Controversy Surrounds Firing of V.P. J.R. Robertson

On the morning of Friday, October 26, President Cheshier fired Southern Tech's Vice President of Business and Finance, J. R. Robertson. Mr. Robertson had been with the school for twelve years, and had been with the University System of Georgia for twenty-three years (not the twenty-five reported earlier in *The Sting*).

When Pres. Cheshier initially announced the termination, he cited only differences in "management style." However, since that time, facts have come to light about sexual harassment allegations against Mr. Robertson.

Whether charges are being pressed at this time is unknown. When asked if the termination was due to the allegations, Pres. Cheshier stated that, "It was a factor, it wasn't the reason." Pres. Cheshier continued to state that, "it was certainly a factor that I was displeased with."

In response to a query about the differences in management style that led to Robertson's dismissal, the president said that he and J.R. "had had differences in the management of his area for some years."

Mr. Robertson's area included the entire financial dealings of the school, Physical Plant, and Campus Safety.

Differences cited by the President were the general dissatisfaction of the faculty senate with the cleanliness of many of the buildings, and the occasional sloppiness of the grounds. The President stated that he had numerous conversations with Mr. Robertson about these topics. However, he went on to add that Mr. Brown, the physical plant director, has not had total flexibility in some regards, and that a lot of positive things had been done by Physical Plant, including awards for beautification and overall management.

The only other allegation that the President was "comfortable discussing" was that at times, "he [J.R.] was not attuned to legitimate student concerns as he could have been.... The area of customer service could have been better."

In conclusion Cheshier stated that "it was a series of things that finally came to a head. I finally said 'enough."

However, Mr. Robertson may not be gone for good. He has about a month to appeal President Cheshier's decision to the Board of Regents. But the president stated that as of Thursday, November 8, he did not know that any appeal had been submitted.

Mr. Robertson's duties are currently being carried out by Dan Youngblood, Robertson's assistant, and Sam Baker, assistant to the President.

If Mr. Robertson is permanently replaced, Regents regulations require that the job be advertised nationally, and that a permanent replacement is unlikely to be settled on before the end of next winter quarter.

38 Residents of Howell Fined to Punish 1 Vandal

A malicious vandal with a strange fetish for bathroom-stall partitions has struck the Southern
Tech dorms once again. This fourth serial-type attack of the hardware in the west-end restroom of the third
floor of Howell Hall had a different outcome - a \$5.35 fine for 38 residents of the affected area.

The latest spree of commodedoor mischief started October 12 with a single door being damaged. The next day two more doors lay in the wake of the notorious hinge buster. A third attempt on an unsuspecting door November 5 was unsuccessful. The loosened hinges were quickly adjusted by skilled Plant Operations personnel before irrevocable damage to the equipment could occur.

The Housing department has repaired doors three times without charging the residents since the bathrooms were renovated in the Summer of 1988. This latest incident, however, found the Director of Housing, Ed Klien, asking the administration for permission to

charge the students.

This was supposed to increase the residents' awareness of their part in maintaining and protecting their resident halls from this perpetrator.

The students in the area of the stall door attacks were given the ultimatum of finding the guilty party or paying for the damages. When the culprit(s) did not turn up the residents on the west-end of the floor were fined. Students who did not pay by last Friday faced the hassle of having their records frozen.

Six students arrived at the business office just before lunch on November 8 to pay their fines - in pennies. One student had paid his portion the day before with 20 quarters, two dimes and three nickels.

Outside of the business office, Kevin Baker, one of the dorm residents fined, said the penny pay off was, "a protest against us having to pay for something we didn't do, and that we in the dorms don't take lightly to paying for someone else's mischief." Vincent Miller added that, "Most of the students being fined go home on the weekend."

"I hope we teach them a lesson [by paying in pennies]," said Greg Esther, adding, "it's not fair to pay for something we didn't do. There

was no investigation. We just got a bill saying we have to pay by the ninth or our records will be frozen."

The Sting has learned of an unnamend philanthropist's offer of

a 535 penny reward for information leading to the conviction of the bathroom vandal.



SGA Seeks Permanent Judiciary Chairman

The Student Government Association is now looking for someone to fill the position of Judiciary Chairman. Currently, Michael Sims is the acting Judiciary Chairman. Jeff Crocker, president of SGA, is trying to establish him as the Judicial Chairman for the remainder of the quarter because he is pleased with Sims' performance.

