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## Four Students Head Deans List Winter Quarter

Four college students finished their winter quarter at Southern Technical Institute with all-A averages, according to the honor-roll computations just released by the Southern Tech Registrar's office. In the official terminology of college registrars, the four future technicians "earned 4.0 averages."

The four all-A students at Southern Tech are:

R. J. Culpepper, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Rossie J. Culpepper, Sr., of Lake Wales, Florida.

Walter C. Jautz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gebhard A. Jautz of Rhinebeck, New York.

Johnny H. Pitts, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Pitts, Sr., of Thomaston, Georgia.

Joseph F. Williams, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph F. Williams, Sr., of Thomasville, Georgia. Williams had also earned a 4.0 average at Southern Tech the preceding quarter.

### SCHOLASTIC BREAKDOWN

A further breakdown on the scholastic averages shows that three students made between 3.80 and 3.99, seven had averages from 3.60 to 3.79, 16 made from 3.40 to 3.59, 24 grades were from 3.20 to 3.39 and 38 made from 3.00 to 3.19.

According to a study completed by the Southern Tech counselor's office, students who graduated from high school out of the state of Georgia made up 17 per cent of the student body in the winter quarter but they constituted 27 per cent of those on the Dean's list. Florida with five students, Alabama with three and Tennessee and Kansas with two each and led the list. Ten other states were represented and two foreign students, both from Columbia, were included.

High schools in the Atlanta metropolitan area furnished 30 per cent of Southern Tech's winter enrollment but they made up 28 per cent of those on the Dean's list. Three students graduated from North Fulton, two finished school at Marietta, Osborne, South Cobb and Tucker; and 14 other schools in the Atlanta area had graduates listed.

Georgia high schools outside the Atlanta metropolitan area gave Southern Tech 46 per cent of its winter quarter student body and 45 per cent of those on the honor roll. Savannah High School was represented by three graduates, and there were two each from Meriwether County High and Union High of Leslie. Thirty-five other high schools placed graduates on the Dean's list.

### TRANSFER STUDENTS

Thirty-four per cent of the students who made the list were transfers from other colleges, and they made up 23 per cent of the Southern Tech enrollment in the winter quarter. Twelve different campuses were represented on the Dean's list, but Georgia Tech with 19 transfers furnished more than half of those from other colleges.

Of the transfer students at Southern Tech in the winter quarter, 17 per cent made the Dean's list. For the out-of-state students, 17 per cent were listed on the honor roll while nine per cent of the Atlanta area students were included. For Georgia students outside the metropolitan area of Atlanta, 11 per cent were on the honor roll. A total of 92 students, 11 per cent of the enrollment for the winter quarter, was on the Dean's list.

The requirements for the Dean's list are: no failures, at least 15 hours of credit work, at least a 3.00 average, and no conduct offenses.

## Lockheed-Georgia Executive To Speak at Graduation

W. A. Pulver, president of the Lockheed-Georgia Company, will be the commencement speaker at the graduation exercises of Southern Technical Institute. The exercises will be held at 10 A.M., June 9, 1962, in the Fine Arts Auditorium of Marietta High School.

Mr. Pulver is a native of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and a graduate of the University of Michigan. He joined Lockheed in July 1936 as an engineering detailer. In October 1936 he was appointed group engineer in charge of shop liaison and was later project engineer on the P-38 airplane and the Navy Constitution.

Mr. Pulver works as manager at Factory "C" in Burbank, California, (1952), chief tool engineer at

the Burbank plant (1954), and chief manufacturing engineer (1955).

In June 1956 Mr. Pulver came to Georgia as chief engineer-product design. He was appointed chief engineer in April 1958 and assistant general manager in February 1959. On August 13, 1959, he was named a vice president of The Lockheed Aircraft Corporation and general manager of the company's Georgia operations.

Mr. Pulver is a member of the Institute of Aerospace Sciences and the Society of Automotive Engineers, (local chapter, national committee on aircraft and missiles, and the SAE Technical Board for 1960).

He is married to the former Miss Jo Elizabeth Kitchen and has two sons and a daughter.

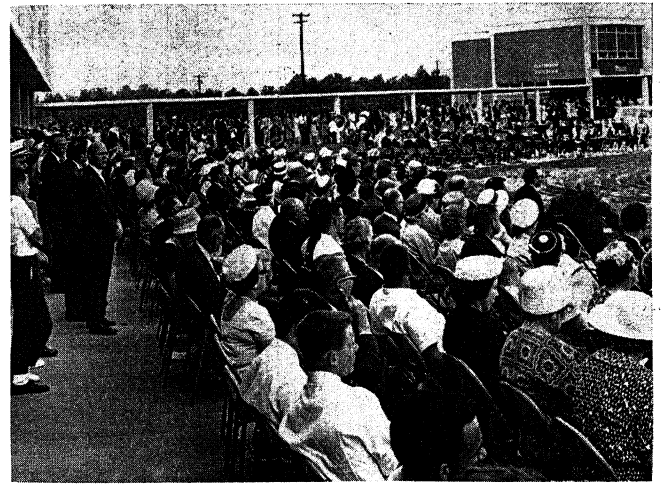

## New STI Campus Toured By Officials, Alumni, Visitors

Industry, education, and community leadership joined hands Sunday, May 6, in the formal Open House ceremony of one of the nation's newest college campuses. This event occurred at Southern Technical Institute, a unit of the Georgia Tech Engineering Extension Division. The formal ceremony began at 3:00 p.m.

