

Two ECET Teachers Denied Contract Extensions

sor John Rupf. As nontenured faculty, they were on one year contracts with "notice of intention to renew or not to renew...to be furnished, in writing,... . at least three months before the date of

termination of an initial one year contract (P & P No. 803.6)." This notice was given in February. According to Professor Rupf, "It was a complete surprise to me. There had been no prior indication, at the professional level, that there was a problem."

Each nontenured faculty member is to meet yearly with the department head to discuss the past year, and usually the upcoming academic year. Pending the outcome of the appeal, neither Professor Colt nor Professor Rupf will be returning for the next academic year. Generally the appeals hierarchy is to appeal to the Dean of the School, but, while Professor Julian Wilson is the ECET Department Head, there currently is no Dean. Because of this, Vice President of Academic Affairs, Dr. Travis is the acting Dean. If there were aDean of Technology, Dr. Travis would be the second step in the appeals process. When called for this story, Dr. Travis was preparing to go out of town and wasn't able to comment.

The main contention seems to be Policy and Procedure No.: 803.0 where it states: "It is the responsibility of the department head to counsel with and guide each nontenured faculty member so that he or she will be able to earn tenure and promotion. The Department

Civil Students Win **Bridge Competition**

Civil engineering technology students from Southern Tech won first place at a regional steel bridge building competition, March 24, topping teams from the Universities of Tennessee, Alabama, South Florida, Memphis State and Georgia Tech. The competition was held at the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa.

The eight-member Southern Tech team and professor and faculty advisor, Michael Orlandella, will go on to compete in the national competition, May 14 in San Diego, California. Team member Luthin Crenshaw, a senior, feels good about the team's chances at nationals. "We've placed first in four of the last five regional competitions and second in the last two national competitions," Crenshaw said. He added that students will work to improve their bridge before the national competition, though it is unlikely that they can improve on their time. Crenshaw noted Southern Tech completed the bridge assembly in 2 minutes, 40 seconds at the regionals.

Sponsored by the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) and the American Institutes of Steel Construction (AISC), the competition challenges college students to design, fabricate and assemble a 21-foot steel bridge, taking into consideration factors such as weight and carrying capacity. Competitive bridges can weigh under 100 pounds; yet withstand loads of one and a quarter tons. Judging is based on construction time, bridge weight, stability and movement under stress, and how carefully students used resources while building the bridge.

Competition materials are funded by donations from the AISC, local industry and Southern Tech alumni.



Substance-Free Fraternities Are Catching On

His head pounded as the familiar smell of sour beer and stale cigarettes seeped into his consciousness. Slowly the morning light brought the remnants of last night's revelry into clear view. He was on the floor in the middle of what had been the newly refurbished living room. Now it was trashed. He felt sick.

This is the kind of experience that more college fraternities are trying to avoid by going substance-free. Alcohol and parties often create potential liabilities such as property damage, personal injury and assault. In serious cases, chapters are suspended and lawsuits are brought against both the chapter and the national fraternity.

Now some fraternities are trying to change their party-animal image by banning alcohol, drugs and cigarettes from the house and from fraternity gatherings.

In early April, Alpha Tau Omega (ATO) at Monmouth College, a small, liberal arts college in Illinois, voted to become substance-free, joining others such as the ATO chapter at Indiana University-Bloomington, Sigma Chi at University of Maine, and Lambda Chi Alpha chapters at Northeastern State in Oklahoma, Louisiana Tech, and Valparaiso University in Indiana.

"The most important reason we

did this was for liability concerns," says Kris Kline, President of ATO at Monmouth. "With everyone being so litigation-happy we don't want to put ourselves in a position where we inadvertently serve (alcohol to) a minor, or have someone fall off our porch, hurt themselves and sue the chapter. We risk losing the whole fraternity just for the sake of having a party in our house. That's not worth it."

