Graduation Exercises Auditorium, June 10

The AS degrees will be received by two hundred and sixty-one graduates. Fourteen of these will receive two degrees and one will be given three degrees.

The word from the administration is that the speaker for the exercises has not been selected.

Summer Registration

April was a busy month for Tech-Annes as plans were completed for the up-coming annual May Banquet,

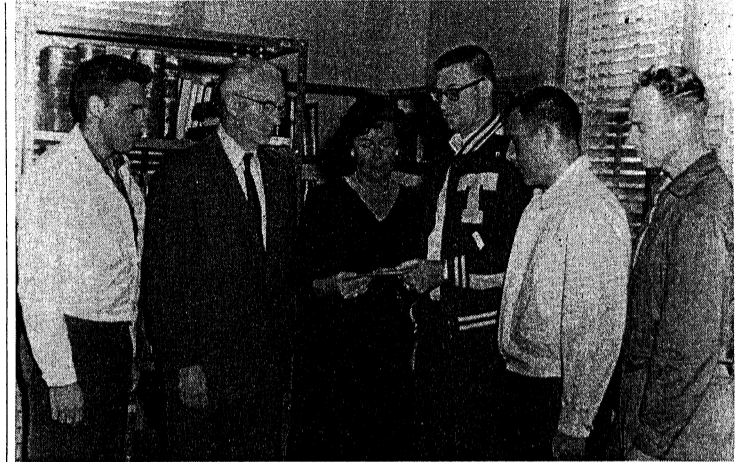

In the past year the library has received many donations and books. Many additional books have also been purchased by the library.

The library has expressed its sincere appreciation to Dr. and Mrs. O. L. Lockhart, prominent Chamblians, for their contribution of the very fine copy of the Bible with concordance; to Mr. Frank D. Wood representing Moody's Investors Service for the copies of Moody's handbooks and manuals which should be valuable to prospective investors; and to members of the student body who need, and have contributed so much to the growth of, the S.T.I. library and who supported the recent Valentine dance sponsored by the student council. The proceeds of the dance were donated to the library fund.

Southern Tech Students have the use of the library on the Georgia Tech campus, since STI's library is a branch of the Georgia Tech library.

Radio Engineers Plan Demonstration Program

The STI Student Associate Branch of the Institute of Radio Engineers continues to grow, both in members and activities.

The branch, which was chartered in March of 1960 as the seventeenth of its kind in the nation, has approximately forty active members this quarter.

Activities during the past quarters have consisted of movies, tours of the Rich Computer Center at Georgia Tech, the Federal Aviation Agency radar station at Smyrna, Southern Bell's Ivy Street Building, and the transmitting facilities of WSB-TV.

The program planned for Thursday, April 27, 1961, says Mr. Carter, faculty representative for the IRE, will be "a demonstration of oscilloscopes by Tektronix, Inc. This promises to be an interesting program, and everyone is invited to attend."

According to Mr. Carter, "A student may join the local student branch, the national organization, or both, to increase his knowledge of electronics and to meet people in this challenging scientific field. Student members automatically become members of the Atlanta Section, and all are urged to attend the monthly Atlanta Section meetings.

Student members may also join one or more of the 28 IRE Professional Groups in specialized fields of electronics."

Students are invited to join the branch now so that they may participate in the tours and other activities planned for this quarter. Regular meetings are held during the club hour on second and fourth Thursdays of each month.

Clark Gives Facts As To Industrial Growth

HOUSING FACILITIES FOR STI STUDENTS AT NEW LOCATION IN MARIETTA

In September of 1961 Southern Tech is scheduled to move from its present location in Chamblee to its new school campus and plant in Marietta. Until dormitories for single students are constructed on the school's campus, single and married students will be housed in apartments in the nearby Marietta Place Project, one of the several projects operated by the Marietta Housing Authority.

Single students will be housed in one-and two-bedroom apartments at a cost of \$70.00 per quarter to them. All apartments have kitchens which may be used by the occupants if they choose to do so. However, three meals a day will be served to students in the Southern Tech dining hall on campus. Meals are also available in nearby restaurants.

Married students may secure housing in the Marietta Place Project. One-and two-bedroom, unfurnished and furnished units will be made available to them. A refrigerator and stove will be included in all these apartments. Cost of the apartments, per month, with all utilities furnished, are:

1 Bedroom, unfurnished	\$45.00
1 Bedroom, furnished	\$50.00
2 Bedroom, unfurnished	\$47.00
2 Bedroom, furnished	\$55.50

A \$25.00 security deposit is required in addition. This deposit will serve as a reservation fee also and is payable to the Marietta Housing Authority when the student files his application. The executive director urges that all who are interested in obtaining one of these apartments should make application just as quickly as possible. Mr. L. Y. Bryant, the Southern Tech registrar, has Marietta Housing Authority application forms available to those students who desire an apartment in the Marietta project. These forms are to be completed by applicant and mailed directly to the Marietta Housing Authority office.