Crocker says Sims has, "been it [Judicial Chairman] in the past and he knows the job." However, for Sims to get the job he must receive 75 percent of the votes from the Student Council, but Sims fell short of this during a nomination vote on October 23.

According to Crocker, finding the right person for the office is not easy. He admits, "We are having a hard time coming up with people who are willing to do the job." However, he says that he already has someone in mind to replace Sims.

The Judiciary Chairman of the SGA presides over the Judiciary committee, which holds hearings of students who appeal some type of disciplinary actions against them. Most of these appeals are for parking violations and fines. The committee occasionally works with the staff and administration in handling more serious offenses such as cheating, plagiarism, and other forms of academic dishonesty. The Chairman serves as the head of the justices and insures that the committee is functioning properly.

To be a Judiciary Chairman, one must show a desire to work with students and the faculty, must know all of the rules and regulations of the school, and be able to spend time with the SGA. According to the Student Government Constitution, the Chairman must have a GPA of

Generally, a Judiciary Chairman serves for about a year; however, if the president feels that it is time to get a new Chairman, then he can nominate one to the council, and the council can vote him in by 75 percent of the entire council, not just the ones who are present for the meet-

One possible candidate for the position is Gary Reuss. He says that he is interested in being the Chairman. He believes that decisions as to how the cabinet is run should be voted on by the cabinet not dictated by the Chairman.

Reuss explains that under the current schedule, the student council meets on alternate Tuesdays and the judiciary cabinet meets on the Tuesdays in-between. This way, there will be the same number of judiciary cabinet meetings as there are student council meetings. He explains that this is important because members of the judiciary cabinet can attend student council meetings and vice-versa.

Reuss explains that if he is made the Judicial Chairman, he would keep this schedule and perhaps even seems to amend the SGA constitution to maintain this schedule.

After a brief chat with Michael Sims concerning his standing as the acting Chairman, he comments, "I have absolutely no comment to make for The Sting."

would have made the whole dorm pay for the damages, then I'd pay for it normally [no pennies], because everyone in that dorm could be responsible." Vincent Miller doesn't believe the cost, around \$217.00, is "right for the cost of two or three hinges," adding "they're not made of gold."

The group doesn't feel they should pay for the materials until they are procured. Sorensen said that if the penny pay off didn't work the group was going to ask to see the invoices for the hinges. They don't feel they should really have to pay for the hinges until they are actually purchased.

According to Larry Welch from Plant Operations, "The cost for replacing these partitions includes the hinges and labor for replacement." He also said, "Hinges were ordered to reinstall in the doors and were received several days before the students were billed for the damages. However they found the hinges were not the correct thickness to secure the doors so the hinges had to be returned to the supplier for an exchange."

When the number of man hours used for locating a supplier, ordering, exchanging and installing are totaled, the rate of pay per hour does not exceed \$5.00 an hour. Plant Operations believes the \$217.10 charge is a very fair price for material and labor.

"A copy of the departmental


request to purchase the hinges will be in the Housing Office next week for students to review," according to Glenda Shipp, Section Supervisor of the Housing department.

When Duane Newman stepped up to the pay window with his invoice and bag of pennies, Pam Grunke, the teller, simply asked him, "you have your money rolled, is that right?"

The Business Office Manager, Nancy Breeding, was quickly called in to explain coin collection policies as stipulated by their bank. She told the students, the people "who you should be upset with are the yo-yos that destroyed the property. I agree • with you and I think whoever destroved the property should be the one to pay for it," adding that "as a form of protest you are not getting to the people you want to get to."

The penny wielding conglomerate of students then marched to the Housing Office looking for the director. He is out of town this week but his secretary booked a 11:00 am meeting for Tuesday November 13 between the students and Mr. Klien to hopefully resolve this difference of opinion.

The students have said they will install the replacement hinges • themselves to keep the cost down but are still upset with the handling of this incident. "They keep telling • us we're adults," said Miller, "and then they come out and treat us like children."

The National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE) is an organiza-

tion which is designed to serve as a mechanism to help students make the transition to corporate America through networking with corporations according to Julius Abraham, vice president of the Southern Tech NSBE chapter. NSBE was chartered at Southern College of Technology (SCT) in 1987. The chapter at SCT has grown from 23 members in 1987 to 51 members in 1990.

The organization has 6000 members nationwide. Southern Tech is located in Region 3. This region consists of six southeastern states. Southern Tech is the youngest chapter in the region.