Like most other substance-free fraternities, ATO had a serious wake-up call before making this decision. When Kline joined ATO, he concedes it had a bit of the "Animal House" reputation. He said they began having difficulties such as an outstanding debt to the national fraternity and some fire code violations due partly to damage from hearty partying.

These problems led the national ATO organization to step in last year and remove most of the membership. In the end, three members remained. They quickly pledged 11 members, the largest class of any fraternity that year. Soon they will move back into their newly renovated house, funded with donations from ATO alumni. Like some other groups, a restored house was another factor in going substance-free.

"We're tired of cleaning up our house after parties...the sticky floors, 'cigarette butts stuck on your wall, people breaking stuff and showing total disrespect for your living environment," says Kline. "So we are trying to eliminate that factor by taking away the alcohol. People who aren't drunk usually don't destroy things."

Kline says members want a place where they aren't ashamed to bring their girlfriends or family members. "If you can't bring those people into your fraternity, then there's something wrong; you are hiding something that you seem to value too highly," he said.

The success of their brother chapter at Indiana University encouraged fraternity members in the decision.

At Indiana University, ATO was dissolved in 1992 as a result of alcohol-related problems, culminating in the hospitalization of two members for near-fatal alcohol consumption. Their prized fraternity house was leased to another fraternity.

This motivated ATO alumni to re-establish the chapter as substance-free, an idea they wanted to test for some time. Because a university sanction prohibited any of the original members from participating in the new chapter, they had to start over completely. In less than one year, they recruited 40 members and have the distinction of being the first substance-free organization at any Big Ten institution. Next fall they move back into their house.

"We believe a growing number of college men want to live in a substance-free environment and simply need to be provided that opportunity in a fraternity setting," says Wynn Smiley, director of communication for ATO headquarters. "A lot of people, many times for good reason, look at the fraternity scene as totally revolving around alcohol party central. I think that scares away some people who would otherwise be interested. Offering a substance-free environment allows those true benefits of a fraternity to rise to the top. They still like to have a good time, but the social aspect, the alcohol aspect, is not all-consuming."

Indiana's administration, like most, is very supportive of the substance-free pledge. Richard McKaig, dean of students, says it is an effective "recruiting ploy" in that it offers something different. ATO competes with 30 other fraternity chapters on campus for membership. He says it is a growing trend nationwide for students to request smoke-free housing and adopt healthier lifestyles.

Still, McKaig acknowledges, "many students wonder if it's going to work or even if they'll live up to the ideal they've stated. My experience with the young men involved is that they truly have a commitment to that philosophy and I think they definitely will be living up to it."

While not pressuring chapters to go substance-free, the national fraternities, where risk management is a top concern, also endorse the concent

"ATO is going to be promoting substance-free at a greater level based on what we know already from watching Indiana's success," says Smiley. "But we don't want to twist any arms. We believe it will work only when the men understand what is going on in the chapter and they want to be a part of that kind of environment."

Lambda Chi Alpha's three chapters have similar stories. The latest is at Valparaiso where the suspended chapter is being reorganized as substance-free.

The chapter at Northeastern State in Oklahoma, founded as substance-free in 1988, has been successful, even during a rough period, when some members decided they no longer wanted to be substance-free and left.

At Louisiana Tech, the chapter decided to become substance-free in 1992 when it began having problems.

"They decided to get back to their founding principles of high academic standards, gentlemanly conduct, leadership development, and lifelong friendships," says Walter Jenkins, director of communications and conferences for Lambda Chi Alpha headquarters. "None of these things need alcohol to happen."

Social Integration More Likely Among Minorities

NEW ORLEANS — Students of color are much more likely than whites to study with, dine with and date students from different racial or ethnic groups, according to a University of Michigan study that paints the first national portrait of social integration on American college campuses.

The survey also showed that students who are Asian American and Mexican American are more likely than blacks to eat, study and date people from other racial and ethnic groups.

