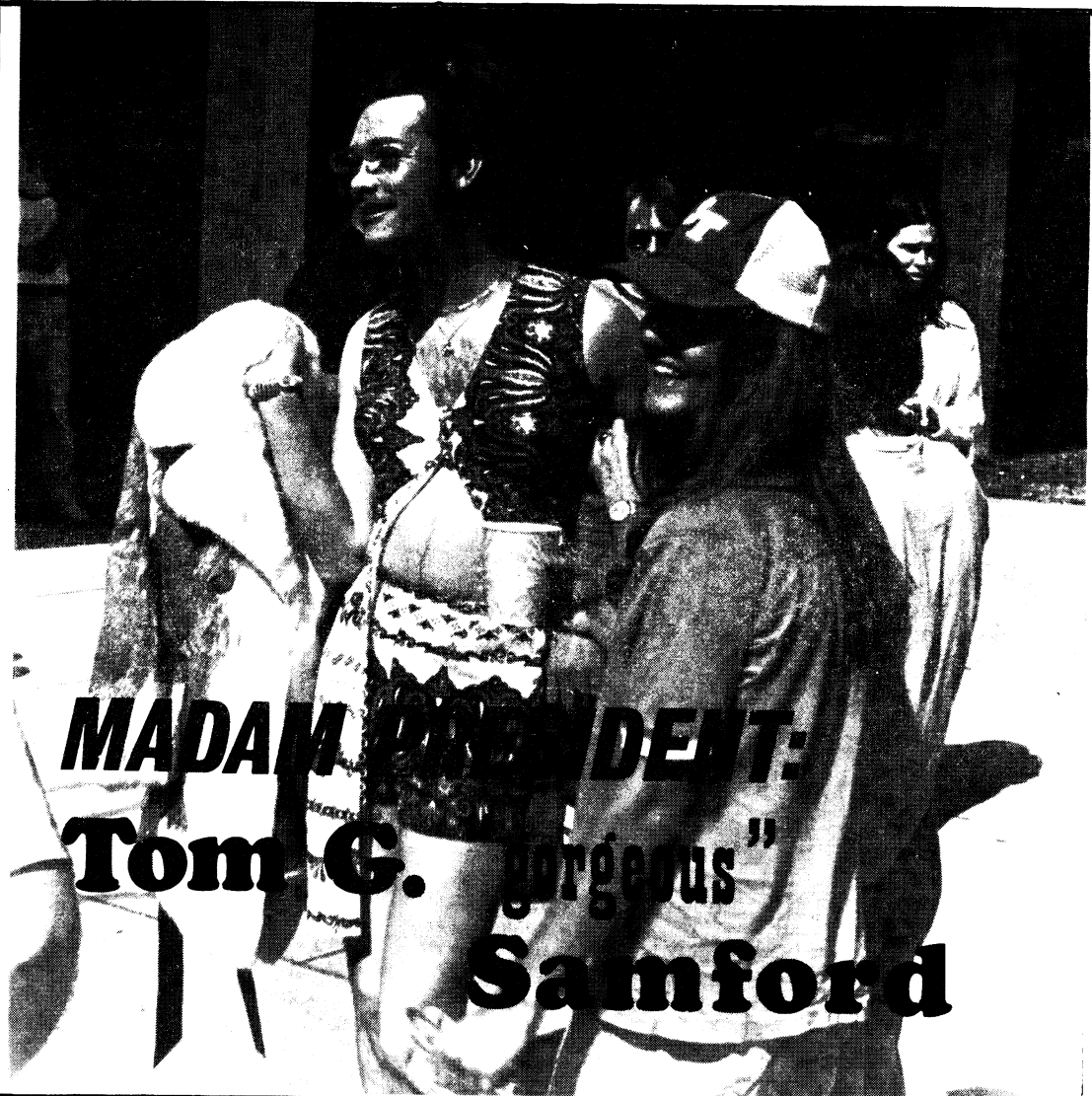

Dear Editor,

I can't stand it anymore! The women on campus should have said something by now about the unfortunate appellations for women printed by The STIng. But they haven't; so I shall.

The Greeks are the worst offenders. In the October 24, 1977 issue of The STIng, TKE proudly announced that "two more men" have recently pledged the fraternity. In the very next sentence, being caught up in the abuse of precise language and ideas of traditional superiority, the "men" wrote: "Five girls have been given bids to become little sisters." In a society that is finally coming out of the sexist dark ages and awakening to the need for recognized, demonstrated equality of women, this kind of condescension through language is no longer tolerable. It is also particularly obnoxious on a college campus where new, forward looking ideas traditionally have been born and nurtured.

As racial minorities have begun to win equality, so the language has changed to accommodate the acceptance and fostering of this equality. In the not too distant past, coloreds became Negroes, and Negroes became Blacks; Mexicans became Mexican-Americans, and Mexican-Americans became Chicanos. As language has been a tool for racism, so it is becoming the tool for equality. The problem of sexism in language is no different. As women achieve their rightful positions in society, the language must reflect and encourage that movement. This is, of course, an idea whose time has come. To continue to write and speak with sexist overtones, no matter how innocently it may be done, is to ignore that which is evident and to cut ourselves off from imperative social awareness. Living in a state of negligence is living in a state of sin. So wipe out your social sins! Wake-up men and ask the women to join you! Wake-up girls and little sisters and become women!

