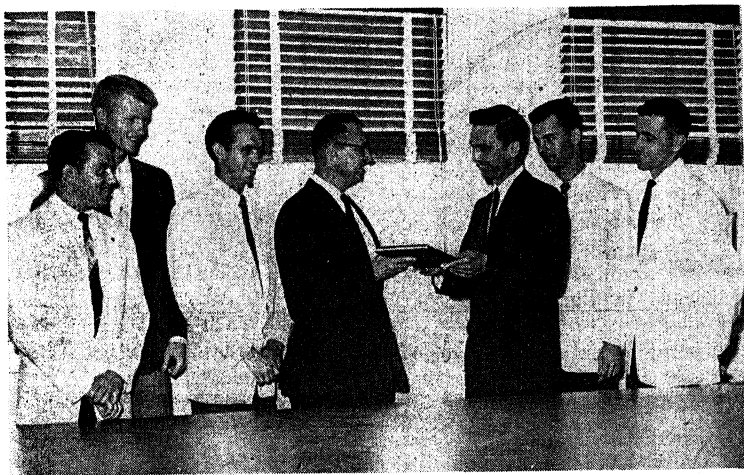
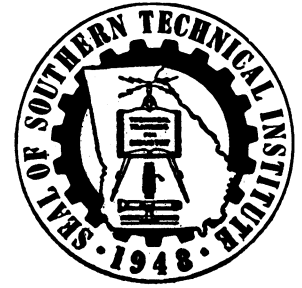

## Morris M. Bryan, Jr. To Be Commencement Speaker

Mr. Morris M. Bryan, Jr., President of Jefferson Mills, and a member of the Board of Regents, will be the principal speaker at the graduation exercises for Southern Technical Institute to be held in the auditorium at the Naval Air Station, Saturday, June 7, at 11:00 a.m.

Mr. Bryan was born in Athens, Georgia on August 10, 1919. In 1937 he entered Georgia Institute of Technology. He graduated from Georgia Tech with honors in 1941, having earned a B.S. degree in Textile Engineering.

He served in World War II where he advanced to Lieutenant Colonel. He received the Legion of Merit and the Bronze Star for a distinguished and meritorious war record.

In 1948, Mr. Bryan was made president of Jefferson Mills with plants in Jefferson and Crawford, Georgia. Under his capable direction, the plants have been completely modernized and doubled in capacity so that today they are recognized as being among the best in the industry.

In 1955 he was elected president of the Cotton Manufacturers Association of Georgia. He became the 44th Georgia Textile Mill executive to hold that office, and was the youngest man ever to hold this office.

Mr. Bryan served as treasurer, vice president and president of the Textile Education Foundation, Inc., a non-profit organization, which helped to construct and equip the outstanding A. French Textile School at Georgia Tech.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce elected Mr. Bryan in 1951 as one of five outstanding young men in the state of Georgia.

He also served as co-chairman of the Ninth District Committee for the Alexander Memorial Building fund, which raised \$65,000.00 toward the cost of the new Athletic Building at Georgia Tech.

He is also past-commander of the Jefferson Post of the American Legion.

During World War II, while Mr. Bryan was in England, he met and married the former Miss Eileen

# Campus Interview

Now you are ready for the campus interview. The Placement Bureau will have set up a tight schedule for the recruiter, for whom every minute during his visit will be a busy one.

Beforehand, you should carefully complete necessary application blanks. It is vitally important that you be punctual for your appointment. An unfavorable first impression may kill your chances altogether, and tardiness will do much to start you off in the wrong direction. College dress is famous these days for being, shall we say, casual. You should forget your blue jeans, T-shirts, saddle shoes, and droopy socks when you are job-seeking. Wear a shirt, tie and coat; have a shine on your shoes; comb your hair (sometimes it is worthwhile to have it trimmed); and have your face and hands properly groomed. During the interview never chew gum and do not smoke unless you are invited to do so. In all probability you know these factors, but there are many who might flunk this test without a reminder.

