**"AVAILABLE FOR RESERVATION"**

"The Student Center shall offer to STI students, faculty, staff, and alumni an environment conducive to fulfilling their non-academic needs on a personal or group basis..." With these needs in mind, our Student Center has been built to provide various areas for reservation and use.

The largest area available is the Multipurpose Room, which is approximately 60' by 70' in size and capable of seating 300 people for a banquet or 500 people lecture style. The Multipurpose Room is ideal for banquets, lectures, movies, concerts, and plays since it is equipped with a catering kitchen, sound system, projection booth, large movie screen and floodlights.

If the group is somewhat smaller in size, then room 119-120 is probably more appropriate. It is easily divided into two areas with a portable room divider. This room, when open, can seat up to 100 people lecture style. It is

carpeted, quiet, and located near the cafeteria serving line, making small luncheons and dinner meetings of up to 50 people possibilities for use.

Conference Room "A" is a small meeting room furnished with a round conference table and capable of seating 20 people. Conference Room "B" seat only 10 people. Both rooms would be good for small group meetings, committees, and conferences.

There are three open lounge and lobby areas on the first floor. On the second, there are four. All of these areas are designed for receptions, displays, exhibits, and distribution of literature and materials.

In closing, let me remind you that each "empty stage" in the Student Center is extremely versatile and well-suited to fulfill many needs. Help the Student Center out by writing your needs down, and visualizing which area you might like to reserve for use—so that you can start utilizing the Center as soon as it opens.

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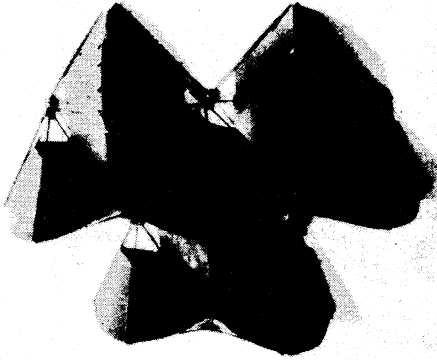
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### HI-FLYERS-GET STRUNG!

Who can beat a 21-hour, 36-minute kite flying record set by a two-man team atop Georgia's Stone Mountain?

Kite flying enthusiasts will get chances to challenge this 1976 record during the 7th Annual Endurance Kite Flying Contest on March 26 on the top of the 300-million-year-old monolith, 16 miles east of Atlanta.

Teams of two to four members, 18 years of age and over, may fly any type kites, weighing not over five pounds. Competing kites must be in the air by noon.

Teams may preregister by contacting Stone Mountain Park or register Kite Day starting 10 a.m. at the Skylift Building. There, registered teams will receive free skylift passage to the mountain top.

The team keeping their kite aloft longest wins the championship plaque and prizes. There are also awards for second and third place.

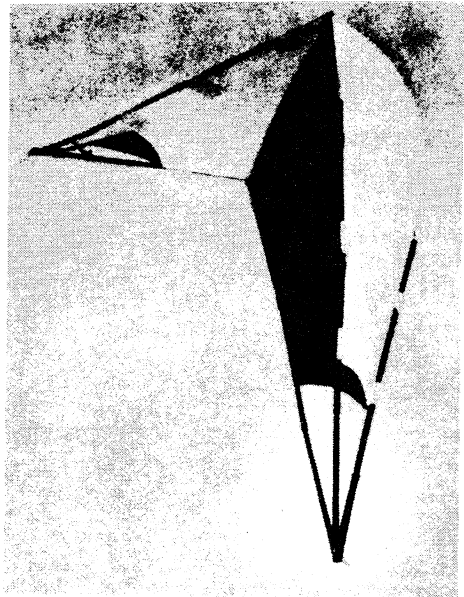
Free kites, tails and string will be given to children, ages 12 and under, beginning 10 a.m. at the Railroad Pavilion. Children may enjoy kite-flying in a designated area of the main parking lot throughout the day.

Contestants, ages 12 through 18, may participate in a special Kite Design Contest also at the Railroad Pavilion.

Registration for the Design Contest will begin at 1 p.m., with judging set for 3 p.m. Kites, which must be hand made of any materials, will be judged for the most unusual on the basis of aero-dynamics, engineering and development. Prizes will be awarded to first, second, and third place winners.
