# After 7 Years and \$6.5 Million, Southern Tech Gets To Occupy Its New Student Center

August 2 marked the last official step in the occupation of Southern Tech's new Student Center. Student organizations officially began moving into their new offices on the upper level of the Student Center ending 7 years of waiting.

First news of the Student Center project reached students and most of the faculty and staff of the college back in the February 4, 1986, issue of *The Sting* in a story about construction around the campus. At that time, Southern Tech was in the midst of a Library renovation project and the construction of the Academic Build-

ing.

Since then, the Student Center project was the subject of no less than 24 *Sting* stories due to political, funding, and construction delays.

The proposal for the new Student Center went before the Board of Regents and the State Legislature four years in a row before funding was finally approved. One of those years, Southern Tech was skipped over on the priority list because Democrats wanted to punish the Cobb County Republicans for opposing an increase in the state sales tax.

When funding was first approved on April 17, 1990, Southern Tech was expecting completion of the project during the Summer of 1992. But the state suffered a \$332 million budget fallback in 1990 putting the funding for the Student Center off another year.

Eventually funding was found through the state, Beers Construction won the contract, and Southern Tech broke ground on the project on November 19, 1991. Symbolic of the funding troubles and the construction delays to come, the ground-breaking ceremony had to be held inside due to inclement weather.

And still opinions vary on the building. "Isn't it purdy," expressed student Kendall Duncan.

"Most excellent," commented Dr. Wiseman.

"It's amazing how a building can turn out like this with such a bonehead architect," said Scott Wages, president of the SGA. And apparently Scott Wages isn't the only one with that opinion. According to sources, President Cheshier has written a letter to the Board of Regents requesting that Siezemore Floyd Architects never be used again. Such a letter does exist, but *The Sting* was unable to confirm its contents at press time.

The new Student Center has a 500 seat theater, a new ballroom complete with hard-wood floor, a new recreation area, 24 student offices including expanded SGA and *Sting/Log* offices, and 11 meeting rooms. With more than 110 dining tables and 11 pool tables, no one should ever have trouble waiting to eat or play pool.

# Southern Tech Gets Instructional Delivery Center

This summer Southern Tech
President Stephen Cheshier announced the establishment of the Instructional Delivery Center. As a separate unit there will be two specific activities this "center without walls" will oversee - distance learning and multimedia services.

Distance Learning is a tele-conference for classrooms and is mandated by the Regents as part of SCT's state mission. Students in Valdosta and Augusta could interact, through tele-links, with a class in progress here at Southern Tech. Continuing Education and the Quality Center currently use this technology.

Multimedia services at Southern Tech have been provided by the IET department at a minimum level for several years according to President Cheshier. He characterized that arrangement as, "somewhat unorganized and inequitable."

The president did not point out a lack of equipment, or more importantly a budget, to fulfill the needs of a good media services department. The separate unit's funding will still have to come primarily from IET's allocation, according to the president.

Currently the production suite is an assemblage of lent pieces, Kennessaw State hand-me-downs, and Professor Hamrick's personal equipment. Even the tool box is borrowed.

President Cheshier did emphasis that the, "Multimedia services are needed to assist the College's in-

structional programs in becoming more productive, efficient, and more meaningful to students."

Currently there is a Taping Classroom and a viewing lab that are used mostly by speech classes and students preparing for senior projects. Very few classes, labs or lectures are currently available on tape.

With the use of the equipment now amassed in D-216 professors could put away their colorful sticks of chalk and better visualize vectors, waves and construction lines on overhead slides. Software exists, on campus, for visual representation of stress, flow and displacement of materials.

Computer labs could have the instructor's terminal projected onto a screen for all the class to see and then at the flip of a switch show one of the student's work.

The Architecture department will require a multimedia lab as part of

their accreditation.

With virtual reality, EDF and IET students could design a home or plant and actually do a walk through on the Gymnasium floor.

What the school needs to move this direction is a staffer with artistic flare and knowledge of available software and a sufficient budget to equip, maintain, stock and run a real media center according to Professor Hamrick, the center's director.