Last year during the National Conference in Florida, Southern Tech's chapter was voted the most improved chapter in the region. During the second year at SCT, two students, Marvin Dickerson and Kyra Winn, held positions on the Regional Executive Board. The immediate involvement of these students showed that the chapter at SCT was going to have an impact within the region.

NSBE encourages ALL of SCT's students to take advantage of the opportunities NSBE offers. In addition to the Career Fair NSBE offers a monthly Resumé Workshop which is open to the entire student body.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the Resumé Work shop which will be offered November 13 and 15. The instructor of this workshop will be Ms. Robin Brown, human research representative from Northern Telecom.

NSBE attends many confer-





· More Collegians Speak Out About Military Buildup



One of the first campus Middle East demonstrations was at the University of Illinois in September. Rallies at 16 cities on October 20 attracted some more students to the issue. Dull picture caption, eh?

A substantial number of college students ended two months of seeming silence about the military buildup in the Middle East by joining - and helping to organize - October 20 protests in 16 different cities.

The rallies were in part organized by the Hampshire College Gulf Crisis Action Group, which sent facsimile messages to campus peace groups around the nation to coach them to generate big turnouts.

Anti-war marches ultimately drew anywhere from 125 people in Washington, D.C., to 5,000 in New York City. Students also rallied in Atlanta, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Houston, among other places.

Organizers said they were

pleased with the turnout and hoped the efforts would get college students and communities involved in a "dialogue" about the U.S. involvement in the Middle East, said Erik Havlick, one of the Hampshire students who mounted the fax campaign.

Students and community members with "all different views" participated, Havlick said.

"We don't want U.S. troops to play a primary role" in the conflict, Havlick maintained.

Other students had different reasons for protesting.

Alexandria De Montrichard, a student at Mount Holyoke who was one of about 800 protesters in Boston, said she wanted Americans to have a more objective view of the crisis.

"I think there's been a one-sided view of possibilities" to end the Middle East crisis, De Montrichard said.

U.S. forces were sent to Saudi Arabia after Iraq invaded Kuwait on August 2.

Many of the 250,000 soldiers sent by President Bush have been college students who were helping to pay for school by joining the military reserves.

However, student reaction at home has been strangely quiet, unlike past conflicts in Vietnam or Central America.

While national polls show that 18-29 year-olds are the most critical of any age group of the U.S.'s handling of the situation, there have been only isolated protests on a few campuses.

The biggest anti-war turn-outs thus far have been at the Universities of Illinois-Champaign, California at Berkeley, Minnesota and Colorado at Boulder and George Mason University.

Havlick maintained that more students would assume the traditional college opposition to most military activities if they knew more about the situation.

"We're not getting any kind of history or background" about the Middle East from the media, Havlick complained.

Havlick started the Hampshire College Gulf Crisis Action Group to help students at his school get more information on the conflict. He hopes that students at other schools will also take a stand.

"I hope that any student who's involved in any sort of social improvement" will fight for a peaceful solution in the Middle East, Havlick said.

However, Michael Beneville, another Hampshire student, was more optimistic about student activism.

Beneville predicted the student movement will increase dramatically, especially if there is fighting.

"They ain't seen nothing yet," he claimed.

There are some indications that college students and administrators are becoming more politically ac-

ive.

Students at the universities of Akron (Ohio), Denver, Alabama and Arizona, as well as Kansas State, American and Tufts universities held a "Free Kuwait Day" on September 24 to call for Iraq's withdrawal from Kuwait.

In a throwback to the 1960s, students at Harvard University held a pre-protest teach-in on October 19.

And an aide to Senator Terry Sanford of North Carolina in early October speculated the Persian Gulf crisis had helped wreck the budget at North Carolina State University, where 300 fewer people than expected registered for this term.

The aide, who asked not to be named, said many of the 300 noshows had been called to active military duty in Saudi Arabia just before school started.

Whatever the reason for the lower enrollment, N.C. State has been forced to lay off staff members, cancel scores of classes and decrease the number of hours its libraries are open to help it save money.

Less drastically, Purdue, Iowa State and Middle Tennessee State universities, along with Robert Morris (Penn.) and Metro State (Colo.) colleges have all announced tuition refund policies for students and faculty who might be called to the Middle East to fight.

Campuses Deal With Cover-ups

While students and officials at two campuses traded accusations of crime cover-ups and sensationalist reporting, Congress moved one step closer Oct. 18 to approving a law to require schools to publish their crime statistics.

A joint House and Senate committee came up with a compromise "right to know" bill.