MONEY, MONEY WHO'S GOT THE MONEY

A recent issue of the STing asked why Southern Tech returned \$56,000 to the state. Seeking the answer to this question, I visited the office of Mr. H. L. McClure, Associate Executive Director. Mr. McClure stated we did return some money to the state, but nothing close to the amount reported by the STing.

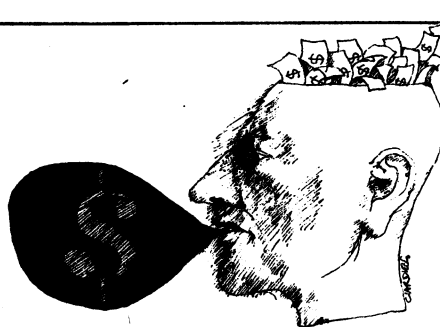
Mr. McClure was asked why we returned money to the state. His answer was simple and honest... "We Goofed." He made no attempt to justify mistakes, but pointed out in the accounting area that STI was functioning independently of Georgia Tech for the first time. This made it necessary to identify specific areas which require special audit procedures. Early identification of surplus money will allow an amended budget proposal to be submitted to the Board of Regents.

There are strict limitations involving the use of state funds, unless approved by the Board of Regents. Southern Tech can accomplish a transfer of state money if it is used for the purpose budgeted. For example: one supply account could receive money from another supply account, etc.

Mr. McClure listed the areas which had surplus money as follows:

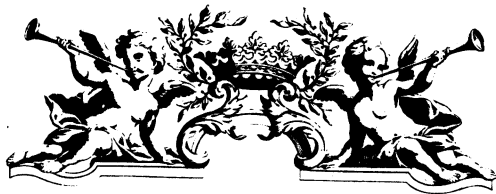
- 1) Southern Tech received a \$10,000 Federal Grant requiring matching funds. Both Southern Tech and Georgia Tech committed matching funds for the grant. The duplication was discovered too late for recovery.
- 2) An unexpected drop in utility bills left a surplus of about \$6,300 which was discovered too late to initiate transfer. Fluctuating rate charges contributed heavily to this surplus.
- 3) Auxilliary Services (food service, dormitories, bookstore) provided an income of about \$7,000 to the Physical Plant above that budgeted from this source. This, too, was discovered too late to spend it.
- 4) Personnel Services (Janitorial) accumulated approximately \$6,000 primarily from docked time. A communication breakdown let the time for transfer get away again.
- 5) Grounds Services did not use \$2,700 of their budget allocation.

Could Southern Tech have used the \$7,000 returned to the state for dormitory operation? "No!" says Mr. S.E. McCoy, Vice Chancellor of Physical Affairs for the Board of Regents. Mr. McCoy states that it is a Board of Regent policy not to use state funds for Auxilliary Services (food service, dormitories, bookstore) and that this policy is predominant throughout the nation.

Mr. McClure assures the STing that adequate procedures now exist to prevent the return of funds to the state.

INTERVIEW WITH THE NEW CO-OP DIRECTOR

This weeks interview is with Regenia Doyle, our new Co-op Director.

I asked her what the Co-op Program was. She explained it is a program where a student works one quarter then comes to school one quarter and alternates until graduation.

If you start in your freshman year, by the time you graduate you will have two years seniority in the company. A person who hasn't co-oped starts in the company from the bottom after graduation. It usually takes five years to graduate and is non-credit, but the job opportunity is great if you can get into it.

The companies that recruit students are from Atlanta, 80% are in Georgia with a few out of state. Some of the out of state companies even pay your travel expenses to and from school.

To apply for the co-op program, you must go by Ms. Doyle's office in the Goat Shed and fill out an application. The only requirement is that you have to have been here at least three quarters. In exceptional cases, you may be able to join the program after the first quarter. Ms. Doyle said that the minimum grade point average is 2.0, but some companies require a 2.5.

Ms. Doyle got her undergraduate at University of Georgia and Masters in Educational Administration at Georgia Southern. She worked for three and a half years at Marietta Cobb Vocational School before accepting the open position here.

Ms. Doyle has been here only two months and says that she has enjoyed it and looks forward to serving STI.

The Departments of English and Social Studies and Continuing Education are enjoying well deserved feelings of pride and satisfaction after having hosted INTERFACE '77--a most successful national conference on the humanities and technology. For two and a half days (October 20-22) at the Marietta Ramada Inn, college professors in both the humanities and technology presented over 50 papers on such diverse subjects as preparing engineers and engineering technologists for a humanistic approach to public technology, the mounting fears of "technological overindulgence," and the impact of technology on human sexuality.