Students commonly refer to the school as the, "Southern College of no Technology"; and for years, high tech in multimedia at SCT meant, "having a bright bulb in an overhead projector." Right now Southern Tech is years behind some local high schools in multimedia production, but with the right combination of resources and the ingenuity of the faculty these unfortunate truths can be reversed.

# Are Professors Actually Professionally Challenged?

Recently, one of my professors (who shall remain nameless) commented in class that he didn't feel professionally challenged by his job because he hadn't done any work within his field in months.

I was immediately struck with the thought: he's a professor. That is his field, no matter what his degree is in. If he wants to be professionally challenged, shouldn't he strive to be a better teacher? (No insult is intended; everyone can be better.)

Southern Tech professors have a harder job than many people realize. They have to be experts in two different areas: teaching and some technical field. I think all too many people, professors included, ignore how important that teaching requirement is. I know all the faculty are expected to keep up with the latest breakthroughs in their technical field, but how many of them constantly strive to be better teachers?

Don't get me wrong; the vast majority of Southern Tech professors are at the very least adequate teachers. But I think they could be better, and I'm not sure how hard they try.

I'm pretty sure professors are required to take a short course in how to be a teacher before they start teaching classes. But this seems woefully inadequate. They are required at the very least to have a bachelor's degree in their technical field, and pressure is constantly being put on them to get Master's degrees and Doctorates. Shouldn't an equal emphasis be put on knowledge about teaching?


I'm not suggesting that all professors be required to have teaching certificates, but all students who have had the unpleasant experience of having a brand new professor will agree that more training is necessary.

Even professors who have been teaching for years can benefit from some new ideas. Shouldn't Southern Tech require professors to attend workshops on how to be better teachers?

I have never seen a Department Head sitting in on a professor's class to see what kind of job he is doing. As near as I can tell, the only people who have any idea what kind of teacher a professor is are the students. In the real world, your boss is interested in how well you do your job, shouldn't the same be true here?

I wonder, are our faculty proud to be professors? How many of them, when asked what they do for a living, say, for example, "I'm a mechanical engineer." Or do they say, "I'm a professor." I think Southern Tech would be a better school if the faculty took real pride in their profession: teaching.

Ever since the Bill Moyers' TV series on "Healing and the Mind," and a New England Journal of Medicine report that said that one-third of Americans are using alternative medical therapies, the phone at the Naropa Institute hasn't stopped ring-

The small Boulder, Colo., college, which offers degrees in the arts, social sciences and humanities, touts itself as a Buddhist-inspired non-sectarian institution where faculty members weave "contemplative practices" into students' daily

More than 600 students, when not hitting the books, participate in everything from cross-legged meditation to Japanese archery and various types of martial arts. The school also offers a program in healing arts that includes courses such as massage therapy.

A growing interest in alternative medical practices, which include homeopathy, massage therapy, Chinese herbal therapies, midwifery, and nutritional disciplines, also is evident at the nation's two schools of naturopathic medicine in Portland, Ore., and Seattle, with both showing increases in applications over the past several years. The AMA, however, says it doesn't have an official position about naturopathic medicine.


### Students Write **Textbook**

Businesses, industries and governmental agencies surveyed by Michigan State reported a 2.9 per-

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

The answer to the longest walk that can be taken through an mxn grid of ▲ city streets from last quarter is 2mn+2 when both m and n are odd, and 2mn otherwise. Only Sheila Donehoo found the correct answer. The other puzzle from last quarter was to obtain 100 in as many ways as possible using the digits 1 through 9 in order and the operations of addition, subtraction, and juxtaposition. For example, one solution is 123+4-5+67-89+100. There are 12 possible ways, including the one just given. Again, the only correct solution came from Sheila Donehoo.

The puzzle for this issue is to find integers a, b, and c that satisfy a^3+b^4=c^5. Although it is possible to use a computer search (the number of cases to check is large) this can also be solved more quickly if you think about it the right way.