The bill, which now must be approved by both houses before it goes to President Bush for approval, will require administrators to make campus graduation rates and crime statistics public.

Such a law won't come a minute too soon at Shepard College in West Virginia or at the State University of New York at Buffalo, where a student was raped and killed Sept. 29 in an area where two other students had been similarly assaulted.

At Shepard, college President Michael Riccards accused editors of *The Picket*, the student paper, of creating "a climate of fear and suspicion on this campus" by publishing an issue focusing on an increase in school crime.

The Picket's October issue included reports of rape, assault, and the alleged hazing of freshmen by members of the football team.

An editorial co-written by editor Steve Rosa noted rises in gay-bashing, racial tension, and hazing on campus, and bemoaned the lack of thorough campus crime reports.

"In some respects, our little corner of the world is even more dangerous than a city," Rosa wrote.

But the articles, Riccards wrote in an open letter two days after the paper came out, "have created a sense of anxiety on campus among students and employees; those articles are also a mixture of fact, rumor, falsehood, and innuendo."

"There is no crime wave on this campus," Riccards declared in the letter.

SUNY-Buffalo administrators made a similar claim in defending their role in publicizing - or not publicizing - three crimes that technically occurred off campus.


Buffalo sophomore Linda Yalem's raped, gagged, and strangled body was found by police near a recreation path about a quarter of a mile from campus. Four months earlier, a woman - a nonstudent - was attacked and raped in about the same area.

In August, 1989, a junior high school girl was attacked and raped in the same area in the same way as

Playboy Begins Search of Women's Colleges

Claiming it's bowing to student pressure, Playboy magazine has started asking students at women's colleges to pose in various states of undress for a spring pictorial.

The magazine, which often trolls campuses for willing models, decided to recruit at women's colleges this year in response to alleged requests from students who felt "left out" because Playboy had never hired women from their schools, said Elizabeth Norris, a Playboy spokeswoman.

Norris, however, would not name the people who made the unusual requests.

She said she did not know if the students who called were male or female

Regardless of who called, Playboy editors also wanted to investigate the "myth" that students at women's colleges are all feminists with short hair, Norris added.

"The response has been fabulous," Norris said.

Some women's college students have a hard time believing her.

"The attitude here is varying degrees of disapproval," said Melissa Dile, president of the Associated Students of Mills College, a women's college in Oakland, Cali-

fornia

"They're trying to capitalize on the publicity of last spring" when Mills students protested to keep administrators from admitting men to the college, Dile maintained.

In mid-October, Playboy sent a crew to Boston for a week of photographing students and alumni at schools that are all-female or have recently gone coed including Elms, Emmanuel, Mount Holyoke, Pine Manor, Regis, Simmons, Smith, Wellesley, Eheaton and Wheelock colleges.

"I think it's important that the public knows that we (students at Mount Holyoke) don't want to be represented like this," said Heather Merrill, a Mount Holyoke senior who helped plan an anti-Playboy petition drive and a picketing of Playboy's Chicago offices.

Norris said that, despite the "fabulous" response, campus protests have "scarred" some students into not keeping appointments for interviews they had made with Playboy.

"It's not fair that they're (the protesting students) not giving their sisters the freedom to do what they want," Norris said.

Tess Resman, vice president of the Student Government Association at Smith College, said students there "believe every woman has the right to do what she wants with her own body."

However, she said, they object to having Smith's name attached to a playmate.

"I think it will be hard" for a student from Mount Holyoke to pose for Playboy, Merrill added.

"I know many students would have a difficult time understanding why she would want to do something like that."

Playboy claims that it already has convinced one women's college alumna, a 1986 graduate of Mills named Heidi Ellis, to pose.

Dile said she and other Mills students cannot find any mention of Ellis in school records.


"It's kind of strange that no one remembers her," Dile said, although models do sometimes adopt fake names when they appear in the magazine.

The controversy is similar to the protests and anger that have greeted Playboy, whose corporate public relations specialists transform them into free publicity, on its recruiting forays onto campuses each

In September, University of California at Santa Barbara students held a small protest of Playboy hiring UCSB women for a "Women of the Big West" feature in the October issue.

In March, the presidents of Athletic Coast Conference schools-including Duke, Maryland, Virginia, Georgia Tech, Clemson, Wake Forrest, North Carolina, and North Carolina State universities - sent a letter charging Playboy was "exploiting our universities" in a group of photos titled "Women of the ACC."

the other two victims.