## PRESENT YOUR QUALIFICATIONS

During the interview, let the recruiter lead the discussion, but uphold your part of it. Do not make him pull information out of you. BE modest but not to the point of being awkward or too retiring. Be ready to present your qualifications directly and compactly, for if you don't tell your good points no one else will, and the interviewer is definitely not a crystal ball gazer. Be courteous and pleasant and not condescending or cocky. By knowing as much as possible about the recruiter's company and the types of positions which he is trying to fill, you may be able to sell the employer the fact that you have

something to offer his organization which will make it worth his while to hire you. Remember that he is not there to sell his company to you but rather to secure for himself the best talent the college market offers.

Remember there is seldom a personal interview from which at least one of the parties does not learn something new, provided he keeps his eyes and ears open and his brain functioning. Be sure therefore, to analyze your conduct, attitude, and reactions during the interview and profit by the mistakes that you probably will have made. By proper analysis and by altering an unfavorable approach in your first interview, you may develop just the right technique for your second job interview.

## YOU MUST SELL YOURSELF

In final words of advice bear in mind that the Placement Bureau "places" no one. It may give you just the right "lead" for the job you get, but it is you who must sell yourself into that job and convince the employer that you are the right man for the job. Once you have accepted a position, stop shopping around. The employer is committed to take you on as of a certain date, and if you consider other job offers, you may find yourself in the unhappy spot of having accepted positions with two companies at the same time. This would only cause deep resentment on the part of the rejected employer and great embarrassment to yourself, and particularly to the Placement Bureau which gave you the leads. As soon as you have been employed, write a letter of thanks to each person who helped you to secure your position. Such letters cost little effort, but they make a tremendous impression upon the recipient and are often valuable in future business relationships.

## Radio Club Improves STI's Facilities For Technicians

To many of the students around Southern Tech who have seen the inside of the radio club, the facilities of W4OMC probably appeared to be a maze of wires and knobs on strange cabinets. To the uninformed, it may seem that it would be impossible to broadcast even so much as a squeak from such an apparent mess. This is far from the truth. Radio signals do pour out from W4OMC, but this isn't enough to satisfy the members of the club.

The fellows got busy and after any hours of work, have changed the appearance of the club's quarters. The club is proud of its efforts and would like for all of Southern Tech to see it.

**FACILITIES ARE THE BEST**  
Here is a resume of the facilities of W4OMC at the present and forecast for the immediate future. A console has been constructed to hold the receivers, conelrad arm, all-band amateur transmitter and a master control panel. The master control has inputs for 70 microphones, two headphones, a key jack, and a speaker. There will be remote control switches for selecting antennas and transmitter send-receive controls. Main A-C Power controls are also located on the control panel.

The master control panel makes possible to have control of any piece of equipment within easy reach of the operator. This feature similar to the ones found in the large broadcast stations. It is believed that it will make operating pleasure rather than a nightmare of switching and adjust-

ments each time a transmission is made.

The station is equipped with a Collins transmitter set up for the two mars nets. This transmitter is the pride of the club because it gives A4OMC, the mars station, a loud voice on the air. This is especially important on the third army traffic net of which A4OMC is a member.

Currently, a 300-watt amateur transmitter is under construction and is expected to be in operation by early summer or before. This transmitter will give W4OMC full coverage on the high frequencies, 3 through 30 megacycles. Being able to get on 15 and 10 meters will be a new experience for most of W4OMC's operators as here before, 20 meters was the highest band available with the equipment which was available.

The Hamerlund HQ-129-X and National HFS receivers make it possible to cover all frequencies from the broadcast band through 220 megacycles.

Future plans for the station include some VHF experimentation. This will be mostly on two meters as a two-meter transmitter is available. Six-meter activity in the Atlanta area is limited by channel 2 interference.

The novices are not to be forgotten. A complete novice station with 75-Watt transmitter and a receiver is planned.

The radio club is a campus-wide organization and is open to all Southern Tech students. More members are needed and those who are interested are encouraged to join the club.

## Technical Report Is Prepared By Father of STI Student

The father of a Southern Tech student, so the Technician has learned, has been doing some interesting writing as a part of a very responsible industrial job. Mr. Jack H. Lacher, father of each student John Lacher, has written a technical paper entitled "Readable Words and Sentences."

