kurosawa is famous for his incredibly well made, exceptionally beautifully filmed, and exceptionally violent films. With this in mind, I saw the movie and was exceptionally disappointed.

Dreams is a collection of short films. These films are literally supposed to be Akira Kurosawa's dreams. And let me tell ya, nothing happens quickly in his dreams. Probably why he has 'em in his sleep.

I must admit, the stories are almost all interesting. I found myself debating with some friends about

the deep inner meanings of some of the stories, and I realized looking back that once you sat through it, this was kind of a good film. And as far as good camerawork goes, it was a great film. Kind of like sitting, staring at a great painting that changes very slowly.

But sitting through it was tough. I went to see it at a special press screening, which means only people who get paid to see movies, and their friends were there. You know the kind of people I'm talking about, film critics. People who like anything unusual. And I swear, a third of the audience left.

How can this be, you may ask? Well, let me tell you about one of the shorts, "Blizzard." The first seven minutes were four men walking in a snowstorm. Not talking. Not fighting. Not falling into big holes. Just walking. To tell you the truth, it was more boring than my Uncle Elwood's slideshow tour of Carlsbad Caverns.

But after that, it was almost OK.

In the movie Akira Kurosawa's Dreams, a young Akira Kurosawa encounters Vincent Van Gogh (Martin Scorsese), who asks him, "Wait, can you hear the voices? They're saying, 'Cut off your ear. Wear a bumb hat.'"

The Clean

The Clean's debut single "Tally Ho!", released in 1981 was only the second vinyl outing for the now legendary New Zealand label Flying Nun. Recorded for \$60 in an 8 track home (Dunedin) studio, the nomessing single sailed into the New Zealand Top 20, setting the pace for what was to be a hugely successful but short lived career...or so it seemed to at the time.

The Clean's sales performance was based on an impeccable live credibility which they had been developing since their formation in 1978

The Clean's nucleus was the

Kilgour brothers Hamish and David, on drums and guitar respectively. The first third man was Peter Gatteridge, a most talented musician and songwriter, but a chronically itinerant member (apparently a common trait in their native Dunedin). By the time of The Clean's records came Robert Scott (later of the Bats).

After "Tally Ho" the trio got together with Chris Knox (Tall Dwarfs) and soundman/alternative businessman Doug Hood to record the classic five-song "Boodle Boodle" EP - this time on a four track in a hired hall! The result was magnificent.

The Clean espoused Dunedin eclectism in it's neat form...caught in "Boodle's" sweep are the tremendous and influential electric guitar drones of "Point That Thing Somewhere Else," the hard folk rhythm and mewling chorus of "Billy Two" and the cheerful youth nihilism of "Anything Could Happen."

By the time the next single, "Getting Older" emerged, The Clean were no more. Uncomfortable with the demands implicit in their increasing success, The Clean one day just bailed out before it stopped being fun. Since then four collections have been issued to show still more faces of the band. The tape-only "Oddities" was just that; a bunch of rough early recordings that show a rainbow of influences. "Live Dead Clean" is seven songs from three gigs, highlighted by another great guitar instrumental, "At The Bottom." It gives a peek into how exciting the band could be live. The EP "In-A-Live" released in June 1989 after an impromptu gig at the Fulham Greyhound a year earlier, was even further evidence of this. But while in London last year they couldn't resist nipping into Blackwing Studios and putting down thirteen more thrilling melodic moments which now comprise the LP "Vehicle".

Still displaying their raw - at times even awkward - simplicity, "Vehicle" is a winged assortment of destination unknown journeys. A melodic purity and insistence lends several tracks a near nursery rhyme sing along quality. "Dunes," "Bye Bye," "Big Soft Punch" interspersed with the softer melancholy of "The Blue," "Home," "I Can See" and "Gem." True to the spirit of Clean circa 1981, "We believe the music should be explored." It would seem that The Clean are once more in 1990, as elemental as ever.

Faculty Shortage Spurs Colleges to Mount Raids'

Like a major league baseball team, Emory University in Atlanta is starting this season with a powerful new lineup in its French department. It signed four star free-agent teachers from another university. It lured them with higher salaries and promises of better working conditions.

In North Carolina, Duke University is opening its season with new professors signed in raids of the faculties of Cornell, Johns Hopkins and Princeton universities.

Earlier this year, six of the University of Wisconsin's theatre faculty moved to the University of Delaware.

American campuses, various observers contend, seem to have suddenly entered an era of raiding each others' faculties, and stealing top-notch teachers away with promises of better working conditions and higher salaries.