Researchers say the findings contradict recently voiced concerns that minorities are practicing self-segregation in greater numbers on college campuses.

"In fact, students of color are crossing ethnic-racial lines the most, while white students seem to be segregating themselves," said Sylvia Hurtado, assistant professor of education at the University of Michigan's Center for the Study of Higher and Postsecondary Education. Hurtado conducted the study with Assistant Professor Eric Day and Jesus Trevino, assistant dean at Arizona State University.

Minority students also are more likely than whites to feel excluded from activities because of their racial or ethnic identity and are more likely to report racial insults or threats made by faculty or fellow

Hurtado presented the study April 5 at the annual meeting of the American Educational Research Association. It was based on a sample of 6,000 college students at 390 schools who were surveyed in 1987 and questioned again in 1991. Among the key findings:

- About 69 percent of Asian-American students and 78 percent of Mexican-American students (other Hispanic groups were not included in the study) reported frequently dining with someone of a different racial or ethnic groups, with 60 percent and 72 percent, respectively, reporting they often studied with someone of a different group.
- About 55 percent of African-American students said they frequently dined with members of other groups, and 49 percent said they frequently studied with members of other groups.
- Only 21 percent of white students frequently dined and 15 percent frequently studied with someone from a different group.

The numbers in all categories drop when it comes to dating. About 42 percent of Asian Americans reported that they had dated someone outside their own racial or ethnic group, compared with about 24 percent of Mexican Americans, 13 percent of African Americans and 4 percent of whites.

About 53 percent of African-American students felt excluded from school activities because of their race compared with about 24 percent of Asian Americans, 16 percent of Mexican Americans and 6 percent of whites.

At the same time, only 19 per-

have overheard faculty members make inappropriate remarks about minorities, compared with 51 percent of African Americans and 31 percent of Asian Americans. About 32 percent of African Americans and 30 percent of Asian Americans said they had been insulted or threatened by other students, compared with 10 percent of Mexican Americans and 9 percent of whites.

Hurtado said the findings call into question claims of "reverse discrimination" raised by white students. "While it's true that students of color are much more likely than whites to face such hostilities on campus," she said. "these negative experiences do not appear to lead to less frequent cross-race interaction."

Choice Alcohol **Drug**

"Turn on, tune in and drop out," Timothy Leary advised students in the 1960s and '70s, and many did just that. What better way to strike a blow at the Establishment, assert one's unique identity, and just plain have fun all at the same time?

Not surprisingly, those decades also saw a rise in the number of social researchers attempting to explain the growing use of marijuana, hallucinogens, sedatives and amphetamines on U.S. campuses, as students increasingly became seduced by the power of such drugs to extend the boundaries of reality.

The counterculture embraced this brave journey, admittedly a dangerous one, into the unconscious, and into areas of pleasure and perception that society normally shunned.

What is drug use like today on college campuses? Despite fluctuations in the use of LSD and marijuana on campus, the drug of choice today — like yesterday and the day before - is still alcohol.

Recent studies found that alcohol was used by 80-percent of American college students, as opposed to 24-percent use of marijuana and only seven-percent use of cocaine by students. Of course, alcohol is legal and accessible compared to the other substances, and it is the most tacitly accepted by society as a legitimate means of coping with life's demands.

Not surprisingly, college students have shown a higher incidence of alcohol use than the U.S. population at large. And a recent University of Michigan study showed that students who leave school before graduation have higher rates of drug and alcohol use than those who stay in school.

Through the 1980s and early-'90s, colleges responded to these trends with an increase in substance abuse services on campus. Many universities now offer a link to a network of counseling, medical and informational services. Brown University has gone so far as to appoint a special dean with responsibilities for chemical dependency.