Assistant Chief Ellison, Marietta Police Department, estimated the crowd at about three thousand. The City and County Police departments, aided by Southern Tech students, managed the parking facilities for the visitors.

Featured on the Open House program were addresses by Robert O. Arnold, Chairman of the Regents of Georgia's University System; T. R. May, Vice President of Lockheed Aircraft Corporation's Georgia Division; L. V. Johnson, former director of Southern Tech and now head of Georgia Tech's Engineering Extension; and Dr. E. D. Harrison, president of Georgia Tech. Rev. I. B. Hall, pastor of Marietta's First Baptist Church, delivered the invocation.

The program also included citation of distinguished guests from the Cobb County-Marietta Community by Harold S. Willingham, state representative from Cobb County. The Marietta High School Band played before and after the formal ceremony.

### TOUR OF CAMPUS

## Bryant Attends Registrar Meeting

L. Y. Bryant, registrar at Southern Technical Institute, Marietta, Georgia, attended the 48th Annual Meeting of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers in Kansas City April 24-27.

More than 800 representatives of 600 colleges and universities of the nation attended.

Guest speakers featured on the program were Dr. Roger Finch, Director of University Relations of the Peace Corps; Major H. Roe Bartle of Kansas City; Dr. B. Hopkins Moses, President, Wyoming Seminary; and Dr. Louis T. Benetz, President, The Colorado College.

Receiving special attention in the general sessions of the meeting were the adjustment problems of foreign students, financial assistance programs for students and the professional growth of admissions officers and registrars.

and staff members explained Southern Tech's eleven two-year Associate in Science Degrees.

Southern Tech's new campus represents a dream fourteen years in coming true. The college opened in March 1948 on rented facilities at the old Atlanta Naval Air Station in Chamblee, Georgia. In March 1958, Georgia's then-Governor Marvin Griffin announced the allocation of \$2 million for a new Southern Tech campus. Immediately after Griffin's announcement a contest between DeKalb County and Cobb County developed over relocation of the college.

Final decision of a home for Southern Tech went to Cobb County. Southern Tech held first registration on its partially completed campus on October 2, 1961. Cobb County's civic leadership had sparked a drive to extend to the college services, such as streets, parking space, land, and utilities. In view of the community efforts to obtain Southern Tech in Cobb County, a key theme of the Open House was relations between the school and community. In his message Dr. Harrison challenged community and faculty to cooperate.

Citing the civic efforts to move Southern Tech to Cobb County, Representative Willingham stated before the Open House: "The relocation of Southern Tech in Cobb County is one of the two greatest events I have witnessed in our county. The only comparable event was the erection of Government Aircraft Plant Number 6 (Lockheed). We of Cobb County wish we could say 'welcome' to Southern Tech a thousand different ways."

Willingham, a leader in Cobb's drive to get Southern Tech moved, saluted during the ceremony many of the civic and professional people who worked with him. Representative Willingham also saluted former Governor Griffin, who was present during the ceremony.

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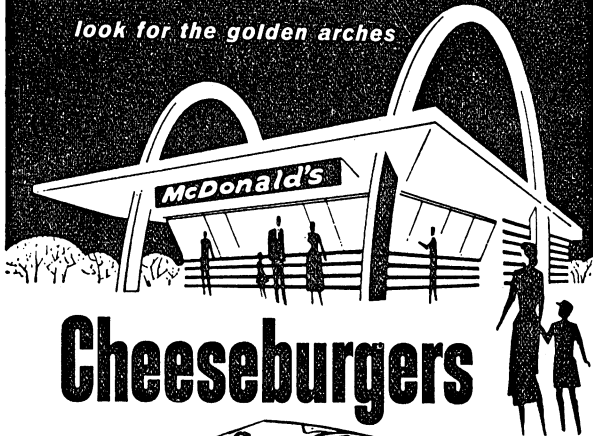
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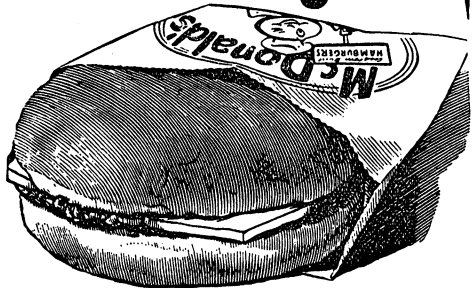
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## Golf Team Participates In Junior College Meet

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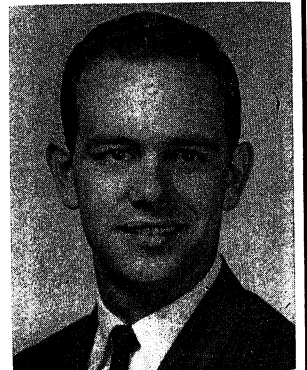
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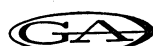


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