"It's definitely happening," said Iris Molotsky, of the American Association of University Professors (AAUP), the nation's thirdbiggest faculty union.

"We're seeing it in a number of cases," she said.

Added Elaine El-Khawas of the American Council of Education (ACE), a Washington, D.C., based

group that represents college presidents, "A greater degree of that [schools luring professors away from other institutions] is going on now than five years ago."

In a study released in July, El-Khawas and ACE found that a majority of American campuses - 59 percent of the 364 institutions they surveyed - were having trouble hiring enough professors to teach their classes.

Moreover, 89 percent of the respondents were concerned about how the shortage would effect at least a few departments.

The survey also found that 63 percent of the institutions reported greater difficulty in getting top applicants to accept positions, an increase of 23 percent over 1989.

The reason for the "professor shortage" is that a big crop of senior professors is approaching retirement age. In the meantime, the students who have gone to grad school to get doctoral degrees and prepare to become full professors to replace the retirees instead opted for higher salaries and faster career tracks in private industry.

To get and hold the relatively few professors now entering their prime, schools will need to offer them better salaries and more perquisites, El-Khawas noted.

But El-Khawas says few of the universities have taken any action.

In April, 1990, Georgia's state Board of Regents voted to give a 4 percent salary hike to state college and university professors.

Several other schools say they are considering raises.

Nationwide, faculty salaries rose 6.1 percent, to an average of \$41,650 for 1989-90, Molotsky's AAUP found in its annual survey released in April.

However, when adjusted for inflation, AAUP found that the average salary increased only 1.1 percent, the same as the previous year.

Molotsky thinks it is too soon to say if there really is a shortage, but added "if the faculty shortage happens, raiding could increase."

The stakes can be high.

During the summer, Johns Hopkins University's French department, considered one of the best in the country, lost three professors and a visiting professor to Emory.

The leader of the move south was Josue Harari, the department chairman who first went to Emory as a visiting professor and then decided to stay and head the department.

"The administration at Emory is committed to the idea that the humanities are growing. I've never seen an administration so tuned into the humanities," Harari said. "At Johns Hopkins we were over ex-

tended. It was never a question of salary, it was a question of work conditions," he added.

"There isn't a university today that isn't aware of the professor shortage," Harari concluded. "Some are trying to do preemptive moves, others use corrective moves."

But Johns Hopkins didn't just lose professors. Two-thirds of its French graduate students followed their professors to Emory.

"It was a hard decision to make," said Lance Peterson, a graduate student who made to move to Georgia.

"When you combine the best (professors) of Hopkins with the best of Emory, it's hard to deny the possibilities," said Michael Winston, another grad student who moved.

Johns Hopkins, Winston explained, was initially appealing because it was a small, intimate program, but it proved to be too stifling.

"Smaller can be better ... but there are areas you can't cover if you are too small," Winston noted.

Johns Hopkins officials tried to put the best face on the raid.

"Schools are always coming here (for professors) because we have the best," said Ghita Levine, a spokeswoman at Johns Hopkins. "That doesn't diminish our departments. It adds to theirs."

Wilda Anderson, the new head

of Johns Hopkins' French department, said the school wasn't feeling "the pinch" of the professor shortage.

She said the university wouldn't have any problems replacing the professors who left, adding that they had already hired on a full-time and one part-time professor.

Anderson's ability to find new teachers may be unusual. Nationwide, campuses may have as many as 6,000 professor vacancies by the end of the century, a 1989 study by Princeton University researchers William G. Bowen and Julie Ann Sosa predicted.

Most shortages would be in liberal arts departments, they said.

Stanley Fish, chairman of Duke's English department, which has hired professors away from • Cornell, Johns Hopkins and Princeton, said the shortage already is noticeable.

"It's increasingly obvious that there is more competition between colleges [for professors]," Fish said.

Fish said it has been easier to place Duke Ph.D. earners in jobs at universities, and that bidding between schools for senior professors has increased this year.

The raiding, however, doesn't cause hard feelings between campuses, he added. Wooing professors from one school to another is "regarded as part of the game."

For much of the day of Aug. 13, Concordia College senior Dan Salava was faced with the uneasy prospect of cutting short his college career a year shy of graduation.

That was the day that a Minneapolis bank called TCF Bank, worried that the financial troubles of the Higher Education Assistance Foundation (HEAF) may mean its loans won't be guaranteed, quit the student loan business.

"I was a bit nervous when I first heard," Salava recounted. "I wouldn't be able to go to school if it weren't for loans."