"Linda was very meticulous and she would have found out if the information was there for her," asserted Ann Yalem, the most recent victim's sister, in blaming Buffalo administrators for not warning students of the danger. "She didn't know, and would not have run there if she knew."

The 1986 murder of Lehigh University student Jeanne Clery led her parents, Howard and Connie Clery, to pressure Congress to require colleges to let students know of crime danger, if only to give them a fair chance of taking adequate precautions.

In mid-October, the Student Press Law Center in Washington, D.C., set up a "Campus Crime Hotline" to help editors pry crime reports from reluctant administrators.

Redd Kross: The Band, Not The World Help Organization

Influenced by the Ramones and the Osmond Brothers, Redd Kross describes themselves as a refreshingly intelligent, highly original trio which also draws inspiration from from the likes of MacKenzie Phillips, Linda Blair, and Hollywood tabloids.

Formed 12 years ago in Los Angeles by brothers Jeffrey and Steven McDonald, Redd Kross began life as a pure punk outfit with a difference: an 11-year-old bass player. Shockingly adept at working with producers, managers, booking agents and other industry types, the brothers McDonald landed gigs all over the L.A. area, and embarked on a recording career at an astonishingly young age.

In 1979, Redd Kross recorded their first EP, a six-song independent release. 1981 saw the release of their classic debut album, Born Innocent. In 1984, the band began work on their much-heralded tribute to their rock'n'roll icons, Teen Babies From Monsanto.

Coinciding with the release of *TeenBabies*, Redd Kross found their missing link with the addition of the incredible Robert Hecker. The band's line-up had, at various times, included Black Flag's Ron Reyes, Circle Jerk Greg Hetson, and pre-Bangle Vicky Peterson on guitar. It was the 1988 album *Neurotica* (produced by ex-Ramone Tommy Erdelyi) that brought the band widespread fame, and gave fans the opportunity to hear Hecker grace an entire Redd Kross album.

A self-described "musician

geek guy," Hecker started playing guitar at the age of nine, working at his craft until his fingers would literally bleed. At times, he still locks himself in his room for days, practicing terror chops until he feels that he has achieved "adequate bad guitar." In truth, Hecker's playing is well beyond adequate - it is, indeed, nothing short of sensational.

Redd Kross's love of The Beatles is evident on their Atlantic Records debut, *Third Eye*, their first major label release. Combining seamless harmonies with punk edges, a lacing of psychedelia, beautifully crafted melodies, and an intelligent hint of humor, *Third Eye* is a visionary album. All of the tracks on the album were written by band members, working either alone or in various combinations.

The mood of *Third Eye* ranges from the inspiration "Where I Am Today" to the sincere tribute of "Bubblegum Factory." Other outstanding cuts include "I Don't Know How to Be Your Friend," a straightforward and moving look at love lost, "Shonen Knife," inspired by the band of the same name, the truly moving "Love Is Not Love," and the rocking, yet tragically beautiful first single, "Annie's Gone."

The album also features the track "1976," written for the upcoming feature film, "Spirit of '76," starring David Cassidy, as well as Jeffrey and Steven McDonald. One of the high points of the moviemaking experience for them was having the chance to quiz Cassidy on "Partridge Family" trivia. Example: Did Tracey (Susan Crough)

Mr. & Mrs. Bridge. A Drama starring Paul Newman and Joanne Woodward. Directed by James Ivory. Based on two novels by American author Evan S. Connell. A Miramax release. 127 minutes.

Mr. and Mrs. Bridge follows the course of an American upper class family in Kansas City during the 1930s and '40s.

First off, the film is pretty good. During the movie I kept waiting for some momentum. When I finally realized there was no climax, it became more enjoyable. The film was pleasantly slow, driven with the minor difficulties and intiricacies of a family with growing children.

Mr. Bridge, portrayed by Paul Newman is an attorney, a husband and a father to three growing children. With a grandfatherly appearance, Walter Bridge seems subtley arrogant, always set in his ways and opinions.

At times, he seems more concerned with his business and political views than with his family. As the years go by he grows more rigid. Yet there is a lovable side showing

concern at times

Mrs. Bridge (Joanne Woodward) is an upbeat caring airhead. She loves her family and friends dearly. She is also impressionable, partly due to her emotional starvation. As she ages, she grows more dependent and vulnerable.

Ruth is there eldest daughter. High-spirited and sexually charged, she aspires to become an actress. She takes off for the artistic bohemia of the Big Apple (New York).

A more conservative sister, Carolyn, heads off to the University of Kansas. There she meets a man and makes an impetuous marriage that later falls apart.

