

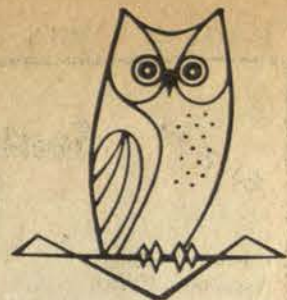

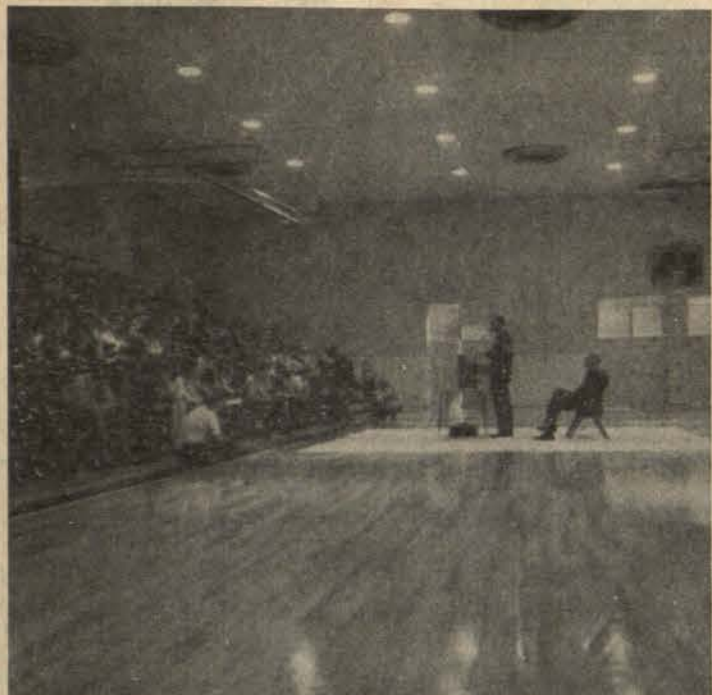

Gubernatorial Candidates Speak To Students At STI

Lester Maddox, Democratic nominee for governor, speaks Wednesday, November 2, on the Southern Tech campus.

Howard "Bo" Callaway, Republican candidate for Governor of Georgia, spoke Thursday, October 20, in the Southern Tech gym.

Baptist Student Union Organized

The first organizational meeting of the Baptist Student Union was held on October 17, on the Southern Tech campus in Room 225. Mr. D. Eugene Briscoe, North West Georgia Area Director of the Department of Student Work, Georgia Baptist Convention, was present and set forth the motives and objectives of the Baptist Student Union.

Mr. Briscoe spoke on what the Baptist Student Union has meant to other campuses such as Georgia and Georgia Tech. After the speech, the students present began organizing, by electing officers for the coming year, and forming their Constitution. The elected officers are as follows:

President, Chip Souther; Vice President, Joel Daniels; Secretary-Treasurer, Dianne Bryan; Devotional Chairman, Lida Sanders; Social Chairman, Mary Lou Davis; Music Chairman, Cheryl Tumlin.

Students of all denominations are invited to attend the meetings, which are held on the first and third Wednesday of each month at 5 p.m. There will be notices of special events and meetings posted.

Dance Plans

Plans are in the process for a KJC Christmas Dance. It will be Dec. 3 at the Marietta YWCA for KJC students and their dates. "No one else will be admitted," stated Dean Meadows, Dean of Students.

The group to play for the dance has not been selected as of press time.

Callaway declared the prime issue of the campaign to be education. He stated that Georgia teachers received four hundred dollars less per year than South Carolina, and a good amount less than the national average. Mr. Callaway proposed expansion of the trade and vocational school program and a greater amount of money for the total educational program in Georgia.

Stressing the importance of bringing new industry to Georgia, Mr. Callaway emphasized the importance of having skilled workers in the state's industries. Callaway proposed a system of incentive for business to train workers.

