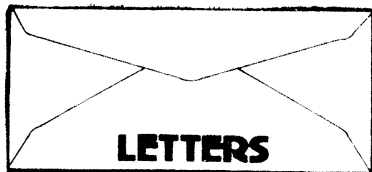
## PUBLIC DIRECTORY INFORMATION --

'GRAND OPENING'

"Georgia on Parade" is the special theme for the official grand opening of the Georgia World Congress Center. The Center is to be inaugurated December 1 through December 5. It will host a spectacular five day festival for the citizens of Georgia.

Since Governor Busbee's official announcement two weeks ago of the "Georgia on Parade" festival, over 100 Georgia businesses, communities, schools and organizations have reserved space in the World Congress Center. Over 500 exhibits will serve as the main attraction depicting Georgia's business and cultural variety. Southern Tech and Kennesaw Junior College will be hosting a joint booth.

Each of the five nights will feature a themed stage show. One end of the massive 350,000 square foot exhibition hall will be set up theater-style with a seating capacity of 5000. On Sunday, December 5, an all day Christmas Party is set. Entertainment that evening will set the stage for the celebration of the nation's forthcoming favorite holiday.

"Georgia on Parade" will be a great deal more than five evening performances. Most of the festival's charm and drawing power will come from the many fascinating Georgians coming to celebrate the most spectacular five day festival in Georgia's history.

Show hours are from 5 to 10 p.m. on Wednesday, 12 noon to 10 p.m. from Thursday through Saturday, and 2 to 10 p.m. on Sunday. Beginning winter quarter--any veteran who fails to complete a Veteran's Status Card, will have his or her benefits interrupted.

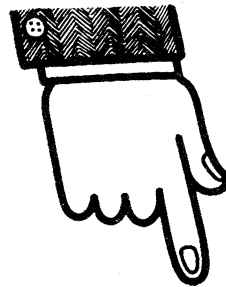