Mr. Lacher's paper resulted from his years of experience with I. du Pont de Nemours & Company, Incorporated, a firm which has employed many Southern Tech graduates. In his report Mr. Lacher stresses effective English as a communication tool for managers, supervisors, and salaried personnel.

During his nearly thirty years with du Pont, Mr. Lacher has worked in the main offices in Delaware, in a cellophane plant in Argentina, and more recently in the H-bomb plant in Aiken, South Carolina.

Until recently, Mr. Lacher was responsible for writing job instructions and other technical papers for the H-bomb plant.

Students who wish to study Mr. Lacher's report can check it out from the Southern Tech library. The report is not classified.

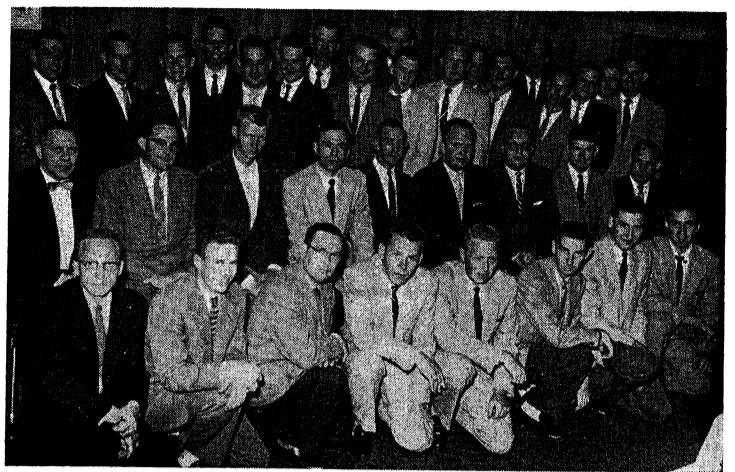

Students are invited to join Tau Alpha Pi after they have made the honor roll for two consecutive quarters and if they haven't failed a subject while enrolled at Southern Tech.

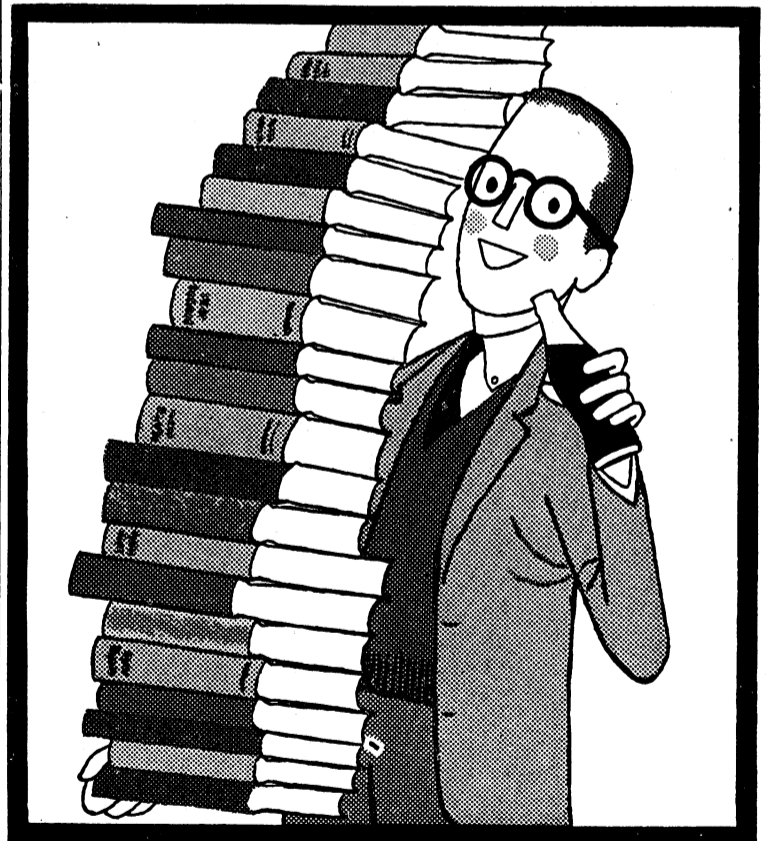
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# Odom Blocked GSW's Path, But Wade Sneaked By, 4-3