Under the apt organizing leadership of Drs. Robert Fischer, Amos St. Germain, John Tumlin, and Richard Castellucis, the conference was conducted without flaws, professionally and with sophistication. Contributing greatly to this success were some familiar Southern Tech faculty: Professor Robert Hays, and Drs. Philip Secrist, Simon Stricklen, Frank Taylor, and Lee Tucker presented provocative, well-conceived papers in separate sessions. Dr. John Tumlin chaired an interesting panel discussion on the overview of the interface. All in some way reinforced the theme of the conference which became to all who attended increasingly imperative: the interface of an ever more complicated technology and ever more demanding system of human values must be reinforced, if we are to expect benign, yet vigorous human progress.

As a new faculty member, I was impressed with Southern Tech's contribution to these important considerations. And I could see the interface strengthening as I shared the audience with Electrical Department Head, Professor David Summers. But I did regret not being able to share our experience with more of my colleagues from the technical, degree granting departments. What promised to be an interesting time turned out to be not only interesting, but eminently sane. I know Professor Summers shares this thought with me; I only hope that other of my colleagues will come to.

STI GETS A NEW DEAN

Charles E. Smith, former assistant dean of student services at West Georgia College, was recently named Dean of Students.

In announcing his appointment after approval by the Board of Regents, Dr. Walter O. Carlson, executive director/dean of Southern Tech, said that Mr. Smith brings to the position a broad range of experience in student activities, having served in various capacities in student affairs in West Georgia and other institutions.

In his eight years at West Georgia College, Mr. Smith served as director of housing, assistant dean of student services for student life, and assistant dean of student services. STI BASEBALL BOOSTS LINEUP

Southern Tech took several steps toward putting its baseball program back on the right track recently, as Coach Charles Lumsden announced the signing of three new players.

They are Robin Parker, a righthanded pitcher, lefthander Kenny Forsyth, and centerfielder Mickey Dunn.

Parker transfers in from Polk Junior College in Winter Haven, Fla., after having an illustrious prep career at Bryan Station Senior High in Lexington, Ky.

Parker, a 6-2, 205-pounder, was 5-2 on the mound and hit .310 his senior year. He also averaged eight points for the basketball team.

Forsyth, a 6-1, 190-pounder, played his high school ball at Paulding County, where he was 4-1 with a 1.35 ERA his junior year and was a football All-America his senior year.

Forsyth has pitched the past two seasons for Chattahoochee Valley Community College in Phenix City, Ala. The Pirates finished third in the state Forsyth's freshman year and won the state his sophomore season, losing out to eventual national runner-up Dekalb South in the regional tournament.

Dunn is a freshman out of Murray County High School and brings with him a big bat and flashy glove.

As a senior Dunn led his team to the state playoffs by hitting .496 with six home runs. This summer Dunn had a six-for-six performance against Ringgold, including two doubles, one home run, five runs scored and five RBI.

The 5-10, 145-pounder has already shown his form in fall practice. His hustle, combined with speed and range in center field, should enable Dunn to step right into the starting lineup.

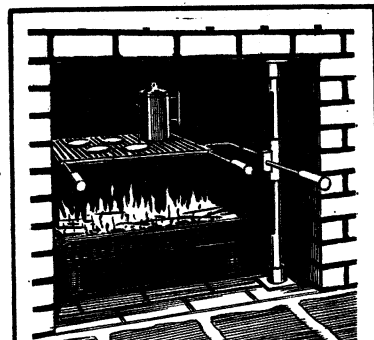

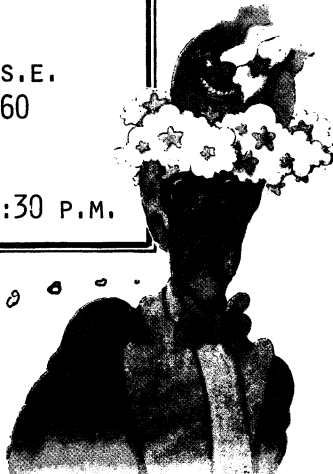

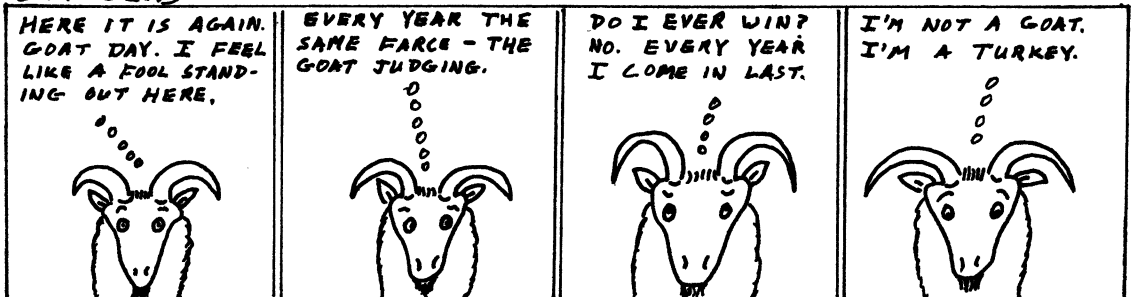
A cassette recorder is here for students who
