OPINION

Last week in this space I presented a column which contained my opinions on the SGA Vice-President's qualifications for the office of the President. Those opinions were my own, based on the facts available to me at the time that I wrote the article. I had asked the Vice-President for an interview on two occasions to confirm or deny the allegations that I later printed in the article. He refused both times, claiming on the second opportunity that he did not want to be recorded.

The sources for the story were, therefore, one-sided, but they were very reliable. They included members of the SGA and my own recollection of the controversy. However, there was at least one error in the story that I know of: the SGA Secretary asked for the Vice-President's resignation, not the Treasurer. Another question was raised as to the use of the word malfeasance to describe the conduct of the Vice-President. That question must be left up to you.

The Vice-President contends that the allegations in that story are lies; that he did ask for prior approval of his actions to set up the intramural championship. He says that he could not get that approval because there was not a quorum at that meeting. He says that the SGA membership present tabled the plan with the understanding that he could go ahead with preparations for the game.

The Vice-President also said that I failed to adequately present his accomplishments in a fair light; that I did not devote enough space to them. This is true. The thrust of the article was by no means "straight" news, it was blatantly opinionated. Still, had he complied with my requests for an interview, the article would probably not have been quite so harsh. In fact, it may never have been written.

In the interest of fairness, both I and the editor of WHATSIZNAME, Tim McCarthy, asked the Vice-President to submit a rebuttal in the form of a letter. He refused. His motives are his own, of course, but one wonders why the Vice-President would not make such an effort to clarify his side of the issue. Apparently, he has decided to let the voters make their determination from the facts that he gave me in our conversa-

tions subsequent to the publication of the article last week. I would have preferred that he write his own defense, but he chose not to do so.

Some have said that a great disservice was done in publishing that article. Others say that it is one man's opinion, to which he is entitled. Some despise it for what it doesn't say; others praise it for what it does. You must decide which is the proper position.

If there was any good to come from the article, it is this: never before have I seen such wide spread interest in a campaign on this campus for a SGA office. Perhaps, by being so controversial, it dispelled part of the apathy that hangs like a mist over the campus.

The Department of Electrical Engineering Technology announces that a new associate-degree option in Nuclear Safety is now being offered.

The student who enters Southern Technical Institute in the summer or fall of 1974 would take the basic courses in Engineering Technology. In the year 1975-76 this same student would be taking largely those courses dealing in Electrical Engineering Technology and Nuclear Safety.

The student who has completed the first year of courses either at Southern Technical Institute or by transfer credits to Southern Technical Institute can begin taking the courses in Nuclear Safety in the fall of 1974. These courses are listed in the 1973-74 catalog as Physics 375, 377, and 379. Several four-year students and students within other departments are planning on taking the sequence of courses starting in the fall. This has developed since, several companies are interested in hiring engineering technologists with some education in the nuclear field.

The Georgia Tech Research Reactor and the nuclear reactor simulator at Southern Technical Institute will be incorporated into the students' education and training.

The need for well-educated and well-trained individuals to insure the safe use of nuclear materials is very much in demand and shall continue to be for many years. This point is well founded by publications and manpower surveys made by the Southern Interstate Nuclear Board.

Georgia Power Company assisted in the development of this program, and is constructing two nuclear power units at Baxley, Georgia. They also plan to construct two more units near Waynesboro, Georgia. The Sequoyah Nuclear Power Plant is under construction in nearby Chattanooga, Tennessee by the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Nuclear energy is a very important part of the world's future demands. By the year 2000 more than 50% of the electrical-energy needs of Americans will be produced by nuclear means.

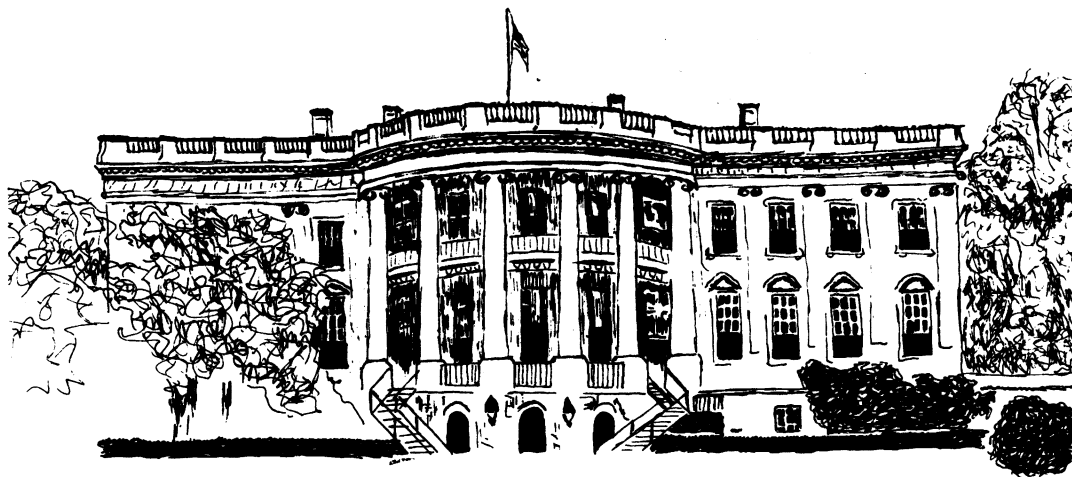