The Republican candidate proposed a priority system of highway construction and an expansion of Georgia's mental health program. Mr. Callaway further stated that he was opposed to the loyalty oath requiring members of political parties to support every party candidate.

Mr. Callaway ended his address by stating that the federal guidelines violated the constitution, whereas the "freedom-of-choice" system complies with the law.

Dr. Horace Sturgis, President of Kennesaw Junior College, stated in an interview that the "possibilities are excellent" that Kennesaw will start the winter quarter on its own campus. Dr. Sturgis further stated that, barring further work stoppages, the only building on the campus that is likely to be unfinished when the quarter begins is the gymnasium.

At the present time, many of the buildings are almost completed, and almost all of the final touches will be completed by December 15.

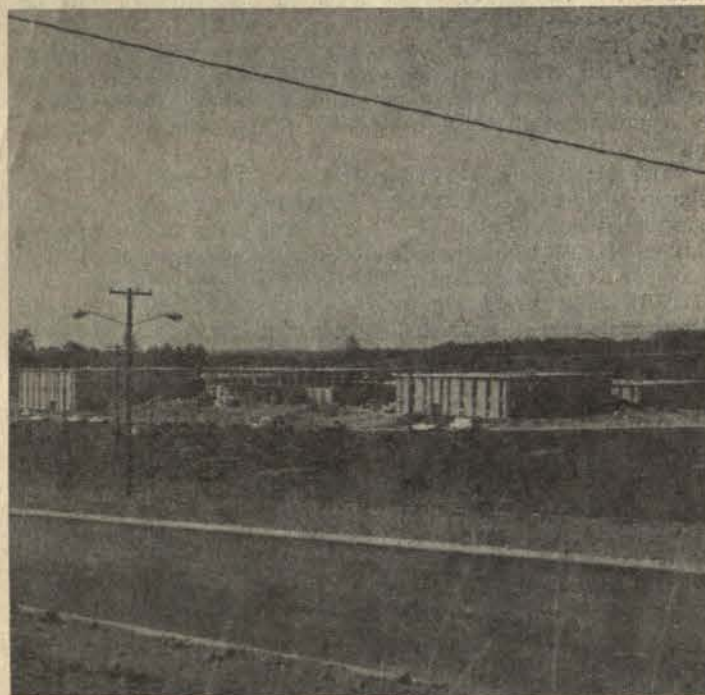
According to the construction schedule the following buildings will be completed by November 15: the Maintenance and Warehouse Building; the Science Building (housing the laboratories and lecture rooms for physics and chemistry); Classroom Building No. 2 (housing classrooms for the Humanities); and the Administration Building.

Also, the following buildings will be completed by December 15: Classroom Building No. 1 (housing the Social Sciences); Student Services Building (housing the College Bookstore and meeting rooms for various organizations on campus, along with a cafeteria and student lounge); and, as a possibility, the Library.

According to the Cobb County Commission of Roads, the paving at the campus will be finished by November 15.

Dr. Sturgis further stated that if the work stoppages had not occurred, the college would be occupying its own campus at the present time. All in all, there were twenty-four weeks of partial work stoppage, and eleven weeks of complete work stoppage in the time since the contract for the building was signed.

Meeting recently in the Choir Room of Marietta's First Baptist Church, twenty-five students, a few more girls than boys, began the organization of this group.