In addition, peer advocacy groups where students help students have sprung up all across the country. Students at the University of Florida have formed a group called Boost Alcohol Consciousness Concerning the Health of University Students (BACCHUS), which is now linked with an international network of student chapters that sponsor informational talks, workshops and meet-





market the college to the local community and thereby assist in creating visibility for the college and the recruiting efforts of the college, and to provide recreation, a source for school spirit, and entertainment for alumni, students and employees of the college as well as for members of the local community.

It is also to provide some students greater access to a college education who might otherwise be unable to afford it.

Recommendation 1: Suggests that the Athletic Director (AD) should report directly to the President of the college and not to the Vice President of Academic Affairs. Some of the members believe that the main obstacle for PR is budget. Others believe that what is needed is a more coordinated marketing approach across the college. Re-

gardless, they decided that the athletic programs of Southern Tech need greater assistance, perhaps even more leadership and cooperation, with the marketing of their programs.

Recommendation 2: Recommends that the President needs to clarify the roles and responsibilities of the AD, Student Affairs, and the Southern Tech PR Department.

Recommendation 3: Recommends that after the AD role is clarified, the President should decide if the duties of AD and coach of a major college sport (eg basketball and baseball) should be separated over the next four to five years, due to the many responsibilities of each.

Recommendation 4: Covers many other aspects that the committee decided were important, including charging coaches to become more actively in-

Head should inform the faculty member of his or her progress toward these goals by taking into account the peer committee's recommendation, student evaluations, and other appropriate sources of information."

"We both feel we were done an injustice and that the University is being denied experienced and qualified professionals," said Professor Rupf. What seems to be missing is "a paper trail" showing unsatisfactory performances and recommendations for improvement. Department Head Julian Wilson's response is that "It's a personnel problem and doesn't belong in the newspapers."

Some ECET students seem to

feel differently though. Student Bill Howard's reaction to the dismissals: "It surprises me, I have nothing but praise for either one of them...I can't see that they didn't teach what they were supposed to." And from Larry McHugh: "... I don't feel that it's right. He [Professor Rupf] has really worked a lot with the evening students." Mr McHugh also felt that one of Professor Rupf's problems was that "he gets to know the students. He isn't from the old school of professor/ student where the professor is always right and you're wrong."

Also a number of students have written to Dr. Travis in support of the two professors. This appears to have been done individually and not as a concerted group effort.



SCT Police Gazette Arrest Made In Ficik Murder

If you are concerned with your calculator or other small electronic item being stolen, record the serial number and keep it somewhere safe. The Department of Public Safety has an engraver for student use to engrave their name and social security number on their calculators. If you have any propery stolen, please report it to one of the Public Safety officers on campus and an investigation will be made. Call 528-7348.

Last Monday, Jason Ragland was arrested and charged for the murder of Claudette Jennifer Ficik who disappeared after February 16, 1994. Ragland is being held in the Clarke County jail.

There were numerous clues that led police to arrest Ragland for Claudette's death, according to *The Red and Black*, an independent paper serving UGA.

Ficik's body was found in the Oconee River on March 27 with yellow rope and a metal bar attached to it. The bar was traced to a construction site near Ragland's place of employment, Petsmart.

The construction manager said that the metal was indigenous of his site. The manager also said that Ragland had asked him for cement blocks and other materials to make counter displays.

Ragland's attorney, Bruce Harvey, said that the cement blocks, the yellow rope used to tie down Ficik, and other materials were "available to the public at large."

There was also a large hole in the carpet of his apartment which he said there was an oil stain. There were also small traces of blood found underneath a loose piece of carpet. But there was not enough blood under the fabric to determine whether or not the blood was human


Ragland and Ficik were ex-

pected in Trenton, South Carolina, on Feb. 16 to tell her parents that she was pregnant and that they wanted to get married. But they got into an argument before they left when Ragland realized that he couldn't leave work that day.

Sources comfirm that Ragland was dating both Ficik and another woman who lives in Athens.

Ragland's arraignment last week in the Clarke County Courthouse determined that he will face a trial by jury in ACC Superior Court.
