Originally from St. Louis, Missouri, Mrs. Stoy has lived in many locations including Kansas City. She currently resides in Marietta, where she has been for the past ten years raising her two children.

For her immediate goals, Mrs. Stoy wishes to reach students all over the campus. She wants the student body to become aware of the services offered by the Counseling Depart-

Governor Miller Requests Increase in the University System of Georgia Budget

According to the January 18 edition of the Legislative Update, Governor Zell Miller has requested a \$100 million dollar increase in the University System of Georgia budget for fiscal year 1994. The request came in his January 14 budget address given to the Georgia Legislature. The bulk of the funding is to be appropriated to "increased enrollment, health insurance costs, and pay raises."

Among other priorities on the Governor's list include \$80 million in bond funding for a comprehensive agricultural livestock and poultry facility and biocontainment research center (both at UGA), and a children's medical center at the Medical College of Georgia. This and other more costly projects are to be paid for out of revenues generated by bonds to be paid back out of the projects themselves and not the general treasury.

The proposed funding includes

a multitude of other expenditures, such as dormitories and parking decks to be constructed at Georgia Tech and Gordon College. Also expected are a number of endowments for research projects at the System's four largest colleges.

Also mentioned was the Georgia lottery proceeds and the funding of the HOPE program, designed to provide scholarships, as well as a construction, equipment, and technology trust fund. This includes the installation of satellite dishes on each campus in the System.

Of the proposed increase, Southern Tech is to receive funding for an Apparel Manufacturing Center, a project shared by Georgia Tech.

Total funding is estimated around \$500,000 - about one-fifth of the entire increase.

Much of Governor Miller's appropriation is aimed at handling growth in the System, with much of the money being spent on human resource needs and future technology.


lengthy project. The use of facilities in the older section has been important to the development of the new section. This explains the increase in student center traffic by people involved in the project.

The increase in traffic has also meant a rise in revenue for the food service outlet currently servicing the student center. There are now lines each day during traditional lucheon hours, waiting for the much improved food being served. Reportedly, that same food service continue once the new section is open and operating.

In a recent conversation with Jack Morehouse, head of the construction team, it was learned that much of the misfortune of delay has come from mother nature herself. Situations beyond their control, such as unforeseen problems in laying the foundation and the unforgiving rain, have caused several delay situations. With the installation of the roof now complete and much of the interior finished, the project is now moving forward with great speed.

At the Student Life Committee (SLC) meeting last Tuesday, the Academic Forgiveness Policy proposal suffered a major setback. Unfortunately, we on the SLC realized that any such proposal is outside the very carefully constrained powers of the Committee.

Earlier this quarter, the officers of the Student Government Association (SGA) proposed to the SLC a policy that any student retaking a class that they had previously received a failing grade for would have the new grade be used to compute the student's GPA. The old grade would

still appear on the student's transcript. The policy had been approved by the SGA Council fall quarter.

The section of Southern Tech's Policy and Procedure Manual (P&P) that relates to the Student Life Committee states, in part, that, "The Committee is charged with recommending policies for all extracurricular Student activities except intercollegiate athletics." The P&P goes on to give further details, but the high and the low of it is the word "academics" is never used. An Academic Forgiveness Policy, obviously, deals with academics, so the Student Life Committee is not

empowered to even consider the idea. So the proposal died in committee.

So what happens to the Academic Forgiveness Policy now? I don't know. Maybe we drop back and punt.

The SLC is an advisory committee to the Faculty Senate, who has to ratify all its actions for them to come into effect. The P&P states that, "The Faculty Senate ... has campus-wide advisory responsibility for all academic matters", among other responsibilities. So this is the only group that does have the authority to consider an Academic Forgiveness

This brings to light a critical flaw in Southern Tech's organization. There are, obviously, no students on the Faculty Senate. There are no students on any kind of a committee that can advise the Faculty Senate on aca-

So the Academic Forgiveness Policy is on hold until someone on the Faculty Senate will arise to champion it, thereby laying himself or herself open to all the slings and arrows of the faculty members who are opposed to the very idea of such a policy. 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Students, Teachers Disagree About Evaluations

Has anyone ever wondered how those instructor evaluations are compiled? Better yet, has anyone ever wondered what happens to those evaluations after they are filled out by students?