GATES RE-OPENED

Have you noticed that Southern Tech campus gates have been re-opened? If not, take a look the next time you are near the administrative building or the dorms.

Southern Tech students should be commended for their behavior in this matter. In the past the gates have been opened and closed many times on account of behavior. Last year the gates were closed for a period of time due to speeding, the Navy informed us. On promise of good behavior these gates have been opened for an indefinite period of time which depends upon your future behavior. It is the wish of the administration that the gates may never have to be closed again.

SOUTHERN TECHNICAL INSTITUTE

Some New Regulations by the Administrative Council

The Southern Technical Institute Administrative Council, in session on March 27, 1961, established several policy-making decisions which potentially could affect the scholastic life and work of every student in the Institute. Because of their importance Registrar L. Y. Bryant was authorized by the Council to publicize the decisions and to urge students to become thoroughly familiar with them.

The regulations are:

(1) That a student may not repeat for the purpose of improving his point average a subject in which he has already made a grade of "B" or better. Council members found no objection to a student's repeating a subject in which he had made a poor grade. They felt, however, that when he had attained the grade of "B" or "A" in the subject, he could and should spend his time more profitably on some other subject.

(2) That a student must carry a minimum of ten hours of scholastic work to remain in school. This means simply that a student cannot at any time within the quarter get rid of so many subjects that his study load will drop below ten hours. If he does so, he will be dropped from Southern Tech.

(3) That a student shall not be dropped from the rolls of Southern Tech for point average deficiency without first being placed on probation for a quarter. Mr. Bryant explains that occasionally a student who has already qualified as a senior on the basis of hours passed and point average achieved drops below the required point average. In doing so he loses his status as a senior and heretofore had been dropped without a quarter of probation. This new regulation grants the student a quarter on probation before being dropped.

The effective date of these new regulations was established as March 27, 1961.

Council members also expressed dissatisfaction with the present lenient rules governing absences at Southern Tech, and much discussion took place concerning the number of absences a student should be allowed and penalties to enforce if they exceed this number. Though no changes were made in the present regulations, Council members agreed that the regulations should be revised this summer and that a new set of rules should be activated in the fall of 1961.

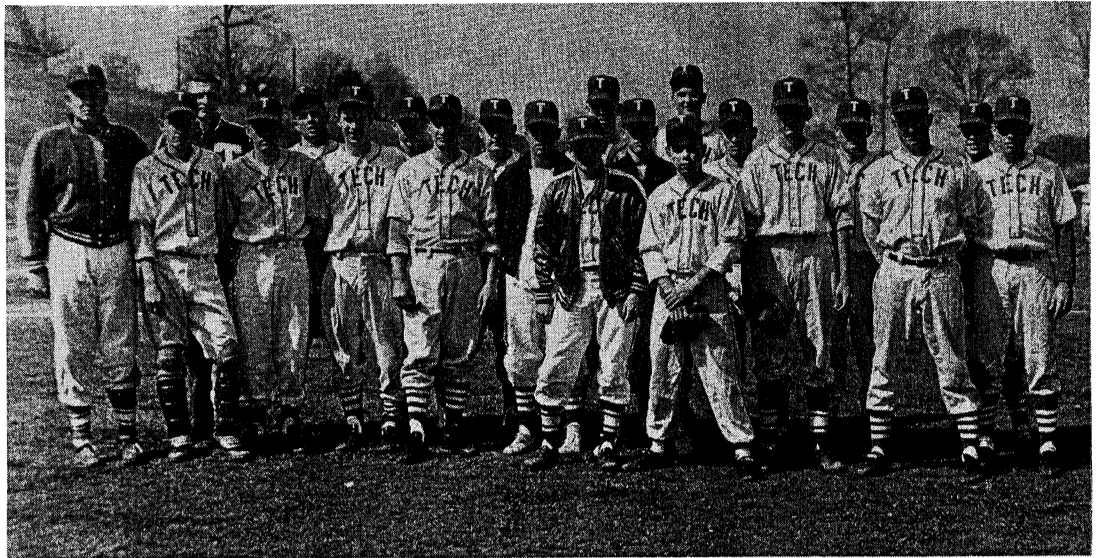

REMINDER TO CLUBS AND STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

A club or other student organization before holding a social function, on or off of the campus, must first obtain the approval of the Dean of Students. If the function is to be a campus-wide affair the approval must be obtained at least three weeks before the date of the function. If the affair is to be just for the members of the group, approval must be obtained at least a week before the date of the function. Blanks for this purpose are available at the Dean of Students' office.

Clubs planning to use pranks or stunts in an initiation ceremony must first have such pranks or stunts approved by the faculty adviser of the group or by the Dean of Students.

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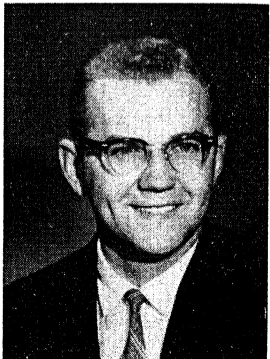
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