While TCF Bank, reassured, rejoined the loan program the next day, the episode illustrates that many banks around the country may be starting to abandon the student loan business despite government efforts to shore it up.

In July, when the Kansas-based HEAF admitted it was in financial trouble, many bank industry observers began warning that some banks would stop making college loans to students if HEAF was allowed to fail.

Some of their worst fears appear to be on the verge of coming true.

"With each passing day, lenders are becoming increasingly anxious," reported John Dean, special counsel for the Consumer Bankers
Association, which represents banks and credit unions around the country. "Meanwhile, some students are caught in the crossfire."

In Mid-August TCF Bank and the First Bank System, its much larger Minnesota competitor, both temporarily stopped making college loans to students until they got government reassurance that HEAF, which guarantees the banks will be repaid the money it lends, would not leave them unprotected.

• While HEAF guarantees loans in many states, the federal government recognizes it as the primary ¶oan guarantor for banks in the Dis-

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Consequently, banks in those states are the most uneasy, Dean reported, with many opting to try to use one of the other 54 guarantee agencies. In the meantime, students in those areas are most at risk of not getting the Stafford Loan money they have been promised.

The crisis began in July, when HEAF executives told the U.S. Department of Education, which oversees most federal college programs, that HEAF did not have enough cash to reimburse banks when students default on their loans.

When a student fails to repay a loan, the lender turns to a guarantee agency to be reimbursed. The guarantee agency, in turn, gets paid back by the Education Department. But if the guarantee agency's default rate goes above 5 percent, the Education Department pays the agency less than the full amount.

HEAF had been repaying banks for the full amount of the loans students failed to repay, but was getting less than that back from the Education Department.

A \$200 million loan from the government-sponsored Student Loan Marketing Association to HEAF will keep the agency afloat

only into October.

The longer the Education Department takes to come up with a long-term plan to manage HEAF's financial troubles, the more uneasy lenders are becoming, Dean warned. Many might simply get out of the program altogether.

"We're waiting on the department to come up with a resolution," Dean said.

"At this point," added Diane Borchardt, financial aid director at Concordia in Minnesota, "it's more of a status quo with a little bit of nervousness."

For now, students should still be able to secure loans, Dean said.

"They may have to make changes in their loan arrangements, but the money is still available."

Meanwhile, the United States Student Association (USSA), a Washington, D.C.-based group that represents student governments, blamed President Bush for the crisis.

"On the heels of a debacle as large as the S&L crisis, making low-income students scapegoats is shameful," USSA President Julius Davis said.

USSA argues the federal government is to blame for forcing students to rely more on loans and less on grants.

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Spring Job Market Not Bad

Despite dire predictions of a lackluster job market, corporate America recruited this year's college graduates as actively as it did last year's grads, a new report contends.

The class of 1990 also tended to get higher starting salaries than the class of 1989.

In a July poll by the College Placement Council, a Bethlehem, Pennsyslvania, based group, campus placement officers across the country reported that graduates in engineering, nursing and business were still being heavily recruited and receiving substantially higher starting salaries than they received last year.

A December, 1989, Michigan State University survey found major corporations planned to hire 13.3 percent fewer grads in 1990.

"They (MSU) didn't take into account the hot spots like nursing and engineering," said Dawn Oberman, a statistical services specialist with the College Placement Council.

"Things are not as bad as they made it sound."

MSU officials, however, stood by their predictions.

"From our indications, our predictions are accurate," said Patrick Sheetz, author of MSU's survey. "13.3 percent may even have been optimistic," he added.

"These may be pockets (of opportunity), but I sure would like to know where they are so I can send our grads there."

Others sided with the College Placement Council.

"We seemed to have a pretty good year," agreed Lynn Compton, assistant director for career planning and placement at Southwest Missouri State University.

Chris Miller, assistant director of the placement office at the University of Redlands in California, said even liberal arts majors are finding jobs.

"Those who are wholeheartedly pursuing jobs are finding them," Miller said.

"They seem to be pretty pleased with the salaries they were able to get," he added.

One Redlands business school graduate will be earning \$36,000 a year with Southern California Edison "but that's the exception," Miller reported.

Miller said \$22,000 to \$25,000 was the typical starting salary.

However the picture may not always look this rosy.

"Right now there are fewer graduates in hot areas," Oberman said. "In a few years, things may change."

Though hazing has been eliminated from many fraternities, here ASU pledges are forced to endure a 48 hour marathon Bingo match.

Non-pledging Frats Do OK ·

One year after Zeta Beta Tau

became the first fraternity to ban pledging, officials report that the ban has slowed hazing at its chapters nationwide, and that it hasn't hurt membership efforts at all.