A little over a year ago, *The Sting* reported that the evaluations were being revised to concentrate on more specific topics and these questions were to be answered with a specific answer, other than one to ten. They also needed to be open to creative suggestion.

The opinions of many students around campus remain the same. Some students stated, "The evalua-

tions are pointless", "They serve no purpose, since a bad teacher probably won't care what a student has to say about them.", "They serve no purpose whatsoever", and "Students should be able to see them."

Professor T.A. Warsi, along with several other faculty members were assigned the task of redesigning the evaluation system. The group is called The Faculty Evaluation Subcommittee

Southern Tech formerly used evaluations supplied by The University of Washington and, according to Professor Warsi, they did not serve the purpose that they were supposed to serve. The subcommittee then started searching for a new format and eventually they found something

that would work.

Professor Warsi hopes that the group will receive some feedback from the rest of the faculty to determine how effective the new evaluation system is going to be.

As to who gets to read the results, nobody other than the teacher being reviewed is allowed to view them. The evaluations are intended to inform the professor of which areas are strong points, and upon which he or she needs to work.

As a matter of fact, the committee goes to great lengths to keep the results from falling into the wrong hands, since that possibility was one of the major gripes pertaining to the old evaluation system. As stated by Professor Warsi, "The way we have

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set it up, the evaluations will come back to Dr. Nadella's office and from there the committee members have assignments to certain departments and the committee members would personally pick it up and we are supposed to place it in the mailboxes of the individual faculty personally, so that it doesn't go into some body else's hands."

The only time that the evaluations are viewed by someone other than the professor is when promotion or tenure time rolls around, but that is only part of what is taken into consideration.

When asked about the possibility of evaluation results being ignored by certain professors, i.e. being stuck in a desk drawer never to be looked at again, Professor Warsi

stated, "When it gets to the end of the quarter, we need to know if we did a nice job or not, and we must depend on the student; they are our client. So personally I use the evaluation for guiding myself and take the evaluation very seriously and look into that and see if there is any truth behind that... I do not know [if some professors] throw them away. That would be pure speculation. When you are dealing with a large number of people, every body might not think that they are important... Colleges are spending a great deal of money on evaluations and they could serve as a very important tool. To my knowledge, I'm not aware of that [happening]."

The Sting has future plans of forming its own teacher evaluations, with the forms and results to be run in future issues of *The Sting*.

There will be no changes to the contents of the major; just the name is changed to protect the innocent. This is a non-substantive change, done only to clarify the nature of the program.












Workers finish the window, on the right, for the new WGHR broadcast studio, complete with Ronco Mr. Microphone and "double-quad bitchin' surround





New Education Secretary Chosen By Clinton

Education Secretary-designate Richard Riley pledged Jan. 12 to promote greater student access to America's colleges and universities and link two issues important to youth - education and national ser-

"We must establish a new covenant which gives both greater access to postsecondary students for those who have earned an opportunity to go on, and also provide incentives for young adults to serve their community and their nation," Riley said at his confirmation hearing before the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee. Riley was expected to win nomination Jan. 19 without difficulty.

The former governor of South Carolina, who had been serving as an adviser to President Clinton, also outlined plans to design a new, proactive approach to education policy after a decade of research and study. Riley termed these new ideas "a participatory, positive approach for turning from a 'nation at risk' to a 'nation on the move."

As governor from 1978 to 1986, Riley implemented a number of education reforms, including higher academic standards, improved teacher training and compensation

and a renewed emphasis on basic skills. In a study released at the Senate hearing, the Congressional Research Service found increases in both Scholastic Aptitude Test scores and the number of high school students going on to college as a result of these policies.