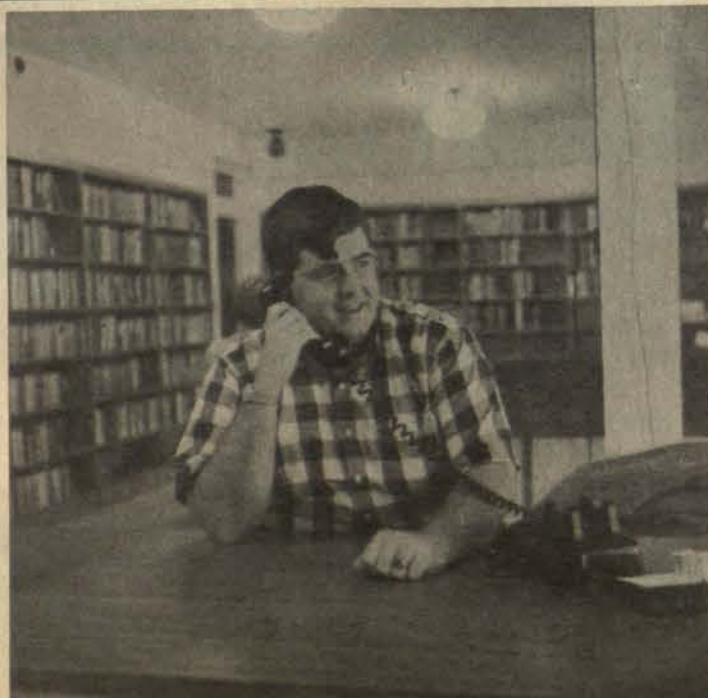
Miss Lucy Lee, Music Professor will advise and direct the Glee Club.

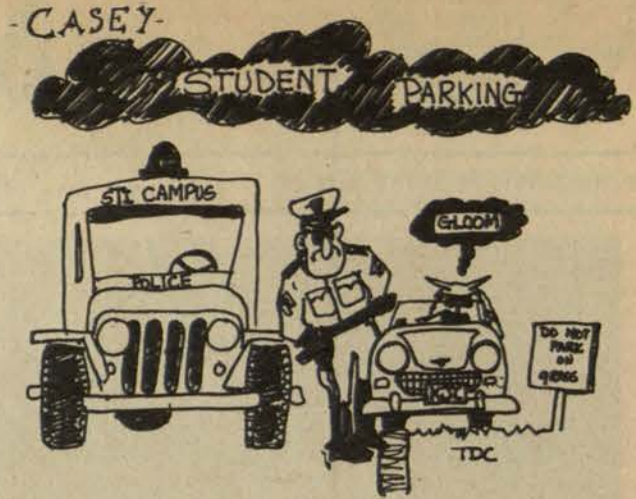

How many times have you sat down and wondered: what can I do this Saturday night? Too often the answer is, "I guess we'll go to movies or something like that." This attitude is all right for the usual high-school harem set, but college students are by nature more discriminating and are continually seeking out new and different things to do at night.

There is usually quite a bit of action in the Atlanta area, most of it being simple to find. There are, however, quite a few new (and old) places that are as yet undiscovered by the college set in Greater Atlanta. One such place is the Comic Book Club, a brandnew establishment dedicated to the fine principle that a general rock-out is the only way to fly. The Comic Book is located on Peachtree in the Peachtree Battle Shopping Center, and is quite a groove just about any time. One hang-up that does not affect the majority of Kennesaw students is the age limit. The minimum age is eighteen, and identification is carefully checked. There have been several extremely good bands at the Comic Book recently, including the Rockin' Romans, the Remicks, a Nashville group, The group Therapy from Holland, and the Fugitives, a local group who just got back from a tour of the United States.

For the ethnic or folk music crowd, there are several excellent spots offering the best in Atlanta and the south in the field of folk music. The Bistro, located on West Peachtree just up from Fourteenth, features Ray Whitley, recording and night club artist, every Monday and Tuesday night. Appearing along with Ray at other times during the night are various guest artists, many of them from other parts of the country. At other times in the week, such greats as Buddy Moss, Columbia recording artist, are to be heard. The Cuisine at the Bistro includes pizza for everybody and



assorted beverages.

One of the most exciting new places for folk music is the Studio, just opened and really going strong. The program at the Studio is generally a kind of freewheeling happening, but the program usually includes Bob Barnes, DeVon Bogue, Mike Austin, and Dave Campbell. The Studio is open only on Saturday nights and features one of the most unique atmospheres in the Atlanta Scene. The Studio is located on Cheshire Bridge Road, N. E. behind the Shamrock Lounge near the corner of Piedmont Road and Cheshire Bridge.