Their brother Douglas, (Robert Sean Leonard from Dead Poet's Society) experiences adolescence with smoking, sex, and model airplane building as a hobby. He is totally excited by the wartime excitement and eventually joins the army air corps.

The evanescence is reflected in the course of the seasons through which the film progresses. The scenes of family happiness all take place during the height of summer. It is autumn when the children leave. In the end it is the dead of winter but Mr. Bridge buys roses for the Mrs. which are the only and last thing that bloom.

The film ends in a rather unique fashion. Mrs. Bridge is attempting to back her Lincoln out of the narrow garage and the car stalls. This garage is so narrow, she cannot open the doors to get out. Meanwhile Mr. Bridge is bringing home those flowers and the flick immediately changes.

It turns into a silent black and white home film while subtitles quickly summarize the events of the Bridge's life.

The casting is appropriate while the acting is excellant and convincing

It was one of those rare movies that was more enjoyable immediately following the film than during it. It was long and drawn out but afterward the little details converged into meaningful lessons.



Many answers were received to the powers of ten puzzle in last week's issue. Due to space limitations I will only give the name of those who were first with a correct answer to each part. Ron Zepp was the first to find, via a computer search, a factorization of 10^9 into factors that contain no zeros. The solution is $10^9 = (512)(1953125)$.

To proceed farther with the remaining parts of the puzzle it is useful to note that every power of ten is composed of factors of 2 and 5 only. In other words, one factorization is always $10^n = (2^n)(5^n)$. In looking for factors with no zeros this is the only one that could possibly work since a 2 and a 5 in the same factor will produce a zero at the end. For n = 9 we obtain the numbers given above that fortunately contain no zeros. The second part of the puzzle, explaining why this couldn't be done

for 10^12, is now easily answered by computing as follows: $10^{12} = (2^{12})(5^{12}) = (4096)(244140625)$.

Since these contain zeros, and any other factorization would put a 2 and 5 together, 10^12 does not have a factorization into zeroless factors. James Comstock and Mitchell L. Ingle were the first with a complete explanation of this. The remaining portion of the puzzle, to find those powers of ten with a zeroless factorization, is now answered by searching the powers of 2 and 5 looking for those that have no zeros. The following is a complete list of the powers of ten that work.

 $10^{1} = (2^{1})(5^{1}) = (2)(5)$ $10^{2} = (2^{2})(5^{2}) = (4)(25)$ $10^{3} = (2^{3})(5^{3}) = (8)(125)$ $10^{4} = (2^{4})(5^{4}) = (16)(625)$ $10^{5} = (2^{5})(5^{5}) = (32)(3125)$ $10^{6} = (2^{6})(5^{6}) = (64)(15625)$ $10^{7} = (2^{7})(5^{7}) = (128)(78125)$ $10^{9} = (2^{9})(5^{9}) = (512)(1953125)$ $10^{18} = (2^{18})(5^{18}) = (262144)(3814697265625)$ $10^{33} = (2^{33})(5^{33}) = (8589934592)^{*}$ (116415326982795684111353125).

The first person to provide this list up to 10^9 was Kashmira Mody. The first, and only, person to carry it up to 10^33 was Mitchell L. Ingle. The values beyond 10^9 are difficult to check since they require computing with an accuracy beyond most hand calculators. Believe it or not, puzzle enthusiasts have checked up to 10^57134 and found no further powers of ten that allow a zeroless factorization. While this doesn't prove that a higher power won't work, it isn't very encouraging.

The puzzle for this week is in a vein similar to the powers of ten and concerns factorials. The factorial function is useful in many areas of mathematics. It is defined by: n! = n(n-1)(n-2)(n-3)...(3)(2)(1).

So, for example, 6! = (6)(5)(4)(3)(2)(1) = 720 and 10! = (10)(9)(8)(7)(6)(5)(4)(3)(2)(1) = 3628800. This week's puzzle is to determine how many zeros occur at the end of 10000!. Computing this number outright is difficult. It contains over 35,000 digits. If you are successful in determining how many zeros are at the end of 10000! you might wish to find a formula, in terms of n, for the number of zeros that occur at the end of n! . If you tackle this, you may find the "integer part" function useful. I(x) = the largest integer less than or equal to x. So I(2.3) = 2 and I(67.9) = 67 for example.














































Crayons and Good Food . Highlight G. Golly Molly's

Perpetrators, Prepare to be Painfully Poked with Pencil Points!