Riley faced a largely sympathetic audience on Capitol Hill, as senators often used their time to offer advice rather than engage in policy disputes. For instance, Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., the panel's chairman, urged Riley to check on the status of Bush administration regulations that could undermine the use of race-specific college scholarships to promote di-

"I urge you to make sure that something isn't put into effect (on the scholarship) issue during your watch," Kennedy said.

Riley said he believed racebased scholarships were legal if designed to promote diversity, not discrimination. "My view is that it's valid, it's good and it's legal," he said.

On other issues, Riley said he favored expanding Pell Grants for needy students. But he acknowledged that increases will be hard to afford, given the government's budget deficit.

'I agree the level (of the grant)

is too low, but again we're faced with the heavy anchor of the deficit," Riley told the panel.

The former governor sought a middle ground on the issue of direct student loans, operated without the help or participation of banks, Riley favored the pilot program on direct loans enacted last year, but he is awaiting the findings of more research. Riley said he also hoped such a program could significantly reduce federal costs.

'I'm very much interested in it for that reason," he said, adding that it also may make loans more convenient to access for students.

But Riley was quicker to endorse the idea of community service in exchange for student loan forgiveness, an idea championed by President-elect Clinton.

"No student should be disallowed from going to college because of costs," he said. In addition to community service, Riley also said former students should be able to earmark a certain portion of their earnings specifically to repay student loans.

Riley also spoke forcefully in favor of "pipeline" issues such as Head Start and early childhood education, which can help disadvantaged children gain early access to education that helps them in the

Even given the massive federal deficit, he said, targeted investments in education are good for the nation. "The education of young people is the only way to get out of the hole

that we're in."

Riley also favored a greater emphasis on parental involvement in education — throughout a student's school years. He said he

would push to develop in parents "an ethic for learning."

During the hearing, the secretary-designate drew accolades from both sides of the political aisle. "Gov. Riley has the vision, background and record to put us on the right path of progress toward reaching the national goals in education," Kennedy said.

PIKE Chapter Required to Do 2,000 hrs. Community Service

LEXINGTON, KY — Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity members at the University of Kentucky will have to perform 2,000 hours of community service as part of their punishment for taking sports memorabilia from two North Carolina universities, school officials said.

Kentucky officials confiscated several of the items that Pi Kappa Alpha pledges took from Duke University and the University of North Carolina during a retreat in December. Among the items taken from Duke were the retired jerseys of former Duke basketball players Christian Laettner, Danny Ferry and Johnny Dawkins.

Pictures and a lamp made out of

a North Carolina Tar Heel football helmet were among the items taken from the University of North Carolina's Chapel Hill campus.

Among the reprimands that the fraternity faces include:

- A one-year probation that will end on Jan. 11, 1994. Any other violation during the period will result in the canceling of the fraternity's registration as a student organization.
- No social events at the house will be allowed, and no new pledge classes can be formed.
- The chapter must make a combined grade point average of 2.78 before any privileges will be re-
- The fraternity must pay for all damages.

Professor Resigns Over **Ethics Controversy**

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — A professor of Judaic studies at the University of North Carolina-Charlotte resigned after it was discovered that he was secretly holding two fulltime teaching positions at two different universities while receiving salaries in the amount of \$146,400.

Tzvee Zahavy, a nationally known Talmud scholar, was hired by UNCC last year as a result of a two-vear national search to fill the Isaac Swift Distinguished Professorship in Judaic Studies.

UNCC was unaware that at the same time, the professor was still holding his previous position at the University of Minnesota.

At UNCC beginning in October, Zahavy taught a class titled "Judaism in the Time of Early Christianity" for two hours on Mondays and Wednesdays, then would fly back to Minnesota, where he taught two of the same classes on Thursdays.

The 1,000-mile commute allowed Zahavy to pick up the hefty salaries from both universities. He also received an advance of \$5,000 from UNCC for moving expenses, which he never used.