In fact, ZBT recruited 17.3 percent more students last year - the first period in which it had dropped pledging activities - than in 1988-89, ZBT national Vice President Ronald Taylor reported at the fraternity's national convention in early August.

"We did just the right thing," Taylor declared.

Just days after ZBT announced in August, 1989, that it was abandoning pledging, Tau Kappa Epsilon said its chapters would adopt gradual steps to end pledging by fall,

Both announcements were made in hopes of ending hazing rituals that often occur during the pledging period.

Last February, eight more greek organizations announced bans on all pledging activities except initiation ceremonies.

ZBT's abandonment of pledging hasn't been easy.

"In theory it's good, but it's really hard to make a switch over like this," complained a ZBT, who didn't want his name or his school revealed.

"It hasn't hurt our rush one bit," he continued, "but it's not something we advertise during rush. We don't advertise that we're different from the rest."

All but about 15 percent of the TKE chapters "have taken some steps toward implementing" the non-pledge program, reported Charles Trabold, TKE's director of chapter services. "There's been no negative impact," he maintained. "If anything, it's been positive."

Despite the move to end pledging, hazing incidents continue to be reported.

Students at four colleges were diciplined for hazing last term.

More than 40 students have died in the past decade due to hazing.

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· Police Say Violent Acts Increasing On Campuses

While the murders of five college students within three days in Gainesville, Fla., the last week in August were unusual, crime watchers say murder is a more common crime on campuses nationwide than most people think.

Hard statistics are hard to find, but crime observers say they've been surprised by the results of several recent studies of the problem.

"The rate of victimization is higher than anyone had known," says Jan Sherrill of the Campus Violence Prevention Center, based at Maryland's Townson State University.

Though people have not been studying the phenomenon for long, some statistics seem to "show an increase" in murders and other violent crime at colleges across the country, added Clarinda Raymond, Shirrill's colleague at Townson.

Moreover, Raymond said, the murderers are often other students. "I guess we cannot rule out that the

Florida murders were committed by a student," Raymond said.

On Sept. 1, police arrested Edward Lewis Humphrey, 18, a University of Florida (UF) freshman, for questioning in the case. Police added that they might have other suspects in the off-campus murders of three UF and two Santa Fe Community College students.

Police found the bodies of 17year-old Christina Powell and her roommate, 18-year-old Sonja Larson, in their apartment Aug. 26. Both were UF freshmen. Both were partially nude, and had been stabbed.

Eight hours later police found the stabbed, decapitated body of Christa Leigh Hoyt, a Santh Fe student, at her apartment.

The next day, Aug. 28, Santa Fe student Tracey Inez Paules, 23, and her roommate, UF senior Manuel Ricardo Toboada, 23, were found stabbed to death.

The brutality and timing of the killings prompted widespread student panic on the UF campus. Many apparently left home just as classes were starting. Some who stayed

held large slumber parties for protection. Still others bought weap-

They could find weapons readily advertised in the independent Florida Alligator, the campus paper, which suddenly found itself with an influx of ads for mace, tear gas and stun guns, said an Alligator ad rep, who did't want her name used.

Some campus leaders nevertheless said UF is a relatively safe place. "Ithink security on campus is incredible," said Michael Browne, UF's student body president. "Campus crime has been down."

Multiple slayings are in fact rare at colleges. The most notable instance occurred in December, 1989, when a gunman killed 14 female students and wounded another 13 people at the University of Montreal.

Some 1,990 violent crimes were committed on campuses in 1988, the most recent FBI census of crime in America found. While the FBI report is notoriously misleading, the number probably did not represent all the violent crimes because colleges are not required to

report them.

In January, 1990, Raymond's group released a survey showing that 36 percent of the nation's students had been victims of violent crimes

Yet students typically don't think of their campuses as dangerous.

"They naturally want to believe it's a safe place," noted Jeanne Morrow, housing director at the University of Illinois at Champaign - Urbana, where a student was murdered in her off-campus apartment in mid-August.

Montana State, Ball State, St. John's, Louisiana State, Northeastern, Wesleyan and Oklahoma State universities, the University of California at Berkley, and Ithica, Stephens, Hunter and Carroll colleges, among others, have been the scenes of violent crimes recently.

Another reason students may be shocked to hear of violent crimes on their campuses is that schools mislead them, Morrow added.

"It is constantly reinforced (to students) what a friendly, warm environment the campus is," she said.

Students, moreover, may not know about campus crimes because their campus newspapers don't report them.

Campuses, worried about the school's image and protecting victim's privacy, often refuse the reveal campus crimes to reporters.