Bad news of the week! NO DANCE UNTIL DECEMBER THE 3rd. I hear it will be a big show, however, when the Christmas Dance does come. Who's Whoo Among KJC Students

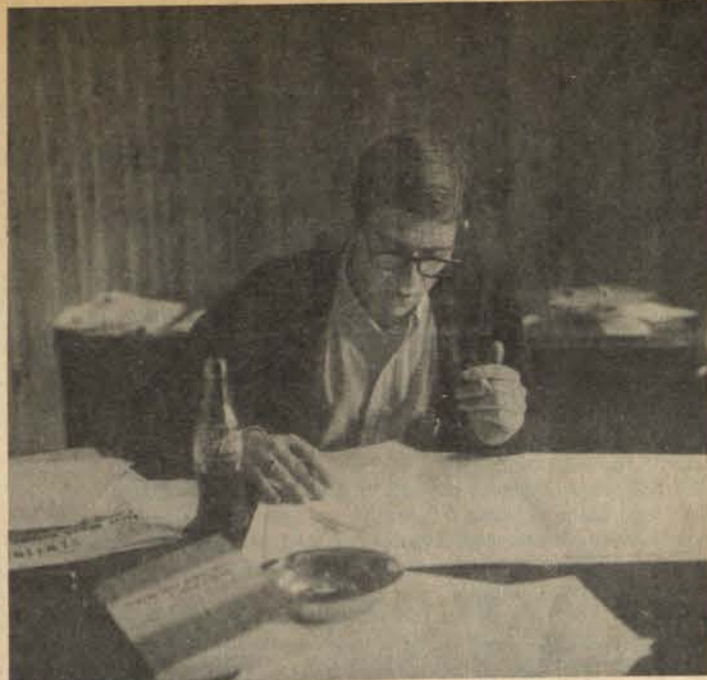
While Dave Campbell appears to be a normal, everyday college student when one first sees him, the fact that he is more than just a college student becomes obvious when any conversation with him has been completed.

Kennesaw students are very privileged to have Dr. Meadows as their counselor and friend. Such a man as dedicated as he is not easily found.

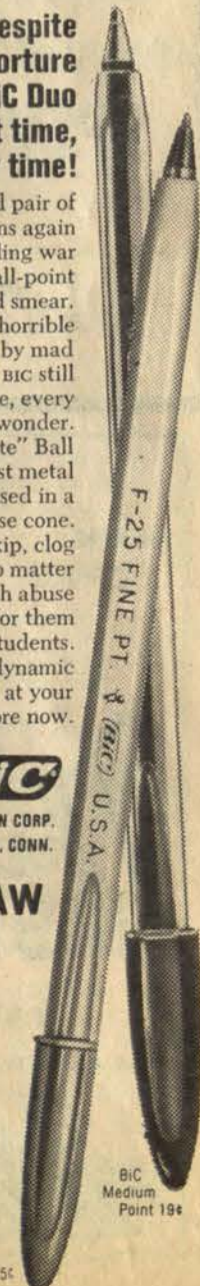


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Baptist Student Convention

Smoking Rules Clarified

Many Kennesaw Junior College students have asked what the smoking regulations are on the Southern Tech campus and if it is permissible to smoke in classrooms.

Southern Tech's policy does not permit smoking in classrooms. However, smoking in other areas is allowed. The reasons for this ruling are that insurance rates are quite reduced with this policy and that smoking may be detrimental to

classroom study and instruction. The same policy holds true at Marietta Place.

Dean Meadows commented when asked about the smoking policy for Kennesaw Junior College students when they are on their new campus this winter that there are as yet "no specific rules for the Kennesaw campus." He mentioned that rules would likely be similar to the ruling at Southern Tech.

The Dean said that this was, in comparison to high schools and some other colleges, a fair and liberal ruling.