In December, just two months after Zahavy's arrival, UNCC Chancellor Jim Woodward asked Zahavy to resign and requested that he reimburse the university \$5,000. Zahavy recently agreed to pay back the money.

The University of Minnesota has also requested the professor's resignation.

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Some College Men React Strongly to Rape on Campus

With statistics showing that one in four college women will be raped, more male students are taking part in rape prevention than ever before.

Joseph Weinberg, an education consultant who gives seminars about rape awareness, said he is encouraged by the trend of men forming groups to battle rape on their campuses.

"There is a lot of denial about the problem and how vast it is," he said. "But some men have friends who have been raped, and it brings it close to home."

Men's rape awareness groups have formed at the University of New Mexico, Michigan State University, University of Wisconsin, the University of Florida and the University of Washington, among other schools.

However, at the University of Virginia, an entirely different kind of group has emerged. Some male students who call themselves The Southern Society need only a secret phone call to confront an alleged campus rapist, according to a story

in the Cavalier Daily.

Founded in spring 1992, the closely guarded society claims to have 20 carefully screened members who approach an alleged rapist, first by leaving notes, and then eventually in a face-to-face confrontation

"They let the person know that they are keeping an eye on them. The message is: "What you did did not go unnoticed, and you won't get away with it," said Marybeth White, a senior who wrote the news story.

White said she was told by the founder of the society, who insisted on anonymity, that the only way to contact them is by running an ad in the *Cavalier Daily* requesting that the "S.S. Society" call a particular phone number at a particular time.

The founder, who said his sister was raped, told White that he hoped that the society could assist women who are afraid to press charges.

Though the philosophy of the group is unclear, the founder assured White that they are non-violent and try to follow the wishes of the victim.

"I am completely convinced of

this man's sincerity," White said, noting that the society also gives out phone numbers of local agencies such as the Sexual Assault Resource Group.

Weinberg, who has held rape awareness seminars on 80 college campuses, said that he has found that many young men want to know what they can do about rape on their campus and how they can be helpful to women who have been raped.

Most rape awareness groups, said Weinberg, are rap sessions that deal with issues like masculinity, sensitivity and sexism. Weinberg is a former president of Men Stopping Rape, a group in Madison, Wis.

At the University of New Mexico, a group of men who call themselves "Men for Gender Justice" meet once a week for two-hour rap sessions on the issue of rape, and what it means to be a man in today's society.

"I've seen too many incidents of sexism accepted, and not enough attention given to them by men," said Mark Mathey, a senior studying antropology at UNM, who acts as chairman of the group.

"We have five to 20 members

who talk about things such as role models and self-esteem issues," he said. "Women are invited to the planning section of the meeting, but not the discussions."

The group, which is working with a local rape crisis center in Alberquerque, has held a public forum on sexual harassment for faculty and students that featured open discussions on the subject.

"Sexism tells men to be a certain way. To be dominate and without feeling, and this does as much damage to men as to women," Mathey said. "Men really are not allowed to live full, whole lives. They are told to be one way, and to get their emotional needs met by someone else."

At Michigan State University, four men fought apathy on their campus when they formed a "Men for Rape Awareness" organization, and opened it to all interested students.

A rape awareness group at the University of Florida took some heat because it tried to limit its membership to men.

According to a flier distributed by the National Organization of Women on the University of Florida campus, "Women must not be excluded from discussions that involve issues of their oppression, discussions which involve their daily lives. Men who want to fight rape will welcome us into this forum ... so we can tell our side, and so we can confront them on their oppressive attitudes and actions."

Resistance by some women is only a part of the problem, Weinberg said

Until school administrations face the problem squarely, he said, the men's groups will not have the backing of the school.

"It is rare for a campus to bring me in to help nurture an awareness group," said Weinberg, who gives eight-hour sessions to athletic teams, fraternities and clubs on the subject of rape.

Weinberg said the small groups that are forming throughout the country's campuses are a good beginning at "making rape a men's issue, not a woman's issue."