Editors at Southwest Missouri State, West Virginia, Oakland and Southern Arkansas universities have sued during the past year to force administrators to give them information about crime in their communities.

Whatever the reasons for the false sense of security, students often inadvertently contribute to the campus crime rate by leaving doors unlocked or taking ill-advised night-time walks around campus alone.

"It's important to make students realize that propping open a door could endanger other students," Raymond said, adding that administrators also are often lax about preventing crime. "Schools must realize that more important than hiring Dr. Wonderful is to provide as safe a campus as possible."

Campuses Expecting International Student Tensions to Increase

Hoping to avoid fights and violence between Middle Eastern and American collegians here at home, Iowa State University (ISU) said it would set up a forum to let students vent their emotions about the United States' confrontation with Iraq peacefully.

"Human nature being what it is, there will be patriotic overtures on both sides," said Tom thielen, ISU's vice president for student affairs. "We're not looking for anything of a severe nature, but we think things will happen."

Ohio State University officials are also braced.

"It is inevitable that there will be some problems of harassment towards the Middle Eastern students," said John Greisberger, program director for International Students and Scholars.

It's happened before.

In the 1970's, before Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi was ousted by the Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's revolution, supporters and opponents of the Shah regularly battled, often violently, on U.S. campuses.

After Khomini took power and seized 52 american embassy employees in Teheran as hostages in November, 1979, anit-Iranian demonstrations rocked American Campuses. Pro - Khomeini Iranians also held rallies, which were often disrupted by American Students.


But Bill Carroll of the National Association for Forign student Affairs, based in Washington, D.C., doesn't anticipate much fighting among Middle Eastern and American students on U.S. campuses during this round of tension, mostly because of the difference in population.

In the late 1970s, more than 50,000 Iranian students from oil producing countries still made up more than a third of all forign students registered here.

"It's not like in 1980, when we had a large group of Iranian students," Carroll said.

Based on figures from the New York - based Institute of International Education, 770 Iraqi students were inrolled on American campuses in 1989-90. The number of Kuwaiti students was 2,280.

Dear Library Users:


Much has been written lately about Georgia's anticipated revenue short fall - estimated to be between three and five million dollars, depending upon whose estimate you accept.

The gym offers a weight room (admittedly small), two indoor volleyball courts, and two lighted tennis courts. Everything is free.



The new program includes options in project management and contract administration, CAD and information management, and land development and planning. Other degrees are in the pipeline and are expected to receive approval soon.

We hope to start construction this academic year on our new student center, an outdoor recreational complex, and perhaps even a new dormitory and an indoor recreational center (subject to Regents' approval and some funding strategies now being explored).

In all, this is a wonderful time to be a student at Southern Tech. Your college days are extremely important, and I encourage you to apply yourself to the fullest. The educational opportunity provided here is second to none, and Southern Tech enjoys an outstanding national reputation. The future will belong to those who are prepared in the various technological fields and tremendous shortages for these graduates are predicted in the years ahead. DON'T catch a social disease. What else need I say?



The student will receive treatment and Southern Tech will be billed for the services. Southern Tech will be responsible for the first \$100 per student per year. Any additional charges are the responsibility of the student. The college will maintain records of these charges and the student is expected to settle his or her account with the college each quarter. A student's registration will be cancelled if these charges are not paid on time.



3. Other Reductions. In addition to those cuts mentioned above, there are others affecting internal operations, less visible to you the end-consumer, but affecting you none the less.

Within the parameters we are forced to adopt this year, we will continue to work toward giving you the best possible service. We ask your cooperation and understanding during this period of financial difficulty.

by the fact of the type of risks which are ACCEPTABLE, vs. those risks which are deemed UNACCEPT-ABLE. Mr. Holz, in his article in our liberal daily which passes as a newspaper in this town stated that about 150,000 people died each year due to smoking related illnesses, and also stated that there are about 55,000,000 smokers in the U.S. If those numbers are correct, then the RISK of death from smoking is 1 part in 366.7 Than means that approximately 0.27% of the SMOK-ERS die each year. Additionally, last year, the Surgeon General hooted about 3,300 alleged deaths due to "passive smoke" in this country last year. Not to mention the noxious gasses everyone has to breathe in the traffic jams to exercise our right to waste as much oil and energy we please. So, all the smokers at Southern Tech, including myself, will be outside with our coffee and cigarettes. The rules is the rules! And, like in high school so many years ago, "Hey, Scott, keep an eye out in the hall and let us know when the Vice Principal comes, OK?!?!?"