"We need to have a different attitude. The media has got to learn the subtle difference between saying, 'yesterday 2,000 women were raped,' and 'yesterday 2,000 men raped a woman,'" he said.

Graduate Assistants Are Restless

Graduate student unions at two University of California campuses are expected to vote in February on whether to continue a strike that disrupted undergraduate classes last semester.

The strike began as a result of the university's refusal to recognize unions at the Berkeley and Santa Cruz campuses as the labor representatives of graduate students employed as teaching and research assistants. Graduate students complain that they are not accorded the same benefits as other university employees.

The Association of Graduate Student Employees (AGSE), which has affiliated with the United Auto Workers Union Local 2165 at Berkeley, led the strike Nov. 19. The Graduate Student Employee Association (GSEA), which represents 600 teaching assistants and researchers at the Santa Cruz campus, followed suit Nov. 23.

Andy Cowell, spokesman for AGSE, said union bylaws require the union membership to vote each semester on whether to continue the strikes. Because new members are joining and old members are leaving, the membership rolls won't be known until mid-February at UC Berkeley. The Santa Cruzunion also agreed Jan. 11 to call off its strike for the same reason.

The strikes by the Berkeley and Santa Cruz unions disrupted undergraduate classes at both campuses before and during finals last semester as teaching assistants boycotted classes and withheld grades.

"We effectively canceled a large part of the classes for the last three weeks of classes," said Russel Paulsen, a spokesman for the union that represents 3,900 graduate researchers and teaching assistants at UC Berkeley.

The strikes also prompted a few

days of informational picketing by graduate students at UC San Diego and UC Davis, university officials said. The San Diego union is affiliated with UAW, and the Davis union is trying to gain membership in UAW.

However, the universities' public relations offices say strikers had minimal effect on classes, with most student grades turned in on time. UC Berkeley officials did not agree with the union's contention that 62 percent of the classes were closed because of the strike.

"They insist that we recognize them as a collective bargaining agent forthe graduate students. That's something that the university will not do," said Bob Sanders, a spokesman for UC Berkeley. "We maintain that by recognizing them as a union, we'd just be equating them with staff. We maintain that the teaching is an essential part of their education."

Nancy Campbell, executive council member of the Santa Cruz union, said union members have scaled down their demands in order to forge a compromise.

"We've given up on asking for full collective bargaining, and now just ask that we are recognized as the representative for T.A.'s and R.A.'s who have joined the union," she told The Daily Nexus, the student newspaper at UC Santa Barbara.

Paulsen said the university was trying to bust the union by refusing to recognize it as the bargaining agent for graduate employees. The Berkeley union has been negotiating health and wage benefits with UC Berkeley since 1989, and the university has even deducted UAW dues from graduate student paychecks.

However, UC officials say they can't legally recognize the union because of a recent court ruling. Earlier this year, a California appeals court ruled that UC Berkeley was not required to recognize the AGSE as a union, a decision that was upheld by the California Supreme Court. At that point, Paulsen said, the university changed its policy about negotiating with the AGSE.

Although Sanders claimed that

union support "has gradually waned over the weeks" with "only a 100 or so graduate students participating in the strike" and "minimal" support in science departments, there are signs that the university has felt the strike's impact.

California

To accommodate undergraduates whose classes were affected by striking teaching assistants, Sanders said students were allowed to change their grades to pass/fail or to take an "inprogress" grade that would allow them to finish the class this semester.




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Families Changing College Students Cope

Sorry, Dan Quayle, but the "Leave it to Beaver" traditional family fantasy doesn't exist in the '90s, and college students, many of them coping with complicated stepfamilies or extended families, don't comprehend the concept.

By the time a teen reaches college, his or her parents may have divorced at least once, tied the knot twice, and some have said "I do" three times.

Stepmoms, stepdads and stepsiblings are a growing part of college life, and some mental health experts say students are paying an emotional price for their parents'

"I observe that there is a great deal of pain in people who come from divided and blended families," said Jeane B. Lee, a mental health counselor at Mississippi State University near Starkville. "They sense that their parents' allegiance is divided, and they are dangling without a good support system.'

Lee said college-age students often feel betrayed by divorced parents and complain that the'/ are

caught in the cross-fire of a relationship that is never peaceful.

"People who share children are never really divorced," Lee said. "Children in college have not outgrown their need for supporting parents, and they grieve their losses."

Often a second marriage can become more strenuous than the first.

"I see many new stepmothers who are jealous of college-age daughters who are close to their dads," she said. "And I often see the natural parent under a great deal of stress and anxiety because they are trying to make everyone happy."

While some college students have been dealing with stepfamilies for years, others have to face the breakup of their families while they are in school.

"Often students go into a tailspin, and feel helpless to deal with the situation," said Joyce Brothers, a nationally known psychologist who studies family and marriage

"You would think it would not affect them much, because they have started independent lives, but this is just not the case," she said.

She described the dilemma of the college student caught up in a

family breakup as having "one foot at home and one foot in the world."

Students can feel deep anger at parents who use them as pawns against their partners. Brothers suggested that students take advantage of campus counseling centers as a source of temporary support, and not forget to talk with friends during the breakup of their family.

"It's a very unexpectedly difficult time. It blind-sides you," she said, noting that people are more concerned with the younger children in the family and don't think about the emotional needs of the college-age children.

The psychologist recommends that students call home frequently during divorce to reassure themselves that family members are doing well.

Brothers also said college-age children often do not feel love toward a new stepmother or stepfather, and the best they can expect is to establish a friendship.

College students suffer enough stress without the additional burden of parental divorce and family problems, said Joseph Sundram, project director at the Institute of HeartMath, an independent research center in Torrance, Calif.

The purpose of a functional family, he said, is to teach young people about self-management.

"Young people out of broken families need to understand that, at the beginning of their adult lives, maturity is about emotional and mental self management, and without that, no external success will ever offer balance, fun or fulfillment."

The last two decades have seen divorce lose its stigma, and many of today's college students are children of baby-boomers who have opted not to stay in abusive or unsatisfactory marriages, experts say.

There also is greater public discussion and awareness of the trauma that arises from broken families. During the presidential campaign, President Clinton openly discussed his relationship with an alcoholic and abusive stepfather and how those childhood events shaped him as an

Some parents, stung by a traumatic divorce, have opted to go solo.

In fact, in 1990 only 26 percent of the nation's children and teens lived in families where one parent worked and another parent stayed home full time, according to a report from the Center for the Study of

Social Policy in Washington.


Further, 64 percent of all children and teens living with one or two parents did not have any parent at home full time in 1990, the report said.

Add to this complex picture the greater share of children and teens who are living in households not headed by any parent, or in "subfamilies" where a child or teen lives with a parent in a relative's house.

"The numbers are dramatic," said Tom Joe, director of the Center for the Study of Social Policy. "The numbers of working single-parent families, and the two-parent families with both working are a huge percentage. We need to stop pretending families are one way when they're not. Colleges ought to change with the times.'

Despite forces revamping the family concept, some soon-to-be college students say they would prefer the stability of the "traditional" family's breadwinner dad and fulltime homemaker mother.

Last year, a group of collegebound high school students surveyed by the National Association of Student Councils voted 586-96 in favor of the "traditional" family.



Director of Student Activities, Southern Tech should look to March for the beginning of a lengthy transition period, geared to moving everything from the old student to the new section. this will of course take place after the state has had its say in the completion of the project and releases it to Southern Tech. It is also up to the state, according to Morehouse, to purchase furniture and inspect the building for aesbestos contamination.

After the transition the campus may have to hire additional student assistants to operate the larger center. This may also include the hiring of full-time personnel, such as a building manager. In any case, none

of this can be done until the state has placed its stamp of approval on this project.

In any event this campus has long waited for the completion of the center. Slight construction inconveniences and the time it took to complete work has taken its toll on campus moral.
